JAPS NEARING PORT ARTHUR TAKE RIHLUNG FORT BY STORM

Attack Eastern Fortifications of Keewan Group, Silence Enemy's Batteries and Explode Russian Magazines.

BATTLESHIP SEVASTOPOL HIT TWO RUSSIAN STEAMERS SUNK

Story From Tokio Not Confirmed and the Czar's Government Declines to Make a Statement One Way or Other.

St. Petersburg, Oct. 28.—(3.35 a.m.)—Alarmist reports from foreign sources of the alleged critical situation of the Port Arthur garrison and of a renewal of the Japanese attack upon that stronghold have created considerable popular anxiety here over the fate of the fortress, which, it must be confessed, had almost been overlooked by the public in the past few days, owing to the absorbing interest taken in the North Sea complications.

The government simply states that it is without direct advice, tho it realizes that the situation in the fortress must be growing daily more difficult, but that it maintains the firm belief that the garrison will be able to hold out.

ANOTHER JAP VICTORY.

Tokio, Oct. 28.—(8 a.m.)—A press telegram from Gen. Kuroki's headquarters reports that on Thursday the Japanese captured Wailashan after sharp fighting. The attack began at 8 o'clock in the morning and ended at 4 o'clock in the afternoon, the Russians retreating to the Japanese captured two machine guns. The Russian casualties are estimated at 200, and those of the Japanese at 150. The Russians occupied Wailashan on the 14th instant with eight companies and began constructing defences. The Russians retreated across the Shakhe River.

STOESSEL EXPECTS TO DIE.

Shanghai, Oct. 28.—A private letter from Port Arthur, dated Oct. 21, received here today, says: "Gen. Stoessel will die in the Russian emperor and court recently."

NEIGHBORS TAR NEIGHBOR.

Essex, Oct. 28.—Last night, at Colton, a few miles from here, a band of masked and disguised men went to the house of a man who was reported to be a member of the Brotherhood of the Evil Geniuses. They pelted him with stones and threw a quantity of tar upon him. The man was taken to hospital and is now recovering.

REV. MR. BROWN RESIGNS.

Chatham, Oct. 28.—(Special)—Rev. Mr. B. Brown, the prominent Episcopalian minister of Chatham, has resigned the charge of his present pulpits in the First Baptist Church of that place. Mr. Brown had been pastor of the church for the past five years. It is reported that he intends taking up residence in the Dominion of Wales.

KILLED BY EXPLOSION.

Montreal, Oct. 28.—(Special)—A serious explosion took place to-night in the east end buildings of the Montreal Gas Co., resulting in the death of John Douglas, the foreman, and considerable damage to the company's property.

ALPHIEVE GETS OUT.

Harbin, Oct. 28.—Morley Alexieff, who is an Englishman, has been released from the custody of the Japanese authorities. He had been held in Harbin since his arrest in the last few months, which was the result of a misunderstanding.

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JAPS SUCCEED.

Tokio, Oct. 28.—It is reported that the Japanese opened a desperate attack on the eastern forts of Port Arthur, during the morning of Oct. 28, and silenced the Russian batteries. A shell exploded the Russian magazine. Simultaneously the Japanese attacked the forts on Rihlung Mountain and Singshoei Mountain, silencing the Russian batteries and stormed and occupied the forts in front of these mountains. On the night of Oct. 28 there was a confusion in old Port Arthur and Oct. 27 a shell hit the Russian battleship Sevastopol and sunk. Official confirmation of the above is lacking, but the reports are believed to be true.

