## The Massachusetts Riflemen.

Happy in the belief that they could "lick all of British creation," the team of Massachusetts riflemen who distinguished themselves in England this year arrived at New York on the 10th inst. They got a great reception there, and were addressed by Mayor Grant, whose remarks are not devoid of general interest. "I have great pleasure," he said, "on behalf of the City of New York, in welcoming you upon this occasion, and still more in being able to congratulate you upon the great success which you have achieved abroad. Washington said with truth that 'the great desence of a free government is a well-regulated militia.' It has always been the policy of our government to keep up a small standing army, and to trust to the citizen soldiery of the various States for our detence in time of trouble. This the history of the nation has shown to be wise. While other countries are almost crushed by the immense standing armies they are compelled to maintain, while the streets of foreign cities are crowded with uniformed men taken from givil life and supported by taxation, here the professional soldier is practically unnoticed among us. It is therefore of great importance that everything which renders our National Guard efficient in war should be encouraged, and that those who show themselves proficient should be commended. Among all the duties of a soldier there is none more necessary than skill in the use of the rifle with which he is armed. You have not only demonstrated that at Creedmoor, but in the five contests in which you have been pitted against the selected riflemen of the English volunteers you have nobly maintained the honour of the United States. Our people are proud of the skill you have shown, are proud of your victories. Our sister State Massachusetts, which you have so worthily represented, will undoubtedly receive you with all the honour which is your just due. I desire, on behalf of the State and City of New York, to join with it in tendering to you my sincere congratulations upon your success and my best wishes for your future."

At a banquet subsequently given, in replying to a toast to the team Major Frost, after expressing satisfaction at the unbounded hospitality extended to them by the English riflemen, coutinued: "The team did its best abroad, and got all it went for and a little more. I think that after our experience we could go over again and beat them worse than we did this time. As it is, they havn't realized yet what has happened."

All of which, no doubt, greatly tickled the hearers, for we are told parcinitically that "laughter" ensued. But the team's spokesman was scarcely fair in his remarks. The Englishmen generously shot the Americans on the latter's plan, not on the English, and the Americans admittedly had an advantage in the sights used, thus making the contest on uneven terms as far as the weapons were concerned, to say nothing of the fact that the Massachusetts were a well practiced team chosen from the whole state, whilst those they met were merely regimental or district association teams, come together just for the matches, and with little or

no preliminary team practice. This is what Major Frost says of his team: "Upon the whole it is the best I could choose. It is true that I might have selected a few individual shots who would have done better than any one of my men, but I looked for an average team. I wanted a team in which jealousy would be entirely absent, and where it would be a matter of indifference who would be first or last man. We worked together so well and spurred one another on so much that I attribute our success greatly to those facts. In all the matches in which we were engaged there was only a difference of 22 points between the best man and the lowest man. Considering the number of shots fired that difference is paltry indeed."

On the subject of the relative merits of the rifles, Major Frost says:—"To me the Springfield is the better arm up to 500 yds. What it is beyond in team matches remains to be seen. We won the 600 yds. distance in four out of the five matches, but lost the other by nine points. Our sight undoubtedly overbalanced the extra fifteen grains of powder shot by the English arm, but what the Springfield would do with eighty-five grains of powder yet remains to be shown. Again, there is the relative capacity of the competing men to be considered, and the excellence of the team coacher. What the Martini-Henry can do with a decent rear-sight will, in my opinion, soon be demonstrated, for I think the English volunteers, at least the marksmen, will soon have an improved sight issued to them. Opinion favours it, and our demonstration of the possibilities of the Springfield, especially in skirmishing, has rather fanned the flame."

There would be many difficulties in the way of such a match, but we would like to see a meeting between this crack Massachusetts twelve and a similar number from some Canadian province, firing on conditions fair to both. For instance, whilst each team retained its accustomed sights—as the test would be one of sights and rifles as well as men—the position might be made "any, with head to target," at all ranges, in place of "standing" being insisted upon at 200 yards. Our Canadian marksmen have had very little practice in off-shoulder shooting.

# Topics of the Week.

This is from the Critic, an interesting weekly published at Halifax, and which gives not a little attention to matters military: "In view of the military proceedings which have been a feature of Carnival week, we again draw the attention of the Minister of Militia to the anomalous positions of Deputy Adjutants General of Militia, who hold only the rank of Lieut.-Colonel. In England the rank of Brigadier has been granted in the volunteers—a force, unlike ours, totally distinct from the Militia. Our D. A. G.'s are actual Commanders in their districts of very considerable forces. The D.A.G.'s of Nova Scotia, command not only this Province, but Prince Edward Island as well. The comparative junior substantive rank of our D. A. G.'s leads to numerous unpleasant complications when they are working with regulars as well as on social military occasions; and, while we are on this subject, we would recommend to Sir John Ross' staff (the General himself is all that could be

desired) the perusal of the Canada Militia Act, in order that they may understand the nature of the Constitutional Force which is sometimes called upon to co-operate with the Imperial Troops."

