that the bliss of heaven will be ours. The cultivation of a spiritual state of mind is the subject to which we would invite your attention in our present annual Epistle. In our opinion there is much reason to fear that this matter does not, in general, receive that degree of serious regard, nor call forth that earnestness of effort, to which it is justly entitled. Its great importance, and happy effects, are evident from several considerations :-

1. It is a command imperative on all believers. The Saviour enjoins, "Seek ye first the kingdom of God, and His righeousness." In like manner an inspired Apostle says, "If ye then be risen with Christ, seek those things which are above where Christ sitteth on the right hand of God. Set your affection on things above, not on things on the earth. . . Walk in the Spirit." (Matth. vi. 33; Col. iii. 1, 2; Gal. v. 16.) Numerous similar admonitions interspersed through the sacred Scriptures, clearly evince how needful it is to give diligent heed to this Christian duty, and to improve this exalted privilege, more bus done Lipons

2. Like all other divine precepts and injunctions it is adapted to promote the happiness of those that observe it, "To be spiritually minded is life and peace. . . The fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace," &c. (Rom. viii. 6; Gal. v. 22.) Not only does the maintenance of communion with God, by the influence of the Holy Spirit, secure present consolation, but it also tends greatly to strengthen the believer's hope of future blessedness. "Now," says the Apostle, "the God of hope fill you with all joy and peace in believing, that ye may abound in hope, through the power of the Holy Ghost. Elsewhere he states, "As many as are led by the Spirit of God, they are the sons of God." (Rom. xv. 13, viii. 14.) So the language of our Lord.— (Matth. vi. 21.) "Where your freasure is there will your heart be also," plainly teaches us that our having the affections placed on heavenly things, furnishes decisive evidence that the bliss of heaven will be ours. If, then, we would be joyful here, and assured of endless felicity hereafter, we must be spiritual.

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It is to be deplored that many persons who profess faith in Christ, instead of " cleaving to the Lord with purpose of heart," soon become remiss in spiritual exercises and Christian duties, and, engrossed with earthly cares and pleasures, conform to the world, and indulge in "foolish talking and jesting, which are not convenient," and consequently lose their religious enjoyment, and their confidence of hope. The deleterious effect of such a course is depicted by the devout Dr. Owen under a similitude to the following effect: Cases have sometimes occurred in which a man has been obliged to flee out of one kingdom into another to save his life. Should such a one hasten with all speed till he judged that he had probably crossed the line between the two kingdoms, and then instead of pressing on to a fine country, where he might live comfortably and safely, he should stop, and remain on the confines, in a very barren place, where he must live in poverty, and in continued fear as to the safety of his situation, would not his folly be great? Similar to this, but still greater, is the folly of a professor of religion who does not exercise "diligence to the full assurance of hope unto the end." (Heb. vi. 11, 12; 2 Pet. with God, by the influence of the Holy Spirit, secure green

3. The possession of a spiritual mind is also highly conducive to the welfare of Zion. It tends to preserve her citizens from immorality of conduct, and from strife, which is very liable to exist among those that are "carnal," and is exceedingly detrimental to the interests of a Christian Church. (1 Cor. iii. 3,4; James iii. 14-16.) A spiritual believer is disposed to "pray for the peace of Jerusalem," to labor for her prosperity, to "be clothed with humility," and to "endeavor to keep the unity of the Spirit in the hond of peace." (Ps. cxxii. 6-9; 1 Pet. v. 5; Eph. iv. 1-4.)—By such a course, coupled as it it naturally is with a readiness to contribute freely for the advancement of Christ's

cause, its interests must be greatly promoted.

