Quebec, Sept. 17.—(Special)—Yesterday's proceedings in honor of the visit of the Duke and Duchess of Cornwall closed with an extraordinarily brilliant display of fireworks from the city heights...

The Duke and Duchess took their places on a raised platform, and the mayor read a formal address of welcome. Following the reply came several other addresses from Montreal societies and the Antiquarian Society and the Antiquarian Society.

The Duke's Speech.—When the royal party arrived at the site they were welcomed by Mayor Fontaine, who read an address of welcome in French. His royal highness in reply said: "Gentlemen: The kind affection and, in one instance, sacred words of your addresses have indeed touched our hearts, and the Duchess joins with me in offering to you and the people of Montreal our sincere gratitude for the warmth and loyalty of your greeting."

Notable amongst the buildings were the Bank of Montreal, post office, Star office, City Hall, Windsor Hotel, Archbishop's palace, C. P. R. Windsor station, and Grand Trunk offices. Nearly all the leading residences were illuminated.

NEW BRUNSWICK'S SYMPATHY.—Lieut. Governor Sends Message of Condolence on President's Death, and Receives Reply.

Fredericton, N. B., Sept. 17.—(Special).—The following is a copy of a telegram sent to his excellency the governor general by the lieutenant governor for transmission to Washington: "St. John, N. B., Sept. 16, His Excellency the Governor General, Ottawa. Will your excellency kindly convey through the proper channel an expression of my profound sorrow and that of my government and of the people of the province of New Brunswick at the lamented death of President McKinley and our sympathy with his family in their sad bereavement. St. John's Newfoundland.—St. John's, Nfld., Sept. 19.—The funeral of the late President McKinley was recognized here today by the half-masting of all flags on government, civic and other buildings, as well as by a general display of symbols of respect by shipping, business concerns and private citizens.

British Columbia Suspended Business.—Victoria, B. C., Sept. 19.—Solemn memorial services were held today in Christ's cathedral, the Bishop of Columbia officiated. All business was suspended this afternoon.

On Porto Rico.—San Juan, P. R., Sept. 19.—Appropriate memorial services were held in every town of Porto Rico today.

Recalled Former Days.—Minneapolis, Sept. 19.—In the historic cathedral hall where McKinley in 1892 presided over the convention that elected him to the presidency, a memorial service was held today in honor of the late President McKinley.

GUARDING ROYAL VISITORS.

Extraordinary Precautions Were Taken Wednesday at Montreal to Safeguard Duke and Duchess.

Montreal, Sept. 18.—(Special)—Owing to the assassination of President McKinley, extraordinary precautions were taken today to safeguard the Duke and Duchess of Cornwall. The royal party was guarded by a special detective force. The detectives kept close watch on all who approached the party. The data on which the addresses were presented was surrounded by police and the streets through which the procession passed were lined with troops.

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FOUND DAUGHTER AMONG THE DEAD. Victim of Wednesday's Railroad Wreck Identified as East Bridgewater Girl.

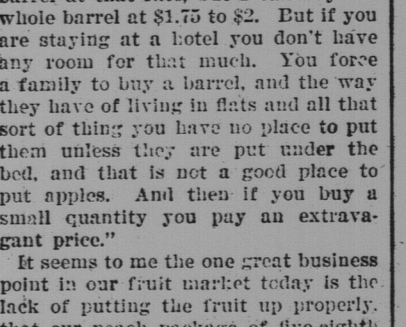

CHURCH ATTENDANCE

Dr. Talmage Says It is Not Cadence in the U. S.

PRESENTS HARD FACTS IN PROOF

One Denomination in United States Averages Two New Churches a Day the Year Through—Why Some Churches Fail to Win Attendants.

Washington, Sept. 15.—Most encouraging to all Christian workers is this discourse of Dr. Talmage while denying the accuracy of statistics which represent Sunday audiences as diminishing; text, Hebrews x, 25, "Not forsaking the assembling of ourselves together."

Starting statements have been made in many of the pulpits and in some of the religious newspapers. It is heard over and over again that church attendance in America is in decadence. I deny the statements by presenting some hard facts. No one will dispute the fact that there are more churches in America than ever before, one denomination averaging two new churches every day of the year. The law of demand and supply is inexorable in the Kingdom of God as it is in the world. More church privileges demanded. More banks, more bankers; more ships, more manufacturers; more churches, more attendants.

In all our cities within a few years churches have been built large enough to swallow up two or three of the old time churches. I cannot understand with what kind of arithmetic and static penmanship have been made in many of the pulpits and in some of the religious newspapers. It is heard over and over again that church attendance in America is in decadence. Take the aggregate of the number of people who enter the house of God now and compare it with the aggregate of the people who entered the house of God twenty-five years ago. The present attendance is four to one. The facts are most exhilarating instead of being depressing. That man who presents the opposite statistics must have been most unfortunate in his church acquaintance.

You are not to argue adversely because there are churches which are depleted. Churches have their days. Sometimes merchandise will entirely occupy a neighborhood and crowd out the churches and families ordinarily attendant upon them. Sometimes a church perishes through intense rivalry. But there are no facts to overthrow the statement that I have made in regard to the increasing attendance upon the house of God. There are churches ready to admit, that there are churches which have been depleted, and it is high time that a sermon be preached for the churches that have been depleted, just entering the gospel ministry and for the warning of prosperous churches as to what are the causes which deplete a church. It is not to be helped, but under all circumstances, decadence in church attendance is a thing of the past.

