MOEY EASIER, AND THE RATE IS ORDERED

Bank of England Reduces to Four and a Half; Long Time Held at Five

Improving Monetary Conditions and Ending of Balkan War Are Causes—Further Reduction When Peace is Signed and Hoarded up Money Comes into Circulation

(Canadian Press.) London, April 17.—The Bank of England rate, as generally anticipated, was reduced today to 4 1/2 per cent. after the retention of the 5 per cent. rate for the longest period in half a century.

A diminution of his cough has relieved the Holy Father considerably. His temperature was 97 this morning. Slight amelioration in the bronchial symptoms was again noted."

News of the death of John Kerr, prominent barrister and chief of the city fire department, came as a great shock to his friends this afternoon. Mr. Kerr was in his usual good health yesterday, but was attacked this morning about ten o'clock by heart trouble and passed away at two o'clock this afternoon.

MACKINTOSH VS. THE BANK OF NEW BRUNSWICK

Death of Miss Elizabeth Smith, An Expert in Handling Money

(Special To Times) Fredericton, N. B., April 17.—The case of J. C. Mackintosh & Co. vs. the Bank of New Brunswick was taken up in the supreme court this morning. H. A. Powell, K.C., acting for the plaintiffs, moved for judgment on the verdict for the defendant and an order for the plaintiff or for a new trial.

PRairie FIRES CAUSE LOSS IN SASKATCHEWAN

Radville, Sask., April 17.—Prairie fires which raged through the hills which cut off Radville, burnt a strip fifteen to twenty miles wide, destroying thousands of acres of pasture. As a result feed will be scarce. The fire burnt fiercely and with the grain of George Eldridge, which was wiped out, while from other districts come reports of men taking the flames for two days and two nights. Three or four other farms were burned out.

CONDENSED DESPATCHES

San Juan, P. R., April 17.—The sugar planters' association has decided to refuse to accept the American refiners' offer to buy at only a discount of \$1.25 a quintal (220 pounds). They are planning to store their sugar pending a clearer understanding on the tariff situation, and send a committee to Washington.

SEVERAL DIE IN A BURNING HOTEL

Old Wooden Structure in Malone, N. Y., Ablaze and 30 People Aroused from Sleep to Battle for Life

(Canadian Press) Malone, N. Y., April 17.—Seven or more persons were burned to death. Several women sustained injuries from which they may die, and a score of persons were rescued by firemen in a spectacular fire which destroyed the De-Wilson Hotel, an old three-story wooden structure in Catherine street, early today.

THE BELGIAN STRIKE

The men as a rule, appear to be settling down to a long test of endurance.

London, April 17.—The admiralty has awarded the owners of the Steamship Wolman, \$47,500 for salvaging the steamer Snowden Range from Philadelphia, Nov. 22.

BY TROLLEY CAR ACROSS NIAGARA

Toronto, Ont., April 17.—The Niagara Park commission is completing arrangements for the granting of a concession to a Spanish company for installing an aerial tramway over the whirlpool. It will be about a third of a mile long and will greatly lessen the route of the International railway, which now runs around the whirlpool.

HOSTILITY TO FRIEDMANN SHOWS ITSELF AGAIN

Washington, April 17.—Dr. Friedmann, it developed today, refused a request of the federal public health service for more serum for a more careful analysis. Dr. Friedmann is declared to have said that he could spare no more. The amount furnished by the Berlin scientist, according to Surgeon General Eise, was a mere drop.

YOUNG WOMAN TAKES PARIS GREEN

Montreal, April 17.—Miss Noe Pagnin, 25 years old, died last night as a result of having taken Paris green. She was unconscious when found by her mother. Despondency over ill-health, as believed, was the cause.

CLERK IN CALGARY TREASURER'S OFFICE IS UNDER ARREST

Calgary, Alb., April 17.—Alfred Matheson, a clerk in the city treasurer's department, is under arrest on a charge of forging five city checks totaling \$288. Matheson received a salary of \$70 a month. He has an invalid wife and two children. He was formerly a member of the famous Scottish regiment, the Blackwatch.

ARMEN CROSS THE SAHARA

Biskra, Algeria, April 17.—Four military aeroplanes piloted by Lieutenants Reimbert, Cheutin, Jolani and Bonnet of the French army, arrived here today after a 500 mile round trip over the Sahara desert. One of the machines carried Colonel Bouteaux as a passenger. The entire flight was made without an error.

