**WIRELESS WILL
TRANSMIT 150 WORDS**

Description of the Station to be
Established at Newcastle, N.
B., at Cost of \$175,000

Newcastle, N. B., March 31.—When
complete the new wireless station at
this place will flash 150 words a min-
ute across 2,700 miles of sea to the
corresponding station at Ballybunion,
on the south-west coast of Ireland.

There is much discussion now over
the question as to whether the wire-
less will do away with the cables. The
commercial speed of the new wireless
station will be in the near neigh-
borhood of 150 words a minute, the great-
est speed now worked by cables across
the Atlantic is 50 words a minute.

The big steel tower at Newcastle is
500 feet high and is surrounded by six
auxiliaries. Between these towers is
strung a net work of 120,000 feet of
wire. A large number of tranches
have been dug on the grounds and on
these another 140,000 feet of wire has
been laid to secure the proper ground
connection.

On the outside of the line of towers
the power house is situated and is
equipped with two 225 B.N.P. Diesel
motors, each weighing 50,000 pounds,
of the largest design, directly coupled
to two 1,000 volts D. C. generators
supplying power to the operating in-
struments. The fly wheels of these
engines are eleven feet in diameter
and weigh seven tons. In wireless
signalling stations that can reach a
ship 1,000 or 2,000 miles at night, can-
not reach over 200 or 300 feet in the
day time. This is supposed to be caused
by the electrification of the ether by
the sun's rays, which presumably
makes it more difficult for the artifi-
cially created waves to travel through
the ether, and also causes a greater
absorption of energy by the ether.

The total cost of the station amounted
to some \$175,000.

**TWEEDIE MAY RE-
ENTER PUBLIC LIFE**
Montreal Report Says He May
Again Assume the Liberal
Party Leadership

Montreal, March 31.—It is more than
probable that Hon. L. J. Tweedie,
former Prime Minister of New Brun-
swick and later Lieutenant Governor of
that province, will re-enter public life
and lead the Liberal opposition forces
at the coming provincial elections in
that province. Hon. Mr. Tweedie, who
was in Montreal on his way from
Hamilton, accompanied by Mrs.
Tweedie, was asked if he did not in-
tend to re-enter active public life. He
replied that the party wanted him to
do so, but that the way things were
going in New Brunswick, it might be
hard for a man to take charge of af-
fairs and conduct them on economical
and conservative lines, as he would
constantly be confronted with the cry,
"Look what the other fellows have
done."

"But being in opposition, your re-
sponsibility will be lessened," said the
interviewer.

"I will not be in opposition, as we
would win," said Mr. Tweedie. "There
would be no manner of doubt on that
score."

Further than this Mr. Tweedie
would say nothing, but the indications
are that he will again become a lead-
ing factor in the public life of New
Brunswick.

**IS BURGLARISED
AT CARLETON, P. Q.**
Store of Ferdinand Landry Brok-
en Into on Sunday Night Only
\$15 is Taken

Dalhousie, N. B., April 1st.—The in-
habitants of the generally quiet parish
of Carleton, P. Q., were in a state of
excitement on Monday, when the news
spread that the store of Ferdinand
Landry, had been burglarized during
Sunday night. The robbers broke in
by the front door, and took all the
money that was left in the cash draw-
er, amounting to about fifteen dollars.

Two suspicious looking men have been
seen in that section, and people say
they resemble Bourret and Faucault,
wanted in Montreal on the charge of
murder.

**LEAK IN WATER MAIN
LOCATED IN DALHOUSIE**
Main Pipe Between the I. C. R.
Track and the Town Will
Require Repairing

(Special to the Graphic)
Dalhousie, N. B., April 1st.—During
the last few days there has been a
panic here on account of the great
scarcity of water in the town reservoir
in endeavouring to ascertain the cause
of the shortage and to-day our citizens
are more optimistic, since it has been
known that the town engineer, Mr.
Wm. Gallop, has located the leak. In
the first place he ascertained that the
run of water into the reservoir from
the brook at the present time is 51-
840 gallons per twenty four hours, and
at the most, the consumption of the
town per day, including the Power
House is 20,000 gallons, which showed
a loss on the face of it of over thirty
thousand gallons. Finding the reser-
voir in good condition, he examined
carefully the ground from McNeish's
brook to the town and located a leak
from the main pipe between the I. C.
R. track and the town. When the pipe
is repaired at this point, it is expected
that there will be sufficient water for
all purposes.

