－A leading flour bhipper says the reason the other side is taking American flour moro freely and whent less so than a year ago is that flour is lower than whent this year， and so low here，with ocean frelghts，that millers on the other side cannot compete， ne they are obliged to buy American wheat to mix with their poor native crop．

－The growing evil of returniug merchan－ dise sold without just cause，nlready al－ luded to in these columns，has called forth a protest from the Toronto dry goods trade．The attention of customers is called to the great loss arising from such habit， through depreciation in value．Only such goods may be returned as are sent＂not according to order，＂and in such cases the house is willing to bear the loss，but what
is objected to is tho exerciso by custom－ ers of the power of returning goorls judis－ criminately．
－The demand for hogs has been brisk of late，throughout Ontario，and both bri－ tish and English markets are firm．A scar－ city is complained of，as for some time young and lean animals have been prompt－ ly marketed，to take advantage of the com－ paratively high prices．Quotations are now $\$ 2$ per cwt．above those of last year．The advance was caused first by the large ship－ ments of hog products by Canadian manu－ facturers to England，which created a scar－ city of meats in our own markets，and huter by the sloort crop of loge as compared with last season．Besides the shipments of hoge to Montreal two large factories in Ontario are buying all they can get to manufacture meats，mosily for export．
－Tho annual poultry fair at Smith＇s Balls began on the 16th，many buycirs from other parts of Ontario，and the Unit－ ed States，being present．Sales agrregated $\$ 8,000$ to $\$ 12,000$ ．Dealers bid from 10 e to 11e per lb for turkeys，and a finer dis－ play was never made in Canada．The farm－
ars have been educated as to the class of birids wanted，how to prepare them for market，and the result was that $\$ 4,000$ were soon paid out at highest figures．Muy－ ers stated that fully one more would haye been paid but for the Americian duty：

The objection lias been raised that if registered letters were insured, as suggested by the Wimipeg Boarl of 'Irade, the contents of each letter would have to be inspected at the office before sending, and again before delivery. The extra trouble would curtail extra cost, allhough the latter might not equal express company charges. Suicty and cheapness is already secured by the moncy order system, and those who object to the slight delay and formality required, might find the registration and insurance of money letters more troublesome still. ## GOLD SAIPMEXTS.

It has always been our contention that banking was beyond the sphere or scope of Government, and no strongei proof is needed than that aiforded by the New York market during the present week in the advance in

money rates to 30 and 40 per ceat. due to a dreaded scarcity of gold following the heavy shipments to Europe of that coin, and the depletion of the J. S. Treasury reserves and the market supply.
The shipment of nearly $\$ 7,000,000$ last week and the prospect of further shipments this week have together aroused the attention of financial minds to the delleacy of the situation. In attributing its perplexities to Governmental action we bad in view the continued lssuance of eurrency by the Treasury to extent of nearly $\$ 50,000,000$ annually, just as a perfunctory matter and note, as it should be, in obedience to a law of natural expansion of the currency, and consequent demand for it. A casual observer maght fancy that this redundancy of the circulating merium would make money cheap, but we sec its opposite effect. The certifientes are payable in gold and redeemable on presentation. When they come upon a Treasury with barely $\$ 100,000,000$ of gold with which to redeem $\$ 500,000$,000 of certificates we at once discover: the factor creating the extreme rates for mones recently prevalent in Now York. Gold shipments, when sterling is abont 110\%, may be simply a matter of indivilual moment, and the shipments may coutinue in large volume and ereate no concern from the fact that being for proftes' sake they must cease when their superabundance hats brolen the rate for sterling and so robbed the shipper of further profit. and ceased his shipments. But if the continue long aiter profit has. censed they raise confecture and then alarm.

It is stated, though not proved, that European bankers acting for the Austrian and Rusbian Governments are at: the baek of some of the recent shlpments und that it is they who remburse the shippers for their losses.

For a lime the money market dil not ivel the effect of these shipments though the drain upon the reserves of the New York Banks was severe. But now a close study of the situation reveals the fact that the cotton and other exports are insuficient to create a supply of bills to adjust trade or investment balances-that the sales of American securitics by burope have continued to an extent denoting lack of faith in present values largely attributable to the inflation of the currency and the nonadjusiment of the silver question, and the further dread that the day may be near at hand when the only coin in which: contracts can be kept will be silver. The double-standard men may or may not be at the back of the movement causing the drain of gold, yet it dose look as if the depletion of gold reserves might mean a suddenly enioreed resort to a silver fitandard.
Our Cathadian Banks whin their large casli baloneess should be observant of the condition of afiairs and take measures to ensure the completion of all contracts in when they are interested on a gold basis.

We woild aguin take opportunter to suggest to our own Government Fillaner Deparment the wisuom of strengthening their gold reserves which are so inadequate.

