Ludendorff's Campaign to Capture the Channel Ports Comes to a Sudden Halt

THE GERMANS SUSTAIN HEAVY REVERSES WHEN YPRES NEAR

French and British Veterans Fall Back but Rally and Form Barrier which for Present at Least **Ludendorff Cannot Surmount—With Exception** of Reverse at Arras Ludendorff has Met No Fail ure Comparable to that which he Suffered on Monday South of Ypres—Allies Highly Encouraged.

London, April 30.-Ludendorff's campaign to gain the Channel ports and crush the British army has come to a sudden halt on the front at Ypres. After a long series of successes the Germans have suffered a heavy reverse, just when it seemed that they were about to grab the prize of Ypres with its sentimental associations and tactical advan- No Cessation in Terrible Bat-

The French and General Plumer's battle-tried veterans fell back but rallied and for the moment at least, they form a barrier which Ludendorff cannot surmount. The enemy's gigantic effort to take Ypres, and to pierce Mount Rogue and Scherpenberg, the eastern buttresses of the Flanders heights, failed dismally and if the Kaiser, from Wytschaete, looked down on the later stage of his battle, he saw his host badly cut off and thrown out of the positions they had reached in their first great onrush

With the exception of the reverse on the front at Arras during the first phase of the battle of Picardy, Ludendorff has met no failure comparable to that which he suffered on Monday south of Ypres. From the allied point of view the situation is highly encouraging because it is known that the enemy employed his forces and that his howitzers and machine guns were working in perfect unison.

FURTHER TAXES ON COFFEES, TEAS AND SMOKERS' MATERIAL

Special War Tax of Ten Per Cent Will be Levied on Sales of Luxuries Business Taxes will be **Broadened Out, While Important Amendments** Will Be Made to Income Tax— C. P. R. Will be Taxed One-half of Net Earnings or About \$7,-000,000 Canada's Net Debt \$1,200,000,000 -Total War Outlay \$878,000,000 - Highly Important Budget Speech by Hon. A. K. Mac-

Ottawa, April 30.-Substantial new taxation was announced in the budget speech delivered by Hon. A. K. Mac-Lean, acting Minister of Finance, in the House this afternoon. Business taxes will be broadened out, while important amendments are to be made to the income tax, both of individuals and corporations. Among new excise taxes will be heavier duties on tobacco, coffee and tea. A change will be made in the system of assessing sleeping berth and parlor car taxes, while a special war excise tax of ten per cent

will be imposed on the selling value of inxuries.

After regretting the absence through ill health of the Finance Minister, Sir Thomas White, and announcing his early return to Canada, Hon. A. K. MacLean dealt with the financial situation. He said for the fiscal year ending Mar. 31, the reveue, when all accounts are closed, will reach \$258,000,000, exceeding the revenue of the preceding year by \$26,000,000 and that of the first year of the war by \$125,000,000.



How the "Big Brother" to the Soldier is Helping Canadian Men Abroad

NEVER in all history has there been such an assemblage of the manhood of the world as that met on the plains of France to-day. Was there ever such an opportunity for a creative, healing work for the bodies, minds and souls of men? Into such a field the Y.M.C.A. has been privileged to enter," writes Francis B. Sayre, in "Harper's Magazine."

The Y.M.C.A. at Work

Y.M.C.A. service for soldiers extends from Vancouver to the firing line, and then back again to the patients in hospital until the men are discharged.

In England there are 79 places in operation.

In France there are 96 places in operation: 38 huts and buildings.

During February 732 concerts and 343 religious meetings were held in England and France. Total attendance— 642,000 men.

One piano is bought every second day. There are 10,000 gramophone records in the Y.M.C.A. exchange.

How "Morale" Is Maintained

Last year Concerts cost \$40,000; Cinemas, \$55,000; Athletics, \$70,000; This year Athletics will cost \$133,000.

75,000 books have been distributed free of charge; 25,000 new magazines are distributed every week in France.

Every week 500,000 sheets of writing paper are given away free.

In the forward areas 23 dugouts are in operation at the present time. Within the past few months the Germans have destroyed 8 "Y" dugouts.

Many Y.M.C.A. centres are placed close to the forward dressing stations for the relief of the "walking wounded."

During February, "Y" men conveyed hot tea and biscuits to advance working parties engaged in tunnelling, wiring and digging trenches. A trip was made every 8 hours, and 80 to 100 men were provided with free refreshments each trip.

Some Sidelights on Work

\$125,000 was absorbed in building of "huts" in France during 1917.

The work of the Y.M.C.A. in London and Paris, advising, guiding, and warning all men, rescuing them from human sharks, men and women, is worth thousands of dollars to the fathers and mothers of the boys.

In England and France the attendance at religious services, free concerts and cinemas was, during February, 559,115.



which he discussed his trip overseas, declared that the visit is being made entirely because of the situation in Ireland and not, as has been reported in special press despatches from Ottawa, because of the differences between the French and Irish wings of the church in Canada.

Bishop Fallon, say his friends, has been called to Ireland by the British government, because of his views on conscription and home rule. He is strongly of the opinion that in the present crisis the Irish people must put their heart in the struggle for humanity. Bishop Fallon believes in conacription, but would have the enforced service act applied by an Irish parliament after home rule has been granted.

One of the bishop's closest friends declared that "Bishop Fallon takes the same attitude to the Irish situation as that of T. P. O'Connor in an interview given out in Washington when he came to present to the United States government the Irish view on conscription. His visit has nothing to do with the French or billingual questions, and if he makes the visit to Rome. While overseas, which in all probability he will, it will be dicidental to the chief object of his mission."

Some Sidelights on Y.M.C.A. War Work

The "Walking Wounded"— A Village Without a Y.M.C.A. Can the Need Be Measured?

"I think of the Y.M.C.A. emergency work when a great push is on," writes Francis B. Sayre in "Harper's," "and the wounded soldiers are streaming back from the front literally by the thousands, maimed, and torn and bleeding. The numbers are so vast that the stretcherbearers can only attend to the prostrate

"All those who can manage to walk or crawl, known as the 'walking wounded,' must make their own way as best they can to the first aid stations. By the side of these first aid stations the Y.M.C.A. takes its place; and all the walking wounded who come in are given hot coffee and made as comfortable as possible while they wait, sometimes for hours.'

Can Need be Measured?

Referring to the Y.M.C.A. huts, the writer says: "I have seen the halls so crowded on the occasion of some religious talk that after the benches were all filled and the standing room taken, soldiers kept crowding in through the windows to sit on the floor of the platform, and others remained outside to listen to the speaker through the windows.

A Village Without Y.M.C.A.

Here is the writer's picture of a French village without a Y.M.C.A.: "With only evil ways in which to spend money burning in their pockets, with nothing to relieve the dull monotony of idle evenings, many of them began to get lonely and homesick, or to drift along dangerous paths.

"It was not many days before officers began to send hurry calls for the Y.M.C.A.: 'For God's sake come down before it's too late and do something for my men.

The harbor receipts for the month of April, 1918, are with one exception to the biggest ever known in the history of the port, the exception being January of this present year. The receipts for the dirst four months of the year 1918, show a big advance over any previous four months, and are nearly ten thousand dollars greater than that for the entire year 1914, the first year in which the present common missioner of harbors, J. V. Russell, was in charge.