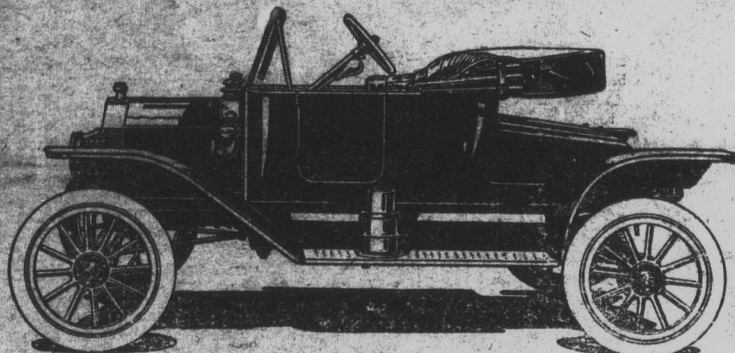

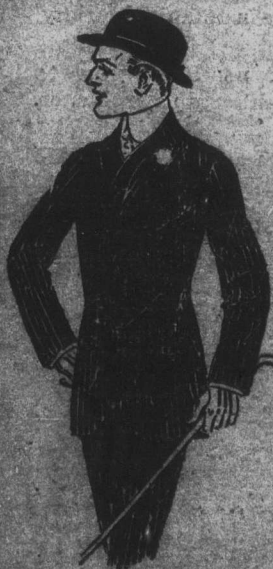

BILL AN ACT RELATING TO THE TOWN OF CAMPBELLTON.

Be it Enacted by the Lieutenant Governor and the Legislative Assembly, as follows:

1. In this Act the following terms shall have the meaning hereinafter assigned to them respectively unless such meaning is repugnant to or inconsistent with the context:—
"Building" shall mean, extend to, and include, "store," "store house," "dwelling house," "public building" and all other structural edifices for whatever purpose the same may be used.
"Built" shall mean, extend to, and include "build," "erect," "set up," "repair," "enlarge," "extend" and "construct".
"Non-combustible" shall include "stone," "brick," "concrete," "concrete blocks" or material of equal or greater resistance to fire.
"Fire Proof" shall include "slate," "tile," "gravel," "metal," "asphaltum roofing" or other material of equal or greater resistance to fire.

2. For the purpose of this Act the Town of Campbellton is divided into three Fire Districts, namely:—
FIRST FIRE DISTRICT:—Commencing at the extreme Easterly end of Water Street at mean low water mark and continuing Westerly along Water Street to Victoria Street, and extending between a line distant Northerly one hundred feet from the Northern side line of Water Street and parallel to the said Northern side line thereof and a line distant one hundred feet Southerly from the Southern side line of Water Street and parallel to the Southern side line thereof, thence Southerly along Victoria Street to Gerrard Street and embracing an area one hundred feet on each side of Victoria Street and parallel to the side line thereof.

SECOND FIRE DISTRICT:—Lying to the Southward and Westward of First Fire District and within the following boundaries, excepting therefrom so much of the said Town as is contained in the said First Fire District as hereinbefore defined:—Commencing at the Restigouche River at mean low water mark one hundred feet Southerly from the Southern side line of King Street, thence running Westerly one hundred feet distant from the Southern side line of King Street to a point one hundred feet Easterly from the Easterly side line of Cedar Street, thence Southerly and Westerly along Cedar and Patterson Streets and continuing one hundred feet distant and parallel thereto to a point one hundred feet Easterly from the Eastern side line of Central Street; thence Southerly and parallel to the Eastern side line of Central Street to a point one hundred feet south of a line that would mark the extension of the Southern side line of Argyle Street in an Easterly direction, thence Westerly one hundred feet South of a parallel to the Southern side line of Argyle Street to a point one hundred feet West of the Western side line of Andrew Street, thence Northerly parallel to the Western side line of Andrew Street and distant one hundred feet therefrom to a point one hundred feet South from the Southern side line of Aberdeen Street; thence Westerly parallel to Aberdeen Street and distant one hundred feet from the Southern side line thereof to Minto Street and thence continuing in the same Westerly direction to a point one hundred feet from the Western side line of Sugar Loaf Street; thence Northerly parallel to the Western side line of Sugar Loaf Street and distant one hundred feet therefrom to the Restigouche River and thence following the bank or shore of the said River to the place of beginning.