THE DEPRESSION IN GREATH bRITAIN.
The gencral depresslon in trade and in agrientime whieh his prevailed latterly in Great Britain, is naturally the subject of much discussion in the more thonghtiul of the periodicals. The "Nineteenth Century" for December. contains an article under the singular cuption of " $£ 38,000,000$ per"annum" fron the pen of the Right Hon. Jesse Collings, M. P., which has special
reference to the National Conference on Agrieultural Depression held during the month, which the author hopes will result in something more effective and satisfactory than that wheh has followed the deliberations of the various committees, commissions and confer. ences which have been held on this ever recurving question in the past. "The public" as he says need information "as to whether the expenses of a nation fall too heavily on the land, whether the basis of assessment adopted in former times when land was the great source of income, and trade and commerce instrnificanti ju comparison, is quite eruitable in the present day when a diferent state of things exists. He ulverts to the signs of the times in respect of protection under the names of Free Trade and Lieciprocity, and he might have added Imperind Federaiton, as likely to be to the front With elaborate arguments to prove that a duty on grain would benefit the farmer, the laborer and the whole nation, a questionable bencit--"by raising the pries of food;"-he looks upon discusslons of this character as sheer waste of time, hasmuch ats it is a settled fact that the people of Great Brltain will not sulmit to any tax whatever upon breadstuffs. Fife follows up the guestion in respect of the duty on grain, by recalling the fact that from 1501 io 1881, when whent averaged above :00 shillings per quarter (about \$1.50 per bushel) the wages of the laborery were lower than durlug the period from 188ㄴ to the present lime, and argues that the much-talked-of improvement in the condition of the inborer arises, not so much from the increase in his weekly wns:, as from the greater purchnstug power of the amm ho recetives In buying brend, which is the primetpal article of food for himself and funily. Mr. Collings strongly asserts that a
tax on raw material of any kind is admitted to be out of the guestion if British minufacturers are to hold their own; and though it may be advanced on the other side that the system upon whicle the govermment of Great Brituin proceeng difers not aftogether in degrer from that which prevalls in countries where a pretectionist policy is avowed.
In Great Britain two or three imported attleles of extensive consumption by all classes of people, except to some extent the teetotalers, are made to provide the revenue, while in other eountries, Canada for example, the dnty is spread to a greater or less extemt over a large number of imports. There is less difficulty in levying upon a iew articles than upon so many, and there are perhaps, not so many opportunities for smuggllag. Mr. Collings points out that the greatest competition with the British furmer comes from the United states; and yet, the exports from Great Britian to that country have more than doubled during the past 15 years, in 1891 alone amounting to a total value of above $\$ 200,000,000$, the imports to Great britain during the same year (excluding foods, raw material and articles not produced in Grent Britain) were it mere trife, and consequently he urgues it would be simply folly to Jeoparize trade to the amount of $\$ 200$,000,000 per annum by imposing dutics on the articles imported (amounting to legs than $\$ 10.000,000$ ) which compete with the British manufacturers. He accounts for the present low values as beiner a reaction from the higher prices of recent years, which following the law of supply and demand, have natwally led to a more abundant production, and that it is a condition to wheh all trades are subfect. But Mr. Collugs' main argmment is bised on the proportion of the land under cultivation in the United Kingtom, the total being is, 000,000 of ateres, of which only abouti $9,000,000$ of acres are being worked, and he points ont that the smblluess of this proportion, which is chlefly devoted to whent, batley and oits, is at the bottom of much of the depression, agrieultmal and other, in Great Dritain. Teaving corn and entthe out of the question, he shows that the imports of other agrieultural products in 1801 were as follow,-reckoning \$5 to the $\mathcal{L}$ sterling:-

Thk: total gives the " $£ 38,000,000$ per annum " which heads the article. Here is a demand, at paying prices, for upwards of $\$ 100,000,000$ worth of agricultural products, over and above the present British supply, a sum which. is Mr. Collings points out, execeds the value of all other exports for the same year to the whole of the colonies of Australia, New Zenland, Tasmania and Nortl: America. "At the same time" he groes on, "there are reports from: all sides, of farms unlet and land thrown on the owners' hands, or going out of eultivation altogether," 'The question arises, Why should an industry be snt)fect to continual depression, which has such a vast umonnt of trade offured at its very doors? "What" says the writer, "would be snid of a body of manufacturers who had available men and materinl, but who, through failing to adapt their products to the demand, allowed the orders offered them to go to foreign countries, and who, nevertheless, complained of depression in trate?" We think there is a valunble lesson in these questions for our own people, and more particularly in respecti of the article of butter which, it is to be hoped, the new interest being. aroused among our people in the Province of Quebee lately, may be determund in asatisfactory manner. "Why cannot" snys Mr. Collings "the farming industry supply the home market, the lest of all markets, with suffieient. gunatities of the articles enumerated in the foregoing table?"