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4. It excites to earnest efforts for the salvation of souls. Many persons who entertain the hope that they are going to heaven, seem regardless of the everlasting welfare of those around them. Indeed, some professors of piety appear to imagine that it is incumbent only on the ministers of religion to use any means for the conversion of sinners. But this is a pernicious error. The first Christians when "scattered abroad" by persecution, "went everywhere preaching the word." Paul charged the members of the Church in Corinth to be "always abounding in the work of the Lord;" and those in Phillipp to "shine as lights in the in the world, holding forth the word of life." (Acts viii. 4; 1 Cor. xv. 58; Phil. ii. 15, 16.) But whatever views people may entertain in theory, it is not to be expected that they will pray fervently for the conversion of the unregenerate, or labor earnestly for it, while they are themselves in a cold and carnal state of mind. Those, however, who are spiritually minded feel concerned for the unconverted, and are disposed to unite their prayers and efforts for the salvation of undying souls. So the Psalmist says, "Restore unto me the joy of thy salvation; and uphold me with thy free Spirit : then will I teach trangressors thy ways; and

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sinners shall be converted unto Thee." And I'aul, who was a truly spiritual man, says, "I have great heaviness and continual sorrow in my heart... for my brethren, my kinsmen according to the flesh." And again, "My heart's desire and prayer to God for Israel is, that they might be saved." He remarks, moreover, "I endure all things for the elect's sakes, that they also may obtain the salvation which is in Christ Jesus with eternal glory." (Ps. li. 12, 13; Rom. ix. 2, 3, x. 1; 2 Tim. ii, 10.) The same disposition of mind creates similar desires in the hearts of all God's children, and prompts them to like efforts.

It may be remarked, last, but not least :-

5. A spiritual state of mind disposes believers to glorify God. The obligations to this, and the injunctions to it, must be manifest to all. (1 Cor. vi. 19, 20, x. 31.) But it is "the love of God shed abroad in our hearts" that leads us to love him in return, cautiously to avoid dishonouring Him by sin, and earnestly to strive, by a life of holy obedience, to "to shew forth the praises of Him who hath called us out of darkness into his marvellous light." (Rom. v. 5; 1 Jno. iv. 19; 1 Pet. ii. 9.)

Seeing, then, that the possession of a spiritual state of mind is of vast importance on many accounts, we would earnestly and affectionately entreat all the members of our Churches, as well as the ministers, to cultivate it with great diligence and assiduity. But here the question naturally occurs, By what means is this highly desirable blessing to be obtained and retained? We would suggest as appropriate means:—

1. The exercise of faith. Believers "receive the promise of the Spirit through faith;" and "without faith it is impossible to please God," and consequently it must be impossible to hold communion with Him. (Gal. iii. 14; Heb. xi. 6.) He that would "walk in the light of the Lord," must be "looking unto Jesus," who is the "Sun of Right-

eousness," and must "live a life in the flesh by the faith of the Son of God." (Isa. ii. 5; Heb. xii. 2; Gal. ii. 20.)

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- 2. Careful avoidance of sin. Indulgence in that which Jehovah forbids, as also disobedience to what He enjoins, necessarily causes Him to withhold the tokens of his favor. So it is written, "Your sins have hid His face from you;" and the admonition is given us, "Grieve not the Holy Spirit of God, whereby ye are sealed unto the day of redemption." This caution includes, not only the avoidance of all external immorality, but also that of every wrong temper of mind, as "all bitterness, and anger, and wrath, and clamour, and evil speaking, with all malice." So the Psalmist says, "If I regard iniquity in my heart, the Lord will not hear me." (Isa. lix. 2; Eph. iv. 29-31; Ps. lxvi. 18.)
- 3. The devotional study of the holy Scriptures. Some men are required, for the benefit of others, as well as themselves, to study the inspired Oracles critically; and all should strive to obtain as correct and full a knowledge of their true import as they can; since none can profit by that which they do not understand. But it is the devotional reading of the sacred word which is especially conducive to spiritual prosperity. Our Lord, who bade the Jews to "search the Scriptures," prayed for his disciples, "Sanctify them through thy truth," and added, "Thy word is truth." So Paul enjoins on believers, "Let the word of Christ dwell in you richly, in all wisdom:" and Peter says "As new-born babes desire the sincere milk of the word, that ye may grow thereby." (Jno. xvii. 17; Col. iii. 16; 1 Pet. ii. 2.)

