ANSO'S FISHING' FLEET.

CANSO, December 27 - At this point in the fall fishing season the reault is rather disappointing. While the weather has been mild and fine, high winds have prevailed and the fishermen have had to contend with very rough sea, often causing the of gear, which has seldom been more expensive than at present. Repeatedly the whole Canso fleet has sone to the fishing grounds day after day only to find when reaching there that is was to rough to fish, and the only thing left to be done was to beat back to the harbor.

A finer and more up-to-date fleet of fishing boats is not to be found on the Atlantic coast than is now owned and operated from this port. Neither is there a fleet anywhere better manned than Canso's fleet. Most of the land. newer boats are owned and sailed by young men who take a delight in making their arduous calling a success, and who are deaf to the calls of the west to which so many of the young men, the flower of our fair province, have listened. The young men of Canso have faith in their town and stie great possibilities of the veritable gold mine, the fisheries, lying right at their doors, and are willing to hvest their hard earned capital in ks prosecution and development. Much has done in the past few years towards making the development of this important industry possible, but in order that the most may be made of the demand for the product of es, and that the fishermen may hare in the prosperity attending the development of the industry, there

must be improved means of putting every day's catch on the market as quickly as possible and thereby compete with other points which enjoy up-to-date transportation facilities. For years the leaders in the fish busiess have advocated and agitated for upon the attention of the governmen the need of assistance in the develop through the county connecting with the main line of the I. C. R. at some point, but all appeals have apparently great fishing industry waits. 