It is to be feared that were Camadia to abandon her present fiscal system. that the home market in this country would be sally reduced for want of eonsumers who would otherwise be obliged to seek employment where the artieles of import ars manufactured and to inmigrate and settle where employment is to be had. Fifty years ago butter wats retalled in England for 14 cents per 1b.. or less; now the price is from 20 eents to 30 conts per 1 b , all beeanse of the short supply in the market, ats shown by the enormons quantity indeated in the above table. The same may be said of butter and every other article of food in the list. It is recommented that the various chambers of eommerce and the commereial press gemerally, take up the subject. He ridibules the alarm erented over the importation of $a$ few thousanyl pounds worth of steam engines or lron girders from: Belgitum, while there is no anxiety nt all shown over the stendy increase in imports of say cheese, which was bought to the extent of $£ \pm, \$ 90,000$ ster-
ling in 1801. "Surely" aays Mr. Collings, "Great Britain is as fitted to produce checse as it is to mamuiacture steam engines and girders."

If traders or manufacturers fail, it is admitted us a possibility that their failure mirght to some degree be the result of want of skill, deficient enterprise, adherence to old routine or to some defective system to which their undertakings are subject. In agrleultural depression it seems that these etuses are but little recognized, and want of suecess is generally put down to other reasons, such as the high price of labor, conditions of climate and roreign competition. It is high time that all places made within easy reach of our large cities by ruilway facilities of late years, should give more attention to the produce of smaller articles of food. It is the minute cultivation, Mr. Collings points out, yiclding but small individual gains in return for close personal attention and hard work, which is necessary for success. Fie points out the case of Birmingham, England, where there are large factories in which the masters have ample employment in the mere overlooking the management of their business, but Where there are also numberless smaller work-shops of varions grides, produchag often what larger concerns cannot do so well. In these the master is found working sometimes with his family only, sometimes with only two or three hands, and his profit and prosperity are due chiefly to his own labor and that of his family. The aggregate production of these emall work shops is probably far in exeess of that of the Inrger factories. Their methods are like those of the Belgium peasant farmei who, for example, finding that English people wonld buy mbitis, set to work to supply the demand, and is now able to send them amually that article of food to the value of above a million dohars.

There is much food for thought in the arguments of Mr. Collings, and we have given oute readers the substance oi his maper in as brici a sipace as possible. He closes by accounting for the agricultural depression in Great Britaln, by saying that the system is fauly and incomplete; and that the community, before entertaining any demands for public relict for the agricultural industry, have a right to aspis why articles of food which the country is fitted to supply and for which so many millions of mones are amually pait to foreign nations, are not produed at home.

## WOOI AND WOOLENS.

- It seems to be a foregone conclusion that a sweeping change will be introduced, affecting wool, woolens and clothing, by the new Amerlean atministration. Certainly, in no other department of industry and trade, was such an aboomal state of affairs brought about by the MeFinley tariff. the necesstry apparel of avery citizen being heavily taxed for the benefit of the privilnged mauufacturing class:
The fact that Americans found they could cross the line into Ontario to buy a suit of clothes and be well repuid for their trouble, after paying hotel and railway charges, speaks for itself. Only the other day a leading Moutren tailor asserted that he conlel afiord to give a New Yorker his return ticket, mect his hotel bill at a good house here, and send his eustomer back with a better dress suit than he conld gev in New York for a considerably higher price, and yet make a good protit for himself. A good deal has been satid about " the pauper labor in Europe" which will not bear the light oi day. An American exchange, for instance, has recently shown that the cottoa spinner in Massachusetts earns so.78, whilst in Eugland he receives about $\$ 0$, in France $\$ 6$, in spain even $\$ \mathbf{6}$, In Germany $\$ 5.98$, in Pelgium 5. 20 and in Hollaud and Switzerland $\beta$ S. Relatively higher wages are paid in the woolen mills in the United States than to the same class of labor in the cotton faetories and it is reasonable to suppose that this is because the duties on woolens have rauged so much-higher than those on cotton fabries. In Great Britain the opposite rule prevails, the spluner in the cotton mill earning about $\$ 9$ and In the woolen mill only \&s.30.
Canada has always been a liuge exporter of wool to the Linited States and the Canadian farmer and American manufacturer have both been injured by the high turiff, to the auvantage of nobody, ad the linited States does not produce anjehing like the quantity of wool which the needs of the people demand, Wool is too bulky an article to be sinuggled in any quantity and the tendeacy with dishonest traders has naturally been to introduce the mannfactured article which, under the stimulus of abundant raw material, has cheapened in price and improved in quallty on the Canadian side. The American farmer in spite of his large market is not much of a wool raiser, statisties proving that America is declining as a wool-producing country. Between 1870 and 2859 the country Incrensed in population 60 per cent., but the
number of sheup only by $8 \frac{1}{6}$ per cent. The true polley for the whole cointry Is now seen to be free wool as this will develop the woolea industries: and cheapen clothing. A wider market is thercfore assured for Canadian wool, surplus supplies of which are already largely held, subject to removal of duty. The Amerfan farmer was won over to the side of the manufacturers, who wished to keep out imported goods, by the paltry sop of a duty on wool, but he soon found that he hitd to pay more for his clothing and necessary woolen material and the least inteligent could not but see that what MeKinleyism gave with one hand it more than took away with the other.
There are over a hundred and fifty Items in the wool schedules, and in the majority of cases the " ad valorem" duty ls 100 per cent. or more. The duty on raw wool and hair varies from 32 to 120 per cent. There is a compound duty on wooleu goods; (1) a duty per pound or per square yard, which is intended to compensate manufacturers for the higher prices of raw wool; and (2) an "ad valorem duty, alleged by MeKinleyites to be necessary as compensation for the higher wages which are supposed to be paid in Americal. Prices of goods have been greatiy augmented bat although less wool is consumed the output has not lessened but rather inereased. In no brauch of industy is fraud procticed with greater success and so woolen goods are made without wool. The waste of factories in Europe-woolen, rags, mungo, flocles, slubbing waste, roving waste, ring Waste, yarn waste, noils, and all other wastes enamerated in the MoFinley taxifi under the comprehensive name of shoddy-is geat to sumerica to the made into woolen fabrics. The well known ingenuity of the American manufacturer has been brought into active excreise. Le bas introduced cattle hair, doge' hair, goats' hair, bark, fibre, and anythiug else, which when manipulated will hold together, into the manufacture of woolen goods. It is stated that alleged woolen cluth sold at 50 c a year contains bo per cent. of shoddy, 9 per cent. of poor cotton, and 9 per cent. of woolen waste. Who can blame the sensible American for carciully replenishing his wardrobe with cheap and honest goods when travelling in Canadn or Great Britain ?
In the variable climate of this continent there is no saie guard equal to genuine woolen wear, nothing contributing more to comfort and bealth, Quite recently the eminent economist; David A. Wells, declared that the
heath of the American people was betn undermlied, through the wholesale de terioration of woolen elothing.