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Daily Hints For the Cook

EVAPORATED PEACHES WITH RAISINS

Carefully wash each peach and soak over night. Remove the seeds from raisins. Allow a cup raisins to 1 pound peaches. Cook them together in the water the peaches were soaked in, add sufficient sugar to sweeten. Slew till tender.

SWISS POTATO SOUP

Pare and slice six large potatoes and three small turnips. Put them in five pints of water, boil five or six hours until perfectly dissolved and of the consistency of pea soup. If it boils away too fast add a little boiling water. When thick enough add butter, pepper and salt. A small piece of salt pork or lamb or veal and a small onion may be added to vary the soup if desired.

THE VALLEY RAILWAY

The choice of routes by which the St. John valley river railway should enter St. John was given another thorough discussion at a special meeting of the Board of Trade, which was called for the purpose, last evening, F. del. Clements submitted a large amount of valuable information on the subject and argued the claims of the western route. There was vigorous opposition to any change in the eastern route which has already been adopted, after an interesting, and at times a lively discussion, the meeting decided to leave the matter in the hands of Premier Fleming and the local government. About forty members were present.

Mr. Clements said that the western route, although only two miles longer, would cost about a million and a half less. The river bridges for the eastern route, he said, would be a menace to river navigation and especially to rafting operations while the harbor bridge on the western route would be a great advantage in giving direct and cheap communication between the two sides of the harbor, and would effect a substantial saving in transfer charges.

EVIDENCE IN CONNECTION WITH THE DEATH OF EDMUND LEBER

The inquest into the death of Edmund Leber, who died from injuries received on board the steamer Montreal, was begun by Coroner Berryman last night. David O'Connell, winchman on the steamer, said that the fatality was purely accidental. The sling of desks became caught in a guy rope and Leber, in doing his duty and loosening the sling, was swept across the deck. Martin B. Wilcox, foreman on the steamer on the night of the accident, said that it was a common thing for longshoremen to work longer hours than the resolution, which was adopted by laboring men, called for. He said the lighting on the ship was perfect on the night in question. The inquest was adjourned until next Wednesday night at 7.30 o'clock.

ALL SEVEN FOUND UNCONSCIOUS

Geneva, April 17—A strange accident is reported from Fiemme, in the Tyrol, a motor omnibus arrived at the station of Fontaine-Froide, and chauffeur opened the door to ask the seven travellers to descend. All were lying in a heap, and looked as if they were dead. The unconscious travellers were carried to a hotel, where doctors attended them, and they recovered. The cause of the accident was a defective benzine tank. The fumes of the gas had entered the closed car, gradually rendering the occupants unconscious.

#### CELEBRATING EDICT OF MILAN CENTENARY

Rome, April 13—The first of the more important festivals celebrating the 16th century of the Edict of Milan took place in the neighborhood of the catacombs that line the Appian Way. The ceremony was organized by the College "Cultorum Martyrum" in honor of the many Christian martyrs whose names are connected with that area. It began with a solemn mass sung with full musical accompaniment, in the crypt of the catacombs of St. Damazilla, between the Basilica of the Saints Petronilla, Novus and Achilous. The crypt itself was richly decorated and lighted for the occasion and the surrounding subterranean galleries were illuminated.

After the mass Professor Marucci held an archaeological conference in the adjoining crypts illustrating the history of St. Cecilia, St. Sixtus, and other martyrs. Late in the afternoon a procession was formed, carrying the Eucharist. It wended its way through the whole area

of the catacombs to a field near St. Sebastian, where an altar had been raised bearing the Constantine monogram. After receiving solemn benediction at the altar from Cardinal Casazza the procession went on to the Appian Way, and followed it as far as the Basilica of St. Sebastian, where the company finally dispersed.

The weather was brilliantly fine, and the ceremony was attended by a dense and reverent throng.

WORK FOR JAIL PRISONERS

It is now lawful in the state of Maine to employ prisoners from the jails to build or repair highways in the counties where they are imprisoned. An act was passed at the last session of the state legislature, under which county commissioners may make rules and regulations and appoint overseers and keepers to have charge of prisoners so employed.

AT OTTAWA

The spectacle daily witnessed at Ottawa is not one which the people may view with complacency. Mr. Borden and his colleagues, fearing to appeal to the country on a question which should never have been raised without an appeal to the people, are doggedly sheltering themselves behind a closure bill which they expect to force through the house by the votes of followers who like themselves are afraid to go to the country.

