

### ANNUAL ADDRESS.

The Most Excellent Grand High Priest then presented and delivered his Annual Address in the following words: DEAR COMPANIONS,-

It is with pleasurable feeling that I again meet the Companions of the Grand Royal Arch Chapter of Nova Scotia, at this Annual Convocation.

For thirteen consecutive years, 12 of which were devoted to the business management of your Grand Body as Grand Secretary, and the past year in the highest position in the gift of the Royal Arch Body, have I endeavoured to make myself as generally useful as circumstances would permit, in the promotion of the welfare of our Institution, and the perpetuation and per-

The various degrees appertaining to the Royal Arch system, are each and all of an impressive and solemn character, and are calculated by a careful study of their intention and meaning to give us a more extended view of our various moral duties. The Rites and Ceremonies of the several degrees refer in every case to matters of a sacred character, and demand for us as Royal Arch Masons, the most absolute reverence. In the Royal Arch Degree more particularly, are we taught with what profound veneration the great and sacred name should be used, and the greatest possible caution even in its mention.

Almost every particle of the appointment of a Chapter, as you all should well know, has its symbolic meaning. The Robes of the several Office Bearers, the banners of the Veils, and their colours, the lights, ornaments, &c., &c., are all full of matter for thought and instruction, and could be profitably studied by each and all of us, if we would but think of the necessity of so doing.

I would advise all officers of Chapters—who take any interest in their work to study well—not only the words of the Ritual of the several degrees as authorized, but also the symbolic meaning intended to be conveyed, which would enable them if sincere in their work, to impress on the minds of the Candidates the moral, as well as the physical beauties of our order.

I trust that the time may arrive when the symbolic teaching of Freemasonry in every branch will become a matter of more thought than heretofore; believing firmly that such a knowledge would be calculated to elevate the whole craft far above its present level.

The Royal Arch Body in the jurisdiction as a whole, is not in that flourishing condition that is desired by its well wishers, although there are several individual Chapters in connection with us which are notable exceptions of this statement. There appears on the part of a very small minority of subordinates for the past two or three years, a spirit of lethargy and carelessness which might have been easily thrown off, if those who had been put in the position of rulers of their several organizations had shown more aptitude and zeal, and a desire to advance the interest of their several Chapters.

Holding as I did for many years, the responsible position of Grand Secretary of this Grand Chapter, I had a favorable opportunity of making myself well acquainted with the workings of the several Chapters, and the amount of energy displayed in each in their desire to perpetuate and make prosperous the Royal Craft.

I have been forced to the conclusion that carelessness and indifference on the part of the principal officers of some of these subordinate Chapters, has been the cause of that want of healthfulness which might have been kept up, if these Companions had been prompted by a sense of their duty to their respective bodies.

From reports received through the Grand Secretary however, I am led to believe that of late there has sprung up a desire that this lifeless state of matters should no longer exist, and a determination expressed that in future a more active interest will be taken in the affairs of Royal Arch Masonry.

That such may be speedily realised is my earnest wish. A very pertinent question might be asked, viz:—

What remedy can be devised to make our Institution more prosperous and useful? I may say that in my opinion there are several things which would conduce to a more satisfactory state of affairs than at present exists.

First.—A more decided and active interest on the part of those put in authority over the respective Chapters, with a due appreciation of the solemn duties they severally promise to perform.

Second.—The introduction on more frequent occasions of any social element which would be calculated to increase any latent desire on the part of members, to attend more regularly the convocations of their respective Chapters, provided always it be of a legitimate character.

Third.—The dissemination of Masonic Literature—of this there is a great lack. I do not hesitate to say that amongst the Craft generally, in this jurisdiction, there is more ignorance as to what is being done abroad in the Masonic world, than obtains in any jurisdiction on this continent.