THIRD FIRE DISTRICT:—All the remaining portions of the Town of Campbellton not comprised within the boundaries of the First and Second Fire Districts hereinbefore set forth.

3. All buildings built within the First Fire District shall be built of non-combustible material and the roof of every such building shall be covered with fire proof material.

4. All buildings built within the Second Fire District may be built of wood but shall not exceed thirty-five feet in height from the top of the basement upon which such building is erected; the basement of any such building shall not be more than five feet in height from the highest line of that part of the street fronting or abutting on which the same may be built; and the roof of any such building shall be covered with fire proof material.

5. All buildings built within the Third Fire District may be built of wood but shall not exceed thirty-five feet in height from the top of the basement upon which such building is erected; the basement of any such building shall not be more than five feet in height from the highest line of that part of the Street fronting or abutting on which the same may be built.

6. All buildings built in the Second or Third Fire District having a greater height than thirty-five feet shall be built of non-combustible material and the roof of every such building shall be covered with fire proof material.

7. The owner of any building built in either of the said Fire Districts since the Eleventh day of July, 1910, and which does not conform to the provisions of the by-laws of the Town of Campbellton at present in force, or to the provisions of this Act, shall, after the First day of July next, upon notice from the said Town through the Building Inspector, that he is required so to do, remove the said building from the limits of the said Fire Districts within thirty days after such notice, or within the said thirty days conform to the provisions of this Act or to the provisions of the said by-laws.

8. No building shall be built in any part of the Town of Campbellton until a written permit shall have been first obtained from the Building Inspector.

9. Any building or structure whatsoever which in the opinion of the Town Council may be a source of danger in causing accidents or in originating or spreading fires must be removed by the owner thereof at any time when notified by the Building Inspector so to do, under the authority of the Town Council.

10. The Building Inspector shall have full power to decide any questions arising under any of the provisions of this Act or of any by-law of the Town of Campbellton passed under the authority of this Act or under the authority of any other Act of Assembly relating to the manner of construction, or the materials to be used in the construction, alteration, or repair of any building in the Town of Campbellton, subject however to the direction and control of the Town Council, and the Building Inspector may require that plans of the proposed construction, alterations or repairs shall be submitted to him for inspection before issuing permit.

11. Any building built, removed, roofed, kept or maintained within any of the said Fire Districts which does not conform to the provisions of this Act or to the provisions of any by-law at present in force in the Town of Campbellton shall be deemed and taken to be and the same is hereby declared to be a public and common nuisance.

12. Any building which shall be built, removed, roofed, kept or maintained within the said Town contrary to any of the provisions of this Act or of any by-law passed under the authority of this Act shall be deemed and taken to be and the same is hereby declared to be a public and common nuisance.

13. The said Town Council of the Town of Campbellton may from time to time by by-law or ordinance alter the boundaries of the said Fire Districts and make new districts in lieu thereof and the number and boundaries of the said Districts shall be entirely within the discretion of the said Town Council, but the Town Council shall not by by-law or ordinance decrease the limits of the boundaries of the First Fire District as hereinbefore defined nor shall not decrease the extent of the outside boundaries of the Second Fire District as hereinbefore defined.

14. The said Town Council shall have power by by-law or ordinance from time to time to declare what shall be deemed to be offensive occupation of any building or buildings in any part of the said Town and any one carrying on or maintaining such occupation in contravention of any such by-law shall be deemed to be guilty of a public nuisance and in the making of any such by-law the said Town Council shall have power to discriminate between occupations and localities in which such occupations may be carried on.