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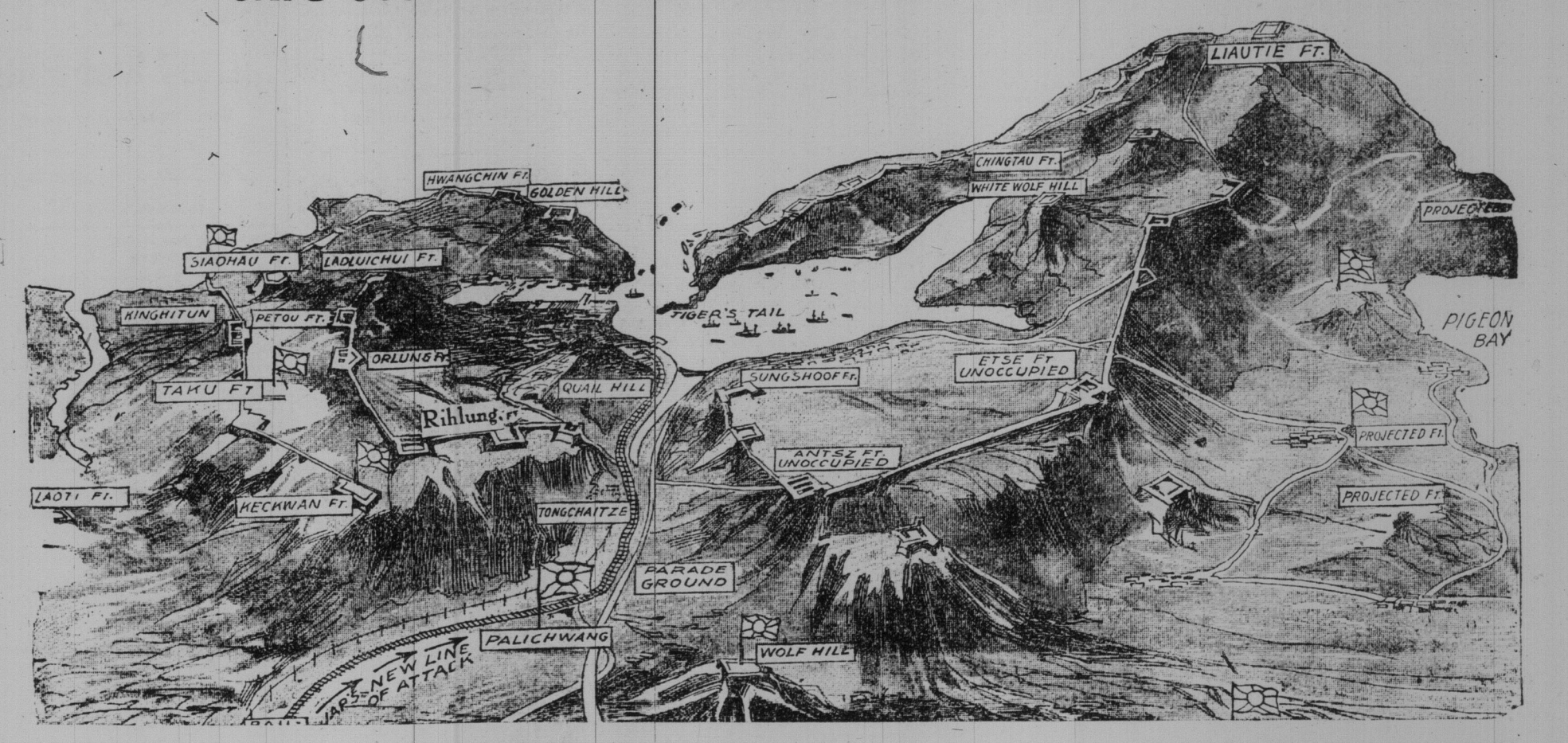
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DIAGRAM OF PORT ARTHUR, SHOWING ITS FORMIDABLE DEFENCES



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BRITONS FAVOR PROTECTION.

(Canadian Associated Press Cable.) London, Oct. 28.—Fourteen hundred members were present at the annual conference of the National Union of Conservatives, which opened today at Southampton. Mr. Chaplin's resolution was carried with but two dissentients, calling for reform in the fiscal policy of the country, and cordially supporting Premier Balfour's demand for power to deal with the evils arising from the unfair competition caused by dumping. It likewise welcomed the recent declaration of the prime minister that if again returned to power he will invite a conference with delegates from the colonies and India to meet to discuss, first, whether the idea of fiscal union commends itself to them; and, second, how it is to be carried out.