Why is it that Freemasonry in England and the United States, holds such a high position and character throughout the world. I believe it is to a considerable extent due to the fact, that these countries possess a high class Masonic literature, composed of magazines and newspapers, edited by brethern of eminence in general social life, and enthusiastic in what they consider the holy cause of Freemasonry, which literature is sown broadcast amongst the craft, and the effect of this dissemination of wholesome Masonic information is to bind more closely the brotherhood in these countries, and creates amongst them a healthy rivalry to excel in Masonic knowledge, and the more of this knowledge which is imparted of the good the Institution is doing in the world, so much stronger will be their respect for it.

The first, and what I considered a most desirable act, performed by me in my official capacity, was the appointment of M. E. Companion, Moses Monroe, Past High Priest of Shannon Chapter, St. John's, Newfoundland, to the important and

I have also sanctioned the appointment of Companion Robert Hendry, Jr., of Kingston, Ontario, to fill a vacancy caused by the death of a distinguished representative, T. Dougles Harington, Past Grand Z., of Canada, and of Companion Wm. Simpson, of Raleigh, North Carolina, to be the representative of the Grand Chapter of Nova Scotia, at that of North Carolina; these appointments were made at the request of the M. E. Grand High Priest of these respective jurisdictions.

It is with feelings of regret that I have to record a severe loss met by St. John Chapter, Pictou, in the destruction by fire of their Chapter room, Paraphenalia, and also their Warrant.

The records of the Chapter were fortunately saved. As the Companions of this Chapter were anxious to renew work, and on application from their body, I issued a duplicate warrant to replace that destroyed.

I trust that a much larger amount of prosperty may attend the

working under the duplicate than the original.

The Royal Arch Craft on this continent has, during the past year, met with severe losses in the removal by death of several very distinguished members of the craft, amongst the most prominent are-Companion T. Dougles Harington, Past Grand Z., of Canada, one of the most enthusiastic and genuine Freemasons in the world. M. E., Jas. M. Austen, G. H. P. of New York; M. E., Albert G. Mackey of New York; one of the ablest Masonic writers of his day.

We are also called upon to deplore the loss sustained by the Royal Craft in the United States by the death of M. E., Comp. Robert Farmer Bower, the General Grand High Priest of the General Grand Chapter of the United States of America, who died on 19th May, last past, at the age of 59 years. No words of mine can add to the general regret expressed at his untimely death; his eulogy is that he attained the highest honor of Royal

Arch Masonry in America.

I cannot conclude the list of those who have been called from their Masonic duties in this life, without adding the name of the late President of the United States, Brother and Companion Jas. A. Garfield, whose melancholy death caused by that diabolical communistic spirit of the present day, removed from a sphere of usefulness one whose life and conduct was an example to be followed, and from what I have learned of his Masonic connection, entitles his memory to special mention in the record of all Masonic Lodges and Chapters throughout the world.

I fully expected at the time of my installation into the important and exalted office of Grand High Priest, to have been able to carry out a programme I had arranged, whereby some of our Chapters at a distance which have not yet had the honour of a visit from the G. H. P., should have the benefit of the presence of that functionary amongst them this year. My plans and programme all came to nought from untoward circumstances, over which I could exercise no control, and very much to my regret.

I appointed R. E. Comp. David Small, P. H. P., to officially visit Alexandra Chapter, No. 11, Charlottetown, P. E. I; also, R. E. Comp. C. Crewe Read, to officially visit Prince of Wales Chapter, No. 10, Sydney, C. B.

I also deputized the R. E. Grand Secretary, to officially visit St. John's Chapter, No. 8, Pictou, and Keith, No. 4, Truro. Reports in reference to these official visits will be laid before you.

In conjunction with the R. E. Grand Secretary, I paid a visit to Windsor, on April 6th, for the purpose of visiting Hiram Chapter, No. 3. I had the books of the Chapter before me which I carefully examined, and found every thing correct, but that no work had been done through the year, not on account of any want of energy or willingness on the part of either officers or members, but from lack of material—the Companions assured me, however, that there was no doubt but that the coming year would show an accession of membership. On account of sickness in my family, I was obliged to return home by early train, which prevented me from attending a Convocation of the Chapter which had been called for that evening, for the purpose of welcoming the M. E. Grand High Priest. I officially deputized the Grand Secretary, R. E. Comp. Smithers, to attend said Convocation in my behalf, who will report to you in reference thereto.

