Make Plans for New System of Water Transport

St. Louis.-A new system expected o mark an era in inland waterway transportation, is planned by a group who have incorporated the Standard Unit Navigation company. Under the plans, transportation on the Mississippi and other rivers of the country would be handled in a manner imilar to rairoad transportation. New types of towboats and barges are to be used, extensive trials of which have proved successful, officials said. Explaining the method Carl J. Baer, one of the directors, declared that instead of the huge barges in use on the lower Mississippi and other rivers, the system provides for small barges which would be linked together like freight cars of a train. The towboats would weigh only one-third as much as the present towboats, but would develop the same power. Propulsion of the boats would be

LET'S TALK OF PRICES

Of Some That Are Reasonable and Others That Aren't.

ERTAIN MEMBERS of the local trade have memorialised the Government, asking that the recent Customs Order governing the assessment of imported Boots and Shoes for duty be rescinded. With their petition they forwarded the Government a schedule of prices. Let us take some of the figures included therein as the text of this present discussion of the boot and leather industry of Newfoundland.

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According to the trade memorial and price schedule referred to, Men's Work Boots and Children's McKay Bals, Boots imported for the Newfoundland trade are both bought in the American market at the same price, namely, \$1.40 per pair.

It must surely, strike even the most casual observer that there is something peculiar about such a statement. How is it possible to buy two such different articles-different both as to cost of manufacture and as to relative wear and tear for which each is designed—at exactly the same price. At a conservative estimate, a pair of Men's Work Boots should cost at least twice the price of a pair of Child's Boots. Are the Child's Boots priced too high? Or, are the Men's Work Boots priced so low as to call into question their fitness for the purpose for which they are sold?

The petition to the Government from the retail trade in Boots and Shoes sets a Manufacturer's Price of \$1.85 on Men's McKay Boots. The duty on such a pair of Boots under the old rate was 96c. Freight about 10c. per pair. Total landed cost, \$2.91 per pair. The selling price of such boots averaged \$4.50 per pair.

The same Boot, under the new schedule to which some retailers object, can be landed at a total cost of about \$4.08 per pair.

Under the old schedule, the retail trade, selling these boots at \$4.50 per pair, could make a total profit of \$1.59 per pair. That is profiteering at the rate of over 54 per cent.

Under the new schedule, taking the total landed cost as \$4.03 per pair and the retail price as still \$4.50, the profit per pair would be 47c. That profit figures out at the moderate rate of about 12 per cent.

Now, let the purchasing public decide for themselves whether the retail trade are as much concerned about the consumer as they are over the fact that under the New Schedule their rate of profit on such boots is reduced from 54 per cent. to 12 per cent. As a matter of Fact the public are not one little bit concerned over or affected by the matter. Their boots cost them no more under the New Schedule than under the Old. But, retail profits are very largely reduced and, quite naturally, retailers are raising a howl, not of protest on behalf of the Dear Public, but in memory of Departed Profits.

A first-class all-leather McKay Boot is being sold by local factories at \$4.10 per pair. This Boot will outwear three pairs of the stuff that retailers want admitted to the country at a low duty. If the retailers are really as interested in the consumer as they allege, let them feature this locally made boot before all others, keeping local factories running and local workmen employed, keeping local money in the country and supplying the country with a boot made of first-class leather, covered by the manufacturer's guarantee and representing full value for every cent spent on its purchase.

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

Reported Huge Cave Discovered

Vencouver, B.C., Oct. 13. (Canadian Rumors that Shuswap Lake has a cave that will rival other mam-Roberts, of Shuswap, B.C., who declares he is one of the only two white men ever to enter the place. For many years rumors have been current that a huge cave existed there. According to Roberts ,the mouth of the cave is hidden by silt and river wash and can only be located by one who has been there before. "An Irish-American named Kennedy found it while seeking a home," said Roberts. "He attempted to file on it only to find that that section of the country was reserved for soldiers wishing to take up land. Disappointed, he carefully covered up the en trance to the cave. Kennedy told me about it and two weeks ago I explored the place. For about 200 feet I proceeded through a parrow passage. sometimes able to go ahead at a crouching walk; then again compelled to crawl, owing to the low roof. At the end of the passage I came into a huge cavern. The candle I held threw no light on the roof, so great was the cave. Radiating from the cavern are scores of passages, several of which I examined. Far off in one of these I could hear the roar of a large waterfall, possibly indicating the existence of another large cave. The cave is of natural formation, but there is a lack of stalactites and stalagmies common to other caves, though they occasionally appear in the passages." Many Hurt in Riot Started by Toughs

Women and Children are Trampled During Wild Stampede in Lon-

London, Oct. 8 .- Shouts of "earthquake! earthquake!" in a crowded street market held in the east end of London yesterday caused a wild stampede in which a number of people were trampled hundreds of caged animals destroyed and a quantity of miscellaneous property ruined or

The scene of the disaster was the narrow Solater street, Bethnal Green, a noted centre for the sale of animals for domestic pets. Local traders say that an auction was in progress in the open street when a band of toughs burst in from a side thoroughfare and rushing into the throng of thousands of marketers and spectators, yelled "earthquake!"

The crowd fled screaming towards i both ends of the street, while the stalls with which it was lined were overthrown. The caged birds and animals and other property that fell in the path of the terrified mob suffered severely, many of the creatures being trampled to death and many of the people falling among them to be trampled themselves.

Hundreds of canaries and other small cage birds, besides parrots, cats, dogs and chickens, were crushed within their frail cages. Women and children shrieked, maimed dogs howled, parrots screeched and chickens squaked. A number of birds escaped, fluttering wildely about the street after gaining a freedom which was destined to end in starvation.

The Daily Mail gives the casualties as 60 persons injured, of whom a dozen were taken to hospitals; 2,000 small cage birds either killed or estaped; 100 dogs and cats and scores of poultry killed. Many of the ani-

nials were perceed stock. The terror of the crowd was increased by the explosion of bottles of gasoline in one of the overthrown stalls. 

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