SIR CHARLES TUPPER

The venerable Sir Charles Tupper has bidden farewell to British Columbia, and the Vancouver Sun comments upon the rather painful simplicity of the departure of the surviving father of confederation from Vancouver. It says that of all the Conservative politicians who owed him as much or more as present, Sir Charles gave the Sun a brief interview in the course of which he said:



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**AYS GOVERNMENT IN PORTUGAL IS FAST RIDING TO A FALL**

**People Disillusioned Under Increased Taxation and Oppressive Rule**

London, April 17—A despatch to the "Standard" from Lisbon says: The bitterness of disillusion has been the lot of the Portuguese democracy, who expected so much from the advent of a republican government. When the reins of power were seized by the demagogues who engineered the revolution, the Portuguese were assured that a halcyon era was about to be inaugurated. What are the actual facts? Instead of taxation being lightened, as was promised, government exactions are increasing to such an extent that owners of landed property and farmers in the country generally are refusing to pay them. Despite the comfortable assurances of the department of finance, national credit is impaired, and the country's resources, drained for the advantage of unscrupulous office-holders, are being steadily depleted.

It is not too much to say that the country is seething with discontent as the result of the flagrant abuses of office and power which the Republicans have committed since they imposed their yoke on an unwilling nation. In the words of a prominent diplomat accredited to Lisbon, Portugal is now "a monarchist country with an anarchist capital." A powerful reaction has set in against a government which panders to Socialists and Syndicalists and other forces of anarchy in order to ensure support against the approaching wave of public indignation that threatens to sweep it away.

As if driven by an inexorable fate, the Republicans are paving the way to their own downfall by the harsh measures taken against the Royalists. Jails are filled with so-called "conspirators" who are condemned to the same treatment as the most hardened criminals. To quote two instances, the Marquis of Ficalho, who held the rank of captain in the Austrian army, and Don Belmonte, a great-grandson of John VI. of Portugal, are at this moment undergoing sentences of ten years' cell imprisonment side by side with murderers and thieves. Prosecution, however, has only had the effect of increasing the number of adherents to the monarchist cause, and in both the army and navy—honey-combed with secret societies pledged to the overthrow of the hated republican regime—the rank and file are practically beyond the control of their officers.

As in the case of the Royalists, so every regime of state tyranny and oppression is being employed against the Catholic church, whose faith is professed by the great majority of Portuguese. Not only are the Catholic clergy the objects of oppression by the government, but they have to endure persecution at the hands of the Carbonarios (revolutionary societies), whose influence with the authorities is such that they are practically allowed a free hand in the commission of their lawless acts.

Other examples might be given of the perils of the state to which Portugal has been reduced as the result of acquiescing so tamely in the coup de main of a few desperate revolutionaries, but enough has been written to show that the whole country now bitterly rues the events which drove the House of Braganza from Lisbon and placed the nation under the ruthless heel of a republican despotism.

**BACK TO NEW BRUNSWICK.** Mr. and Mrs. Oscar McLaughlin left their home in Brewer, Me., yesterday to settle in New Brunswick. Mr. McLaughlin, who has held a responsible position with the Maine Central Railway, will cultivate his large farm near Fredericton, N. B. They were given a farewell reception by their friends in Brewer.

**IN PARLIAMENT**

Ottawa, April 16—One of the most convincing illustrations of the government's intention to stifle free speech was given in the house yesterday, and the event was even more significant in that it furnished ground, for the first time in the history of Canada, for members to refuse to accept the word of the Premier of Canada. Only a week ago the premier had given his assurance that there would be no objections raised by the government to a discussion of charges under "motions" introduced to investigate the connection of Hon. Robert Rogers with the Prince Albert land matter, Premier Borden led the fight to prevent discussion, urging that the matter be laid over until after the adoption of the closure bill.

The opposition objected vigorously, but after a sharp exchange between the two sides of the house the motion was ruled out of order.