In company with the R. E. Grand Secretary, I visited Royal Union Chapter, No. 1—found that there had been a sad neglect of attendance of members at the several convocations during the year, which had retarded to a considerable extent the prosperity of that venerable body. No work had been done up to a late period of the year, but during the latter month there had been an influx of candidates, which would improve very much the financial condition of the Chapter.

late n an ncial In company with the Grand Secretary, I visited St. Andrews, No. 2. This body shows considerable vitality, and on enquiring I found that this vitality was not of spontaneous growth, but had been gradually developing for some time. I found the minutes well recorded, but felt bound to make objection to a part of the minutes of one Convocation, wherein it appears that a Lodge of M. E. Masters, had been opened independent of the Royal Arch—that is, that the Chapter was not opened previously to the Lodge—on this action I declared irregular. I observe that in connection with this subject there is a notice of motion to be considered at this Convocation.

The financial condition of the Grand Chapter is good.

There is a subject which has been creating considerable stir in the jurisdiction on this continent, viz; in reference to the recording of Marks. This question has been on many occasions brought before the several Chapters in our jurisdiction, but the effect has not been very marked.

I do not intend to elaborate this subject, but would simply state that the constitution requires that such shall be done, and a neglect to carry out the provisions of that constitution is certainly a violation of that enactment.

I will read you an extract taken from the Proceedings of one of our Sister Grand Chapters on this subject.

"Your Committee to whom was referred the question, as to the right of a member of a Chapter to withdraw, who refused to record his mark, have had the same under consideration, and respectfully report that the Grand Chapter having provided that every Mark Master must within six months after his admission, select his mark and record the same in the Book of Marks kept by the Chapter for that purpose. A member who refuses to record his mark, is acting in disobedience of one of the regulations of the Grand Chapter, all of which it is his bounden duty to obey, and whilst refusing, is liable to Masonic censure. He is consequently not entitled to withdraw until he has purged himself of his disobedience, by complying with the established regulation."

I thank you, Companions, for the kind attention given to these crude remarks. I trust that the deliberation of to-day, may conduce to the prosperity of the Royal Craft throughout the

The Grand Secretary submitted all the routine correspondence received since the annual Convocation of May 31st, last, which was received, read, and ordered to be placed on file. Also, copies of notices sent to Keith Chapter, No. 4, Truro, and Rossignol Chapter, No. 6, Liverpool, N. S., in reference to their delinquency in not forwarding annual returns in time for the past Annual Convocation. ### REPORT OF GRAND SECRETARY.

FREEMASONS' HALL, HALIFAX, JUNE 5, 1882, A. I. 2412.

I herewith submit my Report for the year past, since my election as Grand Secretary :-

As soon as possible after the Convocation of 1881, I issued and distributed the Annual proceedings, although their publication was delayed by my undertaking to write a short Report on Foreign Correspondence reviewing the proceedings received by me from the date of my election up to the date of issue. The Committee of General Purposes finding that no provision had been made to print a report, authorized me as Grand Secretary to make a beginning in the direction of resuming, after a lapse of several years, the issue of that very important feature in any Grand Chapter Proceedings. I trust that this voluntary action upon my part will meet with approval and that however humble the attempt, that it will be credited solely to my sense of the value and importance of this means of conveying to our own Companions some account of the work of other Grand Bodies as well as information upon many subjects of interest to the Chapt.

