ENTIRE CLASS "FLUNKED" FACULTY FACES INQUIRY

Central Square, N. Y., June 30.—Failure of all members of the 1923 senior class at Central Square High School to pass Regents' examination and the forced abandonment of commencement exercises planned in aid of the Board of Education and the school faculty.

Parents of children, who were scheduled to be given diplomas lay the failure of the class to pass the tests to lack of interest on the part of the school officials. It is the first time since 1909 the school has not had a graduating class. Pupils were so certain of graduation that all details of the commencement exercises had been arranged.

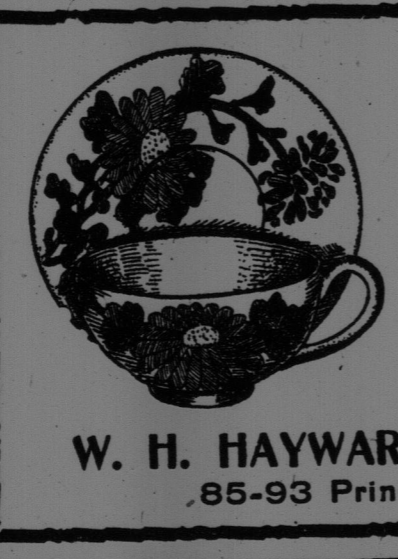

BERNIER GOING TO NORTH AGAIN

Three Months Trip to Maintain Possession of Arctic Islands. Quebec, June 30.—Captain J. E. Bernier, noted explorer, and his equally famous ship, the Arctic, will probably be seen quietly leaving here soon on a cruise to the northern waters that will occupy about three months. The explorer returned from England yesterday on the Minnedosa and will leave today for Ottawa where he will submit his report to the government and at the same time receive final instructions regarding the forthcoming trip. He expects to be back on Tuesday and will then see to the last minute details in connection with the storing of supplies, etc., on board the steamer, sailing as soon as he receives instructions. The object of the voyage, he said, is to maintain possession of all northern islands, such as Ellesmere Island and others, and to replace some men who are on outpost duty there.

JAPANESE IMPERIAL FAMILY BECOMES MORE DEMOCRATIC

London, June 30.—(Associated Press by Mail).—In line with the democratic tendencies of European kings and queens, the Japanese Imperial Family, says a dispatch from Tokio, will in future adopt a more democratic attitude in its public activities. Much of the pomp and ceremony which accompanied the famous painter, who wrote her memoirs much later, may have made a mistake as to the occasion on which she painted the portrait. The picture for which the claim is now made shows a man at least twenty-five years old. He has a fine head, and wears early nineteenth-century dress, with an open collar. There is no direct evidence of Mme. Lebrun's authorship, but it is suggested that painting is in the sterner and more sober manner of her second period of development. As the man in the portrait is shown wearing the red ribbon of the Legion d'Honneur the inference is made that the picture was painted in 1816, as Byron was in Paris in that year and received the decoration from Louis XVII. He remained only a short time in Paris and it is possible that Mme. Lebrun painted from memory as she did in the case of several other portraits.

**Lloyd George Asks
For Special Music**

Says Favorite Welsh Hymn is Most Beautiful Tune.

London, June 14.—(By mail)—Lloyd George was present, with Mrs. Lloyd George and their daughter, at a concert of the Cricieth Choral Society. The society is rehearsing "Elijah" for the Harlech musical festival and selections from the oratorio as well as Welsh hymns were sung.

Congratulating the choir afterwards, Lloyd George said it was a source of great satisfaction to him that the Harlech festival had been revived, affording as it did an opportunity for singing for the love of music other than competitive.

The National Eisteddfod was a very admirable form of competition, and he would not for a moment depreciate its usefulness; it kept them in the spirit of emulation. The Harlech festival, however, took them a stage further, the rendering of music for its own sake appealing not merely to the emotion but to the intellect.

He was delighted that Sir Walford Davies was the festival conductor. He was a great man leading them another step in musical culture.

Wales was a sea of song; but, up to now they had only been cruising around the coast. What they wanted was to sail into the great sea—the broad ocean of song.

They should not be satisfied with the little boats, but get into the great liner—and Wales could do it. They had got the temperament as well as the training—and you cannot get away from the traditions of a people.

What of the Welsh language? Was it going to live or die? Was there so much beauty in the world that they could spare the beauties of their mother tongue?

The hymn tunes they had listened to were exquisite.

He regarded the time "Brynhafyd"—composed by John Williams, a farmer, a couple of miles from Cricieth, and about to be rendered at his special request—the most beautiful in any language. The words themselves were a song, and should gems and pearls of that kind die out the world would be all the poorer.

