

The Board of Managers shall be chosen by ballot by the congregation, from among the members of the church in full communion, at the annual meeting of the congregation, or at a meeting duly called for that purpose.

The Board of Managers shall consist of twelve members, one-half of whom shall retire annually by rotation; and their places, as also the places of any who may die or vacate their office during the year, shall be filled at the annual meeting of the congregation. The retiring Managers may be re-elected.

If any Manager be cut off from church privileges by process of discipline, or leave the congregation, he shall forthwith cease to act as Manager, and another shall, as soon as convenient, be appointed in his place.

The duty of the Managers shall be to attend to the temporal and financial affairs of the congregation. More particularly it shall be their duty to obtain from the people contributions for the sustentation of the ministry; to take care of the property of the congregation; to provide for the payment of the minister's and other salaries; and generally to administer all matters committed to their charge, as the congregation may from time to time direct.

Meetings of the Board shall be held on the last Wednesday of each month for the transaction of business; but a meeting may be held at any time on the call of the chairman, by notice from the pulpit, or addressed personally to the members of the Board.

Seven members present shall constitute a quorum. Every meeting should be opened and closed with prayer.

The Treasurer shall be appointed at the annual meeting of the congregation from the members of the Board of Managers. His duties shall be to keep the accounts of the congregation and to receive and disburse all moneys, subject to the direction and control of the Board of Managers.

The Chairman and Secretary shall be appointed by the Board of Managers at the first meeting of the Board held after the annual meeting of the congregation.

The Chairman's duties shall be to preside at the meetings of the Board of Managers, and to sign all accounts which have passed the Board. In his absence any member may be chosen to act as chairman *pro tem*. The chairman has only a casting vote.

The Secretary's duties shall be to keep a correct record of the proceedings of the Board of Managers and to act as clerk of the congregation at congregational meetings.

All cases not herein provided for shall be governed by the rules and forms of procedure laid down by the church courts of the Presbyterian Church in Canada. In close of that the but that and we

ed he In the good providence of God we have come to the close of another church year, and it is a cause of gratitude that there is no event of marked importance to chronicle, but that the work of the congregation has been quietly, and we trust with general profit, carried on.

Eleven persons connected with the congregation have died during the year, and of these seven were members in full communion; four were members of very long standing—Mrs. Jessie Simpson, Mrs. H. H. Elliott, Mrs. Andrew Denholm and Miss M. Robb. It is worthy of remark that the aggregate age of five persons who have died in the congregation was three hundred and ninety-eight years, an average of almost eighty years' each. Twenty-nine members received disjunction certificates, and nine who have left the bounds have been dropped from the roll without certificate. Twelve infants and three adults have been baptized during the year.

### BOARD OF MANAGERS.

Your Board of Managers have great pleasure in presenting their report for 1897, and desire to unite with the congregation in gratefully acknowledging God's goodness to us, as is evidently shown by the continued prosperity which has attended our labors throughout the year just closed.

During the past year there have been extra expenditures amounting to a considerable sum, which will not necessarily occur for some time again; besides in 1896 \$404 was collected from Church Building Subscriptions, while in 1897 the amount received from the same source was only \$30. In addition to that a number of our liberal contributors left during the year, and quite a number of members and adherents contribute very little, and in many cases nothing, towards the support of the church. Notwithstanding this fact, it is gratifying to note that we have met all liabilities with a balance of \$112.49 to the good.

The amounts realized are as follows: Envelopes, \$4,785.55; ordinary collections, \$633.54; Building Fund, \$30; Ladies' Aid, \$200; anniversary services, \$1,152.29; balance from 1896, \$38.86. Collectively these sums amount to \$6,840.24, and have been disbursed as per financial statement herewith presented.

Although it will be seen from the financial statement submitted, that notwithstanding the loss sustained by the removal of large contributors from our midst, the receipts have proved sufficient to meet all engagements

It is obvious that quite a number of members and adherents are careless about attending to church ordinances, and, we fear are not contributing as their means afford. We trust those who are careless regarding this important matter will give it their earnest attention in the future, that the number so erring may be considerably reduced during the year. In view of liberal aid from those who have been slow in contributing in the past, your Board look hopefully for a large increase in the revenue this current year, so that they not only may have sufficient funds to properly administer the financial affairs of the congregation, but be able to materially reduce the church debt as well, which is a matter of vital interest to the many, who by their assistance and loyalty have contributed largely to the great measure of success which we have now attained.