I have this year received all the proceedings issued by our sister Grand Chapters, and present herewith my Report thereon for approval. And although I fear that our financial condition will barely warrant the outlay, I trust that means will be provided

to print the Report, as I feel that it will be only a wise measure to continue the work resumed last year, and which has been favourably noticed by other Correspondents as a pleasing feature of our publication. I have during the year collected and indexed the larger portion of the published proceedings of the several other Grand Chapters and arranged for binding enough to complete a large number of volumes, and I hope to induce the jurisdiction in some way to provide a fund by which a start can be made towards forming the nucleus of a Grand Chapter Library, long an object of ambition to me. I have also undertaken the task of compiling a complete Register of the members of the Jurisdiction and am satisfied that if the work began is continued by future Grand Secretary's that it will prove a valuable record for reference in the future. I have succeeded in obtaining nearly all the information required and must ask Secretaries of Chapter to supply any additions required to make the registry complete. The work has received the approbation of the M. E. G. H P. and is now before you for inspection. The amount of labor bestowed has been considerable, but I feel assured that the result will repay all the time and trouble expended. I have had the usual amount of correspondence, and have endeavored to keep the same well in hand and guard against any intentional neglect of attending to and answering promptly all communications, whether received from other jurisdictions or within our own border; and in this connection I beg to acknowledge the benefit I received by having the advantage of the advice and direction of our M. E. G. H. P., Comp. James Gossip, whose experience, (as my predecessor) as Grand Secretary since the organization of the Grand Chapter, in 1869, proved invaluable to me in discharging my several duties. And I wish to add that I can thank the Secretaries of our Chapters generally for that efficiency in the discharge of their duties, which has helped materially to lighten my official labor.

I have received to date Returns from all our Chapters, except Keith, No. 4, Truro, in our jurisdiction, from which I find that while some have done well and better than others who have barely retained their position, others have decreased and are virtually at a stand-still. A reference to the statistical tables annexed will show plainly the true state of our jurisdiction, and I trust that each subordinate Chapter will judge for itself its status amongst us, and endeavor by renewed zeal and energy to improve a condition of affairs amongst some of our Chapters which should not for a moment exist. The number exalted is as about the same as last year, but is cut down by dimissions and deaths to an increase of 21 membership over the number of last year. What the causes are inducing this state of inaction I am unable to state. Our jurisdiction is well and carefully divided to pre-

vent crowding by the contiguity of Chapters, to be healthy we want more push, devotedness and heart in the work of the Royal Craft. Any Chapter not possessed of these essentials had better cease to exist, as half heartedness will not do-we want live bodies-not those who are treading on the verge of their grave in a moribund condition, and I must say that from my own knowledge that there is not a Chapter located in any place that could not be sustained vigorously if the Companions set their minds to work to do so.

I herewith submit all correspondence, the minutes of Committee of General Purposes, my account of receipts and expenditure for the year past with all official documents transmitted to me for presentation. It will be seen that our finances have as far as receipts are concerned slightly increased, that our expenditure has kept pace with them and that our balance on hand is about \$228, but to pay off our present liability I believe this balance will be at once absorbed.

I also beg to remind the Grand Chapter that the Edition of the Constitution is now exhausted and that it will be as well to make provision for a revision and republication, if possible.

I may state that the supply of Diplomas having been exhausted, a new lot has been sent for the use of Grand Chapter and will be issued in due course.

Harmony prevails in our ranks. Our death roll is confined to three Companions only, and our jurisdiction is to be congratulated if the fact that no cases of discipline, of grievance or appeal have been before us, is an indication of prosperity and good conduct and not the result of indifference and inattention.

I have the honor to submit for your information a report of the several visitations made by me, as your Representative, to—

Hiram Chapter, No. 3, Windsor.
 St. John's Chapter, No. 8, Pietou.
 Keith Chapter, No. 4, Truro.