But whatever happened, he fervently hoped that the Welsh language would be the language of the home and the altar, and so keep the soul of the nation alive.

Ticket the Campers New Forest Rule

(Canadian Forestry Association)

The Government of New Brunswick has issued a proclamation declaring that people entering the forests of that Province until next November must take out a license to do so. This action brings New Brunswick into line with the Province of Quebec in providing an official check on people who visit forest country for the purpose of "travelling, camping, fishing, picnicking, or other purposes." People who do so must first register with a local fire warden, game license vendor, or other official authorized to issue permits under the law.

This action is deemed necessary by the Government in order to prevent immense forest fire damage resulting from the carelessness or thoughtlessness on the part of those entering the forest on pleasure bent. The adoption of the registration regulation is not an attempt by the Government to keep people out of the woods or to deprive the fisherman, camper, or hunter of his annual vacation. It is a regulation, it is pointed out, whereby each individual is reminded and encouraged to be careful of fire when in the forest.

**PRESIDENT SAYS
NATION MUST BE
MADE BONE DRY**

Scores States' Shirking—Calls Smith's Action "Historic Blunder"—No Modification of Volstead Act.

President Harding served notice in an address in Denver on Monday that the Federal Government was determined to enforce the prohibition law even should the burden of enforcement continue to be increasingly thrown upon it by the states.

Moreover, the executive voiced the conviction not only that the prohibition amendment will not be repealed, but that whatever changes may be made in the Volstead act "will represent the sincere purpose of effective enforcement, rather than moderation of the general policy."

Striking straight out at those who violate the law, the President said the issue is fast coming to be recognized not as one between the "wets" and "drys," but as one of whether the laws of "this country can be and will be enforced."

"So far as the Federal Government is concerned," he said, "and I am very sure also, so far as concerns the very great majority of the State Governments and the Local Governments, it will be enforced. A gratifying, indeed, it may fairly be said, an amazing progress has been made in the last few years toward better enforcement."

While Mr. Harding made no direct reference to the situation in New York state, he did say that "the spectacle" of a state nullifying its own authority, and asking the national sovereignty to take over an important part of its powers, is new. He added that "when the implications of this strange proposal are fully understood by people and parties desirous of preserving the rights of the states, the new nullificationists, I venture to say, will discover that they have perpetrated what is likely to prove one of the historic blunders in political management."

The President disclosed that a good deal of testimony is reaching Washington that some states having prohibition enforcement codes and even some which successfully enforced "dry" laws before national prohibition, are disposed to abdicate their own police authority in this matter and to turn over the burden of prohibition enforcement to the federal authorities.

Contrary to True.

"Doubtless," he said, "this is largely due to a misconceived notion, too widely entertained, that the Federal Government has actually taken over the abdication of police authority which in time will inevitably come to be regarded as an intrusion upon and interference with the right of local authority to manage local concerns. The possibility of disaster in such a situation hardly need to be suggested. Yet it is something that we must recognize as among the menaces in this situation."

"The federal government ought to perform in connection with the enforcement of this policy, those functions which are obviously within its proper province. These are compliance in all its aspects as it relates to international commerce, the importation and exportation of liquors, the collection of federal revenue, the prevention of smuggling, and in general the enforcement of the law within the realm of federal authority. But the business of local enforcement, by



states and cities, ought to be in the hands of the state and local authorities and it should be executed in all sincerity and good faith, as other laws are presumed to be executed.

"It is easy to understand the conditions out of which much unrest has developed, but it is not easy to comprehend so much of complacency amid a developing peril. I want to give warning against that peril.

Hurts Moral Fibre.


"Many citizens, not teetotalers in their habits, lawfully acquired stores of private stock in anticipation of prohibition, pending the ratification of the amendment and the enactment of the regulatory law. Many others have no scruple in seeking supplies from those who vend in defiance of the law. The latter practice is rather too costly to be indulged by the masses, so there are literally American millions who resent the lawful possessions of the few, the lawless practices of a few the vast majority. Universal prohibition in the United States would occasion far less discontent than partial prohibition and partial indulgence.

"It is the partial indulgence which challenges the majesty of law, but the greater crime is in the impairment of the moral fibre of the republic. The resentful millions have the example of law defiance by those who can afford to buy, and are reckless enough to take the risk, and there is inculcated a contempt for law which may

some day find expression in far more serious form.

"I do not see how any citizen who cherishes the protection of law in organized society may feel himself secure when he himself is the example of contempt for law. Clearly, there is call for awakened conscience and awakened realization of true self-interest on the part of the few who will themselves suffer most when reverence of law is forgotten and passion is expressed in destructive lawlessness. Ours must be a law-abiding republic, and reverence and obedience must spring from the influential and the leaders among men, as well as obedience from the humbler citizen, else the temple will collapse.