15. The said Town Council may also by by-law or ordinance from time to time prescribe the nature or material of which any or all buildings hereafter to be constructed within the said Town shall be composed in whole or in part and it is hereby declared that it is the intention of this Act to confer upon the said Town, for the purpose of better preventing conflagration in the said Town, the power to enact by-laws or ordinances dealing with the said subject as freely as the same is capable of being dealt with by an Act of the Legislature of this Province.

16. Section 4 of Chapter 58, 1 George V is hereby repealed and the following enacted in lieu thereof:

(1) Whosoever shall commit or make any act or default contrary to the provisions of this act or any by-law or by-laws enacted by the Town Council under the authority of this act or under the provisions of any Act relating to the construction, location, or erection of buildings within the Town of Campbellton or any Act relating to the prevention of conflagrations within the said Town shall be liable to a penalty of not less than ten dollars nor more than one hundred dollars for every such act and default to be recovered by proceedings to be taken in the name of the Building Inspector or Town Clerk before the Police Magistrate or Sitting Police Magistrate of the Town of Campbellton in the manner prescribed for the recovery of fines and penalties by Chapter One Hundred and twenty-three of the Consolidated Statutes of New Brunswick and amending Acts.

(2) For each day on which any person shall permit the continuance of any matter or thing or shall continue to do or continue to refuse or neglect to do any act or acts contrary to the provisions of this Act or any by-law or by-laws enacted by the Town Council under the authority of this Act or under the provisions of any Act relating to the construction, location or erection of buildings within the Town of Campbellton or any Act relating to the prevention of conflagrations within the said Town he shall be deemed to be guilty of a separate and distinct offence under the Act and shall for each day's continuance be liable to a penalty of not less than ten dollars nor more than one hundred dollars to be recovered in the same manner and with the like effect as is hereinbefore in the last preceding section provided.

(3) In case any building or structure shall be in process of erection, alteration or repair contrary to the provisions of this Act or any by-law of by-laws enacted by the Town Council under authority of this Act or any Act relating to the location, construction or erection of buildings within the said Town it shall be lawful for the Supreme Court or any Justice thereof to issue forthwith an injunction restraining further progress until the facts of the case have been investigated and determined.

17. The Town Council of the Town of Campbellton is hereby authorized and empowered to issue debentures not to exceed in the whole the sum of Fifty Thousand dollars to assist in defraying the expenses and cost of construction and equipment of:—

(a) A Town Hall for the said Town of Campbellton
(b) A Fire Station for the said Town of Campbellton.

18. The said debentures shall be issued upon resolution of the Town Council in denominations of Five Hundred dollars each and for a period of not exceeding forty years with interest coupons attached at a rate of interest not exceeding five per centum per annum, payable half yearly.

19. The said Debentures shall be sold by the Town Treasurer and the proceeds of Twenty-five Thousand dollars or whatever part thereof as shall be deemed necessary applied towards the construction and equipment of a Town Hall; the proceeds of Twenty-five thousand dollars or whatever part thereof as shall be deemed necessary applied towards the cost of the construction and equipment of a Fire Station.

20. The said Town Council may by resolution decide whether the proceeds of the said Fifty thousand dollars be applied to the construction of a combined Town Hall and Fire Station or that the proceeds of the said Fifty thousand dollars be applied to the construction of two separate buildings. The said Town Council shall also have the privilege of issuing the said debentures for the said sum of fifty thousand dollars at different times for the construction and equipment of either of the said buildings, the amount of debentures issued for the construction and equipment of either of the said buildings not to exceed the sum of twenty-five thousand dollars.

21. The said Town Council is hereby authorized and empowered to issue debentures not to exceed in the whole the sum of twenty thousand dollars to assist in defraying the expenses and cost of the construction of permanent street and sidewalk pavements in the said Town.

22. The said debentures shall be known as the "Town of Campbellton Permanent Street Debentures" and shall be issued upon the resolution of the Town Council in denominations of five hundred dollars each and run for a period not exceeding forty years with interest coupons attached at a rate of interest not exceeding five per centum per annum payable half yearly.

23. At the time of making up the annual assessment each year the Town Council shall order to be levied and assessed an amount sufficient to pay the annual interest on the debentures issued under this Act and also an amount sufficient to provide a sinking fund for the retirement of the said debentures at maturity as required by "The Municipalities Debentures Act 1911".