As "all Scripture is given by inspiration of God, and is profitable," the whole should be attentively and repeatedly perused by every person; but the devotional parts are peculiarly adapted to promote the spiritual welfare of be-

lievers. Religious books that accord with the teaching of

the Bible, may also be read with profit.

4. Regular attendance at public worship. Paul cautions us against "forsaking the assembling of ourselves together, as the manner of some is." Asaph was almost overwhelmed with temptations to repining, and even to infidelity, "until he went into the sanctuary;" and there he obtained relief and consolation, and found it "good to draw near to God." So Thomas sustained great loss, remaining in doubt and darkness for a whole week, by reason of his neglecting to meet with the other disciples, who were glad when they saw the Lord, and he too became spiritual and joyful when he met with them. (Heb. x. 25. Ps. lxxiii. 2, 17, 24, 28. Jno. xx. 24, 26-28.) If believers would be spiritual, happy, and useful, let them reverence and improve the Sabbath, attend meetings for preaching, prayer, conference, and devotional exercises in general, as frequently as may be in their power. Let them never, under any pretext, absent themselves from the Lord's table.

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5. Unremitted and earnest prayer. Our heavenly Father speaks to us in His word, and we speak to Him by prayer; and thus we hold communion with him, through the influence of the Divine Spirit, by faith in Christ. (2 Pet. i. 21. Rom. viii. 26, 27. Jno. xiv. 13.) The idea of living a spiritual life without prayer is as preposterous as that of living a natural life without breath. If we would prosper in the ways of piety, fervent prayer, both in secret and in the family, must be constantly maintained. Indeed we should "pray always with all prayer and supplication in the Spirit." Our dependance on His aid should be ever recognized, and emotions produced by His influence should be always regarded. (Matth. vi. 6. Danl. vi. 10. Eph. vi. 18. 1 Thes. v. 19. Jude 20, 21) Constant watchfulness, also, must attend prayer. (Matth. xxvi. 41. 1 Pet. live Tiles wanting enter the spiritual welfer vit. 199

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6. Pious conversation. The Psalmist says, "Talk ye of all His wondrous works?" Malachi informs us, that the godly conversation of the Lord's ancient servants was very favorably regarded by Him. When the two disciples on their way to Emmaus, were conversing in sadness respecting the Saviour, "Jesus himself drew near, and went with them," enlightening their understandings, and cheering their hearts. (Ps. ev. 2. Mal. iii. 16, 17. Luke xxiv. 13-32.) While "the talk of the lips [vaiu discourse] tendeth only to penury," great benefits result to believers, and in many instances to those around them, from a diligent improvement of opportunities for edifying religious conversation. (Prov. xiv. 28. x. 21. Eph. iv. 29. 1 Thes. iv. 18. v. 11.)

7. Devout meditation. Of the "blessed man" it is written, "His delight in the law of the Lord, and in His law doth he meditate day and night." The Psalmist says, "In the multitude of my thoughts within me thy comferts delight my soul;" and again, "My meditation of Him shall be sweet." (Ps. i. 1,2. xciv. 19. civ. 34.) Believers are often placed in circumstances that deprive them of some of the means adapted to promote their spiritual welfare; but the delightful and highly useful privilege of religious meditation may be almost invariably enjoyed. It should be diligently improved.

Not to extend this Letter beyound due bounds, we would in conclusion, affectionately entreat every member of each of our Churches to consider this subject attentively, and to strive earnestly for the attainment and the retaining of a spiritual state of mind. An attentive examination of the texts cited above, with their respective contexts and parrallel passages, may be a profitable exercise, conducive to the furtherance of this desirable object. May "the Father of mercies" graciously enable every one of us to know from our own happy and continued experience, that "To be spiritually minded is life and peace!"

ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

The Committee on Foreign Missions are happy to learn that the number of native Preachers, including Burmese and Karen, laboring in Burmah and supported by funds raised among us in the Lower Provinces, is about seventeen. In addition to these a native Christian sister, zealous and wellinformed, and designated "a Bible woman," is employed whose work it is to read the Holy Scriptures to persons of her own sex, and otherwise impart religious instruction to This, in the peculiar state of society in that country, can much more advantageously be done by such agency, than by a preacher of the Gospel. It is expected that a definite statement respecting the labors of these servants of Christ will be received prior to the meeting of the Convention. In the meantime a pleasing account has recently been given that at one of the out stations nine converts applied for baptism. The Gospel is evidently extending in Burmab through the efforts of these and other zealous laborers in the Lord on what in war about on who was not not be

Your Committee recommend that earnest prayer be offered in all the Churches that the native preachers be much increased, and their labors rendered successful to the conversion of multitudes. Prayer should likewise be offered that the Lord of the harvest would raise up some from among ourselves, who, annointed by the Holy Spirit, shall go forth to direct and encourage these native preachers, and otherwise co-operate with them in seeking to win sinners to Christ. Greatly increased liberality is recommended in

supplying means for evangelizing the heathen.

This was pleasingly apparent to all who enjoyed the opportunity of attending the last anniversary exercises, which consisted in examinations, reading essays, delivering orations, conferring degrees, and bestowing honor-certificates and prizes. The Professors and Teachers at our Institutions are laboring hard, and are doing a noble work. They merit our confidence and sympathy, a sympathy which, at this important crisis of our history, should be made tangible by increased endowments and donations, that will enable the Board of Governors to keep the Institutions in that advanced position among other Colleges and Academies, which they have, by common consent, hitherto occupied. The elevation of the standard of Education throughout the Province, demands in the very nature of things, that it should be raised at Wolfville. The great deficiency in the means for doing this is money. it not be withheld NONE MINOH WO

On account of the scarcity of money, the Governors of Acadia College have decided not to put an agent in the field at present; this will enable the Churches to respond to appeals made to them for aid to meet the current expenses.

ON HOME MISSIONS.

In presenting their annual report, your Board would gratefully acknowledge the continued sympathy and support of the Churches, and increased blessing of their Head. The efforts and expenditures of the Board during the past year, have been with somewhat gratifying and encouraging results. From the reports of the Missionaries, who have been engaged in the service of the Board, we ascertain that 59 weeks' labor have been performed, 229 sermons preached, 60 religious meetings attended, and as far as reported 152 family visits made, 38 baptized, several others hopefully converted, and 9 restored to church fellowship.

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1865 Decr. 1866. The entire expenditure of the Board for the above has been \$234.

In addition to the above \$140 have been given by the Board to assist feeble churches in supporting the stated ministry of the Gospel among them. To the Digby Church \$10 to aid in supporting Bro. Tooker for 3 months. To Barrington and Pubnico \$80 to aid in supporting Bro. Richan. To New Albany, Sherbrook, and Springfield \$50 to assist in supporting Bro. Murray for 9 months. From Bro. Murray's report we learn that his labors with that people were not in vain in the Lord; 7 were baptized at Sherbrook, and 3 at New Albany. Bro. Richan's report from Barrington and Pubnico not only affords indications of present benefits, and ground of hope for future and increasing success, but it affords evidence of the abundant labors, and the small remuneration of some at least of Christ's laborers in the employ of our Board.

Brethren, shall we not lay the wants and the interests of this mission cause for the coming year alongside of our own? Shall we not make more strenuous efforts to replenish beyond the necessity of such meagre pittance, the

funds of this Board?

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Meanwhile anxious desires are enkindling and earnest requests are coming in to us to establish new interests, and to strengthen feeble ones. Let past experiences serve to confirm the Divine promises, and larger efforts will bring more glorious results.

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FRENCH MISSION.

