OFFICIAL STORY NOT RECEIVED

Admitted That Account Will Now Prevent Ultimatum Great Britain Had Prepared For Presentation At St. Petersburg.

London, Oct. 27.—One of the most complicated diplomatic questions in some years exists tonight with no sign of immediate settlement.

The tension that arose into the simple question whether "Russia" would guarantee in advance that she would not resort to the use of force against the British fleet in the event of a Russian ultimatum.

The foreign office apparently, as a matter of course, pursues the policy of silence and the British press is almost entirely uniform.

In the present temper of the British nation it is not at all likely that preparations for a possible invasion of the British coast will be limited.