**TALKS TO TRAINMEN ON HANDLING OF EXPLOSIVES**

Trainmen and other employees of the C. P. R. and I. C. R. heard a valuable lecture last evening in Keith's Assembly rooms on the subject of the proper methods of handling explosives and inflammable materials and acids. It was given by A. H. McMullen, of Toronto, an inspector for the bureau for the safe transportation of dangerous materials. Mr. McMullen, told of necessity of carefulness and, assisted by lantern slides, showed the proper methods of handling the materials, how to load cars, etc. He also urged the necessity of plainly labelling the car as well as the package. The bureau is supported by 200 railways on this continent, and since it was organized in 1907 has accomplished great results in lessening the number of accidents. Mr. McMullen will speak in Fairville this evening.

Magistrate Ritchie dismissed a case in which Margaret and Lawrence Dow charged Mrs. Gray with poisoning two dogs last Saturday. The magistrate did not think the evidence was satisfactory.

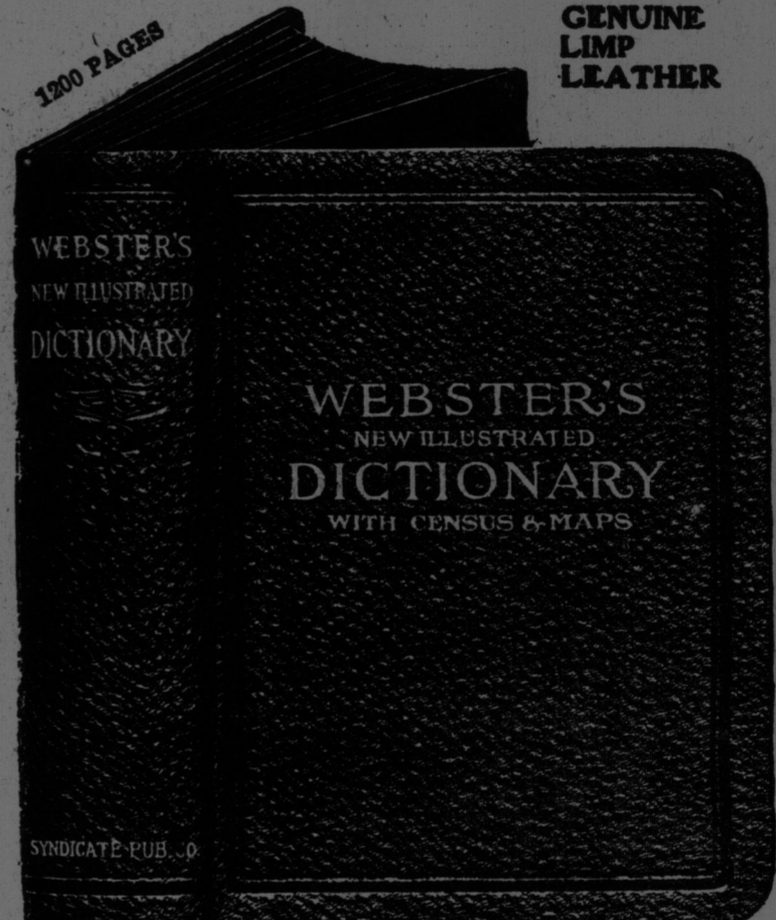

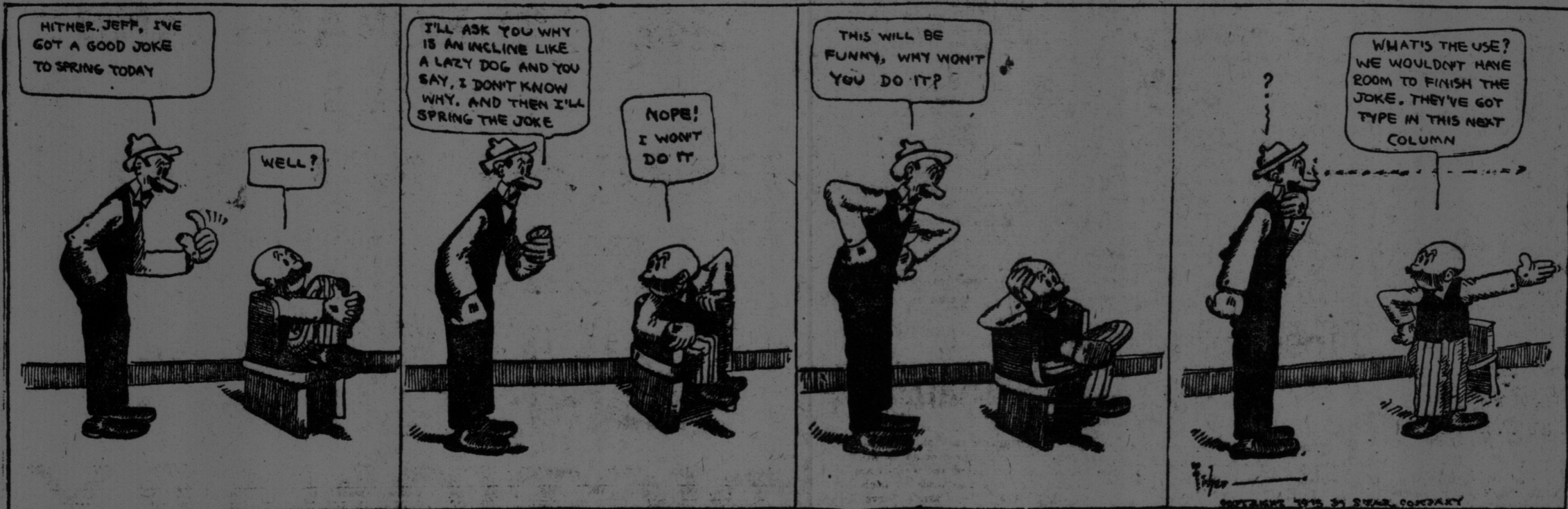

BILLY NOLAN OFFERS TO FORFEIT \$5,000 IF HE FAILS TO PUT PACEY McFarland IN SHAPE AT 133 POUNDS

"Give me eight weeks' time and let McFarland follow my instructions as to training and I will put him in the ring at 133 pounds at 3 o'clock on 133 ringside and have him strong and fast, or forfeit \$5,000," remarked Billy Nolan, manager of Willie Ritchie, champion light-weight, while discussing the weight question with the writer recently.

"I do not mean that I will use sweating methods or such as that to get McFarland in condition and down to weight," continued Billy, "but that I will give him a thorough course of training and work him down gradually, so that he will retain all his strength and at the same time be as fast if not faster than ever."

McFarland is a boy who carries considerable weight if he does not keep in shape and he is also tall for a light-weight, but by proper training he can make the weight easily. The trouble is few of the boxers nowadays train properly. They seemed to be imbued with the idea that once they are fighting the stars all they have to do is go along and box a little and if they get a big fight, why two weeks' work is supposed to be sufficient.

