To the Grand Lodge of British Columbia, I.O. O. F.:

BRETHREN.—It is with mingled feelings of pleasure and honor that I extend to you greetings and welcome you at the Twenty-Fourth Annual Session of the Grand Lodge of British Columbia, and to present to you the annual report in connection with the office of Grand Master.

I regret not being able to report an increase in the number of members during the year 1897; but this is not to be wondered at when we consider that during the greater part of that year the Province of British Columbia was, commercially and industrially, in a very depressed state. From information supplied me, I have every reason to believe that the returns to the end of June will show that the loss has been more than recovered.

During my term of office I have made every effort to visit as many Lodges of the Jurisdiction as possible, and am only sorry that, owing to the urgent claims of my new business venture on my time, I could not pay an official visit to each lodge holding allegiance to this Grand Lodge. However, I trust that the members of the Lodges I have been unable to reach will accept my excuse, for I can assure them that it was my earnest desire to become personally acquainted with every Lodge, and, if practicable, every member, in the Jurisdiction.

During my official visits to the Lodges in the Mainland Division of the Jurisdiction, I had the good fortune to be accompanied by Grand Representative Bro. D. Welsh, who very efficiently and carefully exemplified the secret work of the Order, and I am certain he has effected quite a change for the better in many of the Lodges we visited. To secure uniformity in the Floor Work, arrangements should be made for some Brother, duly qualified, to visit all the Lodges in the Jurisdiction, at least once in two years.

Ans.—Yes; upon application and payment of one year's dues, a member who has been suspended for non-payment of dues for less than twelve months must be reinstated by his Lodge without ballot, in absence of local law to the contrary.

3. *Ques.*—Must a Brother pay dues in advance the same as on a visiting card in order to visit on the new receipt?

Ans -Yes.

4. Ques.—Can a Brother deposit the new receipt in another Lodge for admission the same as visiting card?

Ans.-Yes.

5. *Ques.*—In an initiation should the acting P.G. (in closing his charge) greet and welcome the Brother by giving him the initiatory grip?

Ans .-- No.

6. Ques.—Has a Lodge the right to appropriate the funds of the Lodge to pay railway fare and carriage hire for its members to attend the funeral of a member who died and was buried several miles from the Lodge room?

Ans.-No.

7. Ques.—A member being dropped for non-payment of dress and being rejected upon application for reinstatement, can be renew his application for reinstatement at the expiration of six months? Ans.—Yes; he can renew his application for reinstatement any number of times after rejection, each time waiting until the expiration of the time limited by local law provided in other cases of applications by candidates for admission.

8. Ques.—Can a Lodge lawfully use the money in the Trust Fund for the purpose of building a stable and other necessary buildings in connection with their Hall, on their own property?

Ans.-Referred to Section 335 of the Digest.

9. Ques.—A Sister after being installed as Noble Grand was absout first two moletings, was present the next six meetings and absent the next fc ar meetings, is she entitled to the honors of a Noble Grand?

Ans.-Yes.

10. Ques.—After a Brother has been a member of the Order for a number of years, he finds out that the name he gave to the Lodge was not his right name, he not knowing it at the time of becoming a member; he then changes his name: what effect will it have on his membership?

Ans.—It will not affect his membership if the other part of his application was according to law.

11. Ques.—A Sister of Rebekah, who is in arrears about five years and has been suspended for non payment of dues, wishes to become a member again in another Lodge; at the time of her initiation she was single, now she is married, and her husband is not an Odd Fellow; how can she become a member again?

Ans.—She can become a member again by being reinstated in her own Lodge and getting a withdrawal card to join another Lodge.

12. Ques.—Is a Brother guilty of conduct unbecoming an Odd Fellow and liable to charges, who not being engaged as a saloonkeeper or bartender at the time the recent Ineligibility Law was passed, has since engaged in it?

Ans.-Yes. See Grand Sire John W. Stebbin's decision No. 88.

13. Ques.—Is a Brother who is in good standing when taken sick, and is not reported sick in the Lodge until he is in arrears, entitled to benefit?

Ans.—A Brother who was in good standing at the time he was taken sick and not reported until he is in arrears is entitled to benefits, providing he complies with the by-laws of the Lodge regarding reporting himself sick.

APPEALS.

On August 10th, 1897, I received, through the Grand Secretary, from Bro. Walter M. Ross, member of Selkirk Lodge, No. 12, Donald, an appeal against the action of the Lodge in refusing to pay him benefits.

Bro. Ross had been sick and received benefits from March, 1896, to December, 1896, and had been under treatment at the Hospital at Winnipeg, and on December 3rd, 1896, received a certificate from Dr. McDonald (doctor of the Hospital) stating that he was well enough to follow his usual occupation. The Lodge then refused to pay him any further benefits. Bro. Ross still claims he was sick, claimed three months' benefits and furnished the Lodge with several doctors' certificates, but none of them would say he was entitled to benefits ; so in that case I sustained the action of the Lodge in refusing to pay any further benefits.

> GRAND SECRETARY'S OFFICE, VICTORIA, B. C., 7th June, 1898.

To the Grand Lodge of B. C., I. O. O. F.:

I have the honor to submit for your consideration a report of the transactions of this office during the year that has clapsed, together with abstracts of the reports received from the Subordinate The duties imposed by the last Session have been duly performed. A circular was sent to each Subordinate Lodge directing attention to the report of the Special Committee on Statistics re Dues and Benefits last Session, and recommending a careful scrutiny of their financial condition in connection with the facts contained in the report.

The revised Constitution of the Grand Lodge adopted last Session was submitted to the Sovereign Grand Lodge and approved with the following exceptions: The concluding words "or his deputy" in Sec. 6, Art. II., and the concluding clause of Sec. 4, Art. III., commencing, "Provided also," were reported by the Committee on Constitutions as "not seeming to be in usual or proper form." In the first case the section might be amended at this Session by striking out the words "or his Deputy" and inserting in lieu "or the Deputy Grand Master."

The other clause to which exception is taken provides for the installation of any Grand Lodge officer at any time after his election instead of compelling him to wait until the end of the Session. This clause has, I believe, been in the Constitution since the institution of the Grand Lodge, has been repeatedly approved by the Sovereign Grand Lodge, and as it does not violate any general law of the Order, as far as I am aware, might be re-enacted at this Session.

NEW LODGES.

"Slocan" Lodge, No. 40, was instituted at Slocan City on 3rd July last by Bro. Ben. Robertson, Special Deputy G. M., under a charter granted last session. The instituting officer speaks very encouragingly of the material composing this Lodge and of its future prospects.

Correspondence has taken place respecting the institution of Lodges at Barkerville, Wardner, Trail and Trout Lake City, and it may be inferred that Lodges will be organized at these places at no distant time.

