THE LEGISLATURE The members of the House government appear to think, because one or two farmers attended the sale of Kentucky horses, that therefore the government was justified in disregarding its own act, by making the purchase of such animals without authority of the legislature. Such usurpation of power, however, is not in the interests of good government.

A LIBERAL SWEEP The Liberals have swept Alberta. Of 41 seats they have carried 33, with four to hear from. The Conservatives carried only two seats, and there is one Independent and one Socialist. R. B. Bennett, formerly of this province, is the Liberal member for the whole of Alberta. Mr. Bennett has met with political reverses before, but none to equal that which makes him a member of an opposition of two in a house of forty-one.

A NOBLE LIFE That the world is better because he lived in it may be truly written of George T. Angell of Boston, who died last week, at the age of 88 years. His life and work have been an inspiration and an example. The champion of dumb animals, the founder of the Massachusetts Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals and of the American Humane Education Society; the field of his labors was not confined to the care of dumb animals, but he was also devoted to the welfare of humanity.

At an early stage Mr. Angell found it necessary to abandon his professional work and devote himself to the task of preaching the doctrine of kindness throughout the United States. An early result was the abolition of cruel practices at the Brighton stock yards. In 1870 he went to Chicago, and as a result of his investigations of the horrible suffering of animals at the stock yards there the Illinois Humane Society was organized. In 1889 he started the American Humane Education Society, which has given many prizes for humane stories, and carried the circulation of one book, Black Beauty, up to more than three million copies.



SCHOOL BOOKS AND RUM SOLD IN THE SAME SHOP

York County Vendor of School Books Has Been Thrice Convicted of Liquor Selling—Hon. Mr. McKeown Makes Starting Charges But Secures No Promise of Reform

Fredericton, N. B., March 22.—The government do not take kindly to the criticism of the opposition speakers levelled at them since the opening of the house and have decided to have the debate on the address ended as rapidly as possible. All the afternoon Mr. McKeown discharged hot shot into their ranks and file also.

He referred to the failure of Fire Wardens to take any action to stop the fire at South Bay last year. Surveyor General Grimmer interrupted with the enquiry as to how much of the land burned over was crown land and how much had been burned over before.

Mr. McKeown quickly silenced the surveyor general by asking if it was the policy of the government to protect only crown lands. Mr. McKeown was unable to say whether the land had been burned over but he knew that it had not been for the efforts put forward by the residents of the locality, under the direction of Mr. Lowell, the fire would have reached valuable crown lands and have done damage to thousands of dollars worth of private land.

The only legislation offered of a public nature was two bills introduced by Mr. Hazen, one to fix the salaries of school inspectors at \$1,500 and the other to authorize trust companies, incorporated under the laws of any province in Canada, to do business in New Brunswick.

AN OLD REPORTER DEAD

Joseph Swan, for Nearly Forty Years Marine Reporter for the Associated Press Died Yesterday

New York, March 22.—A long and interesting newspaper career was closed today with the sudden death of Joseph Swan, for nearly forty years connected with the Associated Press as marine reporter. Mr. Swan, active to the end dropped dead in his chair in the ship news office at the Battery. A moment before he had been talking with his fellow reporters. For the past month he had not been a well man and had been warned not to over-exert himself as his heart was showing signs of weakness.

THE SALVATION ARMY

Brigadier John Roberts was seen in conducting revival meetings in Canada the past six months, and who held special meetings at the various city corners during the last winter months will give his final farewell to Canada before sailing for England in the Charlotte street steamer on Thursday evening, March 25th at 8 o'clock. Lieutenant-Colonel Turner, the provincial commander, will take the chair assigned to him by the provincial secretary, Brigadier Collier, and all the city officers and corps united.

PREPARING FOR AN AIRSHIP EXHIBITION

Many Aerial Crafts to Be Tried out at Frankfort This Summer—Immense Buildings Being Constructed

The great aeronautic exhibition to be held at Frankfort, Germany next summer promises to be the most interesting and complete display of aeroplanes and dirigible balloons ever witnessed in Europe. Major Techny, of the Aviation Division of the German War Office, has been appointed technical director of the exhibition, for which a grant of 240,000 marks has been secured.

In addition to the main exhibition building—the largest structure of the kind in Germany—there will be four other buildings, especially constructed for housing dirigibles. They will be from sixty to eighty five feet in height and capable of containing the largest size motor-balloons. Five large annexes will be added for the overflow contributions of aeroplanes. The grounds surrounding the exhibition buildings will be used for experimental flights by the exhibitors of the various types of airships.

WILL COST MORE TO POLICE CITY

Police Department Estimates Will be Considerably Heavier Next Year.

At the monthly meeting of the safety board last evening the estimates for the first, police and lighting departments, amounting to \$124,400, were adopted. Except in the police department, where there is an increase of \$4,000, the totals were practically the same as last year. The board granted an application from Col. M. B. Edwards for the use of the main exhibition building for dancing on the occasion of a military tango on the Barrack square in June. A contract for plumbing in Carleton public hall was awarded to W. E. Emerson. The St. John Railway Company obtained the contract for lighting No. 3 engine house.

The chairman and director were appointed to arrange for the sale of the revenues from tolls and commission stands the losses on the stalls in the market. The sale will take place in April. Renewal of the lease of part of a lot in Guy ward to Mrs. E. Nicholls at a ground rent of \$12.50 was recommended. The property is valued at \$1,800.

Several applications from members of the force for full pay during absence on account of illness were dealt with. Mrs. D. Perry was recommended to half pay for eight days; George Corbett, half pay for three days; W. S. Byles, half pay for seven days; G. C. Watson was recommended for full pay for twenty-nine days on account of injuries received from a kick while in the discharge of his duty in arresting William White.

C. P. R. Boat Arrived This Morning From London and Antwerp With 360 Passengers

C. P. R. steamship Montreal, Captain McNeill, arrived in port this morning at 10:30 o'clock, and docked at No. 5 berth, west side, from London and Antwerp. The steamer had a very fine run the first few days after leaving Antwerp, after that the ship ran into a succession of gales with heavy seas, which caused her to roll considerably, but barring a lot of seasickness the trip was successful. The officers report that one small iceberg was sighted off the Grand Banks of Newfoundland two days ago. The Montreal had 360 stowage passengers and a number of returning cattle-men. The passengers are a fine class of people, most of whom are Belgians, with a scattering of Galicians and Jews, and a few English people. One hundred and fifty of the passengers are bound to the United States, the balance are for the Canadian west. The steamer left Antwerp on the 10th March, and was 12 days on the passage. She has a large cargo on board for this city and the west.

Coal Operators Must Come to Terms Says President of Mine Workers Union

Scranon, Pa., March 23.—"There will be no compromise on the question of recognizing the union," said Thomas L. Lewis, international president of the United Mine Workers of America, who has arrived to attend the convention of the Mine Workers of the three anthracite districts of the union today. "I have never signed an agreement that has not carried with it recognition of the organization and I won't begin now."

A DOUBLE DROWNING

Two Ontario Boys Drowned While Trying to Save Their Dog

Hamilton, Ont., March 23.—(Special)—Albert Murray, aged 12 years, and Willie Gould, aged nine, adopted sons of Mr. and Mrs. Baker, who live in Tintern, were drowned on Saturday afternoon. It is thought that in some way a dog which they had with them got into the water and that the boys tried to save it and were quickly carried down stream and drowned.