## BANEROPTCY LEGISLATION:

It has been said that men with -t gitiemmes are the worst adviserg of legislation-naturally they are prejí diced and it is obvious tomards wheli silde they lean. A conmitte of wealthy men, for instance, who have inherited their wealth, and have never known What a deficiency of cash assets meanis; ate unlikely to advise in legistative matters in the direction of protecting the interests of small or weak men, though the latter possess an equal citi: zenship with their own.
It is easy to be exacting, easy to enunciate the principle of dolar for doilar when you havo no lack of the coin, but it is a duty on the part oi those advising on the subject of bankruptey legislation to frame such enactments as will grant relief to honest insolvents as well as impartially prothet the interests of rich creditors, or others. We incline to the opinion that. the esseuec of bankuptey seems to suggest that were we able to empanel a committee on the subject, of men who had guined whatever means they ever had by hard strugerle, who though honest and component had been overtalien by misfortune and gone through bankruptey, such a committee, we think, could more fairly analyse and: suggest schemes for the protection of all honest interests in tride than the richer class to whom insolvency is but n name.
This may be a quixotic statement, yed mediocre men do contribute largely to the forces which prevall in other departments of ethies, and why not here?

If the course of the information. given to the Ministers of the Cabinet. at. Oltawa by the spokesmen of the recent deputation of the Boards of Trade; ; we notice that stress was Iaid upoil the fact that the proposed bankiuptey bill gave no countenance to the sublect of compromise, and took no cognizance of any other right thin that of creditors to realize by sule the assets of each and every bankrupt:

The Hallfax Board of Tiade ayeai. "go spoke its mind in the direction of the complete disallowance, under any circumstances, of any compromise ditit ectly or indirectly between ${ }^{-1}$ creditoris. and bankrupt. There is a heattiess. ness in such a resolution calling por severo discipline.
We readily udmit that the firgt. obfect of all law after the protection
of the person is the enforcement of the ghingation of contract. Jut legishation musi embrace more than the erudities of the subject if it wants to be just. It mast unt concentrate itself upon but two duestions: 1. By what mensures shall the obligation be enforced. 2 . By what penatiles shatll the breach of It te punishers. This would simply carry us batk to the earlier etages of civilization where the debtor, and sometlmes his family, was sold into slavery for the purpose of satisfing his debt.
Happisy an admaned civilization has Hitherto put a milder construction unon it debtor's fallure to fulfil his contrict, and where unatended with circumstances indicatiag fraud, has attributed it to misfortune, and extended sympathy.
It has withinawn this sympathy wher nergligence has treneled closely on frand, or where dissipated habits and gambliag propensities have caten into the assets belonging to ereditors. It would be a retrograde movement ior a smull commanity like our own to adopl a natrowminded policy in formulating a bankuptey law wheh looked only to the proteetion of ereditors' interests, and mate no distinction between the insolvent who bectume so from inevitable misfortune, and mother who was fond to les seereting his property.
To take away our right to bargain with a fellow man, ant compound his debt if need be, is to reduce us to an unendurable stavery. An enactanent to delmr ereditors from the exereise of a Chisthat privilege should have no place on the statute book.
The mmendments of 1800 to the Jinglish Bamkruptey set, and the proposed National Bankruptey Bill in the United Btates both regard compromise as fair and reasonable, and contain chases enahliug an honest debtor to effect a compromise readily and quielly after having exhibited his schedule of assets and Hablities. We do not advocate hasty of slipshod compromises, butexperience teneles that the offer of the honest insolvent is fatication of the begt resulta that conld tre obtained under a process of realization.

