

According to Von Behring's view, con-sumption is the "Last verse of the song, of which the first verse was sung in the infant's cradle." In other words, he be-lieves that the bacilli of tuberculosis find their way into the human system through

milk. His theory directly contradicts Dr. Robert Koch's doctrine that tuberculosis in milk is not dangerous, and consump tion in most cases is contracted as a re-sult of breathing. Professor Von Beh-ring holds that the germs reach the lungs through the lymphatics and blood vessels He contradicts Dr. Koch flatly in the matter of tuberculosis in milk, which Dr. Ottawa, Dec. 11.-The chairmen of the different committees of the House Koch considers to be most harmless.
