From Ottawa. Seventeen election petitions have been or are before the Speaker, on ob-jections to the recognizances. It is said the consideration of the North-west Resolutions will be brought up on Thursday next. It is reported that the Hon. Joseph Howe will object to the government of Rupert's Land by Canada—his view being that Great Britain should or-ganize Grown colonies in the North-west and assume the responsibility of governing that territory.

It is stated here that the Confed-erate Government has paid over to Nova Scotia the six months' instal-ment of the annunt accruing to that Province at the rate of S0c, per head. Accounts received here from Nova Scotia represent the feeling against the Union to be strengthened in con-sequence of the postage on newspapers. It seems, also, that all the petty ap-pointments in that Province in the gift of the Dominion are being filled up from the party who have been de-feated at the polls. There are various reports as to the extent of the defacit for the fiscal year, ending June 30th, 1867. Some reports place it as high as five millions of dollars. No one seems to know here whether the Tariff will be brought down before the adjournment or not: It is expected Parliament will ad-

Parliament of Canada.

House of Commons, Ottawa, Dec. 2.

House of Commons, Ottava, Dec. 2. Sir John A. MacDonald 'gave notice that on Wednesday he would move for leave to introduce a Bill respecting the construction of the Intercolonial Railway. Mr. McDougall stated that an arrange-ment had been made with the United States Government whereby a mail was sent by every steamer to St. Thomas, in the West Indies. He also stated that it was for the Local Government to de-cide as to the steps to be taken for the restoration of the Government House in Toronto.

Toronto. The motion for the second reading of the St. Lawrence and Ottawa Railroad Bill gave rise to considerable discussion. Mesers. Smith, McKebzie and Blake thought the matter ought to be left with the Local Legislature; the Premier main-tained that the Bill ought to be allowed to go to committee, and as to whether the measure was ready for the general good, or only a local benefit, the Committee should decide, on hearing evidence upon the subject.

or only a local benefit, the Committee should decide, on hearing evidence upon the subject. Dr. Parker moved an address for orders in Council relating to excise duty or ser-vice, &c. He said he moved for the re-turns because the information will, he thought, show that the excise department was administered something oppressive ly to manufacturers, and as far as appoint-ments are concerned, with negligence and inattention. During the last session, it was stated that the excise service requir-ed to be reorganized at the commence-ment of the recess. A number of Inspec-tors have been placed over divisions, yet it was doubtful if they had been appoint-ed, and to protect the revenue, the col-lectors had been forced to place parties on their own responsibility in charge of dis-tilleries, where they had remained for months under pay, without any proper appointmet. He believed the returns and forms supplied to collectors were fre-quently charged, involving unnecessary expenses for printing. Again, under the orders of the Department, manufacturers had been forced to incur large costs in mew apparents, which could not be sup-plied by the time their licences expired and as they were not allowed to work without them they were subjected to serious loss by the delay. The motion was agreed to. Mr. McDougell postponed his resolutions on the North-West Territory till to day.

The following petitions were presented : By Mr. Heffernan from Archid Crooks, asking to be relieved of his income tax, because he has not earned \$300 during the past year. By Mr. Galbraith from Jame Massie & Co., stating that they are assessed twice on income and twice on property in the West Ward, and asking that the mistake be rectified. By Mr. Massie from Thos. Smith, asking to remit income tax on \$300, as he had for three years been out of the Dominion. By Mř. Melvin from James Henderson, asking to be relieved of dog tax, as he had been shot immediately after the assessors were round; also from C. Adsett, stating that he had been charged for \$400 more in tax bill than was in the schedule. By Mr. Sayers from Jas. O'Neil, asking a reduc-tion of his taxes on the ground that they are much higher than they were last year; also from John Daley, asking to remit his taxes as he is unable to pay them. They were referred to the Finance committe.

When Mr. Higinbotham's communica-tion came up to be disposed of, Dr. Herod said he would like to see the contract. The Clerk produced and read it, which was to the effect that Messrs. High-botham and Harvey agreed to deliver 40 be barrels of coal oil at 18c, per gallon, the oil to be delivered as required, and for which they were paid in advance. Dr. Herod said that as the transaction had gone through the hands of the Fire and Water Committee, it was proper to remit the matter to that Committee to make the proper enquiries. He did not think it was right that the prayer of the petition should be granted unless the reasons were stated to the Council why whatever, and therefore he would move that it be referred to the Committee to inquire into the reasons. This was a very serious matter, for a contract had been solemnly entered into with the Corpora-tion, and now one of the parties wanted to get out of it without even so much as saying why he wished to do so. Did Mr Higinbotham want the partnership be-tween him and Mr Harvey in this matter dissolved, or was he going out of the oil business ".

Mr Heffernan said if Mr Higinbotham Mr Heffernan said if Mr Highlottaam wanted the contract broken, and had re-fused the money, he did not know but it would be better to release him, as the Corporation would make money by doing so, as oil could now be got for 15c. per couldon

gallon. Mr. Thomson said that was a very small matter, and he was informed that the oil sold at 15c. was of an inferior quality. The question was whether or not was Mr Harvey able to complete the contract. They all knew that he was and therefore be could see no good reason why Mr. Higinbotham should not be released, when his partner in the transaction, in every respect competent to fulfil the contract, expressed his willingness to do so.

do so-Mr. Melvin moved, seconded by Mr. Massie, that the petition of Mr N. Higin-botham be granted, and that he be re-leased from his contract. In moving the resolution Mr Melvin said he did not think resolution in Soutract. In moving the resolution in Mickins and he did not think the Council had anything to do with any private arrangement Mr Higinbotham and MrHarvey might make between them-selves with regard to the way in which the contract should be completed. They agreed according to the contract to do a certain thing. They also agree that Mr Harvey shall complete the contract, and Mr. Harvey in his note appended to the communication expresses his willingness to do so. Seeing therefore a mutual ar-rangement had been made between the two, and as they all admitted that Mr. Harvey was equally completent as Mr. Higinbotham to fulfill the conditions of the contract, he did not think it was right for them to pry into their motives and demand their reasons for entering into this arrangement.

demand their reasons for entering into this arrangement. Mr. Heffernan—Why press it to night ? Why not refer it to the Committee ? Mr. Nelvin—If it is accepted by the Council there is no necessity for that. The contract was made by the sanction of the Council, and the Council has the power to release any of the parties from the contract. If they asked for any change in regard to the price or the qual-ity of the oil to be supplied, then the mat-ter would require to come before the committee.






