ECLIPSES IN 1847.

This Year there will be two Eclipses of the Sun and two of the Moon.

I. The Moon will be partially Eclipsed March 31st; invisible in this Province, but visible to nearly the whole of the Eastern Continent.

II. The Sun will be partially Eclipsed April 14th and 15th; invisible here. The line of central and total eclipse will pass over the Indian Ocean, and the northern part of Australia.

III. The Moon will be partially Eclipsed September 24th—invisible.

IV. The Sun will be annularly Eclipsed October 9th—invisible in New-Brunswick. This Eclipse will be visible to the whole of Europe, nearly the whole of Asia, and the northern part of Africa.

SIGNALS

Made at Partridge Island on the approach of Vessels to the Harbour of Saint John.

One Ball, close, for one square-rigged vessel.
One Ball, half-hoisted, for two square-rigged vessels.
Two Balls, close, for three square-rigged vessels.
Two Balls, separated, for four square-rigged vessels.
A Pendant, of any colour, for five square-rigged vessels.
A Pendant over a Ball half-hoisted, for seven square-rigged vessels.
A Pendant under two Balls close, for eight square-rigged vessels.
A Pendant between two Balls separate, for nine square rigged vessels.
A Flag of any colour, for ten or more vessels.

[The above are hoisted at the East or West yard-arm, according to the quarter the vessels first appear in, and when their rig can be made out, the following descriptive colours will be hoisted at the mast-head:]

A Union Jack for a Flag Ship, with or without a squadron.
" with a Red Pendant over, for a two-decker.
" with a Blue Pendant over, for a Frigate.
" with a White ditto, for a small armed vessel.
A Blue Pendant, for a merchant ship or barque.
A Red ditto, for a merchant brig or brigantine.
A White and Blue ditto, for a foreign square-rigged vessel.
A White ditto, without a Ball, for a topsail schooner or sloop.
A Flag, blue and white horizontally, a neutral fleet.
A Pendant, white and blue, a neutral man-of-war.
A Blue Flag, a neutral merchant ship.
A Red, White, and Blue Flag, an enemy's fleet.
A Red, White, and Blue Pendant, an enemy's man-of-war.
A Union Jack over neutral or enemy's signals, the vessel is detained or a prize.
A White Flag over any signal, the vessel bears a flag of truce.
A Red Flag pierced White, for a Steam-boat from Digby.
A Blue Flag pierced White, for a Steam-boat from Saint Andrews or Eastport.
A Red Flag with a White square, for a Steam-boat from Boston.
A Ball at the mast-head, vessel is on shore or in distress;—should immediate aid be necessary, guns to be fired.

In thick weather a gun will be fired at Partridge Island in answer to each gun heard at sea. There is a Fog Bell on the Island, which is rung in foggy weather, to warn vessels of their approach to the shore.

When a vessel requires a Pilot, her descriptive Pendant will be shewn at the yard-arm instead of a ball.

TIME FOR GOING THROUGH THE FALLS,

NEAR THE CITY OF SAINT JOHN.

The Falls are level or still water about three and a half hours on the *flood*, and about two and a half on the *ebb*, so that they are passable four times in twenty-four hours, about ten or fifteen minutes each time. No other rule can be given, as much depends on the floods in the River Saint John, and the time of high water or full sea, which is often hastened by high winds, and in proportion to the height of them. For a few days in the spring of the year, the height of water in the River Saint John renders the passage of the Falls extremely difficult.

APRIL.

The audibility of sounds are certain prognostics of the temper of the air in a still evening; for, if the air be replete with moisture over us, it depresses sounds, so that they become audible to a greater distance than when the air is free from such moisture or vapours. Hence when you hear sounds of bells, cannon, water, beasts, &c. more plainly than at other times, the air is inclinable to rain, which commonly succeeds.

The *Second District* comprises all that part of the City between the north line of Union street, and south line of St. James' street, which lies without or beyond the first district, to the westward of the east line of Charlotte street.—The *Third District* comprises all that part of the City which lies without or beyond the second district, to the westward of the east line of Sidney street.—The *Fourth District* comprises all that part of the City lying without or beyond the said third district, to the westward of the east line of Carnarvon street.—The *Fifth District* comprises all that part of the City lying without or beyond the said fourth district.

