CANADIAN AND AMERICAN

In its report to be presented before the Canadian Manufacturers' Association at Halifax, the Intelligence Committee of that body will probably refer to an important matter, viz: the misuse of the word "American."

It will be pointed out, as has often been done before, that the word in question has been generally applied exclusively to the people and goods of the United States.

Canadians themselves as the report will indicate are nearly responsible for the misapplication of the term and very little effort has been made to educate our own citizens as to its correct meaning. Letters have been forwarded at the instance of the committee to the various provinces and Territories, requesting the Ministers in each case to take steps to have the school children educated on this point.

The word "American" is continental in its significance, and no section of the Southern States has a right to monopolize it. The objection to such a monopoly is not merely sentimental. It is a matter of dollars and cents to us. In our fight to establish our products in British and foreign markets it will help us if goods of Canada are recognized as not grouped together as American, but are instead clearly distinguished and individualized as "from Canada" and "from the United States."

A PRESIDENT FROM THE SOUTH. The Democratic party is the Southern party, and it must no longer lose its Southern character. The true has come when the South must cease clinging to the coat tails of distant sections of the United States. It is not attractive to the support of other sections as it cannot maintain its own self-constituted leader from afar must no longer be followed. The choice of a Presidential nominee is a Southern man, because a majority of Democrats are Southern men.

The Port Hood Coal Company is opening up large mines on the northwest coast. These industries are fortunately situated with respect to raw material and are geographically well placed to export their products. They bring a large population to the island. The fisheries of Nova Scotia have been known for many years, fully fifty per cent. of the exports of Canada come from Nova Scotia. These fisheries are now making place in this industry, especially with the improved transportation facilities which are now available.

GRAND LODGE S.O.E. MEETS

And Reports Show That Membership is Increasing and Various Funds Improving.

RECEIPTS EXCEED EXPENDITURE

And the Juvenile Lodges as well as the Other Branches are in a Healthy Condition.

Winnipeg, Aug. 12.—The biennial meeting of the Supreme Grand Lodge of the Sons of England Benefit Society was opened here this afternoon, with the Supreme Grand President, Mayor Fred Cook of Ottawa, in the chair.

That of the Grand President was particularly complimentary to the Province of Manitoba. "For the first time in the history of our grand body," he said, "we meet beyond the confines of the Provinces of Ontario and Quebec. Our society is not a local one. Its lodges are found in every province of the Dominion, in Newfoundland and in South Africa. It is therefore fitting that we should meet at different points in order to give the representatives an opportunity of attending without too much inconvenience."

After dwelling upon the greatness of Manitoba as a province, he remarked: "To this splendid province, to her thriving capital and to the great Territories beyond, we have our own wishes for their continued prosperity and progress; that their population may find happy homes, and assist in the perpetuation of British institutions under that flag that is known as the symbol of justice and freedom the wide world over."

Allusion was then made to the death of the Queen, the accession of the King and the tour of the Prince and Princess of Wales, which he prophesied would be productive of good results. The death of George F. Carleton, a founder and first grand president of the society, was commented upon, a glowing tribute paid to his sterling qualities.

A review of the past two years, as presented, showed that steady progress had been made. The membership had increased in a satisfactory manner and the various funds had greatly improved. Going on, the president told of his official visits and expressed acknowledgment to John Aldridge of Toronto for his generous support and assistance. 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
