

Scholarship Worth Between \$150 and \$200 to Be Given to Toronto University-

CURRICULUM OF COMMERCIAL COURSE

As an Experiment it Will Cover Two Years, But May Be Extended Later. Direct From

ing held yesterday afternoon decided to recommend to the Senate of the Toronto University that a Board of Trade scholar ship be added to the rewards offered by that school of learning. The scholarship Fine Qualities will amount to between \$150 and \$200, but should the University authorities decide to award two Board of Trade scholarships from this amount, the donors will agree In sizes from 1 yard square to 21/2 by 6 yards, with every inter-size, affording a price range from \$1 to \$35.

The recommendation was embodied in the report of the Committee on Technical Education, which body held a conference recently with the University Senate on the proposed commercial course. As a result of the conference, a draft of a curriculum for a diploma in commerce was made, a copy of which was submitted at the meet-ing yesterday, and approved of. The course in commerce, as adopted, is

as follows:
. Candidates may enter this course As follows:

Candidates may enter this course who have passed an examination in English, modern history and geography, mathematics and any two modern languages. The papers of this examination and the standing required will be those of the junior matriculation. First year—English of the first year, any two of the four modern languages, viz.: French, German, Spanish, Italian. Application of mathematics to commence. Elementary inorganic chemistry of the first year. Elementary physics of the first year. Elementary economics of the second year. Honors, drawing. (Optional).

tional).
Second year—English of the second year with two instead of four compositions.
Any two modern languages of the second year, with exercises in commercial literature. Economics (a) Economic geography, economic history. (b) Banking, public finance. 