REBEKAH LODGES.

An application for a Charter and the requisite fee has been received for a Rebekah Lodge at Carson, but no dispensation has yet been issued in consequence of the difficulty of obtaining the services of a qualified P. G. or P. N. G. to act as Instituting Officer. The application will be submitted to this Session for appropriate action. is juris-

as been on has ing the Officer. opriate I regret to state that it has been necessary to recover the Charter and effects of "Ruth" Rebekah Lodge. No. 4, at Chilliwack, it having become defunct.

Bethel Lodge, No. 7, and Esther Lodge, No. 11, have failed to report for the year 1897 although written to repeatedly. The old law provided that failure to report within one month after the end of the year entailed the forfeiture of the Lodge's Charter, but the present law leaves the matter to local legislation; it is submitted that legislation to deal with this matter be enacted at this Session.

Sixteen revised Rebekah Rituals have been received from the Sovereign Grand Lodge free of cost, to replace a similar number supplied of the 1896 Edition, which were found to be defective, and these have been distributed to the Lodges entitled to them.

STATISTICAL.

The reports of the Subordinate Lodges for the year 1897 show a slight decrease in the number of members and of revenue when compared with the preceding year, but to counterbalance that it is gratifying to note that there has also been a reduction in the number of members who were sick and in the amount paid for benefits and for current expenses, whilst the assets show a substantial increase.

The following statement of the work of the Lodges during the year ended 31st December, 1897, is compiled from the Reports to that date and a comparison is made between the results and those of the preceding year:

ODD FELLOWS' HOME FUND.

This fund is slowly growing and now amounts to \$300.98 deposited in the Dominion Government Savings Bank. The contribution of five cents per member made at the last Session realized \$10,55, and this has been supplemented by a liberal donation of \$50 by Laurel Rebekah Lodge, No. 9, the result of an Anniversary Social, which is commended to the other Lodges for imitation.

It is respectfully submitted that a similar grant of five cents per member for the ensuing year be sanctioned at this Session.

The money in the bank is deposited in the name of the undersigned in trust for this Grand Lodge, but as this fund is likely to assume considerable proportions, it is suggested that it would be advisable to appoint Trustees or that it be invested in the corporate name of the Grand Lodge to be withdrawn only by authority of the Grand Master and Grand Secretary for the time being.

AGED ODD FELLOWS' FUND.

As will be seen by the foregoing statement, there is now \$26.88 to the credit of this fund; the sum of \$9 was received during the year for the sale of some of the effects of the late Mission City Lodge, No. 32. A donation of \$20 was granted to a former member of Mission City Lodge, No. 32, who is now sick, on the recommendation of Tatnai Lodge, No. 9. It is submitted for instructions whether the balance of this fund shall be deposited in some bank at interest, and if so in what manner it shall be invested.

MEMORIAL PAGE.

Since we last met a familiar figure has been removed from our ranks by the death of Bro. R. Roberts, P. G. M. & P. G. R. Bro. Roberts was connected with the Grand Lodge since its institution and for many years took an active and intelligent interest in the work of the Order. It is recommended that a memorial page be inserted in the printed proceedings of this Session containing the names of Bro. Roberts and such other members of the Grand Lodge as have died during the year.

CONCLUSION.

The past year has been characterized by peace and harmony in this jurisdiction, as is evidenced by the absence of appeals. The Lodges appear to have devoted their time to the practice of the cardinal objects of the Order, in the relief of distress, burying the dead, and in the support of the widows and orphans who are the wards of the Order.

T. F. Neelands, Grand Representative, read the Report of the Grand Representatives which was ordered to be received and referred to the Committee on Printing.

To the Grand Lodge of British Columbia, I. O. O. F .:

Your Representatives to the Seventy-Third Annual Session of the Sovereign Grand Lodge I. O. O. F. held in the City of Spx,agfield, Ill., commencing Sept. 20th and ending at noon on Sept. 25th, 1897, heg to submit the following report:

The attendance at the Session was large, there being present nine Grand Officers, eight Past Grand Sires, and one hundred and eighty-six Grand Representatives. Every Grand Jurisdiction subordinate to the Sovereign Lodge was represented except the Grand Encampment of Arizona.

The City was beautifully decorated with flags and bunting; the Brethren and the citizens had spared neither expense nor labor in their desire that the Representatives should enjoy their visit to Springfield. In this they were entirely successful, as we have every reason to believe that each representative carried away pleasant recollections of his stay in that city.

Before the Session was formally opened a public reception was held in the State Capitol Building, at which addresses of welcome were given by the Governor of the State, Jno. R. Tanner, P. G., the Mayor of the city, the Grand Master of the State of Illinois, the Grand Patriarch of the State of Illinois, and Mrs. Mary D. Stone, President of the Rebekah Assembly of Illinois, which were responded to by the Grand Sire, after which the Sovereign Grand Lodge was formally opened.

Your Representatives were appointed on the following Committees: Finance, Welsh; Grand Bodies not Represented, Neelands.

Extract from the Grand Sire's Report :

GENERAL CONDITION OF THE ORDER.

The condition of the various branches of the Order are fairly good, although, owing to the depressed condition of business in the $V_{\rm Dit}$ States, coupled with the excitement always attendant on a presidential election in this country, I am inable to report any large increase during the year 1896; but we are not going backward. The membership of the Subordinate Lodges show an increase, while the Rebekah branch has made very large proportional gains.

In the Encampment branch, I regret to say that the figures show a slight decrease, while the Patriarchs Militant have gained in un-inbership, showing that the legislation of past years, which invested them with more authority to govern themselves, has been wise and beneficial to this branch.

If some way could be devised by which suspensions for nonpayment of dues could be avoided, or greatly lessened, it would be the greatest achievement of our legislation for years. I commend the subject to your most earnest and careful consideration.

From the Grand Secretary's report :

By an examination of the table accompanying this report, which gives the increase and decrease in membership during the year, it will be seen that the loss in the Encampment branch has been unusually heavy, while the gain in Subordinate Lodge membership has been the smallest since 1885, when it was 1,080. The prevailing depression in business affairs, which, judging from the reports of Grand Secretaries and Grand Scribes, seems to be felt in all sections of the country, must account to a great degree for this tardy growth; but another, and doubtless a more prominent stumblingblock in the way of progress, is the strongly-marked lack of personal interest among the membership in the work of the Lodges and En-A renewal of that interest which prompted the *c*ampments. is other to unite with the Order is necessary. The faithful few who ttend the meetings regularly, and who do the work in Lodge or Encampment, need the help and encouragement to be found in the presence of a goodly company.