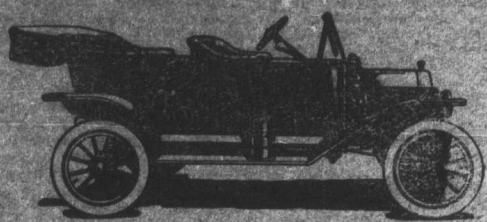

MUNICIPALITIES PROTEST HAS DESIRED EFFECT

Government Amends Last Year's
Bill Which Placed Heavy
Burden on Counties

Fredricton, Mar. 26.—Hon. Mr. Flemming introduced a bill relating to the Provincial Hospital. In explaining same, he said it was an amendment to the act of last year which required all municipalities to contribute one dollar per week toward the cost of maintenance of their pauper lunatics.

The principle of last year's bill, he declared, was sound in every respect. The maintenance of such persons was in no sense a charge against the province, but against the municipalities to which they belonged. The government was not asking the municipalities to bear the cost, but only to contribute one-third to it, which, as had been mentioned in the House, was considerably less than was paid by the municipalities in some other provinces.

However, the government was willing to place some limitation on the number of patients to be paid for and the bill now introduced provided that no parish should be called upon to pay for more than six patients and no municipality more than seventy-five. There are some isolated parishes in which the number of pauper lunatics is very large in proportion to population and beyond their paying capacity and under the provisions of this bill they would be relieved from considerable payments. One parish in Gloucester had eleven patients, one in Kent none, one in Northumberland thirteen, while in Westmorland twenty parishes had thirteen, eleven and twenty-five. In future each of these parishes would pay on six patients only, which would be a considerable relief. This should appeal to the House as being very reasonable and it was not the desire of the government to impose greater burdens on any particular locality than it could carry.

The provision that no municipality should be called upon to maintain more than seventy-five patients was intended to benefit St. John county, which was often called upon to pay the cost of maintenance of patients who were not natives of the county, consequent upon the tendency of country people to settle in the city.

LEGISLATION

As promised in last week's Graphic, we today publish the full text of the bill relating to the town of Campbellton, which is now before the legislature, and which will come up in the house tomorrow. A careful perusal of the provisions of the measure is called for, so that every reader can form his own opinion as to the merits or demerits, of the powers now being sought. It is impossible in short space to deal at length with the several clauses, we can only point out their provisions. The definition of the fire districts, and fire proof buildings takes up most of the bill. The debatable point in this is section No. 7, which says

"The owner of any building built in either of the said Fire Districts since the Eleventh day of July, 1910, and which does not conform to the provisions of the by-laws of the Town of Campbellton at present in force, or of the provisions of this Act, shall, after the first day of July next, upon notice from the said Town through the Building Inspector, that he is required so to do, remove the said building from the limits of the said Fire Districts within thirty days after such notice, or within the said thirty days conform to the provisions of this Act or to the provisions of the said by-laws."

the hardships a clause of this kind will entail on a person who has built or owns a shack or temporary building in these districts. On the other hand, what about the hardship occasioned others who constructed their buildings in compliance with the building by-laws, thereby paying increased amounts for construction, under the impression that all shacks and temporary buildings would be removed in accordance with the by-laws. The clause is weak, however, in this, that no Court would compel any land owner to erect a building he was unable to finance, other large cities getting over this difficulty by inserting a clause in their acts giving them power to take the land over from the holder by arbitration, and erecting proper buildings in accordance with the by-laws themselves.

With regard to the town hall and fire station, it is embodied in the bill that these may be two separate buildings. It is conceded by all and especially by the firemen themselves, that a properly equipped fire station with hose drying tower is an absolute necessity. It is also urged by the fire department that the proper location of the station should be in the vicinity of the subway, or even further west. With a town hall, the cost of construction should not exceed \$20,000, the interest on this would be \$1000 per annum. We are at present paying \$120 per month for the Murray Building with the privilege of renting the stores. This privilege is a negligible quantity, and in the future the stores may or may not be leased, but can not be included as an asset with any degree of certainty. A town hall with proper side room accommodation, would rent quickly for dances and other entertainments, and would be a source of revenue as much as our present buildings.