In presenting their 16th annual report the French Miss. Board have to congratulate themselves and the friends of the Mission on the experience of more abundant tokens of the Divine favor during the past year, than were ever enjoyed in one year before throughout the Mission's history; while they are saddened and perplexed with difficulties

graver than at any time embarrassed them.

One year ago, in view of the great want of another laborer in the field and the abundant means for sustaining him, we were congratulating ourselves on the possession of two mission premises, with the finishing of those at Saulnierville well advanced towards completion; while with upwards of \$300, subscribed at one meeting by a few individuals, principally members of the Board, towards paying for those premises, it was thought that the raising of the entire amount needed for discharging the debt would be a comparatively easy labor.

The Rev. N. Cyr, a gentleman of whose ability, attainments and Christian character we could not but form the highest opinion, and also tried and experienced in French Mission operations was at that time here among us, with a prospect of his engaging in this Mission and occupying one

of those premises.

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Eleven had renounced Romanism during the year previous, seven had professed faith in Christ, and two had been baptized. We were consequently cherishing gratitude toward God, and hopefulness for the future.

Since the meeting of the last Association until our assembling here, the Board has held but four meetings, so that it will not be a tedious labor to recount its doings

throughout the year.

At a meeting held in July an engagement was made with Brother Cyr to labor in the Mission for three or four months, partly among the French, and partly among the churches for the collection of funds, and this with a view to a more permanent settlement. Bro. Cyr went home to make arrangements for entering upon the service, when sickness in his family prevented his returning so soon by a

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few weeks as he and we anticipated. At a subsequent meeting of the Board at Hebron, the circumstances of the case were so viewed as to induce the Board to rescind that engagement. We deeply regret the loss of Bro. Cyr's services, as it is not probable that another person so well suited to the work will be readily obtained, yet we would assure the Association and the friends of the Mission, that in this action we endeavored to do what seemed to us wisest and

best for the general interests of the Mission.

During three years preceding the past one, Bro. Normondy had been in the receipt of \$480 per annum with the premises he occupied. At the meeting in July the Board voted \$500 to the Missionary as his salary, and \$60 in addition to make the salary equal to \$500 for those three years preceding. In consideration of the increased cost of living and the circumstances of the Missionary's family, at the meeting held by the Board in May they still further increased his salary to \$600, with the premises he occupied, and made him a gift of \$200, to liquidate his existing debts.

The premises at Saulnierville are still in the same condition in which they were a year ago—unfinished and unoccupied. The debt upon them is not discharged, but yearly interest is continually augmenting it, making it reach, at present about \$1600, and for meeting this or stopping in-

terest no means are being used.

During the year the Missionary has spent 12 weeks on a collecting agency, having preached and lectured while on the tour 53 times, and obtained, subscribed \$610, and colsected \$376. In discharge of his mission work he had preached 62 sermons, held 46 other meetings, and made

165 family visits.

But human infirmity and error have not prevented the rich displays of Divine grace towards the French. During the past winter the Spirit's influence have been bestowed to bless the preaching and labors of the Missionary, and cause the seed sown to bear fruit. The section of the field at the Ridge of St. Mary's Bay has experienced a gracious revival of religion, under which the graces of those previously believers have been stimulated, twenty-six have already made application for baptism, between thirty and forty have given gredible evidence of conversion, and twenty have been baptized and gathered into the church there. The interest, in

a gratifying measure, still continues, and the cause in that locality presents a cheering aspect.

The goodness of God has also to be acknowledged, in stimulating "A Friend to Missions" in Cornwallis to make a donation of \$100 to the funds of the Mission, to whom, as the almonor of God's bounty we would tender our thanks.

Brethren, no people in the world more need the ministration of salvation than the Acadian French. In no place is a wider or more effectual door opened. Five Missionaries would be in nearer proportion to the demand, at the present day, than one. The blood of this people will be required at our hands, and every consideration calls upon us for larger sacrifices and renewed efforts for their salvation. What shall we do? Shall we continue to play "penny wise and pound foolish," or attempt greater things for God and receive greater things from Him? There is everything in the circumstances of the case, in the warrants of God and in His tokens of favor to induce us to move forward.