An amendment by Moore Bailey, a Birmingham free trader, to throw out the first paragraph, which he interpreted to mean a tax on food, found only thirteen supporters. The other resolutions, dealing chiefly with protection for the home industries, were carried. Contrary to expectation, Mr. Balfour confined his speech to the Russian crisis, and the Daily Graphic says a colonial conference would be a long step towards the goal which every imperialist has in view, and which sooner or later must be reached.

The Morning Post says that the result shows that Mr. Chamberlain has rightly interpreted the opinions and desires of all wishing to see the empire made stronger and more united.

The Daily Chronicle is doubtful whether Premier Balfour accepts Mr. Chaplin's support, and urges him to speak on the subject. The Daily News says the adoption of Mr. Chaplin's resolution is a slap in the face of Mr. Balfour. If he takes it lying down, it will have the effect of concluding the leadership of the Unionists has passed from his hands to those of Mr. Chamberlain.

The Standard says Mr. Chaplin's motion was drafted with a painstaking desire to avoid a deliberate challenge to Mr. Balfour, who will not consent to remain leader of a party which adopts the distinctive features of Mr. Chamberlain's program.

The Times says that not only is there increased solidity upon the central portion of Mr. Balfour's policy, but his approximation to Mr. Chamberlain's views is stamped unmistakably with the approval of the Conservative associations.

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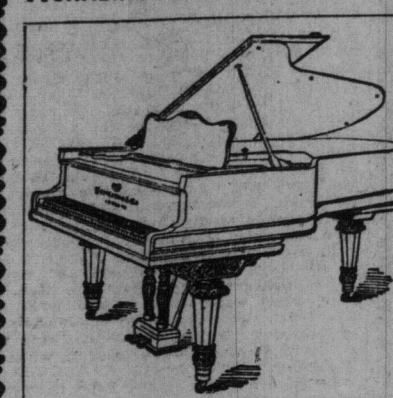

NEW METHOD OF DRIVING AND REGULATING CLOCKS ELECTRICALLY. A new method of driving and regulating clocks electrically by the use of a synchronous motor, has been patented by K. Siegl. This synchronous motor, by Ruhmer, in an exhausted pear-shaped bulb, was placed inside of a glass cylinder, and the light from an incandescent lamp could impinge upon the cell whenever a second hand-dial passed its lowest point, at which a slit in a card fastened on the pendulum coincided with a slit on a fixed mirror. 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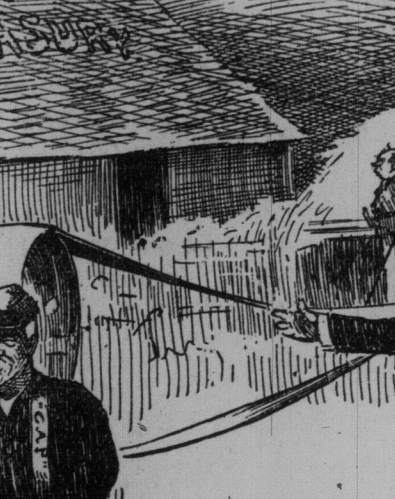

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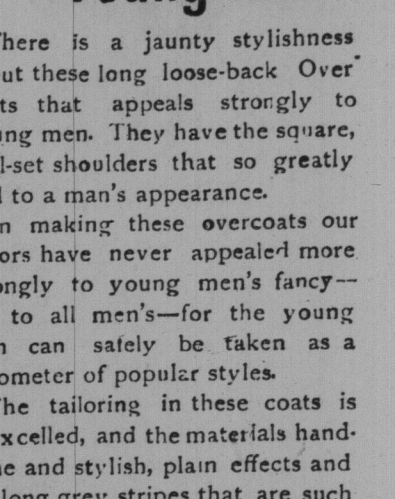

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BROKER OWES \$125,000

J. Walter Labaree Caught in Bull Market and Disappears.

The New York Herald says: Seventy out of town "brokers" and "commission men" besieged the office of J. Walter Labaree, on the seventeenth floor of the Empire Trust Company building, No. 42 Broadway, yesterday, engaged counsel and planned various other moves to get from Mr. Labaree a sum of money which is set at \$125,000 now but may reach a much greater figure.