Arrear notices were sent out regularly at the end of each quarter, and although many of the smaller contributors failed to respond, yet \$412 have been collected throughout the year, principally by this means.

We earnestly request those who have been irregular in their givings in the past to contribute with more punctuality, let the offering be great or small. In future the Board purposes notifying monthly, instead of quarterly, all those who are unmindful in this regard.

In the early part of winter we had our regrets in finding the revenue falling behind, and in order to, if possible, improve matters, it was considered advisable to issue circulars to all of the congregation, and although this mode of proceedure did not apparently find favor

with the majority, being regarded only by a few, yet we believe good has resulted from the scheme. The circular requires no comment, it speaks for itself.

### RECOMMENDATIONS.

We recommend the following resolutions, passed at a joint meeting of the Session and Board of Managers, held on the 12th of January, 1898:

That this joint meeting requests the Board of Managers to recommend to the annual congregational meeting, that for the needs of the choir for the current year the same aggregate sum authorized but not expended last year, be expended if necessary this year, namely: a total of \$625, but that the proportions in which it be apportioned, respectively, as to organist and leader, be remitted to a joint committee composed of all members of Session and Board of Managers.

The Board of Managers recommend that \$75 be voted the Sabbath School for Sabbath School purposes.

That the same ushers now acting be re-appointed, viz.: D. M. Mills, W. A. Reid, J. M. Ferguson, F. A. Bapty, R. G. Lind, Wm. Simson, Alex. Craig, R. S. McPherson, H. W. Lind, Charles Riach, John Sharp, W. A. Coleman.

The six retiring managers are Messrs. A. M. Hamilton, Arch. Sharp, R. G. Fisher, S. B. Coon, J. R. Shuttleworth and A. P. Templeton, all of whom are eligible for re-election.

The thanks of the congregation are due to the choir and ushers for faithful services gratuitously rendered.

The following is the report of the teachers and officers of the Sabbath School for the year just past. It will be seen by the tables given below that the average attendance is less than last year, although the roll of the school is larger. This difference is due partly to the fact that we had very many more wet or disagreeable Sundays than usual in a year, and partly to the fact that many of the additions were made in the last quarter. The lowest attendance for the year was 83, and the highest 200.

During the year the names of four teachers and officers were removed and six added. Of scholars there were additions to the roll to the number of 42, while 22 were removed, leaving a net gain of 20 scholars. Six of those who left belonged to the Infant Class, seven left the city, two went to other schools in the city, and six were transferred to the class for Bible Study held in the church. We regret to record the loss by death of one of the Infant Class, Minnie Fish, who was called away to be with Jesus.

There are at present 24 classes, including the Infant

Class; 11 boys' classes with 68 scholars; 12 girls' classes with 85 scholars; and the Infant Class with 22 boys and 23 girls. Total boys 90, girls 108.

The contributions for Missions show a considerable falling off from last year. The total amount raised was \$260.08, which includes \$6.40 collected by the Infant Class for the Picture Roll, which is sent to the Northwest. The decrease from last year is \$26.38, and is partly due to the decrease in average attendance. At the annual meeting of the teachers and officers held on January 17th, it was resolved to keep account of the amount raised by each class, with the idea of impressing upon the younger generation the desirability of giving regularly as well as freely to the furtherance of Christ's work. # MISSION COMMITTEE.

Your Committee has much pleasure in reporting that the ordinary contributions of this congregation for missionary purposes have been fully maintained during the year just past. The amount on hand \$791.70, being about \$20 in excess of what it was in 1896, and then notwithstanding a contribution of \$25 received last year from the Society for Bible Study has this year been directed into a different channel.

The number of contributors has increased from 131 last year to 147, the highest point yet reached. It is gratifying to find that as our membership increases, a greater number are doing something towards the support of the missionary and benevolent work of the Church. There are still however, quite a number who are holding altogether aloof from this part of the work. It is to be hoped that they may realize their responsibility in the matter.

While the number of contributors has been increasing, there has been a slight decrease in the average contribution, which this year stands at \$5.30 per contributor, as against \$5.90 last year and \$6.14 the year previous.

The demands upon the various Boards of the Church are rapidly increasing, and would warrant a very considerable extension of their operations, but instead of this, great difficulty is being experienced in carrying on the work already taken up, and from present appearances

there is likely to be a considerable deficiency in the funds required for this purpose. A committee has accordingly been appointed who have prepared an estimate of the amount required to be contributed by each congregation, if the work is to go on, and existing liabilities are to be met. The amount allotted to this congregation was \$1,282, some \$500 more than the sum actually collected, so that we have fallen far short of what was asked of us.