But whatever may bo our mind upon the multer of compromise or our experlence in dealing with jusolvent: debtors we cannot advocate the placing on: one statute book of any law that would rob us of our freedom to commomise a debt where common sense and the detates of consedence urged us In that direction.
Wenie confldent that the law offlers of'ti' Crown by Introduciug the mater.
ns a Government measure will eliminate all local or class legisintion from the Bill now before them for consiteration.

## CANADA AND FRANCE.

The commercial convention with Franco, recently advocated by Sir Chas. 'rupper, has been warmly approved by Ja Irepubligue Fruncalse, on the ground that it is fair and advantareous and would draw more closely together the bonds which unite the mother country to its old colony. It appears that there is a majority of the two Chambers, strongly opposed to the system of conmercial treaties, but in the proposed arraigement there is nothing; accordiag to this authority, to give rise to the slightest objection. Canada offers a treaty containing notable advantages in tavor of French products, flestring in return the benefit of the minimum tarifi of France.
Trance has Just signed new arrangements with the United States, and granted the minimum, instead oi the: maximum tariff on a number of arifeles, on the condition that the United States entrely removes the duty on sugar, ta, cofice, and hides. The comduct of Ganada compares much mote favorably, for while the United states was making war upon Srance with prohibitory tarifis, the Dominion atmitted free of duty sugir, tea, coffee and hides. and levied muel lower duties on tobacro fhan- those imposed by the United States. French wines, spirits and ligaors have hat to pay duties arerubing 15to e0 per eent. lower than those leved at American poris. These considerations have led the Parisian mess to treat the Canadian proposals in a invorable light and, in fetet, to speak of them as just and equitable. Canatat is seen to be "a conntry with a great iuture, the prosperity it is enjoying at present being a guncunte oi what it will be when its population has reached its norman development." Probably; for the want of better commanication, White our imports of Frenel goods have inereased our exports have been surpisingly small, amounting to less than hali a million. The proposals to include a French port in the new at lantie sorvice is calculated to put trake on : In entirely different footing.
it would be surprising if Franee should forget her sons in the new World and treat them with less regard than tho Euglish speaking races in the Gnited states. "We cannot lorget" says La Republigue Francaise" "the two milHons of French Camadans who are of our race and our blood; who speak our tongue; who have eser proseryed
a warm affection for the mother country, and who defend so courageously the influence of French customs inal dieas on the American Continent."

## PETROLPUM TARINF,

Since our last utteravce on this sub-ject-in the issue of the 9 th instantour attention has been called to several alleged rensons why changes in the present trade arrangements of this business should be made. It is not desirable here to mix up the ephemeral incidents of varying prices in this discussion. It is more important that the broader view of the large and perma. nent general interest be considered.

The first charge made is that the oil producing district in Cimada is rapidly beconing exhausted. This charge we ire prepared to meet with an unqualified denial. The statisties of the business will show that in the current year more crude oll has been pumped in the Petrolia, Oil Springs, Euniskillen, and Sunia districts than ever before. Development now-a-days in these places is not characterized by the incidents of bige strikes and flowing wells thit were common when the territory was first opened up, but its capacity to yield antl stay is proved by its life. There are wells pumping now that have been pumping for over twenty-five years, and teritory abaudoned at one time has bees again worked and worked pro. Atable. An American operator some sears ago mronomeet the Cumation of inele the most durable in the world, :Hul if this contimued excitement about fariff were left alone, other distriets would be developed, and come into play. some of our readers will doubtless remember Bothwell: the man who made the "Toronto Globe" realized largely out of this district by the enterprise and faith some people had in Bothwell. There is still oil there, hut the conditions of drilling are different, and it takes a fairly stendy price to encourage operations there. These operations are boing undertaken now, and we expect Bothwell to rank once more' as an active crude producing entre. There are other districts that would be operated in if reasonable assurance of permanence were given to operators. We imagine this is the retarding cause in developitg New Brunswick, as the Crude auty ought eufficiently to protect operiations in the Albertite slale distriet. We should probably have had some reports too from our own North-west. One set of operators sent plant and machinery out last season to explore nour Lethbridge, but the "rig" by
accident got burned down. A fresh attempt will llkely be made.
It is charged that varlous kinds or products eannot be made out of Camadan oil. To that all we have to say is, that if people want Gasoline, they can get all they require in Canada. Eugine oils are a separate business, as other oils than Petroleum are used In these; and any liseussion of this brauch must necessarily include fish, vegetable and other auimal oils as well as the mineral. We do not hesitate to say that Canudian mineral lubricating oil is the best of its kind and cannot be execlled either as to quality or price by any country under the sua. But we do not deng that there may be some fancy products, such as hair oil and hail restorers to which Canada has not yet attained, but articles of that lind do not come within our purview.