HACKNEY-COACH FARES.

For conveying not exceeding four persons from any public stand to any other part of the City, or from any one part of the City to any other part thereof, *one shilling*; and for every passenger over four, *six pence* additional; if the carriage be detained, to pay additional, at the rate of *one shilling* for every half hour.

USEFUL HINTS TO FARMERS AND OTHERS.

Antidote to the Potato Disease.—Mr. J. W. Rogers, C. E., in a letter addressed to the Editor of the Mark Lane Express, states that potatoes may be most entirely preserved from the prevalent disease by using pulverised peat, or wood charcoal, abundantly interposing it between the layers and in the interstices, in pitting or storing, the pit or store being, of course, properly ventilated. The action is thus:—the charcoal absorbs the over-abundant moisture, the attendant of the disease, and instantly corrects the putrescent matter which it largely contains, therefore effectually protecting the whole from infection or contagion, or the evil action of heated moisture.

Potatoes.—A very sensible labouring man lately told me the following as a fact. He said that two men cultivated the headland of a field in potatoes; that one kept his part clean and did it well, that the other suffered his portion to be covered with weeds; that the crop of the former was extremely rotten, and that of the latter very sound. Another man, quite to be trusted, told me he had just seen a cottager digging his potatoes; that in general they were very bad, but that under the hedge and among the weeds and filth, (his own words,) where they both expected there would have been few or none fit for use, they found a good crop, quite sound. There are other statements of the same sort in circulation, where thick chickweed has been abundant.—[Gardeners' Chronicle.]

Potatoes.—A curious circumstance attending a field of wheat growing on the farm of Hudston has occurred. Last year, the field being under green crop, potatoes were raised;—like many more in the neighbourhood, the crop proved a failure, owing to the blight, in consequence of which the sound ones alone were gathered in and the diseased ones left to rot in the field. No sooner had the spring time of the year come round than vigorous stems were observed shooting up in every part of the field, indicating a state of health in the tuber quite unexpected. The crop is prolific, and, what is of greater consequence, both tuber and plant are free from any disease. After reaping a plentiful wheat crop, the farmer is resolved to dig up the potato crop at the usual time.—[Dundee Advertiser.]

The following plan for saving potatoes affected by the disease was tried with success, last season, in the neighbourhood of Devizes:—"The haulm was removed from the ground before the disease had communicated to the tubers, *not by cutting it*, but by pulling it away from the roots; the land was then pressed down firmly, and afterwards earthed up in ridges, to preserve the potatoes from the rain, till they were dug at the usual period of the year. One half of the land was treated in this manner, and the crop was saved;—on the remainder it was almost entirely lost."—[Devizes Independent.]

To raise Potatoes from the Seed.—A few large ripe apples should be chosen from a perfectly healthy plant of an approved kind, and preserved carefully through the winter in dry sand, so as to

keep them apart from each other. The seeds should be either picked out from the apples and sown in narrow drills or rows in a prepared bed of garden mould, or the apples and sand may be mashed up together and sown in the drills without the trouble of separation. When the seedling plants are about an inch high, they should be raised carefully, with as much earth adhering to them as possible, and planted out in rich and well pulverised ground, the rows being about fifteen inches wide, and the plants standing ten inches asunder, keeping them clear of weeds both by hoe and hand weeding, and when ripe the roots should be cautiously secured from frost during the winter.—Next season the roots should be planted out in the common soil of the farm, which however, should be of a dry and friable nature, and the cultivation should be carried on in the ordinary manner. The potatoes will then arrive at their full size, when their distinctive properties can be ascertained; and whether only those of the former quality, or any new varieties of a better kind are thus procured, it will be found that those grown from seed will continue for several years to yield a larger return than those planted in the usual way, as well as to be more free from the disorder called the "Curl."

A New Article of Food.—The root of the dahlia contains a bitter principle of so acrid a nature, that its employment as food has always hitherto been despaired of. The *Journal de Chambery* states, however, that this bitter principle is removed by boiling, much in the same manner as the potato is cooked. The dahlia root may, therefore, it would appear, in some measure, be substituted for the potato during the present scarcity.—*Medical Times*.

