Another Range Glass. There has been introduced of late for use by the French army, it is reported, what is known as the lunette Souchard,, that is, a powerful binocular glass for determining the exact distance of an object from the observer. When the glass is in the focus, there are interposed by a movement of the fingers, between the eye and the object, two prisims of Iceland spar, then there are brought into the field of vision two images, the one being the real object, the other a smoky fac-simile, he is distant just at the rear of it, the second image being more elevated, as the distance is greater. THE FURY OF VESUVIUS.

Four Flery Streams Are Now Flowing

From Its Crater. The Record presented a report and diagram showing the renewed activity of the volcano Vesuvius, showing that one new crater was forming on the northwestern border of the (id crator of '71. In the meantime, changes made by the volcanic forces have become very evident. Two new eruptive craters have opened up on the north-western side of the cone below the former summit. At first only a little lava flowed from the new rents. During the first week of July one of these rents increased in size until it reached to the foot of the cinder cone. From this crevice a lava stream of nearly two hundred feet wide flows with great api-dity towards the hills of Orocells, and has, by this time, crossed the coad from the observatory to the station of

cano, of which the one flowing toward Resina has already destroyed two House, London. vineyards. Professor Palmieri, of the meterological observatory, had two mmense stone walls built for the protection if the buildings; it is feared, however, that this proaection will be too feeble to withstand the enormous pressure brought upon it by the stream of lava which is overflowing the crater at that point with a thickness of at least twenty feet. The heat is now almost unbearable. The largest eruptive crater has formed in the "Atrio del Cavallo," the saddle between Vesuvius and the Somma; the lava flow from this crater has formed, by this time, a larger lake between the "Colle del Savatore" and the military rifle range. Next to this crater two cones are forming and steadily rising. which cast a red glow over all the sur roundings. A peculiar phenomenon never before observed is the whistling sound emitted by one of these craters, resembling a locomotive whistle.



But the Prince Did Not Die. The dangerous illness of the Prince of Wales, in December, 1871, was the cause of events—curious and amusing
—which will ever find a place in the history of British journalism. The death of the Prince seemed inevitable, for the doctors began to despair. One day the announcement went forth that His Royal Highness could not survive many hours, and accordingly every daily newspaper in the kingdom had its obituary of the Prince "set," or put into type. But the expected telegram announcing the death never came, and so at midnight, when the hour for going to press was close at hand, many filling six or eight columns of the paper was compelled to fill up the blank columns with "standing matter of all kinds, such as old advertisements and older news. The principal newspaper editors subsequently sent the Prince, at his own request "proofs" of the obituaries, and pasted in a bulky scrapbook, they now form one of the strangest and most curious objects to be seen at Marlborough House.

paper recently read before the Business Men's Associtaion of Newport, R.I., by Charles Acton Ives. The writer shows that the total amount of fire insurance risks written for the year 1893 on property in the State of Rhode Island by the fire insurance companies of all kinds doing business there was \$477,-650,683. The total premiums received by the companies amounted to \$4.272,-049. The total losses were \$1,769,782. The difference between losses paid and premiums received was \$2,502,267. Of this large difference between income and losses, the writer states that more than five-sixths went, not to the stockholders, but to the numerous expenses of running the business. This expense, to borrow a word from science, is friction, and, therefore, dead loss. A draft bill is incorporated in the paper showing how an insurance department can be worked in connection with the state and municipal machinery.