"That is where they all make a mistake. A boxer should train as hard for what he considers a soft match as a tough one, and if he happens to be out of shape and the other fellow is tough and willing to take a change, he is liable to make things decidedly interesting for Mr. Star."

"As to McFarland, there has been much talk about making weight for Ritchie. Now Willie is champion, and a legitimate, light-weight, as he made the 133 ringside for Wolgat without bother. They tell me McFarland can't do better than 135 at 3 o'clock and then he must work overtime. Well, my offer stands about forfeiting \$5,000 if I fail to put him in proper shape in eight weeks' time and bring him to 133 ringside or 135 at 3 or even 6 o'clock. Of course, I would not train him in a city, but would take him to my ranch near San Francisco and put him through a regular course and have his stamina better than ever and his general make-up improved. He would have to follow my advice explicitly as to the training methods, and while it would not be terribly hard work it would not be child's play, such as some fighters look for in the gymnasium. This is not intended as a slight on the training methods of Pacey's manager, Mr. Thiry, but simply to show the faith I have in my own ideas on training."

C. P. R. steamer Ruthenia, of the Austrian service, will sail tonight about 7 o'clock for Trieste via Naples, with passengers and a large general cargo, including grain, flour and lumber.

Donaldson liner Letitia has shifted to McLeod's wharf to discharge local cargo.

The Casandra of the Donaldson line was reported last night at nine o'clock 233 miles southeast of Cape Race, and is due in St. John on Sunday.

Head liner Bengore Head, left yesterday for Dublin with a heavy cargo of grain, flour, lumber and general freight.

The Manchester Commerce is expected to sail tonight about 7 o'clock for Manchester with a large general cargo, including 128,000 bushels of grain.

Manchester liner Manchester Miller arrived at Halifax this morning from Manchester and will dock here about the last of the week.

The Royal Mail steamer Empress of Britain will leave tomorrow for Liverpool via Halifax with passengers and a capacity cargo of grain, flour and general freight.

Royal Mail steamer Victorian of the Allan line is due here on Saturday with a large passenger list and a full cargo of general freight.