But while these have languished, the prosperous Rebekah branch, with her small fees and light dues, has vigorously grown. A proof of this fact is seen in her increase of 444 Lodges and 27,998 members for the year.

If our membership has not kept pace with the rate of increase during the past twelve years, discouragement need not follow. It is in lessons of experience that we are taught the performance of duty. Let there be a renewal of interest among the membership to aid and

COMPARISON OF THE BETURNS FOR THE YEARS 1895 AND 1896.

During the year the Grand Sire rendered 115 decisions, all of which were approved except as otherwise shown.

SUBORDINATE LODGE DECISIONS.

1. *Ques.*—Can one Lodge sue another in the civil courts without violating the law of the Sovereign Grand Lodge?

2. *Ques.*—Can a Brother who owes a Lodge a note for Third Degree claim benefits?

Ans.—A Brother owing a Lodge a note for Third Degree is entitled to benefits, he being otherwise entitled to receive them.

3. Statemen'.—The by-laws of a Lodge provide for the payment to its Treasurer the sum of fifty cents per month for his services as Treasurer, and also requires the payment by its members the sum of fifty cents per month for dues. The Treasurer was taken sick, owing the Lodge \$2 for four months' dues, and the Lodge owed him \$2 for four months' service as Treasurer.

Ques.—Was he in good standing in his Lodge and entitled to benefits ?

Ans.-Yes. (Not approved.)

4. Ques.—Is it permissible to admit members during conferring any of the degrees, or may members be admitted during or introducing first and second parts while the candidate is taken out into the ante-room ?

Ans.-No.

5. Ques.—Where a Brother has been dropped for non-payment of dues, and before one year from date of his suspension applies for reinstatement and pays one year's dues, is it his right to be reinstated, or has the Lodge the right to ballot on such application and refuse to readmit him?

Ans.—Yes; upon application and payment of one year's dues, a member who has been suspended for non-payment of dues for less than twelve months must be reinstated by his Lodge without ballot, in absence of local law to the contrary.

6. Ques.—Can a Grand Master issue dispensation to a Subordinate Lodge empowering it to confer degrees the same night the candidate is initiated?

Ans.—Yes, he can, unless the laws of the Grand Jurisdiction otherwise provide.

7. Ques.—Do sections 1829 and 1830, White's Digest, edition of 1895, prohibit the printing, by a Subordinate Lodge, of the Funeral Ceremony, not for sale, but for its own convenience?

Ans.-Yes.

dition of Funeral 8. Statement.—A Brother who has been suspended for more than five years for non-payment of dues, and is now about sixty years of age, wants to be reinstated in his Lodge as a non-beneficial member.

 $Q_{acs.}$ —What will the Brother have to pay the Lodge, and would the Brother then be exempt from dues, and would the Lodge have to pay per capita tax on the Brother?

Ans.—In order for any Brother to be reinstated who has been suspended for more than five years, he must pay the amount of one year's dues, unless otherwise provided by local law, although he may take a Dismissal Certificate for one dollar; in his application for reinstatement, he must further show, if the application is for non-beneficial membership, that he has been a member of the Order for five years. In the absence of local law, otherwise providing, he must pay dues and the Lodge must pay per capita tax on him.

9. Ques.—Is it necessary, when two Subordinate Lodges under the immediate jurisdiction of the Sovereign Grand Lodge, consolidate under the charter, name and number of one of them, the other surrendering its charter to the District Deputy Grand Sire, and its papers, books, etc., to the one retaining its charter, name and number, to apply for and procure a new charter?

Aus.-No.

10. Ques.—Which officer, the Recording Secretary or the Permanent Secretary, is the proper one to sign the certificate for dues prescribed by the Sovereign Grand Lodge at its last session?

Ans.—The Permanent Secretary.

11. *Ques.*—Must a Brother pay dues in advance, the same as on a Visiting Card in order to visit on a receipt?

Ans.-Yes.

12. *Ques.*—Can a Brother deposit the receipt in another Lodge for admission, the same as a Visiting Card ?

Ans.-Yes.

13. Ques.—Must the A. T. P. W. be given to all Brothers on paying up their dues?

Ans.—No, if they only pay their dues to date.

14. *Ques.*—A member of a Lodge on February 1st, 1897, owes \$3 dues; he goes to his Lodge and pays \$1 of said dues and demands a Visiting Certificate; is the Lodge compelled to issue said Visiting Certificate and give him the A. T. P. W.?

Ans.—The Lodge is compelled to issue the Visiting Certificate, but it is not allowed to give the A. T. P. W. There is no such thing known to the law as a "Visiting Certificate." It is a Certificate showing the payment of dues on which certificate, coupled with the A. T. P. W., entitles the holder to visit Lodges outside his jurisdiction.

15. Ques.—When a Brother pays his dues, is the Secretary of the Lodge compelled to give him a certificate under the law of 1896, or may the Secretary use another form of receipt when the Brother does not desire the A. T. P. W.?

Ans.—When a Brother pays his dues, the Secretary is not allowed to give him a receipt for same except on the form issued and sold by the Sovereign Grand Lodge, notwithstanding the Brother does not desire the A. T. P. W.

16. *Ques.*—When a Brother pays his dues and does not desire a receipt, is the Secretary compelled to issue to him a certificate under the law of 1896 ?

Ans.-No.

17. Ques.—If a Brother fails to pay his dues on the last meeting night of the Lodge in the term, and comes forward and pays at the commencement of the succeeding term, is he non-beneficial?

Ans.—While the term of a Subordinate Lodge must begin at certain stated periods, viz., first meetings in January and July or April and October, yet such commencement of a term has no necessary reference to when and how dues shall be paid, and a Brother is beneficial just so long as he does not owe his Lodge one-fourth of the annual amount fixed by its by-laws for dues and legal assessments.

18. Ques.—If a Brother is reported sick with a chronic disease (rheumatism), and the Lodge pays forty weeks' benefits at two dollars per week; the Brother is then a little better, and is reported from the sick list; in a short time is reported sick again from same disease, and continues sick for a long time; must the Lodge pay him two dollars per week for fifty-two weeks from the date of the last report, or can they pay the balance of twelve weeks, which would have been the Brother's due if he had not been reported recovered from first sickness, and then one dollar per week thereafter? Would you call this last sickness a new one or a continuation of the old, where the disease is the same?

Ans.—It is two separate cases of sickness, and the Lodge must pay him two dollars per week from date of last sickness. (Not approved.)

ge must (Not ap19. Ques.—A Grand Master suspends a Lodge; the Grand Lodge held that it was illegally suspended; that the Grand Master had no authority under the law to suspend it. What per capita tax should the Lodge pay?

