



The appointment of Lord Dufferin as the successor of Lord Lisgar has found great favour with the English press. The

the specessor of Lord Lisgar has found great favour with the English press. The Daily News of the 3rd inst., says:—

"After the Viceroyalty of India, the Governor-Generalship of the Dominion of Canada is the most distinguished and most arduous office, in connection with the administration of our dependencies, that a statesman can fill. Our present relations with the United States, and the vexed and difficult topics which affect the position of Canada towards the Mother Country, call for a policy at once cautious, hold, delicate and yet firm. It is impossible to predict success in Colonial administration until its achievement converts prediction into history. But there is every reason to look hopefully on Lord Dufferin's future career. It is a matter of secondary, though by no means of small importance, that his literary ability, his refined tastes, his varied accomplishments, and his graceful courtesy of address and bearing, will make him a fitting representative of the Crown."

The London Daily Telegraph says:—
"Lord Dufferin has at length obtained a working office in the conduct of which he can display his signal abilities; and the Dominion, we are entitled to presume, will regard the choice made by our fovernment with warm approval. Courteous, eultivated,—pradent,—yet.—enterprising; gifted with imagination, which issus needful to a general or a statement as a poet or musician; the new Governor-General is precisely the person to fill an office which demands tact in the management of mea, acuteness in the perception of things, and a comprehensive moderation able to make ample allowance for, party passions and national peculiarites."