Churches are often cleared of their audiences by the attempt to transplant the notes of the past into the time of the present. The notes and methods of fifty years ago are no more appropriate for to-day than the modes of dress of the past are for the present. TERRIBLE GALES WITH PROBABLE LOSS OF LIFE.

Numerous Shipping Disasters Reported from Lake Huron.

Toronto, Sept. 17.—(Special)—Terrible gales have raged on Lake Huron during the past three days and numerous shipping disasters are reported. A despatch from Southampton tonight reports the steamer *Berg* of Kingston, coal laden, from Cleveland for Owen Sound abandoned in a sinking condition 40 miles northwest of Southampton at 10 o'clock this morning. Capt. Hanson and crew of 11 took to the water and landed safely seven miles north of Southampton after eight hours exposure to cold and storm.

Owen Sound reports the loss of the steamer *John A. Mearns* and probably part of her crew during Sunday's gale. Capt. Hanson, his wife and two of the crew abandoned the vessel and reached Tobernomy Monday night. The remainder of the crew took to a raft and were since seen or heard of. It is believed all are lost.

MILLER'S SHINGLE MILL AT CAMPBELLTON BURNED

Loss of \$4,000 and No Insurance—Twelve Buildings in Metapedia Valley Destroyed.

Campbellton, N. B., Sept. 17.—(Special)—W. H. Miller's shingle mill, barn and cook house, located two miles west of here were burned this afternoon. The fire is supposed to have caught from the *Mowat* mill near by. Four carloads of shingles were destroyed. Mr. Miller has the sympathy of the entire community as by his enterprise and industry he built up a fine business.

Twelve buildings were burned this morning at Sayabec, Metapedia Valley. They caught from the forest fires.

Dalhousie, N. B., Sept. 17.—(Special)—While William Miller was here today he received word that his shingle mill was destroyed. There was no insurance. The loss is about \$4,000.

TRADES AND LABOR CONGRESS SESSION.

Deals With a Number of Important Matters—Against Joining Militia Except on Invasion.

Brantford, Ont., Sept. 18.—(Special)—The Dominion Trades and Labor Congress today passed resolutions deploring the assassination of President McKinley. Another resolution called for the government to have copy sent to the printing bureau more regularly so as to avoid suspension of employees. Another declared compulsory arbitration and its adoption by the government. Municipal ownership of public franchises was endorsed and also control with regard to graft staple necessities.

A motion submitted calling on labor men not to join the militia unless the country was invaded caused angry discussion. Many objecting to the use of volunteers to suppress labor troubles. The resolution finally carried.

STRONG IN SUPPORT OF MURRAY GOVERNMENT.

Many Conservatives Range Themselves on the Liberals' Side.

River Heights, Sept. 17.—Messrs. Black and Tucker, the Liberal candidates, spent yesterday in this section and were accorded a hearty reception. The record of the Murray administration is satisfactory to a wonderful degree. In the evening a public meeting was held. J. O. Scott, brother of S. D. Scott, was in the chair. gospel who, not being able to preach, is set to teach others how to preach. In most cases than one the poorest speaker in the faculty is the professor of elocution. We want more wide awake, more abledodded, abledodded men, more abledodded men in our theological seminaries and in the professorates—men like Addison Alexander, who could during the week teach the theory of preaching and then on Sunday go into the pulpit and with the thunder and lightning of Christian eloquence show them how. We want less deadwood in the theological seminaries and more flaming evangelists. I denounce the theory of preaching that professes that cannot preach himself cannot teach others how to preach.

Young ministers are told they must preach Christ and him crucified. Yes, but not as an abstraction. Many a minister has preached Christ and him crucified in such a way that he preached an audience of five hundred down to two hundred, and from two hundred to one hundred, and from one hundred to fifty, and from fifty to twenty, and on down until there was little left save the sexton, who was paid to stay until the service was over and lock up. There is a Christ for the pulpit, and a Christ for the store, a Christ for the banking house, a Christ for the factory, a Christ for the congressional assembly, a Christ for the court, a Christ for every trial and every emergency and every perturbation.

Ah, my friends, churches will be largely abandoned if we ministers can meet their wants, meet their sufferings, meet their bereavements and meet their needs. If there is a church with small help, small audience, medium help, medium audience; large help, large audience. LOGGERS MUST BE INFORMED OF STRIKE SETTLEMENT BEFORE PUBLIC.

Shaffer So Declares—Conditions in the Mills Improved Greatly—Large Majority of Strikers Have Returned to Work.

Pittsburg, Sept. 17.—After taking time to think it over, President Shaffer, of the Amalgamated Association, has announced that there will be no public statement of the terms of the settlement of the strike. He has also decided to issue a circular giving the terms of agreement on which the men were ordered to return to work and after all the loggers have received it, the circular will be made public. The Riverside plant of the American Sheet Steel Company started up this week. The Canal Dover plant of this company has five of the 10 mills operating. There will be no effect on the National Tube Company, started in full today. The National Steel plants in Bellaire and Mingo Junction are the only plants of that company now idle. The Riverside plant of the National Tube Company, is wholly idle.

The greatest trouble seems to be predicted in the plants of the American Tin Plate Company that have been conceded by President Shaffer as non-union.