Beet Root as Food.—The Carmarthon Journal suggests beet-root, white or red, as a substitute for potatoes. In Italy, and other parts of the Continent, baked beet-root is carried about hot from the oven, and is sold in the streets, being purchased by all classes, and giving to thousands, with bread, salt, pepper, and butter, a satisfactory meal. There are few purposes for which beet-root, baked, or even roasted or fried, would not be preferable to boiled.—*Gardener's and Land Stewards' Journal*.

GARDEN WORMS, &c.—When a garden is much infested with the common grubs or cut-worms, strew a little lime over it late in the fall, and dig and throw the ground into ridges; but do not manure it at the same time, for the manure would be lost. Cabbage has many enemies. The white butterfly produces the green worm which eats the leaves. A small fly, resembling a house-fly, lays its eggs beside it, which soon change to maggots, and creeping into the ground, attack the roots. To prevent this, water the plants as soon as they are transplanted with a pint each of a mixture of five parts of water, and one of pickle of fish or meat, and repeat it the two following weeks. The bug that produces the club-footed root is a stationary animal, and is best avoided by choosing new ground for cabbage, and never using any manure for it that contains the scrapings of the cellar, or the parings of turnips; but if the old ground must be used, dig into it a large quantity of fresh sea-weed, or salt, at the rate of two quarts to a

rod. Salt destroys the eggs of many insects. Destroy lice immediately: one lousy cabbage, if neglected, will produce flies enough to affect the whole patch; if they have got into the heart of the cabbage throw a handful of dry dust upon them.

The Time of cutting Fodders.—The old careless practice of allowing corn, wheat, beans, &c. to stand until dead ripe, is giving place to the more rational method of cutting when the herbage is turning yellow, and the stem is dried an inch or two above the ground. Not only is the grain, whether wheat, oats, or corn, much heavier, and whiter, and preferred, but the straw, haulm, or fodder, is increased in value from four to ten times: thus, while the dry, brown stems of peas are of no value in husbandry, it is the opinion of the best Scotch farmers that the same stems, taken when just yellowed, are twice as valuable as hay: and chemical examination shows this to be a true estimate. Hay cut in flower is worth twenty per cent. more than that cut in seed, and twice as much as that with dry stems: the same is true for clovers, lucern, and all coarse fodders. Straw is obtained nearly as good as hay, when cut in the light greenish yellow state: but when seed grain is wanted, the straw must be allowed to dry perfectly.

Pole Beans.—The most convenient method of cultivating pole beans, especially for those who can command but little land, is to describe circles of six or more feet in the soil, and having manured it liberally, to deposit the seeds on the outer edge, at distances of from six to eight inches. This done, stick a circular row of poles, just within the circle of beans, and let them converge to a point at the top, uniting them there by means of a strong twine. This will form a cone, and present quite an ornamental appearance. With proper management, each hill thus managed, will yield from six to eight quarts of dry beans, besides furnishing the family with green beans during their period. It should be borne in mind that *pole* beans are far more prolific than *bush* beans; they are also said to be far more nutritious, weight for weight. Of the varieties now in common use, we know of none enumerated in the catalogues of our seedsmen that possess higher claims than the "Case-knife;" they come early into bearing, are prolific, ripe before the advent of heavy frost, and excellent when dry.—*Maine Cultivator.*

Safety in a Thunder Storm.—The following maxims, as to places of greatest safety during thunder storms, may be useful to many;—1. All metals, and most fluids, attract and conduct lightning—consequently contact with them is to be avoided. 2.—It is infinitely more dangerous to go under a tree during a thunder storm than to remain out in the open road or the fields. Persons have also been killed when sheltering under the eaves of a house, or by the side of a brick-kiln. By the same rule, corn and hay-stacks are to be avoided. 3.—A large room is safer than a small one, and that it is better always to keep in the centre of it. Since a current of air will, in some measure, conduct lightning, a position between a door and a window, if open, or a window and chimney, should

be avoided. 4.—Persons whose clothes are wet are more free from danger than those whose garments are dry. Travellers inside of railway or other carriages are in little danger compared with those who are outside.

Recipe for making Bread without Yeast.—Mix equal parts of new milk from the cow and boiling water, and when cool enough add sufficient flour to make it of the consistency of batter; put a little salt, set it before the fire to rise, and when it rises, add flour sufficient for your bread; set it by the fire again to rise, and when risen bake it. Bread made in this manner will keep sweet longer than any bread made with yeast or leaven.

