Dublin Is Advised.

By the same token, it is believed, Britain would oppose any Irish attempt to obtain an advisory opinion from the World Court of Justice in the way of an interpretation of the convention. Only registered treaties have any standing before the World Court, and although the Irish document has been duly registered at Geneva, Great Britain apparently holds that this gives Ireland neither the right to appeal to the Council nor the Cornt.

It was learned that a copy of the British communication to the League has been officially forwarded to the Free State Government at Dublin.





#### STRAIGHT FIGHT IN DUNDEE ELECTION

Canadian Press Despatch.

LONDON, Dec. 14.—The by-election in Dundee caused by the death of E. D. Morel, the Labor member, is now a straight fight between the Labor candidate, Tom Johnston, and the Liberal, E. D. Simon, the third man, H. Ferguson, having dropped out. Mr. Ferguson was runing as an Independent Conservative, also as an Imperialist and Anti-Socialist candidate.

Trade Anxiety.

(Irish Times.)

There was a time when Ireland did not need to be anxious about her trade. Before the war exports exceeded imports by so much as 15,000,000 pounds, while at one period during the war the favorable balance was increased to 40,000,000 pounds. 



## STIRRING TALES OF OLD METHODISM MARK CENTENARY

Lone Woman Prayed All Night as Indians Peered

Through Windows. PIONEERS RECALLED

Ballad of Olden Times Tells of Quick Church Building.

HAMILTON, Ont., Dec. 15—Three women and three churches, all of pioneer stuff, make memorable the centenary celebration of Hamilton Methodists, which took the form of a motor ists, which took the form of a motor tour to historic sites in the district. On the so-called "Methodist Mountain" in Ancaster township they found Bowman's Chapel, built originally on two adjoining farms, but moved to Peter Bowman's land when a schism arose. A tablet to the pioneers who in 1796 formed a Methodist circuit at that centre was erected by the modern pilgrims in cooperation with the residents.

And the story went back to Anna Roy, who came from the Mohawk valley in New York just after the Revolutionary War and became the moving spirit in organizing the first "class meeting" in the township. Her name, with that of other original members, is engraved in the brass memorial placed in the chapel wall.

When the party moved on the Rock Chapel, overlooking Dundas Valley and Lake Ontario, they found a frame build-ing that has braved the elements since 1802. Its heroine was Mrs. Ezra Adams, wife of a saddle-bags preacher who, in 1812, built his cabin there and then went "itinerating" westward to Lake Huron. One winter night Indians in ugly mood through its windows at the lone woman Meanwhile she prayed till dawn and safety came. Rock Chapel and the cabin had been built on land which these savages had held until it became "The New Indian Purchase."



Miss Maude French Here on Way Hcme From Shanghai

The outlook for the National Christian church 'n China is bright indeed in the opinion of his Maude French, ove of the manbes. of the secretarial staff of the National Christian Council of China who arrived in St. John yesterda, on the Montonin, on the last lap of her round-the-world cruise which commenced in September from Shanghai. Miss French was the guest of Mrs. Clive Dickason, of Rarris street, yesterday and renewed a friendship that had begun in the West several years ago. It was 12 years since the two friends met last.

Miss Frenchs' home is in Winnipeg and she will spend Christmas there after a brief stop over in Toronto. She has spent the last three ronto. She has spent the last three and a half years in China with Shanghai as her headquarters and has been connected with the National Christian Council since its formation in the spring of 1922.

Speaking of the council yesterday she said that it was made up of the representatives of all the various Christian denominations and that its keynote was unity. There were four official secretaries, two Chinese and two foreign, the two foreign being the eminent British Quaker, Dr. Hodgkins, and Rev. E. C. Lobenstein, the son of a New York millionaire, who for more than 20 years had devoted himself to missionary work in China. The council was now beginning to take definite form and the perile were realizing what a very great force it might become. A National Christian Church was the ideal of the Chinese Christians and their zeal and enthusiasm for the cause was so great that it had completely overcome the Oriental inclination to agree politely with every one, and had led the young Chinese Christians to come out boldly and take a very definite stand.

Miss French left Shanghai on Sept. 16 and sailed on the P. and O. liner Karser-l-Hind by the East Indies and india route to Suez and arriving at fuez began a very inter-eting tour in wifeh she saw Egypt, Palestine, Italy, Pwitzerland and France. After a short, stay in England she sailed on the Montcalm for Canada and home. She could not speak of the fighting around Shanghai as it had taken place during her absence but she ba-lived that foreigners would have been very little effected as the warfare was entirely between opposing Chinese armies. While the rights and lives of foreigners were still held in some respect by the Chinese, Miss French pointed out that foreigners were not so cure of immunity as they had prevolusly been because of the lawlessness of the bandits who terrorized the country districts.

U. S. Not So Low in 14 Years.

OTTAWA, Dec. 15—The balance of trade between Canada and the United States is swinging steadily in favor of the Dominion. Not for 14 years has the excess of Canadian imports from the United States over exports to that country been so low. For the 12 months ended last October this excess stood at \$116,000,000 in tavor of the United States, as compared with \$209,000,000 in the pdevious year.