Ans.—When a Lodge has been suspended, and it has afterward been decided by proper authority that its suspension was illegal, and it has been reinstated, such Lodge should not be required to pay per capita tax for the period it was under suspension.

20. *Ques.*—Can Lodges provide by by-law for the admission of non-beneficial Odd Fellows, when no action has been taken by the State Grand Lodge?

Ans.—A Lodge can not provide by by-law for admission of nonbeneficial Odd Fellows, unless the Grand Lodge of the jurisdiction has by some legislative action anthorized Lodges so to do.

21. Ques.—In an initiation, should the acting P. G. (in closing his charge) greet and welcome the Brother by giving him the initiatory grip?

Ans.—No.

22. Ques.—Have Grand Masters the power under the law to grant dispensations to Subordinate Lodges upon request of said Lodges to permit them to admit applicants into Lodges for a less fee than what their by-laws call for, for a limited time?

Ans.—No, they cannot grant such dispensations; they must change their by-laws and have them properly approved if they wish to change the fee charged for initiation.

23. Ques.—Can a Subordinate Lodge appropriate any of its funds to pay the premium on a surety bond issued by a guarantee or indemnity company to bond its Treasurer or Trustees?

Aus.—Yes; if a Subordinate Lodge should require its Treasurer to give a bond with a guarantee or indemnity company as surety, such Lodge should pay the premium therefor; but the Lodge not making such requirement, if the Treasurer should, in place of giving the ordinary bond, with personal security, for his own convenience choose to give as surety such a company, then and in that event he should pay the premium himself, and the Lodge should not pay it,

24. Ques.—Does a Subordinate Lodge have the right to adopt or make a by-law confining sick benefits to Degree Members only, as provided in Digest, page 51, section 16?

Ans.—Yes, unless otherwise provided by local law.

Ans.-Yes.

26. Ques.—In view of the laws set forth in Sections 726 and 727 of the new Digest of 1895, if a Lodge fixed its initiation fee so that it is less than the sum fixed for one year's dues, can such Lodge law-fully reinstate a member who has been dropped for non-payment of dues, within one year, for a sum equal to the initiation fee?

Ans.—Such Lodge can not lawfully reinstate a member so dropped for less than the amount of one year's dues, such being the law as set forth in Section 726, Digest of 1395, which law is plain and unambiguous, although, in view of the possible facts, he might have to pay more than a member who has been suspended for more than a year.

27. *Ques.*—Under the same laws (Sections 726 and 727), can such Lodge lawfully charge the amount of one year's dues for reinstatement of a member who has been dropped for non-payment of dues for more than one year?

Ans.—A member who has been suspended for non-payment of dues for more than one year can not be lawfully charged for reinstatement more than the amount charged an initiate of the same age, although the Lodge may charge less if its local law so provides.

28. Ques.—A Brother who was a member of a Lodge and a barkeeper when the amendment to Section 5, ArticleXVI, Constitution of the Sovereign Grand Lodge, went into effect, takes a Withdrawal Card therefrom, continues in the occupation of a barkeeper, and within a year from the issuance of said Card deposits it with another Lodge and applies for membership therein. Can such Lodge admit him?

Ans.—Yes, the Lodge can admit the Brother to membership in the Lodge, he being already a member of the Order.

29. *Ques.*—Can a Grand Body compel its Subordinates to purchase a given number of Rituals?

Ans.—It can not. This answer was not approved and the following answer substituted—That Grand Bodies may compel their Subordinates to purchase a given number of Rituals not exceeding the number allowed by the laws of this Grand Body. 7111, of , ''shall 3y-Laws 6 deter -

30. Statement.—A Brother is paid up in full until December 31, 1895. He pays nothing more, but on June 8, 1896, is by the probate judge of the county in which he resides adjudged insane. The verdict of the jury and the decision of the probate judge is that he is insane and has been for six months prior thereto. Then he was on that date ordered committed to the State Insane Asylum at Topeka, Kansas, and was so committed, and has been at all times since and is now confined there. The Brother having no property, it was ordered by the court that the expense of the proceedings be at the cost of the county and the keeping at the cost of the State. The Brother is the only support of his family.

 $Q_{ues.}$ —Is the Subordinate Lodge to which he is attached, and in which he was in good standing on December 31st, 1895, and until 13 weeks thereafter, debtor to him or his family for sick benefits ?

Ans.—The Brother's family is entitled to the benefit provided by the By-Laws of the Lodge to which he belongs, he being in good standing at the time he became insane. See Sections 42, 43 and 47, White's Digest. edition 1895.

31. *Ques.*—Has a Lodge the right to appropriate the funds of the Lodge to pay railroad fare and carriage hire of its members to attend the funeral of a member who died and was buried several miles from the Lodge room ?

Ans.-No.

32. *Ques.*—Can a Lodge be organized in a good building on the ground floor ?

Ans.—Yes; yet all Lodges are admonished to see to it that they surround themselves against intrusion by outsiders; that is to say, no person or persons should be permitted to gain a knowledge of what is going on in the Lodge room by approaching it too closely.

33. *Ques.*—Is it legal for a Sudordinate Lodge to purchase an American flag?

Ans.-It is. See Articles 355 and 359, White's Digest.

34. *Ques.*—Has a member of a Lodge who prefers charges against another member of same Lodge, a right to appeal from the action of his Lodge in finding the Brother not guilty?

Ans.-Yes.

35. Ques.—Has the Grand Master the right to set aside the action of a Lodge and order a new trial?

Ans.-No.

36. Ques.—A member being dropped for non-payment of dues, and being rejected upon application for reinstatement, can be renew his application for reinstatement at the expiration of six months?

Ans.—Yes, he can renew his application for reinstatement any number of times after rejection, each time waiting until the expiration of the time limited by local law provided in other cases of application by candidates for admission.

37. Ques.—When a Brother who has been suspended for nonpayment of dues applies to be reinstated, must the application be referred to a committee before it can be balloted upon, if the By-Laws of the Lodge provide that the ballot may be taken without such reference, provided the Grand Lodge of the Jurisdiction where such Lodge is situated has not required applications for reinstatement to be referred to a committee before final action by the Lodge?

Ans.—When a Brother suspended for non-payment of dues applies to be reinstated, the application need not be referred to a committee before it can be balloted upon, if the By-Laws of the Lodge provide that the ballot may be taken without such reference; provided the Grand Lodge of the Jurisdiction where such Lodge is situated has not required applications for reinstatement to be referred to a committee before final action by the Lodge.

38. Ques.—Since the adoption of the amendment to the stitution of the Sovereign Grand Lodge, known as the liquor ..., can a person who has been initiated in good faith and in ignorance on his part of the law, be advanced to a higher Degree, the Lodge ascertaining after initiation and before advancement that he is a saloon keeper?

