SPECIAL IN PREM.—On Wednesday of last week a social came off at the residence of Mr. John Cross, on the sixth Concession. About 140 persons took part in the proceedings, and everything passed off very pleasantly. The refreshments were good and was the music, which was supplied by Mr. Bristol, Miss Cornish, Henderson and Mills were the principal speakers, and short speeches were also made by Messrs. FELL FROM A BARN.—Mr. Simon Grieves, a respectable farmer, was employed at a raising of Mr. George Quarry's barn, on the farm in Paisley Block about 6 o'clock, one evening of last week, in company with a number of others, when he accidentally slipped and fell to the ground, breaking his wrist and his instep, and sustaining a concussion of the spine. He was immediately taken care of, and Dr. Herod administered to his injuries next morning, when he found his patient in a low state. It is supposed, as Mr. Grieves is a temperate man, that he had become overpowered by the heat of the sun, and thus lost his balance upon the building. If the spine is not seriously injured, the case will be less dangerous, and Mr. Grieves will probably be himself again. In the meantime he has the sympathy of a large number of friends, he has been removed to his home near Hepler.

RUNAWAY.—We regret to hear that considerable damage was done by a runaway which occurred on the morning of Mr. Alexander Campbell, Pauline Gore, this (Wednesday) morning. Mr. Campbell had just hitched up his team and loaded his wagon to start for Guelph, the horses being tied at the door. Mrs. Campbell came to the door to shake a quill, and this appeared to have frightened the horses who made a start and broke the tongue of the wagon, then with another bound broke their fastening and started off down the lane at a tearing pace, with the tongue hanging down and the wagon behind them. Before going far the wagon struck a stone and upset, liberating the horses, who galloped on until they were brought up by a gate, which they smashed. One of the horses was badly cut, and the wagon will need extensive repairs.

POLICE COURT. (Before the Police Magistrate.) August 13, 1873. ASSAULT. Albert Boddy, carpenter, was charged by George H. Black, machinist, with assaulting him on Saturday last. Jealousy appears to have been the cause of the difficulty. Defendant was fined 50 cents and costs.

ADVERSIVE LANGUAGE. Peter Honley, labourer, was charged with using adverse language to Elizabeth Butler on Saturday last. The parties live in Northumberland street, and this is not the first time they have brought their little differences before the Bench. Fined \$4 and costs.

REMARKABLE YIELD.—Mr. John Jamieson, of Clear Spring Settlement, took ten bushels of wheat, raised on new land, to Pritchard & Peers' mill, St. Paul's Parish, from which he received 545 lbs. flour, 275 lbs. pollard, 100 lbs. bran; total, 970 lbs.—Monticoba Free Press.

On Monday an employee of the Metropolitan Bank in St. James-street, Montreal, lost \$14,000. He was on his way to make a deposit at another bank, when he lost the above amount. There were over \$10,000 in cheques, payment of which had been stopped. The balance was in his pocket.

SERMON.—Mr. McMillan, a resident of Golebich, has for some time complained of what he for a long time believed to be an attack of Rheumatism in the hip. This opinion he entertained until a few days ago, when he felt the point of something sharp sticking through his flesh. An operation was performed, which resulted in removing a darning needle 4 1/2 inches in length. How the needle entered his flesh Mr. McMillan is unable to learn.

Credit Valley Railway.

IMPORTANT MEETING IN ELORA. In accordance with an announcement published in the Centre Wellington press, meeting was held in Elora, yesterday, Tuesday, to consider the advisability of submitting another By-Law granting aid to the Credit Valley Railway. More than a hundred gentlemen were present from all parts of the Riding, Erin being strongly represented. We have not space for a full report, but will content ourselves with a bare outline of the proceedings. The meeting, which was held in the Drill Shed, was called to order about 3 p. m., when Hugh Hamilton, Esq., Reeve of Elora, was appointed Chairman, and E. Burns, Esq., Secretary.

Moved by Mr. McDowell, of Erin, seconded by R. R., was present, but did not appear until nearly the close of the meeting. Several good addresses were delivered. Mr. Hugh Roberts, Reeve of Pilkington, acting as spokesman for the opposition. The following resolutions were carried almost unanimously, only three or four dissenting being present. There is little doubt that another By-Law will be placed before the electors of the proposed new group at an early date, and that there will be a keen contest between the supporters and opponents of the By-Law.

Moved by Mr. McDowell, of Erin, seconded by Mr. C. Ferguson, of Erin. That in the opinion of this meeting the advantages to be derived from Railway competition are of such a character as to warrant a liberal outlay for the purpose of securing them, inasmuch as they lessen charges for freight and in the same proportion increase the price of farm and other products.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. McMillan, Reeve of Erin, and seconded by Charles Allan, Esq., Pilkington. Whereas the Credit Valley Railway Company have secured their charter to construct their railway from the City of Toronto to Elora and Salem, and the construction of the same is of immense importance to the various municipalities of the County through and to which it runs, it is therefore the opinion of this meeting that if the said company will construct the road they have undertaken to build, and if the necessary steps be taken to secure the submission of a By-Law for that purpose.—Carried.

