HIGH PRESSURE SYSTEM GETS SATISFACTORY TEST

Underwriters Given Demonstration of What New Fire Fighting Appliance Can Do. Everybody expressed satisfaction at yesterday's test of the new high pressure system, conducted for the benefit of the fire underwriters.

Several hundred people witnessed the display, including Mayor Oliver, members of the board of control, Ald. McEwen, chairman of the fire and light committee; ex-Ald. Fleming, chairman of the committee in 1904 when the system was first installed.

The display was certainly impressive, the buildings around setting off the height of the thrown water to better advantage than at the first test kind weeks ago at the foot of Bay-street.

The gauge attached to a hydrant by Inspector Howe showed initial pressure of 300 lbs. Three two-inch streams were turned on, and the pressure dropped to 250 lbs. The ordinary hydrant pressure is around 40 lbs.

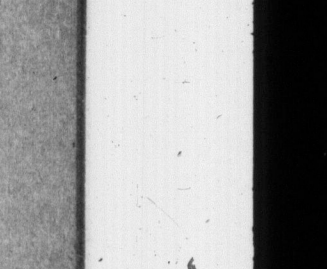

PRICES ARE REACTIONARY AT WALL STREET EXCHANGE

New York Stocks Turn Weak After the Opening—Some Canadian Issues Are Firmer.

World Office, Tuesday Evening, Dec. 29.—Considerably more speculation entered the Toronto Stock Exchange to-day. Brokers had more orders than they had had for some time past and in selling them prices responded to the interest of outside investors and speculators in New York and Chicago. Nova Scotia Steel was also a favorite both here and at Montreal. The Mackays were given a little support in New York and attracted inside attention at this exchange. Pending the settlement of the Mackay, L.R. and Power and Mexican Tramway deals, it is to be brought out at Montreal on Wednesday, though no inclination to follow these stocks.

It was put up in small lots, but the strength of the investment and the market was again shown to-day by sales of Treasury, Imp. Steel and Standard, each of which made advances. The undertone of the market continues, but cannot be considered as being buoyant on to-day's operations.

Wall Street Politers. Stock of New International Smelting Co. already four times over-subscribed. Earnings of B.O. line for past four months indicate annual showing at rate of 14 per cent. on common. Pittsburgh reports orders for steel rails continue to come in very slowly.

MINING PROSPECTOR TELLS OF DEPOSITS AT GOWGANDA

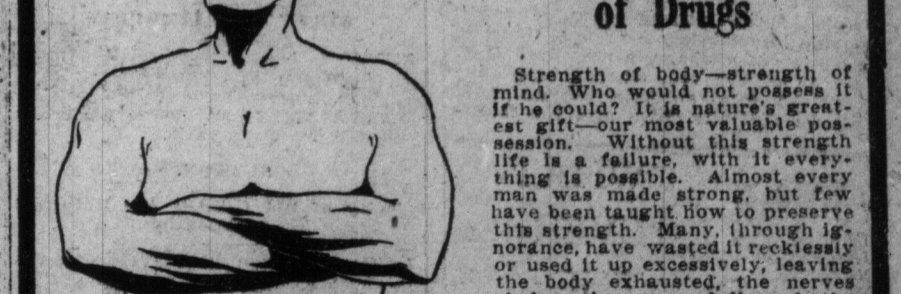