We will pass over the debentures for street purposes, which is or is not required according to the street you stay in, and pass on to the last part, which deals with assessments. This is one of the town's most crying needs, and it is a disgrace to think that we are almost on the next years assessments, and carry a defaulters list of nearly \$10,000.

In the space at our disposal we have only put the points before our readers who must judge the matter for themselves, looking on all the different sides of the questions involved.

A despatch from Trout Creek, Ontario, which is situated on the Toronto-North Bay Branch of the Grand Trunk Railway, states that Mr. A. Mermer, a prominent resident of that town has imported from New Hampshire, a number of live deer for breeding purposes. Mr. Mermer has enclosed over two hundred acres of bush land which he intends to convert into a breeding place for deer and probably buffaloes, if they are obtainable.

IMPROVEMENTS IN 1915 AT EEL RIVER

Large Mill Will be Built There Next Year For The Manufacture of All Kinds of Lumber

Among the improvements reported to be made during 1915 at Eel River Crossing, Rest. Co., are the following: The building of an up to date general store by Mr. Alex. Dittie, formerly merchant of Campbellton. Most of the materials for the enterprise are already on the grounds.

The little R. C. Church commenced last year, to be completed during the coming summer.

The D. M. Silas mill to be rebuilt. Two other mills may be built at Eel River, one in which Messrs. S. S. Harrison, R. L. Myles and others will be interested in.

EPIDEMIC CLOSES NORMAL SCHOOL

Outbreak of Scarlet Fever in Fredericton, and Infection of Many Students

Fredericton, N. B., March 31.—The Provincial Normal School was ordered closed Monday afternoon on account of the discovery of several additional cases of scarlet fever among the students.

The school will remain closed until after the Easter vacation. This will mean that it will be closed three weeks altogether.

Scarlet fever is widely spread throughout Fredericton and Marysville. Several children have died since the disease first was observed early in the winter.

The health authorities have done what they could to combat disease, but failure of members of afflicted households to observe quarantine regulations is largely responsible for the spread of the disease. The action in regard to the Normal school was taken only after careful consideration by

The choir has given loyal support to the preacher. On every evening, there has been special music either from the members of the choir or the friends temporarily assisting.

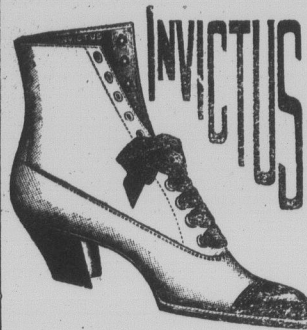

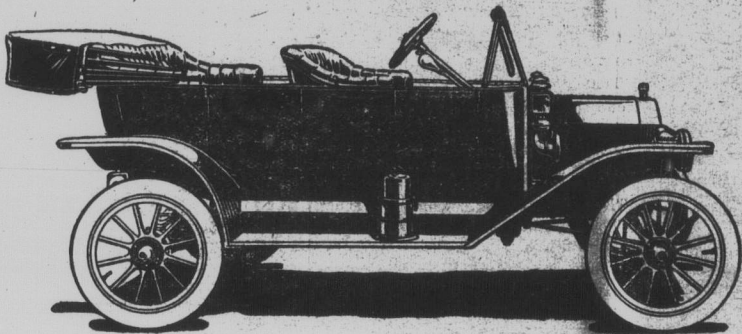

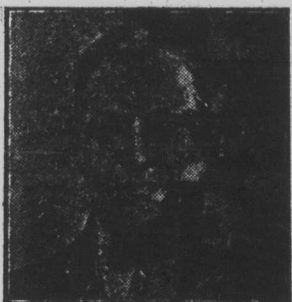

As to just what is to be done no one is prepared to say until Premier Fleming lays the exact facts of the case before the House. From what has been published in the shape of rumor, it would seem that the contractor of the Valley Railway is unable to finish the work without further financial aid from the Province. When the guarantee of bonds for this enterprise was before the House two years ago, the Premier convinced the country that the work would be of great benefit to the Province, and the standing of the promoters was such as to make the liability of the Province seem secure from jeopardy. If a further guarantee is necessary to finish the road, there must have been some very bad figuring somewhere. We of the Northern Counties who will not receive an iota of benefit from the building of this railway, thought that we acted very generously when we made no opposition to the granting of this guarantee, but we think that it is asking too much to expect us to be in favor of more of the same thing to the amount of \$2,000,000.