Moved in amendment by Hugh Roberts, Esq., Pilkington, and seconded by David Lydell, Esq., Pilkington. That it is not advisable to vote any sum of money for the Centre Riding of this county to the Credit Valley Railway till the main line is completed.—Lost.

Moved by C. Allan, Esq., Pilkington, and seconded by Mr. McMillan, of Erin. Whereas some portions of the Municipalities through which the proposed line of the Credit Valley Railway Company will receive less direct benefit from the construction of the said Railway than other portions which are contiguous to the said Road, it is deemed advisable that those portions of said Municipalities which are directly benefited should not be assessed for its construction.—Carried.

Moved by A. Dye, Esq., Garafraxa, and seconded by R. Black, Esq., Garafraxa. That that territory to be assessed shall consist of the following Municipalities, viz:—East and West Garafraxa, Orangeville, Fergus, and Elora, all that portion of the Township of Nichol north-west of the line between the Third and Fourth concessions of the said Townships of Pilkington North West of the line between Lots Seven and Eight in all the concessions of said Township of Nichol north-west of the Grand River, and all that portion of the Township of Erin North-west of the line between Lots Ten and Eleven in Concessions One to Six inclusive and North-west of the line between Lots Five and Six in concessions Seven to Eleven of said Township inclusive.—Carried.

Moved by David Boyle, Esq., Elora, seconded by J. Godfrey, Esq., Elora. That in view of the reduction of the territory to be assessed, it is advisable to offer a proportionately less bonus to the Company, and the amount of such bonus shall be One Hundred and Thirty-five thousand dollars, to be paid in five equal annual instalments.—Carried.

Moved by R. Dalby, Esq., Elora, seconded by D. Boyle, Esq., Elora. That in view of the reduction of the territory to be assessed, it is advisable to offer a proportionately less bonus to the Company, and the amount of such bonus shall be One Hundred and Thirty-five thousand dollars, to be paid in five equal annual instalments.—Carried.

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BY TELEGRAPH.

MEMORIAL TO HIS EXCELLENCY. NINETY MEMBERS SIGN. The Conservatives Seceding. By Telegraph from our own Correspondent. OTTAWA, August 13th, noon.

A large meeting of the members was held in the Railway Committee room this afternoon. A memorial to the Governor General was adopted, asking him not to prorogue Parliament until the House had time to have a thorough and speedy investigation of the Pacific Railway scandal. Ninety members signed the memorial, fifteen of whom have hitherto supported the Government.

Associated Press Despatch. OTTAWA, Aug. 13.—The Governor General arrived early this morning. The House will meet at three o'clock, and it is understood the Governor will be ready to proceed with the prorogation immediately afterwards. It is probable that an announcement will be made that the Commission will proceed to investigate Pacific Railway matters immediately, and Parliament will be called together for the fall session. About 120 members of Parliament are in town. Among the arrivals yesterday were Dr. Schultz and Brown from Manitoba, Hon. J. H. Pope, Prince Edward Island, and a strong representation of the Press. There is considerable excitement in town, and many rumors afloat.

OTTAWA, August 13, noon.—The Pacific Railway Investigation Committee have just held a meeting with all members present except McDonald & Pletion and have adjourned till to-morrow at 11. The proceedings were private but it is understood that no report will be presented by the Committee to the House this afternoon.

The greatest uncertainty prevails as to the proceedings of the House, but if it is prorogued, the existing Committee falls to the ground. The Cabinet is in session now with all its members present. It is stated on good authority that when the House meets this afternoon the proceedings will not last ten minutes; that the members will be summoned to the Senate and the House prorogued, and another session called in about eight weeks.

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Railway Collision at Guelph.

This (Wednesday) morning at a few minutes after seven, the residents in the neighborhood of the Market Square were startled by ominous rumbling from the direction of the railway—the crash of splintering timber and of iron meeting iron; whilst a prolonged screeching of whistles awakened rudely the late-sleeping portion of them, used as they are to this kind of nocturnal howling. The cause of the disturbance was a front-to-front collision between two trains on the railway crossing at West Market Square, opposite the Central School, and a few yards west of the switchman's hut. One of them was a special freight train going west, with two cars full of foreign emigrants attached to it; the other was also a special freight train, going east. The signalman at the crossing noticed the two trains approaching each other on the same track, and excitedly waved his red flag. Being the danger signal, the drivers immediately whistled "down brakes" and reversed their engines. The emigrant train was brought nearly to a stand-still, as it had only just left the siding at the
