To Mrasurs rue HEIGHT of Thess.— When a tree stands so that the length of its shadow can be measured, its height may be readily ascertained as follows :— Set a stick unright—let it be perpendicu-lar by the plumb line. Measure the length of the shadow of the stick. As the length of its shadow is to the height of the stick, so is the shadow of the tree to its height. For instance : if the stick is four feet above the ground and its shadow is 6 ft. in length, and the shadow of the tree is 90 ft, the height of the tree will be sixty feet (6 : 4 : : 60) In other words, multiply the length of the shadow of the stick.