After this excess had been going up steadily for several years, mounting from \$113,000,000 in 1910 to a peak of \$384,000,000 in 1917, there was a reversal in trend which by 1922 had brought the excess down to \$223,000,000, a figure almost halved by this year's results. In the readjustment period after the World War Canada's purchases from the United States were so much greater than American purchases from Canada that there were strenuous appeals to patronize the home market. The Canadian dollar was at a heavy discount in New York and Canadians were urged to buy at home as one means of bringing it back to par. Recently Canadian funds have stood at a slight premium in the New York market.

Both Canadian purchases in the United States and American purchases here are lower in value than they were a Tew years ago, due in part to the decline in prices after the post-war boom. 



## MAY OBTAIN WATER FROM BURIED SEA

North Carolina Has Vast Underground Supply in Coastal Plain.

In the existence of a large supply of underground waters within the bor ders of the State there is seen by the North Carolina Geological Survey a potential resource which holds forth many possibilities from an economic

"Here in a great section between the Piedmont and the sea is a vast area of geological formations which are saturated with and holding as in a reservoir an almost motionless supply of fresh water, the uses of which have been so far greatly limited by lack of knowledge of the scientific facts of its occurrence, extent, quality and economic possibilities. Roughly and by sound hypothesis the character of the coastal plain and its underlying fresh water level is known. The factors which confine this water, and except by infinitely slow progress prevent its escape to the sea, are understood. The source of the pressure resulting in the source of the pressure resulting in the flowing artesian well is likewise matter of scientific knowledge. But there is little known concerning the yield of which effective knowledge, but of which effective knowledge is so scent as to amount to essential ignorance."

These great stores of scarcely circuitating waters are derived from rainfall, it is pointed out. Because of the low relief and prevalence of sandy soil of the coastal plain, 85 per cent. or more of the water which falls upon the surface is a basorbed by the soil and, with the exception of a relatively small amount taken up by the roots of plants, finds its way downward into the underlying materials. 1,000 Feet Under Sea.

The portous materials consist of a great series of sedimentary deposits, for the most part unconsolidated, which rest upon a gently sloping surface of ancient rocks dipping from an elevation of from 400 to 500 feet at the eastern border of the Piedmont under the sediments of the coastal plain, until at the coast its depth is more than 1,000 feet below sea level. The sediments of the coastal plain resting upon this rock surface consist of a succession of clay, sand and in part of limestone beds which dip at a slight angle to the surface. Water which falls as rain is absorbed by the loams and sands, passes through them by gravity, either enters the underlying beds or moves off laterally to escape as springs along the valley slope.

laterally to escape as springs along the valley slope.

If these inclined beds led to a place of escape at the lower end, the water would continue to gravitate downward, following their more porous layers, and be drained away. However, in the geologic formation a great mass of the underlying materials adjacent to the coast are of marine origin, according to the Survey, which must have been saturated with sea water when they were deposited. It is believed that they have never been above sea level, and as a consquence the sea water imprisoned within them has never had opportunity to escape. It is the pressure of this sea water that prevents the land water from craining away and serves as an effectual barrier against it.

Curious as to Yield.

"The Survey is constantly in receipt of requests for information concerning the yield of wells and the quality of the water and has frequently to give unsatisfactory replies. Well diggers, nunicipalities and engineers all recognize the unsatisfactory condition which exists, and if the State should make it obligatory for all drilling wells to report a log and the results of the test for yield, the Survey could after two years collect the data and issue a report on the subject. Meanwhile, it is desirable that there be provision for the collection of records of yield, log and quality of underground waters.

"Another important public concern in respect to both surface and underground waters is knowledge of their chemical contents. To a very large extent chemical composition determines the method and cost of treatment for municipal supplies. In manufacture it is equally, if not more, important. For instance, it frequently is the determining factor as to the location within the State of such industries as papermaking, tanneries, dye, bleaching and other plants. In the case of undergrounds waters, the matter carried in solution as a rule renders treatment other plants. In the case of under-grounds waters, the matter carried in solution as a rule renders treatment necessary, but in the case of surface waters these are available for such processes without treatment of any

Little Data Available.

tential resource which holds forth many possibilities from an economic and industrial standpoint. As yet the amount of such waters as well as facts concerning their physical properties are uncharted quantities, and it is consequently urged by the Survey that systematic investigations be made so that sufficient data can be assembled from which scientific inferences could be drawn and which would be of aid whenever industrial use of such waters may be contemplated.

In this connection it is pointed out that the harnessing of water for the production of hydro-electric energy in North Carolina was brought about largely through the early assembling of data necessary to attract the attention of industry. Measurement of stream flow, surveys and investigations of streams in relation to their power potentialities have done much, it is stated, to encourage the investment and enterprise requisite to harness the streams and thus add immeasurably to the wealth and activity of the State and its people.

"Water resources," declares a statement issued by the Survey, "by no means stop with the common phenomenon of rainfall and stream flow which is evident to the eye in every river, headway to the sea Except for limited value in navigation and as aids to agriculture, the first significance of these waters is as power and municipal supply. There remains another great source of water supply underlying the coastal plain—the underground waters of which the artesian well is the familiar indication.