The cooperage interest is referved to. Noue know its well as the new agitators that this is merely a blind. Barrels are made now-a-days by machinery and the present manufacturiug capacity in the Dominion is ample for all. requirements. Barrels are used for years, and filled over and over again. They are re-shipped in all sorts of ways. What worls falls to be done by cooperages is simply lieeping up the amoal waste. That industry woukd not change under any system, and our present coopernge capacity is largely in excess of the possibility of all requirements. As an illustration we may say the patented machinery in use in Canada could make more barrels in a week than the cutire Camadian requirements call for in six. This cooperage argument is the very thimest possible.
We think it unnecessary to say more at present. If any changes are shown to be necessary, 1 et us begin with them in the right way-by dealing with our oll friends as having a joint interest in the Couniry with us, instead of hounding and abusing and misrepresent. fing them for no other fault than enter. ing into legitimate mining enterprises uvaier national invitation in this DominIon of ours.

## BANE OF OTTAWA.

A report of the elghteenth annual meethng of this institution, held at Ottawa on the luth instant, will be pound elsewhere in our columns. Speaklig to the shareholders at the meeting a year ago, Mr. Burn, the able chitef esecutive ofleer, said " while we cannot hope always to show such good resulte as those now presented, we can, I trust by prudence and care in carry-
ing out the policy:indicated from time to thine by the Directors, hope to deserve success and to mieet with comparatively few reverbes."
The shareholders at the meeting last: week in considering the statements ior the year ending 30 th November were able to congratulate the Directors and Mr. Burn over the fact that what had been devoutly hoped for hat been actually reulized.
Befltting eulogies were bestowed upon the memory of flle late lamented President James Maclaren to whose efforts In so large a degree the Bank has owed both its origin and stability.
Comparing the figures with those of 1801 we note a very generar nerease in those which denote progress and extended influence, amongst whicle are the following :

The increase in cupital is part of the $\$ 50 c, 000$ issued a year ago and now all subscribecl, but of which $\$ 104,590$ yet remains to be paid. The new stock was issued at a premium of $42 \%$ realizing $\$ 212,500$ of prospective profit. of thls the Rest Account has had creuit in
1891 for $\$ 7.4,468.50$
1892 for GS.0S0.75
and the balance of $\$ 00,950.75$ we presume will be patd into the Bankis hauds with the iinal instalments on the stock. The increase in Capital will call for earmings of $\$ 2,4,000$ or there about, and the increase of interesi: bearing deposits $\$ 577,295$, about $\$ 20$, 000 more. These sums will be proviterl for out of the increased discounts and loans, $\$ 050,601$.

The total loanlyg power of the Banl: has been extended $\$ 1,629,242$ in the last two years. The Rest Account is now $\$ 707,549$ or about 53 per cent. of the Capital, but the management have wisely demonstrated to the shareholders its true value by informing. them of the ritio it bears to the ag. gregate of loans and discounts which have now reached the considerable total of $\$ 0,034,786$.
There are no burdensome tems under the heudings of overdue debts, real estate, mortgages, or bank premises, upon which facts we may congratulate Mr: Burn, and not less his attentive and careful Board of Directors, and the former also upon the bestowment of his aew title of General Manager.