It is a lamentable fact that many of our fellow countrymen are still pursuing the downward road of drunkenness to destruction, nor should we cease to work and pray until Total Abstinence principles are embraced by the entire brotherhood of man.

In view of these facts we would respectfully urge upon all friends of Total Abstinence to double their diligence, and to the utmost of their ability use every laudable means, both morally and legally, to banish the demon from our land. Especially would we urge this at the present time as we are approaching a general election, the influences of which

have hitherto been so disastrous to the cause.

We fully concur in the sentiments embodied in the circular addressed to this body by River Side Lodge of British Templars, and would recommend that that document be read in connection with this report. We are firmly of the opinion that we require more of the religious element in Temperance meetings, especially in the Division and Lodge Rooms, and just in proportion as our principles are based on Love, Purity and Fidelity, together with Faith, Hope and Charity, may we hope for success.

Sabbath School Convention.

HILLSBURGH, June 17th, 1867.

The Association adjourned to allow the Sabbath School Convention to hold a Session for one hour.

Samuel Brown, Esq. was, in the absence of the President, appointed Chairman.

Rev. Isaiah Wallace was called upon who moved the first resolution. This was seconded by Rev. R. D. Porter:

Resolved, That we gratefully acknowledge the hand of God in the success that has already attended Sabbath School instruction.

Moved by Rev. J. E. Balcom, seconded by Rev. W. H. Porter—

Resolved. That the success of the past should stimulate us to renewed exertions in this department of Christian work.

Moved by Rev. R. D. Porter, seconded by Samuel Brown, Esq.:

Resolved, That to ensure still greater success in the future Sabbath School Concerts and Bible Classes should be encouraged.

The Secretary read an abstract of reports of Sabbath Schools.

Rev. W. Hall brought to the consideration of the Convention the "Provincial Melodist."

The Convention adjourned.

[The Secretary Rev. Jos. H. Saunders expresses great regret that the Sabbath School Returns are so imperfect. It is hoped that next year, as blanks are to be forwarded to all the Churches, more attention will be given to this very important department of statistics.]

Statistics of Sabbath Schools in the Western Baptist Association, June 1867.

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CONSTITUTION

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ART. 1.—This body shall be called the Western Baptist Association 2;—It shall be composed [of delegates appointed by the Churches of which they are members, together with delegates from Corresponding Associations. Each Church connected with the Association shall have the privilege of sending one delegate or more, but no Church shall be entitled to send more than five in addition to its pastor.

3.—The objects of the Association shall be the collection of statistical and other information from the churches; the cultivation of mutual acquaintance and fraternal union; the promotion of individual godli-

ness and the spiritual prosperity of the Churches; and, in the use of scriptural means, the enlargement of the Redeemer's Kingdom.

4.—The Association shall meet annually on the second Saturday in June, at 10 o'clock, A. M., at such place as it may appoint, and the services shall be commenced with public worship. Should the interests of the body seem to demand it, a special meeting may be held at any time intervening, a requisition therefor being made by five of the churches through their pastors.

5.—The officers of the Association shall be a Moderator, a Clerk, and Treasurer, all of whom shall continue in office until the election of

their successors.

The Moderator shall preside in all the meetings; nominate all committees of not more than three, unless otherwise provided for; take the direction of all the religious services, and call special meetings pursuant to requisition.

The Clerk shall record all the transactions and prepare the Minutes

for publication.

for publication.

The Treasurer stiall receive all monies and other property contributed for any of the purposes of the Association and dispose of the same according to the will of the donors, or, when the will of the donors is not expressed, according to the vices of the Association.

6.—Bach church connected with the Association shall send annually a letter, containing an account of its history during the year preceding, specifying the number added by baptism, by letter, and by restoration; the number removed by dismission, by exclusion, and by death; and the whole number then in fellowship. If any church shall neglect, for three successive years, to send such a letter, it shall be considered as having withdrawnfrom the Association, unless two or more members shall request its continuance, and shall engage to enquire into its standing and report at the next meeting of the Association.