Ans.-Yes.

This decision was overruled by the adoption of the following :

"Your committee has come to the conclusion that as the Constitution of this Grand Body declares that saloon keepers are ineligible to membership in the Order, that whenever it is discovered that such inhibited individual has by any means been initiated into the Order, that his further progress in the Order should be arrested. That as he is not eligible to membership, he is not qualified to receive any of the Degrees. (Journal, 15,605.)"

39. Ques.—Can a member whose dues are paid to January 1st, 1897, be suspended on December 28th, 1897?

Ans.—No. The period from January 1st, 1897, to December 28th, 1897, is not one year, and therefore a Brother who is clear of the books on the 1st day of January can not be suspended on the 28th day of the next ensuing December.

Ques.—Upon the resignation of a Vice Grand, a member was elected to fill the vacancy, but was not installed into the office, but served to the end of the term for a majority of the nights, and was then elected and installed as Noble Grand and served to the end of the term : is he enlitted to the honors of the office?

Ans.—Yes, he is entitled to the honors; he was elected and installed as Noble Grand, served as such for the term, so no matter what mere irregularities there were in his installation and service as Vice Grand, he is entitled to the honors as Noble and Past Grand.

REBEKAH DECISIONS.

40. *Ques.*—Is the wife of an Odd Fellow who is but sixteen or seventeen years of age eligible for membership in a Rebekah Lodge?

Ans.—White women, without regard to age, who are wives of Odd Fellows in good standing, are eligible to membership in Rebekah Lodges, subject to the laws relative to residence, of the Sovereign (irand Lodge and the Grand Lodge of the Jurisdiction in which application is made.

50. *Ques.*—How many black balls are required to reject an application for membership in a Rebekah Lodge?

Ans.—Three black balls, and no more, shall be required to reject an application for membership in a Rebekah Lodge.

This answer was modified as follows:—Not less than three black. balls shall be required to reject an application for membership in a Rebekah Lodge. Grand Lodges may require a larger, but not a smaller number than three to reject such an application.

52. Ques.—Can the staff of Rebekah Lodges have their photographs taken in their robes and costumes for their own use?

Ans.—A Rebekalı Lodge cannot legally have photographs of its staff taken in the robes and costumes used in conferring the degree, for the individual use of its members.

53. Ques.—Does Section 10 of the Rebekah Code as amended do away with Section 1175 of White's Digest of 1895, or what is the standing of a Brother in a Rebekah Lodge who is suspended, either for non-payment of dues or for cause, in his Subordinate Bodge?

Ans.—Section 1175 of White's Digest remains in force, and a Brother's standing in a Rebekah Lodge depends upon his continuous good standing in a Subordinate Lodge in good standing, except in case of a Brother holding a Withdrawal Card in date, his membership in a Rebekah Lodge is not affected thereby, provided he keeps his dues in the Rebekah Lodge paid for one year from date of Withdrawal Card. 54. Ques.—Can Subordinate Jurisdictions still authorize their Rebekah Lodges to set aside 5 per cent of the receipts for dues for contingent fund, notwithstanding the 34th section of the Code for Rebekah Lodges ?

Ans.—Yes, they can.

55. *Ques*,—When should the A. P. W. be given in a Rebekah Lodge, as per Rebekah ritual, or after the candidate has signed the Constitution?

Ans.—The A. P. W. is given by the Noble Grand of a Rebekah Lodge to a candidate in the course of instruction prior to signing the Constitution.

56. Ques.—A member of a Rebekah Lodge was tried and suspended for two years; she appealed to the Grand Lodge, and while the appeal was still pending, and before the session of the Grand Lodge, charges were preferred against her on some matters growing out of the previous transaction, but she paid no attention to the said charges, and the Lodge thereupon expelled her for contempt; shortly afterwards the Grand Lodge reinstated her on the first charges, but the Lodge refuses to permit her attendance and claims she was expelled on the second charges. Was the action of the Lodge in refusing to reinstate her legal?

Ans.—On authority of Sections 1611, 1612 and 1613, White's Digest, edition 1895, the action of the Lodge was legal.

59. Ques.—Under Section 33 of the Code for Rebekah Lodges, do the laws digested in Sections 726 and 727 of Digest apply to Rebekah Lodges?

Ans.—Sections 726 and 727 of the Digest apply to applicants for reinstatement into Rebekah Lodges as well as it does to Subordinate Lodges; Section 33 specially stating that all the laws, rules and regulations of the "Sovereign Grand Lodge now in force, or that may hereafter be adopted for the government of Subordinate Grand Jurisdictions, or that in any way affect the rights of individual members, are made to apply, where applicable, in all their force to Country, Provincial, State and Territorial Jurisdictions of the Degree of Rebekah."etc.; there, as no specific provision is made in the Code for reinstatement, the general law as found in the sections of the Digest referred to certainly govern.

65. *Ques.*—What regalia should a Brother of the Rebekah Degree wear in a Rebekah Lodge ?

Ans.—Where the Rebekah Code, Section 25, states that Brothers should wear the regalia that they are entitled to wear in the Subordinate Lodge it must be construed to confer to those Brothers rize their dues for Code for

who do not hold office in the Rebekah Lodge. Section 25, Rebekah Code, specifies what the regalia shall be for a Rebekah Lodge. Section 1218, Digest 1895, states "that an Encampment member may wear his Encampment regalia when sitting in his own Lodge, *unless he is a Lodge Officer*, in which case he must wear the regalia of his office," hence, when anyone is elected to office in a Rebekah Lodge, whether male or female, they must wear the regalia provided by law for such office.

61. *Ques.*—Has a Grand Lodge, under the Rebekah Code, any authority to authorize the existence of any other Rebekah Grand Body than an Assembly?

Ans.-No.

62. Ques.—Under Section 24, Rebekah Code, revised in 1896, can we require Lodges to vote yes or no ?

Ans.—Section 24, Rebekah Code as amended, provides that "votes in all other cases" (excepting such that are specially stated shall be by ballot), "shall be rira voce" which means that the vote may be either yea or nay, or yes or no.

63. *Ques.*—Has a Brother a right to wear his Encampment regalia when sitting in a Rebekah Lodge?

Ans.—Yes, unless he is an officer in a Rebekah Lodge; in which case he must wear the regalia of his office, as prescribed in Section 25 of the Rebekah Code.

64. *Ques.*—Can a Brother holding a live Withdrawal Card from a Subordinate and Rebekah Lodge join a Rebekah Lodge by deposit of card, without first having renewed his membership in a Subordinate Lodge?

Ans.—He can not. He must be a member of a Subordinate Lodge. A Brother holding a Withdrawal Card is a member of the Order but not of the Lodge.