An ex-president of the Ontario Rifle Association, and a good friend to rifle shooting, has passed away in the person of Lieut.-Col. Walker, of London. He was in command of the Seventh Fusiliers, London, in the palmy days of that corps. It is for him the "Walker" match, annually on the programme of the O.R.A, is named. Col. Walker was fatally stricken with paralysis whilst fishing at Grand River, Quebec, and his end came in a manner just such as he had on more than one occasion expressed his desire for. He was in his sixty-seventh year.

Here is a pleasant paragraph from an Amherst, N.S., paper: "Militia officers and n. c. o's should, when at Halifax, inspect the armouries and n. c. o's rooms at militia headquarters. To those who have known them only in years past, the neatness and order which they evince will be a revelation. It is not that they are in form just now for Gen. Middleton's inspection, which took place yesterday, and elicited high commendation, for they were equally ready for inspection when we saw them weeks ago. The fact is, that this is only one illustration of the spirit of improvement which has been evident throughout the force in this district under the regime of Col. Worsley, D. A. G., and Col. MacShane, B. M."

### THE SNIDER SIGHT MATTER.

The following is the report made by the sub-committee of the D.R.A. executive to whom was referred the matter of framing a regulation respecting Snider sights. This report has been adopted:

OTTAWA, Aug. 17.

The Secretary, D.R.A.:

• Sir,—We beg leave to report that we have ascertained the standard width of opening in the leaf of the backsight of a Snider rifle of government issue is twenty-one hundredths of an inch, and that the height of the foresight above the block is ten one-hundredths, and its width at the block, seven one-hundredths.

We have also ascertained that the width of opening in the leaves of backsights of rifles by private makers, ranges up to twenty six-hundredths of an inch, and also that the majority of rifles in the hands of marksmen will vary in width to the extent mentioned.

We have also found that many of the "leaves" have been "cut down" to permit the 400-yards range being shot "over the bar."

In view of the existence of these differences from the standard, we beg leave to advise that the use of rifles having a width of opening of the leaf not exceeding twenty-six one-hundredths of an inch, and cut down to permit the use of the "bar" at 400 yards, be sanctioned.

We cannot advise as to the "foresight," as we find that they are but seldom tampered with, but would suggest that if it be found that a foresight has been materially altered by filing or otherwise, the rifle be condemned.

# THE P. Q. R. A. MEETING.

This is from the Witness of Monday, 19th inst.: "With reference to the final scores in the aggregate (third series—teams) in connection with the recent meeting at Cote St. Luc, it is right to state that although the 6th Fusiliers were adjudged the winners, the Victoria' Rifle team of Hamilton really came in first as a matter of scoring, but, owing to an inaccuracy in their returns, were ruled out, according to the law in this matter, which is very strict. They have the right of appeal, however, and it is probable that they will exercise it. The Executive, who hear and decide such appeals, permitted the Victoria Rifles' team to amend their return in the battalion match; this would otherwise have gone to the Governor-General's Foot Guards, but Capt. Gray generously refused to accept victory by a fluke, and the award was made to the Vics. The Executive also permitted Staff-Sergt. McAdam in the match for the Governor-General's medals to amend his return. Two years ago the Guards' team was ruled out in the aggregate series for inaccurate returns. The liberal disposition of the Executive this year will probably induce the Hamilton team to appeal for rehabilitation."

# Gleanings.

Some important experiments are now being carried out at Lidsing, near Chatham, the encampment of the balloon detachment of the corps of Royal Engineers, with a new balloon and parachute, intended for military purposes, the invention of Lieut.-Col. Templar, the senior of the Balloon Department.

A Fort Hays, U.S., correspondent writes: "Our post commander has inaugurated quite a useful scheme in announcing the uniform of the day by means of different flags displayed in front of the commanding officer's headquarters daily at 8 a.m. A white flag indicates undress uniform; a blue flag, straw hats, blue blouses and white trousers; red flag, overcoats, and no flag, full dress. The camp colour displayed means dress parade."

A lecture on "Forage for Military Purposes," was delivered at the Royal United Service Institution June 14th, by Mr. George Fleming, C.B., LL.D., F.R.C.V.S., principal veterinary surgeon of the army. Gcn. Sir C. P. Beauchamp Walker, K.C.B., vice-president, was in the chair. Having referred to his previous lecture on this subject and the inutility of concentrated food and essences, the speaker went on to remark that the natural food of horses, oats and hay, should, as far as possible, be provided during a campaign, but prepared in such a way as to make it portable, fit for keeping, and ready for issue without waste. He commended crushed and compressed oats and chopped hay compressed into trusses.

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
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