"Whatever satisfaction there may be in indulgence, whatever objection there is to the so-called invasion of personal

**M. N. Natanson Buys the
Sheepshead Bay Race
Track Property to Divide
and Improve It.**

New York, June 30.—The Sheepshead Bay race track property in Brooklyn, once famous as the scene of historic contests between American thoroughbreds, has been sold by the owners, the Harkness Estate Company and other interests, to Max N. Natanson. Not only the race track and motor-drome property, but sixty cottages, bungalows and Plum Beach Island in Sheepshead Bay, together with other valuable acreage were included in the deal. The transaction, which was negotiated by Charles F. Noyes Company, will eventually amount to \$20,000,000.

By his purchase, Mr. Natanson obtains complete ownership of nearly 650 acres of land in the vicinity of Sheepshead Bay, with a bay frontage of approximately 4,000 feet and an additional water frontage on Emmons avenue; more than twenty blocks of property in Gravesend road, and more than 5,000 feet on Ocean avenue, at the foot of which is the bridge over Sheepshead Bay to Manhattan Beach. More than 6,000 lots are involved.

The Sheepshead Bay race track was sold by the Coney Island Jockey Club, in April, 1915, to a syndicate of automobile manufacturers and Wall Street men, for the purpose of building a motor-drome. The late Harry S. Harkness was president of the purchasing company, the Sheepshead Bay Speedway Corporation, and Everett Thompson, formerly director of the Yale Bowl, Charles E. Danforth, Percy R. Pyne, Horace M. Kilborn and Blaine H. Miller were interested. The entire cost of the project, it was announced, would be \$3,500,000. The first great contest held on the new speedway was the Astor Cup Race, on Oct. 2, 1915.

Early in 1917 judgment for \$2,040,000 was entered in favor of the Coney Island Jockey Club against the Sheepshead Bay Speedway Corporation, and shortly afterward the property was taken over by Mr. Harkness. Since that time the future of the property has been in doubt. Various proposals for its use were made, but nothing definite was accomplished, principally because of the desire of the Harkness estate to sell the property for all cash. Meantime, the Police Department has held its annual Field Day on the ground, and other exhibitions have been staged there.

In discussing the deal by which he has become the owner of the property, Mr. Natanson said:

Tells Reasons for Purchase.

"The transaction has been under negotiation for many months. The final closing was deferred until yesterday because of title conditions and the necessity for acquiring contiguous properties. My principal reason for acquiring this extensive property is that it is generally considered to be the finest unimproved tract in the metropolitan district. It is within the ten-mile zone from City Hall or Forty-second street. No property within the city has better transportation facilities, and while part of the Sheepshead Bay neighborhood will be immensely benefited and real estate values, I think, greatly stimulated."

Charles F. Noyes, the broker, said: "Many offers have been made for the property, both as a whole or in part, but these offers have been steadfastly refused, because the Harkness Estate Company, the chief owner, was unwilling to ride their holdings or sell it except on an all cash basis."

"Mr. Natanson is paying all cash for the property, and has already received a substantial part of the Mandelbaum-Lewine Syndicate. Other negotiations are pending with a combination of Western capitalists to take over approximately 1,000 of the lots for immediate development. These men were negotiating for the property before Mr. Natanson made the offer which ended in the purchase."

"Mr. Natanson will reserve from 1,000 to 1,500 of the lots, covering the better part of the property, for resale to house builders, and these lots will be sold through Joseph P. Day, either at private sale or public auction at a date to be announced later. Meanwhile, landscape architects and engineers have been engaged to improve the property and make it suitable for immediate home building."

WATERMELON CROP SHORT.

Forecast Shows Decrease From 1922 of 20,600,000, or 36 Per Cent.

Chicago, June 30.—Extreme heat in many sections of the country increased the demand in the past week for the already scarce watermelon and carlot prices rose to \$1,000 or above in New York and Pittsburgh, according to the weekly fruit and vegetable review of the Federal Bureau of Agricultural Economics, issued today. The price range in New York City was \$450 to \$1,100.

The forecast for watermelon production in nine early States gives a total of 36,000,000 melons, compared with 50,600,000 in 1922. Southern California is the only district thus far this season with shipments in excess of those for the same period last year. The week's shipments averaged 150 cars a day, against about 675 cars for the corresponding week last year.

INDIA REPORTS GOOD CROPS.