1.—The Association may receive any church which shall apply for admission by sending a letter and delegates, and shall give satisfactory evidence as to its faith and order.

3.—The Association shall not, in lany case, interfere with the internal

evidence as to its ratin and order.

8.—The Association shall not, in any case, interfere with the internal concerns of the churches, but it may dissolve its connection with any church which, after proper examination, shall be judged by the Association to have departed essentially from the Baptist faith and practice.

9.—The religious schliments of this Association are those expressed in the "Declaration of Faith and Practice of the Baptist Churches in

Nova Scotia.

10.—This Constitution may be altered or amended by a vote of two thirds of the number present at any annual meeting.

RULES OF ORDER.

Rule 1st.—At each annual meeting the Letters from the Churches shall be at once handed in, from which the clerks shall immediately make out a list of Delegates.

2nd.—After religious worship the officers shall be chosen. The choice of the Moderator shall be made by ballot.

3rd. At every sitting husiness shall be opened and concluded with prayer.

4th.—Brethren invited to a seat with us, may speak on all subjects under consideration, but vote on none.

5th.—No subject shall be discussed without a motion thereon being first made and seconded

6th.—Every speaker shall address the chair and no person shall speak oftener than twice on the same subject, unless by permission of the body.

7th.—When a church is received into the Association the Moderator shall give to one of its delegates the hand of fellowship.

8th.—At the commencement of each sitting the Minutes of the last one shall be read and corrected, and of the last before the final adjournment.

9.—All resolutions shall be presented in writing.

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10th.—Motions made and lost shall not be recorded unless so ordered at the time.

11th.—No delegate shall be allowed to leave the Association before the business is finished, without permission of the body. 12th.—These rules shall be distinctly read from the chair at the

Report of the Committee on suggesting Improvements as to the time and manner of holding this Association.—ordered to be printed in connection with the Rules of Order.

Your Committee after much deliberation beg to report—
That your Committee while feeling that there are objections of considerable importance to the selection of the month of June as the time for the meeting of the Association, has not been able to decide upon the recommendation of any other time of the year as preferable, but would leave the matter in the hands of the Association as an open question on which it can take action or not as it may see fit.

Your Committee would recommend

1. That at the commencement of any future annual Session of this Association the clerks shall meet in the vestry or other convenient place than that occupied by the Association, to receive the letters of the Churches and prepare a list of delegates.

2. That while the above duty is being attended to, the Association shall hold a devotional meeting, to be opened, after singing and prayer, by an address from the Moderator or a substitute provided by him, to be followed by voluntary addresses and prayers.

3. That at the close of the above meeting the list of delegates be read by the clerk, the Association organized,

and the Committee of Arrangement appointed.

4. That the first business attended to at the afternoon session be the reading of the letters of the Churches, after which the Committee of Arrangements shall report.

5. That the following shall be the duty of the Committee

of Arrangements:

To provide preachers for the various Sabbath services and others held during the session of the Association; to provide and notify in due time speakers for all the public meetings held in connection with the Association; to mominate committees; to name the place for the next annual session, the preacher of the Association Sermon and writer of the Circular Letter; and to recommend the order of business for the next annual session, subject to such modifications as circumstances may induce the Association to adopt. The full report of the committee when adopted to be inserted in the Minutes.

6. That each evening of the Association including Saturday evening, be devoted to preaching or a public meeting on Missions, Education or Temperance. The first portion of the time to be occupied by the brethren appointed by the committee of arrangements, voluntary addresses to follow.

7. That a digest of the letters be published in the Minutes.

8. That all the delegates sit together as near as practicable to the pulpit during the Association. Seats being

reserved for that purpose.

 That the above recommendations be incorporated by the clerk with the standing rules of order of this Association, be printed with them in the Minutes, and read by the Moderator at the commencement of each annual session.