It would certainly be very unfortunate if the road had to be abandoned after committing the Province to the extent that it has, but we must remember that there is no business in sending good money after bad, and unless the future of this road is guaranteed in such a way that there can be no possibility of disappointment, it would be better for us to stop where we are.

While the outlook is not very promising, yet we believe that our representatives are alive to the dangers of the situation, and will see that every thing possible will be done to protect the Province from serious loss or crippling liability.

SALMON MATTERS IN HOUSE OF COMMONS

Hon. Mr. Hazen Replies to Queries of Hon. Chas. Marcell Regarding Pond at Tide Head

The following are the questions put by Hon. Charles Marcell, and the answers given by Hon. J. D. Hazen on Restigouche Salmon matters which will be of interest to many in this district:

1. Does the Marine and Fisheries Department contemplate removing the salmon retaining pond from Tide Head to New Mills, N. B., or anywhere else?
2. Why is such a change being made and on whose advice?
3. What action will be taken to supply the new pond with fish?
4. Are tenders being called?
5. Is it true that certain parties who were offered work are said to have refused to accept it on the ground that they were opposed to the removal of the pond?
6. Who were such parties, where did they belong, and had tenders been called?

Answer by Hon. Mr. Hazen.

1. It is the intention to discontinue the pond at Tide Head, and to maintain one at New Mills, N. B.
2. To enable the parent fish to be purchased from the commercial fishermen, instead of being captured as they are at present after they enter the river, and to be retained in a tidal pond, as such is preferable. On the advice of the experts of the Department.
3. Fish will be purchased from the regular fishermen.
4. No.
5. Not to the Department's knowledge.
6. Answered by No. 5.

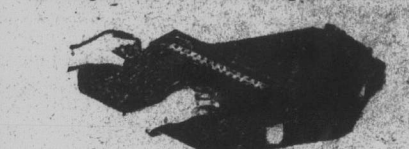

24. Section 2 of Chapter 88, 2 Edward VII is hereby repealed and the following section enacted in lieu thereof:—
(2) At the first meeting of the Council after each Annual meeting or any subsequent meeting they may if they see fit nominate and appoint one of their number as Deputy Mayor who shall in the absence or illness of the Mayor perform all Acts and assume all duties which the Mayor could or should do if present and shall on the death of the Mayor perform all Acts and assume all the duties of a Mayor with all the powers and responsibilities incident to such office until another person be sworn in as Mayor and the said Town Council shall also have the power at the first or any subsequent meeting of the Council after the Annual Election to nominate and appoint three assessors, one from each Ward.

25. Sections 74, 75 and 76 of Chapter 81, 51 Victoria, are hereby repealed and the following sections enacted in lieu thereof:—
(74) The Town Treasurer on receiving the assessment list shall forthwith cause to be published in a newspaper printed in the Town or by handbills posted up in each Ward of the Town a notice that he has received the assessment list and that all persons assessed in the Town shall be entitled to a deduction or discount of five per centum on the amount assessed against them respectively upon the payment of their respective rates to the Town Treasurer within thirty days after the first publication of the said notice; after which time no discount shall be allowed and all rates and taxes must be paid within sixty days after the first publication of said notice, after which date interest shall be charged on any balance due at the rate of five per centum per annum.

(75) The Town Treasurer upon receipt of the said assessment list shall also immediately prepare or cause to be prepared a notice to each person named in such assessment list in the form following:—

"Mr. _____
Take notice that you have been assessed in the Town of Campbellton for the year _____ to the amount of \$ _____; Personal Estate to the value of \$ _____; of income to the value of \$ _____.
If the sum of _____ dollars is paid me within thirty days from this date a discount of five per centum will be allowed and if not paid within sixty days from this date an execution will immediately issue against you for same.
Dated at the Town of Campbellton the _____ day of _____ A. D. _____
Rate of Taxation _____
Poll Tax _____
Town Treasurer.

