Dominion Parliament.

OTTAWA, MARCH 14. Hon. A. W. McLelan made an excellant speech on the Budget, which was received with great applause. During his remarks he entered into an elaborate comparison of the expenditures of the Liberal Conservatives and Grit auminis trations, showing an enormous increase of public debt by the Grits, no less than \$35,000,000 in addition to \$4,500,000 of the Fishery Award, which if they had not received as they did they would have had to borrow that amount of money. He charged the Mackenzie administration with spending millions of dollars uselessly on public works that would be useless for all time to come. In referring to immigration he said that ast year no less than 28,000 people went Spring Tweeds and Worsted into the North West; now it was estimated that every bona fide settler was worth \$1,000 per annum to the country. Accepting that estimate, the North West immigration of last year was worth \$28,000,000. Within a year or two that immigration will reach 100,000, and the value to the country will be \$100,000,000.