Under your commission it was arranged that Eureka Chapter, No. 5, Annapolis, and Hiram, No. 3, both being in the same line of travel, should be successively visited, but at the last moment it was found that from various causes the Eureka Companions could not guarantee a full convocation at the date designated, the visitation was therefore confined to Hiram, No. 3, Windsor, which Chapter I officially visited on the evening of the 7th April, 1882; on which occasion I had the pleasure of being accompanied by our R. E. Grand Scribe, Comp. J. R. Cowen and R. E. Comp. F. W. Dakin, Past Grand King, to whom I am indebted for assistance and support. I found that while Hiram Chapter had not done any work during the year, that their organization is as good as ever, and their affairs generally well conducted. The records and business having received your own personal inspection leaves me no more to say than that they are a credit to their able and energetic Secretary, Comp H. W. Dimock, P. H. P. It afforded me great pleasure to meet with the Companions of Hiram, a Chapter which numbers amongst its members so many active workers in the Royal Craft; and I was especially pleased to be again honored in meeting our venerable and esteemed Companion, Col. James Poyntz, Past Grand King, who exhibits a pattern of zeal and attention to his duties in the Craft well worthy of the emulation of many younger members. I believe that Hiram Chapter is in a most prosperous condition, and, with the work in progress, will shew a substatial increase next year. After the visitation I conferred the order of High Priesthood in Royal Arch Masonry upon M. E. Comp. Aubrey Blanchard, H. P. of the Chapter, in solemn form, being assisted in the impressive ceremonies of that Order by P. H. Priests Dakin, Rickards and Cowen.

On the day of May, accompanied by R. E. Companions William Williams, Past Grand Scribe, and Ex-Comp. Landis, the Scribe of St. Andrew's, No. 2, I paid an official visit to St. John's Chapter, No. 8, Pictou, and was, on presenting and reading my commission, received with due honor as your representative. As you are aware our Companions in Pictou had been prevented from meeting for some time by the disastrous fire which, in Nov. last, totally destroyed the Masonic Hall, Pictou, and by which the Chapter lost all its property, paraphernalia, Charter and Jewels, &c.; the only thing saved being the records of the Chapter from its constitution. While sympathising with the great loss sustained, it is a gratification to know that their Books, which happened to be in the possession of the Secretary, were saved. It is to be regretted that the Chapter had no insurance upon their property, a precaution which, if taken, would have been a great help to them in their endeavor to place their Chapter in a working condition again. I have to suggest to you, M. E. Companion, to urge upon the Chapters the duty of providing against loss in this way, by insuring their effects, as a failure to do so may strike at the very existence of a Chapter if not in a position to replace their furniture, &c. I found the Records well and correctly kept by their attentive Secretary, Comp. Fred. W. Fraser. The Chapter is at present meeting in the Odd Fellows Hall, but I believe that the Craft in Pictou will re-build their Temple at an early date. and have a house and habitation for themselves. The election of officers took place after the visitation, when I installed the new officers, being assisted by the visitors, Comps. Williams and Landis. I also took the opportunity of installing M. E. Comp. J. R. Davies, the H. P., as Grand Royal Arch Captain of this Grand Chapter, to which office he had been appointed at last Annual Convocation.

After making some explanations as regards Constitutional matters, and instruction in several parts of the Ritual, the Chapter was closed by the M. E. H. P., an invitation to partake of the hospitality of the Companions, closing the exercises of a meeting pleasing alike to visitors and visited. I feel confident that the Chapter having received a new Warrant, and having elected good officers, and possessed of energetic members, will attain a good position amongst our Chapters.

With reference to Keith Chapter, No. 4, Truro, on my return I met by arrangement the Secretary and several other Companions, with whom I spent some time in urging them to attend to the duties of their Chapter, and received a guarantee from them to meet on the following week to elect officers and progress with the work in hand. The Grand Secretary reported that he had during the year prepared a Registry of the Membership of the Jurisdiction, and also a Registry of Diplomas issued since the organization of the Grand Chapter, and as it was his intention to make it as complete a Record as possible, desired the Secretaries of Subordinate Chapters to give him the necessary aid and information to attain the object in view.