London, June 6.—(Associated Press, By Mail).—According to advices from India, the spring crops in that country are the finest that have been seen in many years. Throughout northern India the granaries, which are well stocked as a result of last autumn's excellent harvest, are overflowing.

DANISH BUILDING CURTAILED.

Copenhagen, June 1.—(By Associated Press by mail).—The French occupation of the Baltic is materially affecting the welfare of Denmark, according to the Scandinavian Shipping Gazette. No iron, steel, coke, dyes or other goods have come from the Ruhr since the French went in.

**STEEL PRODUCTION
CURTAILED BY HEAT**

Full Shipments Being Made on Contracts, However, Says Trade Report.

(New York Times)
The hot weather of the last week has caused some curtailment of operations in the steel mills of the country, according to trade reports, particularly in the sheet and tin plate rolling mills. Buyers and sellers agree, however, with few exceptions, that full shipments are being made on contracts. Manufacturing buyers still hold their orders close to requirements and are finding that on some products earlier delivery promises are now made by the mills.

The shut-down planned for July 1 affect a relatively small minority of producers," says the Iron Age, "being only for necessary repairs. Most of the larger companies will continue the present scale of operations. Ingot production as a whole has not been materially affected by the heat, which is being met by the purchase of sheet and tin plate curtailments, which in the Pittsburgh and Youngstown districts have run from 15 to 30 per cent, being made up in part by larger outputs of other materials."

"The Carnegie Steel Company's input output has been greater in the past

week than in the week preceding, and the Illinois Steel Company's operations were at 93 per cent. of capacity. "Indicating that some mills are making up on orders, it is now possible to get bars in two or three weeks in the Pittsburgh district. Similar promises can be made by some plate mills, and a recent order for fifty miles of line pipe went to a Central Western mill because it was in position to make deliveries in three weeks."

"Rail buying, which is from three to four months earlier than usual, keeps up. The Illinois Central has inquired for 60,000 tons, which will be divided between Chicago district and Alabama mills. The Pere Marquette is buying 6,000 tons of rails. Of 50,000 tons for which the Norfolk & Western is in the market, half are 100-pound and half 130-pound rails, and deliveries are to run from September to April.

"Railroads do not hesitate to buy anything needed in the remainder of the year except cars, and at the same time are calling for as liberal shipments as possible against contracts."

"The Iron Trade Review says in part: 'Steel prices are steady and show no tendency to dip below the Steel Corporation figures or the minimum schedule, excepting in black sheets. The recent purchases of 25,000 tons of sheet bars by the Steel Corporation were above \$42.50, but this buyer has been quoted such prices since.'

"Iron Trade Review's composite price of fourteen iron and steel products is \$46.16, as compared with

\$46.34 last week, \$47.32 for May and \$38.35 for June a year ago.

Big Bank Losses

Pretoria, South Africa, June 20.—(Canadian Press Cable).—Serious losses incurred by the National Bank of South Africa, Limited, were reported by the chairman at the annual meeting of the bank yesterday, necessitating absorption of the whole reserve fund of one million pounds and the writing down of the paid-up capital from ten to seven pounds sterling a share, the reduction aggregating \$89,500.

THE FRENCH BUDGET.

Paris, June 30.—The Chamber of Deputies last night adopted the 1923 budget, 457 votes to 93. The appropriation voted amounts to 23,431,000,000 francs. It also was decided, 410 to 158, that this budget shall be applicable to 1924.

\$5,000,000 RICKARD ARENA PLANNED

"Greatest Amusement Centre" to Occupy Car Barn Site—Will Seat 26,215—Call for 26-Story Office Building.

New York, June 30—G. L. (Tex) Rickard, boxing promoter, John Ringling, circus owner and associates expect to settle the matter of title to nearly a whole block at Fifth Street and Seventh Avenue, within a stone's throw of Times Square, where they plan to erect what they describe as "the largest indoor arena in the world."

The arena, together with a 26-story office building which will form a part of the proposed structure, and the land will situate in the neighborhood of \$5,000,000, according to information given by one of those interested in the project.

Four of the largest banking groups in New York are ready to underwrite the enterprise, it was said. Negotiations for the car barns site have been under way for several months.

Difficulties in closing the deal have been due to complications of receivership. Any change in title to the property is subject to the approval of various groups of bond holders, especially the 4 per cent. group.

The arrangements have been discussed by the representatives of bondholders' committees and the Rickard-Ringling group have not been disclosed in detail to Job E. Hedges, Receiver, who explained last night that the sale of the property would have to be approved by Judge Julius M. Mayer and that there were several other steps to be taken before the present owners to the New Madison Square Garden Corporation.