**HERE'S APPLICATION FOR STREET PAVING**  
Garden Street People Ready to Share Expense—City and I.C.R. in Land Exchange

The property owners of Garden street between Colburn and Hazen streets realize the advantages of good pavements and have petitioned the city for a permanent pavement for the street in front of their properties undertaking to pay half of the cost under the provisions of the local improvement act. The petition was presented to the city commissioners at their meeting at noon today, and by the pressure of other business, action in the matter was deferred.

Plans and descriptions showing the exchange of land between the city and the I. C. R. at Lombard street were submitted to the city commissioners today by the road engineer and received their approval. To compensate for the land taken from the southern side of Lombard street by the railway the latter gives to the city a section on the northern side of the street, the portion of the old Harris property. This will give room for a street of the same width as the rest of Lombard street connecting, on a curve, with South-west street.

**SUGGESTION RE BUILDING HERE**  
How Brick Houses of Smaller Size May be Constructed More Cheaply

As a help towards the solution of the housing problem in St. John, a builder has suggested that while the building laws are being revised, it might be worth while to consider the advisability of permitting the construction of brick dwellings within certain limits, with eight inch walls.

At present nothing less than a twelve inch brick wall is permitted by the regulations and he says this makes it practically impossible to use brick in the construction of cheap dwellings. In Toronto where almost the entire city is of brick construction, the eight inch walls are permitted in buildings of certain size. It is thought to be due to this that even the cheapest workmen's houses are built of brick and a comfortable self-contained brick dwelling with modern conveniences may be purchased at very moderate prices. One result is that small brick dwellings may be erected at a cost that is not less than in St. John. If it were found feasible to permit such construction in this city it might help to solve the problem of supplying the demand for dwellings at reasonable prices.

**SUSSEX MAN WINS PLACE ON COMMISSION**  
Pasadena Adopts New Form of Government and W. B. Loughery is One of Those Elected

W. B. Loughery, formerly of Sussex, is a member of the first administration of the city of Pasadena, California, which has adopted the commission plan of government. Mr. Loughery has been in business in Pasadena for twenty-nine years, and has, evidently, won the favor of his fellow-citizens. There were but candidates for the position of grand master in the division, and he was in fifth place, running close to his colleagues and defeating the others by a good majority. In a statement issued after the election Mr. Loughery said that the commission would organize and get ready for work at once, and that a close study of the situation would be necessary at the outset.

**NEW MASONIC GRAND MASTER IN IRELAND**  
Dublin, April 17.—A special meeting of the Grand Lodge of Free-masons in Ireland was held in Dublin for the purpose of installing and offering a welcome to the Earl of Donoughmore as grand master in succession to the late Duke of Abercorn. Sir Charles A. Cameron, G.B., acting grand master, presided, and the attendance, numbering upwards of 600, included representative members of the fraternity from all the Masonic provinces in Ireland. The grand master formally appointed Sir Charles Cameron as deputy grand master, and confirmed the provincial grand masters in their appointments.

**PROPOSED INDUSTRY FOR CHARLOTTETOWN, P. E. I.**  
At the last meeting of the city council of Charlottetown, the most important correspondence considered was that from the Colonial Corporations Limited of Halifax. This company proposes to establish a rolled steel plant in Charlottetown, provided they are given a free site, free water and exemption of taxation for ten years as an inducement. These terms are being offered in other provinces. The capacity of the plant will not be less than 200,000 bushels per annum, and from 20 to 30 men would be employed at the outset. They expect a very large output, will run day and night, and want a site along the water front, with the railway running alongside the factory. Provided the necessary arrangements can be made they will have the company incorporated at the present session of the legislature.

The matter was referred to the finance committee. C. P. McLennan is managing director of the company. If incorporated the concern would be known as the P. E. Island Steel Co. Mr. McLennan stated that the minimum number of employees for the first year would be twenty.

**DIAMOND PIN PRESENTED**  
J. Walter Andrews, who has been employed with W. H. Thorne & Co., Ltd., for about twelve years, has severed his connection with this firm to accept a position as traveler with The Union Metallic Cartridge Company, of New York. Last evening, just before closing time, his fellow employees in Messrs Thorne's gathered together and made him the recipient of a handsome diamond heart pin, together with an entable address. The presentation was made by Edward Coll. Mr. Andrews made a suitable reply, thanking the donors for the expression of their kindly feeling.
