Villages in Serious Danger-Volcano Has Become Once More a Terrifying Spectacle.

PROF. RICCO, director of Mount Actna Observatory: "The cruption is very grave, and I think it will become much more serious. The lava has covered five miles in sixteen hours, and if my calculations are right, the cruption of the volcano will not be of short duration."

CATANIA, Sicily, March 24 .- Mount Aetna, whose eruptions in the past have wrought great destruction, is again in a state of activity. A pronounced movement within the crater which began last evening has steadily increased in volume, and to-night the gravest fears are entertained as to the results if the eruption continues in ts present violent form.

From Catania, a correspondent motored in the direction of the mountain. Passing the village of Mascalucia, twelve miles in a direct line from the crater, a thick curtain of smoke was encountered which entirely consider the control of the control of the control of the crater. ter, the entire population had gathered in the square to watch the volcano which appeared as a black phan-

Now and then it was illuminated with flashes of light, appearing almost red. Higher up, the rain of cinders became thicker and extended like a vell across the mountain. A deep rearing was heard, and detonations like the sound of artillery followed one another in quick succession, while the earth shook underfoot

Greeat Stream of Lava. cinders covered the ground like a carpet, rendering walking difficult. A peasant was encountered, coming down. He said: "The fire is rushing down, burning everything. The lava is like a red-hot river."

Proceeding a little further along, four colossal columns of black smoke could be observed. Occasionally they were cut by flashing of fire. It was an awe-inspiring spectacle. Then the wind opened the clouds for a moment and a wide strip of fire could be seen in the distance, advancing with monstrous contortions. It fell like a tor-tent from Mount Capriole, and spread

The lave flow already has reached the vineyards above San Leo and Hin-azzo, seven miles from the crater, and ans buried a large number of peasant's houses. It came in several streams and united in one great mass about 20 feet in height, and 1500 feet wide. Its locity was estimated at three or four feet a minute, varying according to the condition of the ground.

This was decided on at a meeting of the board of control last night, to finish the work of pruning estimates. Controller Church and Foster neld out for a reduction of 1% mills from last year's rate of 1816 mills, and the board finally agreed to trim the estimates further with this end in view.

Even with the reduced rate, it is figured that the yield from taxes will be \$425,000 greater than last year, ow-

ing to the big jumps in assessments.

Must Cut Estimates.

In making the cut, however, the board must, between now and Tuesday, eliminate about \$65,000 from estimates as they now stand.

Organized labor will oppose the bill, which is now in the senate at Ottawa, to incorporate the Retail Merchants' Association. Reasons for the opposition as explained to The World vesterday are that the passage of such oill will create a monopoly and that this same association, which opposed hru deputation the co-operative bill introduced into the house by Lloyd Harris, is asking for practically same privileges. In the first place the labor mer maintain that a federal act should have been passed giving the laboring classes the right to organize co-operative societies as the most practical method by which they can associate with a view to protecting and increasing their earning powers as now en joyed by capital by virtue of the joint stock companies' act. They now pro-test against the throwing out of the Lloyd Harris bill, and strongly deprecate the opposition raised by the retailers of Canada to a general cooperative act. They feel now that the bill presented by the association to the senate should likewise be killed, because it would confer upon the retailers the right to legally associate in order to promote their own interests, and it would give them a right which they deny the working men. The bill as proposed by the Retail Merchants' Association, they say, would simply organize a gigantic trust to the detriment of the consumer and

Do You Know the Origin of the Easter Bunny?

Childish voices are asking why the rabbit is seen with the eggs and the chickens that fill the shop windows and showcases, and grown-up minds are not all in a position to supply the reason. The legend that established the hare as a symbol of the Easter-tide is not generally familiar. It is of German origin and runs as follows:

Many years ago, during a cruel war, the Duchess of Lindenburg, with her two children and an old servant, fled for safety to a little obscure village in the mountains. She found the people very poor. And one thing that surprised her much was that they used no eggs. She learned that they had never seen or heard of hens. And so when the old servant went off to get tidings of his master and the war, he brought back with him some of these barnvard birds.

The simple village folk were greatly interested in the strange fowl, and when they saw the tiny yellow chickens breaking their way out of the eggs they were full of delight; but the duchess was saddened by the thought that Easter was drawing near and that she had no gifts for the little mountain children. Then an idea came to her: she would use some of the eggs. So she made bright dyes out of herbs and roots and colored the eggs, because the spring was beginning to color the earth with leaves and flowers. Then the children were invited to visit the duchess, and she told them stories of the glad Easter Day, and afterwards bade each make a nest of moss among the bushes. When they had all partaken of the little feast provided in their honor, and went back to the woods to look at their nests, lo, in each were five colored eggs!

"What a good hen it must have been to lay such beautiful eggs," said

"It could not have been a hen," said another. "The eggs that the hens lay are white. It must have been the rabbit that jumped out from the tree

And all the children agreed that it was the rabbit, and to this day the mystic bunny is supposed to bring eggs and gifts at Easter to the little children of the "Fatherland" who have been loving and kind during the year.

The acceptance of the hare has become universal. It shares the prominence of the egg and the chicken in the various displays of Easter favors in our own midst. 



HOUSE OF LORDS REFORM.

ord Rosebery's three resolutions lling for reform of the house of ds had academic rather than pracical interest. Two of them passed without objection-those affirming that a strong and efficient second chamber is not merely an integral part of the British constitution, but necessary to the well-being of the state and the balance of parliament, and that a second chamber can best be obtained by reforming the house of lords. The third, about which some trouble arose, declared that the necessary preliminary of such a reform and reconstruction is the acceptance of the principle that the possession of a peerage shall no longer in itself give the right to sit and vote in the house of lords, After a debate which revealed considerable differences of opinion, the last resolution carried by a vote of 17 to 17-a large majority, but of less account then at first sight appears, since less than one-third of the peers took part in the division, and the abmentees, mostly "backwoodsmen," will not be whipped into line without diffiguity. As it was, Lord Lansdowne, in order to secure its acceptance, had to express an assurance that the resolution would in no way sacrifice the henditary principle, and he added that "a peer may vote for the resolution and then vote that every meinber of this house should have an hereditary title." Obviously the character of the vote does not betray any marked enthusiasm on the part of the peers







world is unusually active in its en-deavor to send missionaries abroad During last year on the walls of the University of Toronto there was a notice, from the Students' Volunteer Movement for Foreign Missions calling for 272 "college" trained missionaries to assist in spreading in foreign countries the gospel of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ. The propaganda of the Laymen's Missionary Movement with its great efforts to evangelize the world in this generation is also now prominently before us. Missionaries going out to foreign lands, under the auspices of such organizations, must necessarily also carry with them the civilization, culture, and science of the western world. Having in mind the warfare which has been waged between science and theology,—a little sample of which we have been wit-nessing in the recent religious controversy in the City of Toronto led to enquire upon what ground the integrity of the Scriptures, so far as science is concerned, will be maintained by the missionaries when presenting the gospel to those in foreign lands. 
