## Parcels for Nfld. Forces Overseas.

(1) Parcels must not exceed 11 lbs in weight.

(2) Parcels addressed to members of the Newfoundland Forces Over-seas should bear the name and address of a second addressee to whom the parcels may be delivered or forwarded if it should prove impossible to deliver the first. The original address should be written on the FRONT of the parcel where the postage stamps and Customs declaration are affixed, and the second or alternative ad-

dress should be written on BACK of the parcel. If a second address is not furnished at the time of posting, and delivery cannot be effected, the contents of the parcel, unless of exceptional value or of a personal nature, will be turned over to the Military Authorities for distribu-

Parcels containing articles of a value will be returned, if a request for their return in case of non-delivery is made by the sender, such request to be written on the cover of the parcel at the time

of posting.

(5) This plan is being adopted at the suggestion of the British Post Office, which states that the present procedure of holding undel erable parcels at the Dead Lette Office until instructions are re ceived as to their disposal is resulting in the waste of a large quantity of perishable foodstuffs, which form the contents of 90 per

If parcels are sent through the proper channels, every precaution is taken for a safe delivery, from the time they are deposited in the Post Office, St. John's, until they are delivered to the addressee. One case may be cited where a soldier in Scotland to whom four parcels were sent, claimed that he had not received any of these parcels. Complaint was made by the parents of this man, and the matter was investigated. Later the man in ques tion admitted having received the four parcels, but in the meantime, the Regimental authorities and the Pay and Record Office, London, were be ing discredited for mismanagemen and carelessness in looking after the welfare of the men. The public is strictly recommended to follow instructions regarding postal matters published in the Press periodically; and in the event of any complaint of welfare of the men.