MISCELLANEOUS DECISIONS.

73. Ques.—What names should go on duplicate charters?

Ans.—All the names appearing on original charter must be inserted in duplicate charter.

74. *Ques.*—Will the ordinary receipt be illegal when issued simply as a receipt for dues paid ?

Aus.--Yes, it will be illegal.

76. Ques.—Can a Brother who is in possession of a Certificate and the A. T. P. W, visit a Lodge within the Jurisdiction containing his own Lodge, he being without the P. W. of the current term?

Ans.-Yes.

77. Statement.—Confusion having arisen over the legislation of the last session of the Sovereign Grand Lodge concerning interstate visitation on certificate for dues.

Ques.—Is it mandatory, under said legislation, that Subordinate Lodges and Encampments shall use *exclusively* the certificate mentioned in such legislation?

Ans.-No, not to the exclusion of the Visiting Card.

78. Ques.—Does the Sovereign Grand Lodge have exclusive power to print such certificates ?

Ans.-Yes.

79. Ques.—May State Grand Lodges and Encampments print such certificates for the use of Subordinates within their jurisdiction?

Ans.-No.

80. *Ques.*—May Subordinate Lodges and Encampments provide themselves with any form of receipt for dues, notwithstanding such legislation ?

Aus.-No.

81. *Ques.*—Can a Brother visit on an official receipt beyond the date for which his dues are paid?

Ans.-No.

* 82. Ques.—Is any other receipt for dues except the official receipt permissible to be used simply as a receipt for dues?

Ans.-No.

83. *Ques.*—If a Patriarch or Brother pays 26 or 52 weeks in a year, can he demand an official receipt each time, if he pays every meeting night in the year?

Ans.-Yes.

84. *Ques.*—Can a Lodge or Encampment charge three cents or any other price for the receipts, or must they furnish the same free if dues are paid?

Ans.—No. A Lodge or Encampment can not charge any price for the receipt, but must furnish it free of charge.

85. Ques.—Did the resolutions from Committee changing or tacking on to Article 16, Section 1, S. G. L. Constitution, to recognize said official receipt as a proper card, change the section; if so, should it not have laid over one year?

Ans.-No, it did not change the section.

86. *Ques.*—Can a trial committee in any or all cases appoint a stenographer or typewriter to take down the evidence in cases, he or she not being a member of the Order?

Ans.—A trial committee can not appoint a stenographer or typewriter to take down the evidence, such persons not being memhers of the Order.

87. *Ques.*—Is it legal to allow a Grand Warden to be put in possession of a Rebekah Ritual, he not being a member of a Rebekah Lodge ?

Ans.-No.

88. Ques.—Are the words occurring in decision 152 of P. G. S. Stebbins of 1896, "in every branch of the Order," to be construed as abolishing the retiring P. W. in the Grand Lodge and Grand Encampment?

Ans.—Yes, and instructions in the use of such abolished P. W.'s should be therefore omitted in giving instructions in the Unwritten Work in the Grand Bodies as well as in Subordinates.

80, *Ques.*—If a member is in arrears for dues and pays part or all of such arrearages, and nothing in advance, can he demand as a receipt the Visiting Certificate?

Ans.-Yes.

90. Ques.—To receive a Visiting & rtificate, does a member have to pay in advance the same as he does when receiving a Visiting Card, and if a member in arrears for dues pays part or all of same, and nothing in advance, can he demand the Official Certificate and the A. T. P. W.?

Ans.—He can demand the Official Certificate, but not the A. T. P. W.

91. *Ques.*—When does a woman cease to be a member of her father's family and cease to be entitled to funeral benefits by reason of her age ?

Ans.—All orphans under the age of twenty-one years are entitled to receive funeral benefits. See Section 90, White's Digest, edition of 1895.

92. Ques.—Must Lodges and Encampments use the new form of receipt or certificates, to the entire exclusion of any and all other forms of receipts for dues?

Ans.-Yes.

Ans.-No.

94. *Ques.*—If this is the only legal receipt, and a Brother's dues must be paid in advance before he can use the same for the purpose of visiting another Lodge, what form of receipt may be issued to a member who is paying arrearages, but not in advance?

Ans.—The form issued and sold by the Sovereign Grand Lodge, "said form of a receipt (certificate) to be universal throughout all jurisdictions on this continent, and to be used as the only and legal receipt (certificate) for dues, assessments, fees, etc., by all Lodges, Encampments and Rebekah Lodges."

95.—*Ques.*—Can a Lodge or Encampment prescribe by by-law that a small fee shall be paid by the Brother on the issuance of the new form of receipt?

Ans.-No.

96. Ques.—Has a State Grand Lodge the right to provide where one black ball appears in balloting for a candidate for admission, that one or more additional ballots shall be taken ?

Ans.—Yes; State Grand Bodies have the right to make such rules and regulations in regard to balloting as those contained in the Constitution for Subordinate Lodges.

97. Ques.—Is it legal and proper for Suberlanate and Grand Lodges to authenticate documents issued by them with a printed impression of the seal, or must it be actually impressed upon them?

Ans.—Yes, it is legitimate and proper to use a *printed* seal on official documents, when it is not convenient to actually impress it.

98. Ques.—Graud Sire Underwood decided that the D. D. G. M. when installing should be addressed as Grand Master. The new ritual says they shall be addressed by their own proper title, which is D. D. G. M. The Ritual says in a Rebekah Lodge the installing officer shall be addressed as Special Deputy Grand Master. Which governs?

Ans.-The Ritual governs.

99. Ques.—Under the wording of the fine print at the end of the instruction in each Degree relative to who may be kept out of a Lodge, can a member suspended for non-payment of dues be kept out?

Ans.-Yes.

101. *Ques.*—Can I, as Grand Master of Texas, legally appoint a Past Grand of the Jurisdiction of Illinois, but not residing in Texas, as Special District Deputy Grand Master, he possessing peculiar qualifications for the position as an organizer?

Ans. No, he is not eligible for appointment to the position.

102. Ques.—A member of a Lodge in Texas obtains a Withdrawal Card; changes his residence to another Jurisdiction, having, however, no settled residence therein; can he within twelve months from the date of the issuance of the card deposit it and apply for membership in the Lodge granting it, he not being a resident of the Jurisdiction of Texas?

Ans.—He can not.

103, *Ques.*—If a member of the Order went into the saloon business between the time when the amendment to Section 5, article 16, Constitution of the S. G. L., was adopted in 1895, and the date of the approval of Decision 88 by Grand Sire Stebbins in 1896, did he violate the Constitution, and should charges be preferred against him for conduct unbecoming an Odd Fellow?