Scratches in Horses.—The sprinkling of plaster of Paris on stable floors, is not only an excellent plan for arresting the fertilizing gas of ammonia for manure, but it prevents horses having the scratches, or sore heels.

A simple but useful Medicine.—One ounce of best aloes and half an ounce of best Turkey rhubarb, compounded together, and put into a black bottle, with a pint of best brandy. Two tea-spoonsful to be taken as a dose by a person of ordinary habits.

Cure for the Whooping-cough, and also for the Croup or Quinzy.—A tea-spoonful of castor oil, to a tea-spoonful of molasses;—a tea-spoonful of the mixture to be given whenever the Cough is troublesome, or the Croup distressing. It will afford relief at once, and in a few days effect a cure. It relieves the Croup, however virulent the attack.

Healthy Children.—If every child were, from the first, nourished with pure, healthy milk, invigorated by morning and evening ablutions daily, and have pure air to breathe, how few indeed would suffer from disease. Yes, and if every adult could or would live according to the dictates of prudence and temperance, it would be dull times with the doctor and the apothecary. But who lives up to the dictates even of his own reason? Very few; and the general but vain experiment is trying to get along so as to evade the consequences of wilful error in diet and habit. There is, perhaps, little difficulty in most cases, in being healthy, if we choose to take the trouble.

LIGHT HOUSES.

Board of Commissioners for the several Light Houses in the Bay of Fundy.—Robert W. Crookshank, John Ward, L. Donaldson, I. Woodward, Esquires; Hon. Thomas Wyer, John Wilson, Esq. Hon. W. F. W. Owen, Lieut. Charles Hare, R. N., and John James Robinson, Esquire, R. N.

Isaac Woodward, Esquire, Surveyor of those Light Houses in the Bay of Fundy belonging to New-Brunswick, and also of those belonging to Nova-Scotia, which are partly supported by this Province.—Office in Chubb's Brick Building, Saint John.

Cape Sable Seal Island Light.—The first Light on approaching the Bay of Fundy is on the South Point of Seal Island. This is a plain White Light—elevated about eighty feet above high water mark, and may be seen in approaching the Island from any point of the Compass. A very dangerous rock, under water, but upon which the sea always breaks, called Blonde Rock, lies about two miles S.S.W. by compass, from the Light House. Between this Rock and the Island there are some dangers—the ground is rocky throughout, and large vessels, therefore, ought not to attempt passing between them.

Brier Island Light.—In advancing up the Bay, the next Light is situated on Brier Island, about half a mile N. E. from the N. W. point thereof.—A plain White Light.

Digby Gut Light.—The next light on the coast of Nova Scotia is placed on the West side of Digby Gut—from Brier Island North Eastward. The coast is very bold, and not indented; the Light is, therefore, chiefly intended as a guide into Digby Basin.—A white Light.

Gannet Rock Light.—This Light bears from the Light on Brier Island, N. W. $\frac{1}{2}$ W. 21 miles. It is intended to warn vessels of their approach to a very dangerous range of shoals and ledges, which extend from the Old Proprietor to the Seal Islands off Machias, a distance of about 20 miles.

Bearings from the Gannet Rock Light House:—

To the Old Proprietor, which dries at $\frac{3}{4}$ ebb (very dangerous), E. by N. $\frac{1}{4}$ N. 7 miles.

" Black Rock (always above water 25 feet), off White Head, N. E. $\frac{1}{4}$ E.

" South West Head of Grand Manan, N. W. $\frac{1}{2}$ N.

" Northernmost of the Murr Ledges (dry at $\frac{3}{4}$ ebb), N. W. by W. $\frac{1}{4}$ W.

" Southernmost of ditto, called St. Mary's Ledge, (always out of water), S. W. by W. $\frac{1}{4}$ W.

" Machias Seal Island Lights (distant about thirteen miles), W. by N. $\frac{1}{4}$ N.