Mr. Labaree has temporarily absented himself from his office and from his usual haunts, and his great scheme for underwriting or backing bucket shop enterprises on a small scale through the United States is in a state of disarray.

His attorney announces that he is insolvent and desires to arrange with his creditors somewhat on the plan of the corporation proposal by Dr. Woodcock in his creditors' several months ago.

Soon after this Labaree's underwriting scheme was developed. He started to branch offices, but he took upon himself to supply to all out of town brokers who wanted to underwrite or clear for them their dealings.

Seventy customers from Bangor, Me., to New Orleans, were on his list. Among the customers were Rochester, Asheville, N.C., Birmingham, Ala., Toronto, Ont., and many others.

The upward jump of stocks was most disastrous to Labaree. He told a friend nearly two weeks ago that on one day the rise had cost him \$25,000, with a loss of \$100,000 in the other two weeks.

Then the out of town men began to gather. The first delegations were met by Labaree at his office, and the section of the Woodcock case was suggested.

A corporation—the "J. Walter Labaree Corporation"—was hastily formed with \$500,000 capital. A charter was obtained at Albany on Monday, and continued in every corner of his empire in every corner.

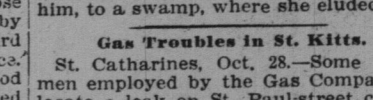

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SIR FREDERICK'S DEFENCE.

Military Gazette Makes Reply to Minister of Militia.

The Military Gazette has the following editorial on Sir Frederick Borden's defence:

We have been requested by some friends of Sir Frederick Borden as a matter of fair play, to publish the minister's speech in the house of commons on the 22nd July last, his recommendation of Lord Dundonald. The speech takes up a great deal of space, but we will give a brief summary of its substance...

The action of the minister of agriculture in forcing Dr. Fisher to resign is a precedent in the history of the militia as the political reason for which it was done was discreditable to the minister. The unfitness of both ministers in the house was so definite that it was shown and so widely known that nothing further need be said on that point.

The minister of agriculture, in his speech, which is in his election pamphlet, is printed in large capitals that Lord Dundonald went to Montreal to see Sir Frederick Borden...

There is one remarkable inconsistency in the minister's speech. He says: "We want the cooperation and assistance of the industrial men throughout Canada to assist us in building up the militia, and can you find an influential man in your city who is going to assist us as a man with his salt—who has not some political views or ideas? I think it would be very difficult to find one, and the practice in this country in organizing such camps has been to go to one of the most influential men in the county and ask his influence."

And he claims on that account that Mr. Fisher was entitled to interfere. His argument is ridiculous. If Mr. Fisher had been asked to organize the regiment as lieutenant-colonel that would have been quite proper, but another Liberal, Col. Smart, was entrusted with the duty. He was responsible for the organization, and he was deeply interested in its success, and as Dr. Borden says, naturally wanted the cooperation and assistance of the industrial men, and he must have felt that he had secured a prize when he was able to obtain the command of a regiment.

WILL BE BISHOP SCOLLARD.

Dioocese of Peterboro Will Divide at Early Date.

Peterboro, Oct. 28.—(Special)—The Catholic diocese of Peterboro, which as at present constituted the largest diocese in Ontario, is about to be divided, and the northern and western part taken off. The diocese now extends from Peterboro County on the east to Thunder Bay district on the west, and the height of land on the north is more than 800 miles in length, and all under the care of Bishop O'Connor of Peterboro. An official bill from Rome, making the change, is expected in a few days.

The proposed division will consist of the counties of Peterboro, Durham, Northumberland, Victoria, and Muskoka, leaving Nipissing, Algoma and the Thunder Bay district for the new diocese, the seat of which is at St. Marie, Ont. Over this district the new bishop, Father Scollard, will have charge. Bishop O'Connor will retain the eastern section of the diocese.

What Blair Will Do.