Ans.—Yes; under the law and Decisions 88 and 104, session of 1896, such member is liable to have charges preferred against him, and if convicted, should be expelled from the Order.

104. *Ques.*—Can a Brother visit upon an expired Visiting Certificate?

Ans.-No.

105. *Ques.*—Where there is an apparent conflict between the Ritual, the Constitution of the Sovereign Grand Lodge, or the Constitution of Subordinate Lodges, which should govern?

Ans.—The Constitution of the Sovereign Grand Lodge is supreme law, and where any other law conflicts with it, such other law must give way to it.

106. *Ques.*—Can a Rebekah or a Subordinate Lodge legally refuse to grant a Withdrawal Oard (except to investigate) to members who are clear of the books of whatsoever kind, good moral character, and free from charges, etc. ?

Ans.-Yes.

107. Ques.—A person regularly proposed and elected a member by initiation; a special meeting was called to initiate him, but four members of the lodge attended. They, with the assistance of members of other Lodges, initiated him. What is his standing?

Ans.—He is a full member of the initiatory degree, although the Lodge acted in violation of law in conferring the degree, but the initiate is in no manner chargable with this, Having received the degree it cannot be taken from him, although the Lodge is subject to discipline for conferring the degree with less than a quorum of its members present. See Sections 639 and 690, White's Digest.

108. *Ques.*—Can the Grand Master of Oregon grant permission for a resident of Idaho to join a Lodge in Oregon, every other requisite for admission, such as consent of Idaho, nearness to the Oregon Lodge, etc., etc.. existing ?

Ans.-Yes.

109. Ques.—Can a Subordinate Lodge provide by by-law that an initiate shall receive no benefits until six months after his initiation ?

Ans.—Yes, it can, provided they are so permitted by the uniform constitution of its jurisdiction.

110. *Ques.*—Is it not obligatory on all Lodges to pay at least the minimum benefits to initiates and to members of the first degree, as well as to members of the third degree ?

Ans.—It is not; the lodge, if not prohibited by the Grand Lodge of the jurisdiction, has a right to declare what class of members shall be beneficial and may provide that only members who have attained the third degree shall be beneficial, but if they pay to any class, benefits, it must not be less than two dollars per week.

111. Ques.—Please state all the conditions under which a lodge may deny benefits, or all but the minimum benefits, to members?

Ans.—This question has been, in effect, answered in the preceding answers. The law is that a Subordinate Lodge has the right to declare what classes of members shall be beneficial, it may so divide the members into classes as to give one rate of benefit to an initiate, another rate to a first degree member, another to a second, and another to a third; but it can not give to any member declared by it beneficial, a less rate than two dollars per week.

All these divisions, however, are subject to the laws enacted by the Grand Lodge, it having, however, no power to say that a lodge may pay less than two dollars per week to any member it has declared beneficial. uember ut four of mem-

Ans.—A band has no right to use the name of the Patriarchs Militant, either with or without permission of the P. M. authorities, and if the persons composing the band are members of the Order, charges can be preferred against them in their Lodges and Encamp ments. $\frac{1}{2}$

114. Ques.—Can the Noble Grand and Secretary issue an order for the semi-annual password which will extend beyond their term of office, and be good up to the time the brother pays his dues?

Ans.—Yes, they can.

115. Ques.—Under Section 985, White's Digest, 1895, what is the extent of the "declination" required? Would every Past Grand of the Lodge have to be elected and then decline before dispensation provided gould be asked?

Ans. "It's not necessary for every qualified Past Grand belonging to the Lodge to decline to accept after they are elected. It is sufficient if on the night of election all present decline an election.

Barty and all LEGISLATION.

That the official certificate provided for by the Legislation of 1896, shall be furnished to Subordinate Grand Bodies at, and for the rate of eighty cents per hundred, and to Subordinate Lodges, Subordinate Encampments, Rebekah Lodges at the rate of one dollar per hundred.

That the Grand Sire appoint a special committee, consisting of three members, to consider and codify the funeral and burial ceremony, and make their report to this Sovereign Body at its next annual session.

That Section 194 Digest be amended so as to read as follows: that all Withdrawal Cards, Visiting Cards and Certificates for Dues, Assessments, Fees, etc., should be signed by the holder thereof, in the presence of the officer by whom the A. T. P. W. is communicated.

That it shall be the duty of each Secretary of each Rebekah Lodge to furnish to the Secretary of each Subordinate Lodge to which any member of such Rebekah Lodge belongs a list of the members of said Subordinate Lodge who are also members of said Rebekah Lodge, and thereafter to notify the Secretary of the proper Subordinate Lodge, when any Brother shall become a member of said Rebekah Lodge; and it shall also be the duty of each Secretary of a Subordinate Lodge thus notified that a member or members of his Lodge are members of such Rebekah Lodge, to inform the Secretary of said Rebekah Lodge, without unnecessary delay of the withdrawal by card suspension, expulsion, or reinstatement of any such member.

That it shall be unlawful for any Grand Master, Grand Patriarch, Grand or Subordinate Lodge or Encampment, or any officer or member thereof, or any committee of any Jurisdiction to solicit aid or relief for any purpose or in any manner, either by direct request for funds, sale of tickets or chances, or by any scheme whatever from the Lodges or members thereof, or of the Grand Patriarch, if such appeal is to be made to Encampments, or Patriarchs thereof. Such consent can only be obtained upon proper request therefor duly made by the Grand Master or Grand Patriarch of the soliciting Jurisdiction.

That any member of the Order who shall introduce, sell, or offer to introduce or sell, to any Subordinate Lodge, Rebekah Lodge, Encampment or Canton of Patriarchs Militant, any device which in its character is calculated to make ridiculous the sublime lessons taught by the Degrees of the Order, shall be guilty of an offence against the Order, and on conviction thereof shall be expelled.

That hereafter the Official Receipt shall be designated as the Official Certificate and shall be issued in all cases when members pay dues and assessments to Subordinate Bodies and shall request a receipt, and that such change be made in the form and `atter as to make it plain and distinct, with ample space for necessary signatures and a line for the location of body issuing it and the date.

The statistics of the Manchester Unity be no longer compiled and printed in the journal of the Sovereign Grand Lodge.

That the special committee on Juvenile Degree be discharged and the further consideration of the subject be indefinitely postponed.

That the history of Odd Fellowship published by the Fraternal Publishing Co., of Boston, be made the official history of the Order.

That in the case of the absence of a Brother paying dues, a duly accredited order for the A. T. P. W. shall accompany the receipt.

That hereafter the printed journal shall no longer be designated or referred to as the "Revised Journal," but as the "Journal of Proceedings."