## WIRE: ITS MaNUFACTURE AND USES.

Wo are indebted to the B. Greening Wire Co. of Hamilton for a copy of a compact
littlo paimphlet of some two dozen pagos, dealing with the manifacture of wire, it autiguity and its relation. to modern uses. As the firm is one of the largest users ofwhe thenselves, they havo beon able to condonse a great doal of information in the fer pages to which the brochure is confined. The pauphlet begins with referonce to the great extension of the uses of wire during the prosent century, for the clectric telegraph, ocean cables, the groat suspension brilges, the telephoue, electric roads, the drilling for uatural gas, tha making of wire fencing, nails, ete; all of which have created an inmense demand. for the article and stimulated an industry which, as they say now, takes such highi rauk amons the manufactures of the world. The B. Greening Wire Company can claim to a long and inherited exporience in the business. Immediatelv before the beginniug of the present century Nalhaniel Greening, who came from Tintern Abhey, well known to the readers of Wordsworth, began the munufacture of wire at Warrington in Lancashire. $\Delta$ few years later the firm of Greening \& Rylands was established; who carried on business until 18.10, when tho partuership was dissolved, Mr. Greening taking his sons into business and establishing the firm of N. Grecning \& Sons. IH was with the firm of Greening \& Ryhade that the late B. Greening, secoud son of N. Greming, servad a soven years' apprentieeship as a wire-drawer, and laving sometime alterwards bugun business for himeelf, he coutinued until 1858 when he came to Cumath and became one of the pioncers of the wire industry in this country under the name of B. Greening \& Co. In 1887 he was succeeded by his son S. O. Greeniug, who bnilt new works and ubled largely to the lines previously manuinetured. Tho mosiness was incorporated in 1889 as a joint stock company under the present name. with Mr. S. O. Greening as presir. dent; meantime important additions havo been made to the buildings and machinery occupied and employed by the company.
We cannot do better here than mako nome extracts from the pumphet under notice, describing the methods of wire manufacture. We sliall omit any reference to the ore and its conversion into bloomis whicl are passed between a pair of power. fil grooved rolls which form the welded. iron into bars. these burs are cut into short lengths, and a nunber of them aro placed togetior and aro known as a "iag. got." After being brouglat to a welding heat, they are subjected to the heary blows of a stean hammer for the purpose of driviug out any further impurity remaining. The welded mass thus formed is called a "billet." The billet is passed through a train of rolls and the rods are reduced. in diameter to about three-sixteonths of an inch or No. 0 wire gauge, which is the size of rod mostly used. The rods are now ready for the cold-drawing process but are first thoroughly clenused fromin benle or rust by soaking in : a solution of sulphuric acid and water. They are pext immersed in lime-water to prevent rusting until tho wiredrawer is ready to taieo them in hand,
The end of the wire is uext put into a: pointing nachive which produces a tapered end, in order to pass far cuough through the plate or die to enable the drawer to seize it with his tonge. By two or there
$\ddot{p}$ plls he draws enough wire through to fusten in a pair of vice-jaws attuched to the revolving block around which it is enrried, each coil of the wire foreing tho " hat further up the block until the coil is timished. After being reduced a few gauges, the wire becomes so hard that annealing:becomes necessury,--quite a tedious pro-ceem-nfter which it is agatin nlowed arother clenning and euting, nad further reduced by repeated drawings through fahes in the dies until brought io the size reipuirect. The construction oi these dies reipuives many days of contintoon driling. The delicacy of the work may be somewhat understood from the fact that the size required is as fine as the dinmeter of a hair. Whe B. Greening Wire Co. sty that they hnvo suceceded in their own mill in drawinn hoft steel wire so fine that it would tuke 140 wires, laid silde by side, to cover ant inch, which is said to be tho finest aver drown in Canadi. Dintil quite recently, about five jenrs ago, all the special grades of wire wore imported, but phain uncovered and tinued wire for mattresses had the stitching of pamphets are now manafactured extensively in the company's works in Hamilton. 'linned wire for mak--ing toilet pins, whieh are male expressly for a manufacturing firm ill Galt, is also un important part of the business.

A alencription of some of the ases (1) which wire is puti will not be deemed unintaresting here. 'I'hore are varions grmes oin ateel and iron used, aceorting to the purpose for which the wire in intemed. For suspension bridges, mining, quaryiug, deep well drilling had all purposes reguiring great strength and tonglimess, ropes are male from crucible cast steel, tronted by a specint putented process. The tensile strain to the wire shond be abont-
$180,000 \mathrm{lbs}$ to the square inch, which menns that a bat of the materind frome which the wiro is made, one inch square should lift ninety tons. The toughness nit the wire is tested by a vely thorough process; it is grasped in the jaws of the vice nad bent backwal and forwari at right nugles, a certain namber of twists io the inch. Aiter passing the necersary insjeetion it is womd on reels and placed on a rotary frome, where it is twisted into rope. Theso, ropes reguiro great flexibility and nre: made up of a mumber of fine wires, to cmable them to beme aromid small ithems, boeks, pullegs, ete. The utmost care is reausito for the manufacture of those wire ropes and such is the extreme precision attained, that the aizes often recquire to be maintained to the thousandth part of an incil in diameter. One oi the largest wire ropen manufachued by the B. Greening: Co. is that near liaden, ont. at the flone: mills of Shirk and Snyder, which rope is nbout four thousamd feet in length.

