In the course of a long statement he pointed out the defects of the present system of education, which had a marked tendency to professionalism and com-mercial life to the detriment of the artisan. He pointed out how technical education could be promoted, and advocated the estab-

"Our mistake in Ontario," said Mr. Houston, "is that we have depended far too much on the selection of subjects to teach instead of considering the best methods of teaching them. This has been the great blunder of education in modern times. Teachers have simply perpetuated a had system—that of stuffing children with a mass of facts, a large proportion of which are of not the slightest practical use to them in after life. Now, we are making some progress in the right direction, but not nearly so rapidly as we should."

Every mechanic ought to have received the best practical training at school. "Teach a boy what he will have to practice when he becomes a man,"was the good old dictum of Aristotle, and it is true yet. The duty of practical training had never been better put. A boy should not commence work until he is 14 years of age.

The School of Practical Science, which was the only one in Canada, should be improved. Its curriculum was not extensive enough and its staff too limited. "It is in a wretchedly bad state, so far as industrial training is concerned." It ought to have ten distinct practical departments. The fundamental one should be industrial drawing. It should have civil, mechanical and railroad engineering classes, each distinct. Its fifth department should be "fhouse construction," instructing not only to draw ground plans, but to work from plans. The sixth department should be that of coloring, dyeing and painting and other principles of applied chemistry. The seventh department he would suggest should be textile fabric working; the eighth, a department in two branches—simple mining and mineralogical. An electrical science department would be desirable where it was not taught, as in Toronto, in the physical science class at the university.

He did not think this ought to deter the Government, for as present they were contributing \$34,000 a year to the Guelph college and farm, while the School of Physical Science only received \$7594. In the remainder of his evidence Mr. Houston spoke of the decay of the apprenticeship system, and said that the most valuable feature of trades unionism was that it tended to supply the place of the Middle Ages "guild" spirit. More machinery would swallow up, smaller ones, and if we wished workingmen to be less amenable to such ideas as had been preached at Chicago, and had had such dire consequences, there must be a better system of training them and improving their position.

At the evening session a delegation from the Carpenters' Union gave evidence. The first witness was Henry Lloyd, who attributed the improved position of the trade of late years to organization. He entered into particulars of the recent strike and said the employers refused to arbitrate on the questions at issue. Personally witness was not in favor of arbitration, but the union as a body was favorable to it. This was his own opinion. The taking on of unskilled men often led to disputes. It also tended to bring down wages. He differed materially in his evidence on several points from that given by Mr. Dinnis. Men worked as carpenters who were only laborers and this the union objected to. If masters would employ such men the union fixed the minimum rate of wages.

The other day the sales of copper on the New York Exchange ran up to dopper on the New York Exchange ran up to between five and six million pounds, mostly for export, at advanced prices. In certain leading American mines, situated in the west but owned mostly in Boston, fires are now traging, which are expected to affect greatly the future supply. But the biggest corner of all is in tin. The world's supply of that article has been covered by a Franch syndicate. all is in tin. The world's supply of that ar-ticle has been cornered by a French syndicate, which was formed in Paris with forty or fifty million dollars capital, and which went into the London market as far back as April or May last. Since then the syndicate's course has been successful right along—upward and onward. The corner is entirely in pig tin, the raw material, and prices for tin plates have not gone up enough to make manufacturing pay. The high prices have checked o'nsump pay. The high prices have cheeked to statution everywhere, so it is said. The Paris syndicate has bought up, in spot and in futures, twice the estimated visible supply of tin in the world. It is not so much a corner as a control of the markets of the whole world.