That hereafter all assets of Subordinate Lodges whose Charters have been surrendered may be placed to the credit of a fund to be called and known as Aged Odd Fellows' Fund. Such fund may also ubers of e Secrethe withuny such

be increased and maintained by voluntary contributions and by such other means as are not inconsistent with the laws of the Order.

That the 20th day of September be recognized as the anniversary of the institution of the Rebekah Degree and that it be annually celebrated and commemorated by proper and appropriate ceremonies.

That the Official Certificate and the Visiting Card shall be the only legal acknowledgment for dues and assessments paid by a member to a Subordinate Lodge, Subordinate Encampment or Rebekah Lodge.

That after January 1st, 1898, no Grand or Subordinate Body shall receive any credit for old Rituals returned or destroyed, but all Grand and Subordinate Bodies shall pay full price for all Rituals purchased.

That Section 958 of Digest of 1895 be amended by striking out the word "permanent" in the second line and inserting the word "financial," so that the Permanent Secretary will hereafter be known as Financial Secretary.

That Grand Lodges may provide for the payment of a system of uniform dues and benefits (graded according to age), provided that the amount of benefits is not less than the minimum established by the Sovereign Grand Lodge.

That in all other respects than is hereinabove set forth, said Official Certificate shall conform to, and carry with it all rights and privileges provided by the legislation of 1896 relative to the subject matter hereinabove referred to.

That all cards in the Grand Secretary's office and in the possession of Subordinate Lodges which have on the margin the facsimile of the signature of Theo. A. Ross, Grand Secretary, are hereby declared legal.

That the Grand Secretary be directed in all future editions of the Digest to have Section 1834 eliminated, as it was never enacted into law by this Grand Body. (This Section allowed Lodges to purchase six Rituals.

That this Sovereign Grand Lodge express and place upon record the sincere sympathy of this Great Brotherhood for our unfortunate and suffering Brethren on the Island of Cuba.

That the sum of \$1,500 be annually appropriated, commencing with this Session, for the use of the Grand Sire for office expenses and for visitation. That the Grand Secretary be directed to ship a complete set of the bound proceedings to every Odd Fellow's Home, which has not already received them, without charge,

The amended Constitution of our own Grand Lodge was submitted, and referred to the Committee on Constitutions who made the following report, which was Adopted.

To the Sovercian Grand Lodge of the Independent Order of Odd Pellows;

Now Committee on Constitutions beg leave to report that they have examined the Constitution of the Grand Lodge of British Columbia, adopted at its Annual Session, June 9-11, 1897, and find that the san – does not conflict with the laws of the Severeign Grand Lodge, except in Section 6, Article 11, the concluding words, "or his Deputy." and Section 1, Article 11, the concluding elanse commencing, "provided, also;" which, in the judgment of your committee, are not in usual or proper form.

Resolved, That said Constitution be approved with the exception of the portions of Section 6, Article 11, and Section 4, Article 111, as above mentioned.

Report read from the Special Committee on Uniform System of Dues and Benefits, appointed last Session, which was received and referred to the Committee on Legislation :

VANCOUVER, B. C.,

June 6th, 1898.

To the Grand Lodge of British Columbia, I. O. O. F.:

Your Committee, appointed last Session to enquire into the amount of benefits paid, with special reference to monthly dues, with a view of formulating a uniform system based on sound thancial principles, beg to report that we have gone carefully into the matter and have been guided by the report of a similar committee. to the Grand Lodge of Ontario from which we quote: -" Your Committee are strongly of the opinion that there should be adopted a uniform system of dues and benefits. The subject of vital statistics has been studied so keenly that nearly every Order contains within itself some persons who are competent to guide their Brethren, and it is cheerful to note that the labors of the leading men all tend towards financial improvement; and if some Societies are ahead of others, it is simply through the greater self-denying labors of some of the Brethren within it. At the beginning of their careers some of the grand Societies in the United Kingdom had no knowledge of the scientific principles which should have guided them; neither had they any clear conceptions of the limit of their duties. Now they can boast of organizations perfected by years of trial and of a patiently built up financial system that is proof against any attack. and open for adoption by all Societies that believe in the necessity of a balance being adjusted between dues and benefits.

A careful investigation must demonstrate to the most sincere advocate of "things as they are" the folly of the conclusion that because a Society has contrived to meet all its demands and save a little money, during the earlier portion of its existence, it is necessarily in a solvent condition. A much larger num than is generally inargined is required to be placed out at interest during the earlier period of membership if the heavy claims for sickness, which past experience shows must be expected after the recipients have reached the age of sixty, are to be faithfully liquidated. It has been proved beyond dispute that the total average amount of sickness between the age of 20 and that of 60 (a period of forty years) is sixty weeks, three days and eleven hours (Neilson, Ansell, and Actual Experience of Friendly Societies), while between 60 and 70-a period of only ten years—it is seventy-seven weeks, two days and two hours. In other words, there is on the average less sickness experienced during the llest forty years after manhood than in the ten years between 60 and 70. Again, from 20 to 70 the average sickness is one hundred and thirty-seven weeks, five days and thirteen hours; and from 70 to 80, two hundred and five weeks, two days and cleven hours; an increase during the latter ten years over the preceding fifty of sixty-seven weeks, three days and twenty-two hours.

The importance of the above statistics cannot be too strongly impressed upon the minds of all interested in the prosperity of the Order. It will be seen that a person entering at 21 brings with him an immediate liability of only over rather half a week's sickness per amum; while he who joins the Society at 40 commences with the prospect of claiming double the amount of benefits. Yet in spite of the many warnings, we find that a very large number of our Lodges continue to charge a uniform rate of dues for all ages.

The necessity of a uniform scale of dues and benefits we think is becoming apparent.

Mr. L. G. Fouse, the actuary who examined the financial standing of a kindred Society some time ago, recommended the adoption of a graduated system of dues for each age, and prepared a table founded on the Canadian experience, which your Committee think should be obtained by this Grand Lodge.

Your Committee would call the attention of the Representatives to the following action of the Sovereign Grand Lodge at the Session of 1893 :

1. *Resolved*, That the *minimum rate of dues* in all Lodges immediately subordinate to this Grand Body shall be ten cents per week, or \$5.20 per amum.

If this system of small receipts and large expenditures for benefits continues, how long wid it be field bodges are compelled to repudiate altogether the claims of widows of deceased members? As soon as it becomes known that hodges cannot perform their promises, and must disappoint the just expectation of widows and orpeans in the hour of their need and affliction, they may as well write "debabod" on the doors of their hodge rooms. The relief of the widow and orphan has been a work to which the members of the Order have pointed with pride. As far as your Committee can learn, ours is the only Society in the Province which undertakes to pay widows' benefits.