## DAIITYING IN Q UBBEC.

Thio aunund convention of the dairy aseoclation of the province took place in Sto Therase last week. In formor issues wo
hare referred to the establishment at St. Hyacinthe of a central dairy sehool and experimental station. This School comprises a cheese factory and a butter factory, furnished with the latest and most improved apparatus. It will have a lnboratory for the special tenching of milk-testing: reading rooms, a library, in which the students will find the publications of the day on Dairying in both English and Freach, aud a bull for public lectures. The tenth report of the association has been issued as a supulement to the report of the Departiment of Agriculture and is a creditable production being well arrunged and full of interesting matter. Ten years ago the province could only claim a few scattered cheesc factories, now there are betwean T00 and S00 eremmeries and cheese factories, and in more than one compatition with Ontario and the States, Quebec has come out ahend. The importance of gorcrument action is well set forth in some remarks of a Mrontreal buyer printed in this report. "During the past beason," he suys. "I bought cheese in all parts of this brovince, nud wisited every district where there was an inspector, exeept Chivoutimi. In the Lastern Townships, I found a great :mprovement. The putrons were doing their best to take care of their mills, and the result was ensity seon, as at the Sherbrooke Exhibition, they enrried off the first prizes which were open to tho whole Dominion. This was by no menns the case in the Townships two years ago ; then, their cheese had a very bad flavor, which seemed dirtientt to cure. I believe that the greatest improvement made in the province is to be found in the Townships, and I atcribute it, in a great measure, to the work of the inspectors. This will appear still more prominently when we compare the 'lowniships' checke with that from Rimouski. etce, where there are no inspectors: the checse from these places is very poor. Some cheeseries turn ont good cheese today and bud cheese to-morrow ; on the whole, the make is very mequal, which shows that instruction is needed. The product of preserved butter in tias for tropicai countries has long been an important inlustry in Franee, Demmark and Molland, ant an expert of the association who has visited Europe asserts that this trale can be followed up with more advantago than shipping tuls loutter to England. Full detaile of the process and manner of doing business necompany the report. The principal points for the exportation of preserved butter are:-bmail, north and south; consumption enormous; Freneh and English West Tuliat lalumls; Central American Republics; British Imdin; China, Japan, IniloChime and French colonics. The same oxpert fumishes an exlmustive report on con* densed milk nad its manuincture. This indesiry' was introduced into Switgerland, in 1807, by Mr. Magr, then American consul at Zurich. At present, there are boven vory large factories in the canton of \%ag, and at Freiburg, called "Anglo-Swisn." From these several factories, $25,000,000$ boxes of condensed milk nre sent out overy year. Condensel milk from the Trimo factory, Nova Scotia, has been favorably received in Jamaica and considered fully equal to the best swiss article. The londing dairymen of Quebec lure in view the manulacture of fanes wakes of cheose, at present "mported to "somo 'extent for thig bept
trade, and the geniuine interest that is now being takea in everything pertaining to dairying angere well for the future.

## TIIE ANNEXATHON HOAX.

The author of the "Moon Hoas" must be jet alive; or, if dead, he must have endowed someboly with his extriondinary gilt. In a recent" number of the" "Nér York Sun," appears an article in which it is stated confiden'ly that Cauada. is beiug agitated at present east and west, over the question of Anuexation to the United States, and also that the couitry is prepared, or nearly so, for such a change. It is clear that the "Sun" has been imposed upon by some wag, for we can assure our contemporary, that Cannda has no more notion now than she ever had of anmexing herself to the United States, and we are not aware that the ausstion $i$ ", in the slightest degree, agitating any portion of our people. Mr. Wiman, on the other hand, ussures us that Anexation is impracticable and as Mr. Wiman has given tho matter a great real of grataitous persomal attention, he ought to know. It would have been little more than faid, on the jart of the "New York Sun," to have sent a reporter across the City Hall Park, to interview Mr. Wiman on the subject. But then we know that writers on the public press are apt to draw on thetir imagination for their "facts," at this time of the year when ghost and fairy literature largely takes the place of what are sometimes. alled the Dismal Sciences.

## THE BANK STATEMENTS.

The returns of the banks for November have reached us too late for detailed attention. The principal features as compared with October are shown in the increasp of about $\$ 3,000,000$ in discounts and $\$ 3,200,000$ in deposits. There is a falling off in circuintion of $\$ 1,504,000$, in deposits by other banks in Camadi of abont $\$ 500$, 000. in balances due to agencies or branches in the United Kingulom, abont $\$ 430,000$, in specie, of $\$ \pm 50,000$ and in Dominion notes about $\$ 320,000$. There is also a falling off in Call Lome of nbont $\$ 375$, 000. The comparative table and the statoments in detail will appear in our next. issone with more extended commentary.

These organizations for-the -ipurpose of giving these members a monopoly have limited the number of young men to whom they will allow the trade to bo taught to such an extent that any expansion of the bustness is often attended with diffieulty in securing the help needed. When additionis labor is wanted it is necessary to seek it abroad. Oue of the most nigryant instances of this abuse is that furnished by the Window Glass Workers Association, This organzation not only restricts the number of apprintices to the lowest himit
but actuall discriminates aganst boys of but actinlly discrimmates aganins boys of matade entifely in foregn hands should be strongly reluked and utterly condemmed. It is interestlag to note that the superiority of this organization over the British trade union bystem is so manifest that the Juited Soclery of Doiler Makers and Iron Shifphuilders in England, itave pructically ridonited its methods. Its lesnotism. Is apparent from the statement that an apprentice ominited at one to fivo workmen) must get al card from the society.amd have it rised quarterly, ins nbout tho same way one would under pematy. This is an evidenco of the trend of tranes; unionism of which wo belleve the law must snon take cormizanco. Indliduality, Independence, private rights are trodilen down remorselessly. Lallor organlations are necessary and desirable but when they pass a certanin point and become, as nome of them have, orthey are aralnat puble policy and should be wiped out.