Not to Quit Garden. The purchase of the site and operation of the arena and office building will be handled by the recently formed New Madison Square Garden Corporation. The papers of incorporation of the new organization were filed with the Secretary of State at Albany on May 31, when there was much speculation regarding the future plans of Rickard, Ringling and their associates.

There were rumors that that Rickard and Ringling, holding a lease on Madison Square Garden with still eight years to run, would scrap the old Garden and build a bigger and finer amusement palace. Both Rickard and Darwin P. Kingsley, President of the New York Life Insurance Company, lessor of Madison Square Garden, were questioned, but shed no light on the plans of the new corporation.

It is now definitely announced that Madison Square Garden will not be abandoned by the New Madison Square Garden Corporation. The disclosure of the plans of the Rickard-Ringling group was made to a limited number of the friends of the promoters who were invited to share in the undertaking.

So sure are Mr. Rickard and Mr. Ringling and those backing their project that they will gain possession of the lot that they filed today that Mr. Ringling and Mr. Rickard have prepared a formal announcement which was to have been released for Monday.

The new arena is to be adapted will be embodied in the forthcoming announcement.

The recently organized New Madison Square Garden Corporation will take over all the enterprises of Tex Rickard in the United States. Prohibited activities in America and in foreign companies will go to the new corporation, which he is under agreement to serve for a period of twenty years from May 1923.

The place of Chairman of the Board of Directors of the new corporation will be filled by Mr. Ringling. Men who are known in the financial and athletic worlds will have places on the board.

GIBBONS BEST BOXER DEMPSEY HAS MET YET

Writer Sees in July 4 Bout a Similarity to Meeting of Corbett and John L.

New York, June 30.—(Associated Press).—When Tommy Gibbons, St. Paul heavyweight, steps into the ring at Shelby, Montana, July 4, against Jack Dempsey, the champion, he may be compared in some respects to "Gentleman Jim" Corbett when that dapper boxing wizard squared off against John L. Sullivan at New Orleans in 1892.

Gibbons' chances against Dempsey

have been belittled by a majority of the experts, and indeed, the Minnesotan hardly appears heavy puncher enough to flatten the Coloradoan. But like his middleweight brother Mike, "The Phantom," Tommy is a master boxer, cool in combat, always clever, always fast, and a puncher of no mean ability.

At least a year older than Dempsey, an inch or two shorter and really a light-heavyweight, Gibbons may not be able to stand before the champion for 15 rounds. Except in age—Corbett was much younger than Sullivan when they met at New Orleans—Gibbons and Dempsey will be like "Gentleman Jim" and "Terrible John L." in that famous scrap of 31 years ago.

Sullivan's terrific punching power, like that of the Dempsey of today, caused many a sturdy opponent's knees to quake when he thought of it, and many of them were defeated by fear before Sullivan laid a glove on them. Not so Corbett. When Jim took his corner at New Orleans John L. scowled, shuffled his feet and spat on the ring floor, his customary greeting. Jim laughed and chatted with ring-siders as the gloves were being pushed upon his hands. He paid no attention to Sullivan.

Through the rounds, as agile Jim sidestepped Sullivan's bull-like rushes, the champion became infuriated. Came then the famous twenty-first round, Corbett still strong and smiling. The wear of the fight had told on Sullivan; he was angered, but even then had he been able to punch Corbett solidly he would have retained the title. Corbett landed five crashing blows to the jaw. Sullivan kept his feet, but his eyes began to roll. He was tottering. Cor-

Haddock Denies Charges Against Amateur Hockey

Pittsburgh, June 30.—The charge that all teams in the United States Amateur Hockey Association, excepting the Boston Hockey club and the St. Nicholas team of New York, are professional, made by Francis J. Sullivan, president of the association, declared in a statement issued here.

Sullivan announced at Boston that he would make a formal protest to the American Olympic Committee against participation of the Boston Athletic Association hockey team, winners of the association title, in the Paris Olympic games.

"In the first place," said Mr. Haddock, "it has not been decided who will represent America at Paris. We may send the Boston A. A. club or send an all-star team from players in the association."

"There is nothing professional about the association. A player in order to get in must prove his amateur standing. For instance, some players come to us from Canada. Before we give them a playing card we verify their amateur standing through the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association."

"This verification of a player's standing caused Sullivan's suspension. He managed a team at New Haven and asked permission to play a number of men from Canada. It took some time to verify their standing and Sullivan believed we held up their cards purposely. As a result of this he refused to play at Boston one night and was suspended and his franchise taken away from him."

"His protest to the Olympic Committee, I feel sure, will have no effect upon the selection of America's hockey representatives to Paris."
