SIR CHARLES TUPPER PROTESTS Against the Imputation That Pleuro Was

Imported From Canada, LONDON, May 11.—A few days ago Sir Charles Tupper, Canadian High Commis-sioner, wrote a letter concerning pleuro-preumonia to Henry Chaplin, formerly President of the Board of Agriculture. He protested in this letter against the recent statement that the outbreak of pleuropneumonia in Scotland was traceable to Canadian cattle and insisted that Canada was then and always had been free from the disease.