NOTE.—Between the Northernmost and Southernmost of the Murr Ledges, there is a range of dangerous Rocks and Shoals—many of them always above water, and which extend Westward from the Light House about four miles; from this range, farther

Westerly, about eight miles, lies a dangerous Breaker, called the *Roaring Bull*. This may be avoided by keeping three remarkable headlands, near the S. W. end of Grand Manan open. The red glass having been removed from the Lantern, there is now a flash light—WHITE—twenty seconds dark and forty light in each minute. The Light House is painted in stripes, vertical, black and white.

Machias Seal Island Lights.—There are two fixed WHITE Lights upon the Machias Seal Islands, elevated about forty-five feet above high water, and bear from each other E. S. E. and W. N. W. distant about 200 feet, by which circumstance of two Light Houses at the same station, they will be immediately distinguished from all other Lights upon the Coast, (British or American.) Both the Buildings are painted White. The following are the bearings from them, viz.:

To the Southernmost Murr Ledge (St. Mary's) E. S. E. easterly.

Gannet Rock Light, E. by S. $\frac{1}{2}$ S. 13 miles.

Southern Head of Grand Manan, E. by N. $\frac{1}{2}$ N.

Northern Head of Grand Manan, N. E. $\frac{1}{2}$ E.

N. E. Rock, distant 2 miles, N. E. by N.

Little River Head, N. by W.

Libby Island Light House, (American) N. W. by W.

Vessels standing in to the Northward, between these Lights and the Gannet Rock, should tack or haul off the moment they bring these Lights into one, as they will be then not more than three-fourths of a mile from the Murr Ledges, if more than five miles to the East of the Lights.

Head Harbour Light.—Next in order, after passing Grand Manan, and the plain white Light (American) on West Quoddy Point, is Head Harbour Light. This is placed on the North East extremity of Campo-Bello, and is a guide to vessels entering the main channel to West Isles, Moose Island, and the Inner Bay of Passamaquoddy;—it enables vessels also at all times to enter Head Harbour. It is a fixed WHITE Light. The building is painted white, with a red cross on it.

Point Le Preau Lights.—Upon this projecting head-land two Lights are placed, one above the other, in the same house, and distant twenty-eight feet.—Both Lights can be seen from every point of the compass, where they may be useful—both are fixed and WHITE. The Light House is painted red and white, in stripes of five feet broad each, horizontally.

Partridge Island Light.—This Light, at the entrance of the River and Harbour of Saint John, having been established about fifty years, requires no particular notice, further than it is a fixed WHITE Light, and the Light House is painted Red and White in vertical stripes. The Light is now (Nov. 1846.) being enlarged.

Beacon Light.—Within Partridge Island, and upon a Spit or Bar, which extends about half a mile S. S. E. off Sand Point, and which dries at two-thirds ebb, stands the Beacon Tower. Upon this Tower a Light is established, which is eminently useful to the Coasting Trade of St. John, and to all other vessels having Pilots on board, as it enables them to enter the Harbour at all hours of

Quaco Light.—A revolving white Light is placed on a small rock off Quaco Head, showing twice full and twice dark in a minute. This Light can be seen from any quarter where a vessel can approach. The Light House is painted white and red, in horizontal stripes.

Cape Enrage Light.—On the Point of that name, in Westmorland, nearly opposite Apple River Harbour, N. S. The House is about 120 feet above the tide mark, and is painted white.—A plain white Light.

OBSERVATIONS.—1. The nearer the time of the moon's change, first quarter, full and last quarter are to *midnight*, the fairer will be the weather during the seven days following. The space for this calculation occupies from ten at night till two next morning.

2. The nearer to *mid-day* or *noon* the phases of the moon happen, the more foul or wet weather may be expected during the next seven days. The space for this calculation occupies from ten in the forenoon to two in the afternoon. These observations refer principally to the summer, though they generally affect spring and autumn also.

3. The moon's change, first quarter, full and last quarter, happening during six of the afternoon hours, that is, from four to ten, may be followed by fair weather; but this is mostly dependent on the wind, as is noted in the table.

4. Though the weather, from a variety of irregular causes, is more uncertain in the latter part of autumn, the whole of winter, and the beginning of spring, yet, in the main, the above observations will apply to those periods also.

5. To prognosticate correctly, especially in those cases where the wind is concerned, the observer should be within sight of a good vane, where the four cardinal points of the heavens are correctly placed.