Fortunately, however, the amount has been made up for this year in a manner which was quite unexpected, by the receipt of a handsome donation of \$500 for Foreign Missions from the estate of the late Mrs. Kent, through the kindness of Mr. Thomas Kent. This brings up the amount available for Missions, etc., to \$1,291.70, a little more than was asked.

We cannot of course look for a repetition of this experience and will no doubt have to depend upon our own efforts for the current year. Your committee would therefore earnestly urge upon all, especially those who have not hitherto exercised much interest in the general work of the church, to take into serious consideration their duty and privilege in this matter, and would suggest the advantage as well as the convenience of giving regularly and systematically for this purpose, even if the amount be small. While many are at present contributing liberally, the number of those who are doing little or nothing brings down the average to something like three cents per week per member. Very little effort on the part of each would surely increase this to five cents per week per member-which, while not being burdensome on the individual, would produce a satisfactory result in the aggregate.

For the information of those who have recently joined our congregation, and others who may not be conversant with the work carried on by the Church as a whole, a brief summary of the different schemes is given. They are as follows:

- 1. Home Missions—In the newer and smaller settlements from Quebec to the Pacific coast. Service at present at one thousand and seven points and in seven different languages. Since 1875 eighteen mission stations a year started on the road to self-support.
- 2. Augmentation of Stipends—Of ministers settled over congregations which have grown out of the stage of mission stations, but are not yet strong enough to stand alone. Since 1883, two hundred and fifty congregations have been thus helped to the self-sustaining point.
- 3. French Evangelization—Which includes the school at Pointe Aux Trembles. There are 1,415,090 people of French origin in Canada, mostly Roman Catholics. Our Church has ninety-three preaching stations among these, twenty-five ordained missionaries, ten student missionaries, seven colporteurs and twenty-three teachers. The aim is not controversy, but more light through the Bible.
- 4. Foreign Missions—Very wide spread, embracing New Hebrides, Coolies of Trinidad, Northwest Indians, Formosa, Honan, Central India, and Chinese in Canada.
- 5. Colleges—We have contributed to Knox. The colleges secure us an educated ministry, and are themselves centres of active missionary work.
- 6. Aged and Infirm Ministers' Fund—Supported in part by ministers' rates. A minister must be seventy years of age or wholly incapacitated for work to get any benefit from the fund.
- 7. Widows' and Orphans' Fund—Ministers pay rates also to this fund, in addition to what is given by the congregation.
- 8. General Assembly Fund—To pay the necessary running expense of the General Assembly.

We lift up our hearts in gratitude to our Heavenly Father for the measure of success that has attended our efforts, although these have been feeble and far short of our desires.

During the past year there was a paid membership of 61. One member has passed away, several have left the city, but others have taken their places, so that the membership remains the same.

Eleven meetings were held, with an average attendance of 31. In the beginning of the year a committee was appointed to draw out a plan of work. As a consequence some excellent papers have been given from time to time, which added greatly to the interest of the meetings.

In May, a union meeting of the city Auxiliaries was held in the Lecture Hall, when the delegates to the annual meeting in Hamilton gave interesting reports of the work done.

In June, Mrs. John Harvie gave a helpful talk on Mission work in the schools in the Northwest. A collection amounting to \$8.50 was taken up to defray expenses; \$2.50 remained, which was handed to the purchasing

committee for Northwest supplies. An invitation was extended to other city Auxiliaries and Mission Bands, and the meeting was well attended.

The total amount collected by the Society is \$250.49, which includes a most welcome donation of \$50 from Mr. Thos. Kent, also \$10.30 specially collected for the Majority Memorial Fund.

The Thank-offering meeting was held in October. A good programme was provided, but owing to unfavorable weather, the attendance was not so large as expected. The offering amounted to \$81.50, a slight increase over last year.

Our box to the Northwest contained an excellent supply of clothing to the value of \$134.75.

A very pleasant feature of the December meeting was the presentation of a certificate of life membership in the General Society to Mrs. Vincent, one of the oldest and most devoted members.

We trust this backward glance may be profitable to us. We realize that the past is gone with all its opportunities; let us therefore, asking for divine help, enter another year resolved to be more self-denying and zealous in our efforts to assist in gaining the world for Christ.