Interest at the rate of five per centum per annum will be charged on all overdue taxes."

Which notice when so prepared shall forthwith be delivered to a constable or other person to be appointed for that purpose by the Town Council who shall without delay serve said notice upon the respective persons to whom they may be respectively addressed, or if any of the said persons cannot be found within the said Town the said persons appointed as aforesaid shall leave such notice or notices at his or their known places of abode within the said Town; or if no such place of abode be found then shall place said notice or notices in the Post Office at the Town of Campbellton; and when so served such notice shall for the purposes of this Act be deemed and charged on all overdue taxes.

(76) Immediately upon the expiration of the sixty days mentioned in the Seventy-fourth section of this Act, the Town Treasurer shall, by publication in one of the newspapers printed in the said Town, or by handbills posted up in each Ward thereof give notice that the assessment list remains in his hands as Collector and Receiver of Taxes, and that all persons who have not paid their taxes within the said sixty days as aforesaid are defaulters, and he may at the same time and in the same manner publish the name of such defaulters and the amount in which they are in default in one or more of the newspapers published in the said Town and unless payment be made by them respectively at the expiration of the time mentioned in this demand of the rates and taxes, payment will be enforced without delay.

26. It shall and may be lawful for any Peace Officer or Constable or other persons in whom has been vested the authority of a Peace Officer by any law or Statute, and all such persons as they may call to their assistance to take into custody and detain without any other authority than this Act any person or persons who have committed any offense against any public statute or against any of the by-laws or ordinances of the Town of Campbellton and to convey such person or persons before the Police Magistrate to be dealt with according to law, and the said Town of Campbellton is authorized to make a by-law to compel any person peddling in the streets of the said Town to exhibit on demand of any Peace Officer or constable his or her license to peddle within the said Town, and on failure to do so the peddler is liable to an arrest without warrant for peddling without a license and to convey such person before the Police Magistrate of the Town of Campbellton to be dealt with according to law.

27. All Acts of the Legislature of New Brunswick or any part or parts of the said Acts that may be inconsistent with or repugnant to the provisions of this Act as far as the same may be inconsistent or repugnant are hereby repealed.

WM. GAGNIER SENT

UP FOR TRIAL
(From the Gloucester Northern Light)

The adjourned hearing of the examination of the notorious Wm. Gagnier on the charge of burglary of W. J. Kent & Co.'s store on March 17th, was concluded before Justice O'Brien on Monday, who sent the accused up for trial.

Evidence was given by Officer Mann of Campbellton, who arrested the young man in that town on the evening of the 17th, and the articles he found on him consisting of rings, chains, collar buttons, neckties, a revolver, a Gillette safety razor and an electric flashlight were produced in court. These articles were identified by Messrs. W. J. Kent, Adelard Melanson, Napoleon Doucet and Harvell White, as having been missed from the store the morning of the 17th. Adelard Melanson and Napoleon Doucet also testified to the finding of an old pair of boots in the store on the morning of the 17th which the accused's brother Arthur, said were similar to the ones worn by his brother. Two cuffs were produced by Napoleon Doucet as found upstairs in Kent's store, and on being compared with the shirt which the prisoner was wearing, was found to be of the same pattern and marked with the same number.

The prisoner asked to be heard in his own defence, and on being sworn, said that on the evening of March 16th he had been to the moving pictures and on coming out started home. He stood for a little while at S. Holden-graber's corner, and while there saw a man with a red suit case come toward him from the direction of P. Elhatton's house. The stranger passed him, and then came back and said, "you are Gagnier, aren't you?" He replied "yes," and on asking the other's name was told it was White. The man asked him to walk up the street with him and asked him if he would go to Campbellton with him to which he answered he would. They went to the station together, where the man White, opened the suitcase and gave Gagnier a revolver, safety razor, searchlight, and a bag containing jewelry, a watch and a knife. He also gave him a pair of boots, which he put on after taking his old ones off and throwing them away.

White bought two second class tickets, and leaving Gagnier at the station came over to town at about eleven o'clock, returning at half past one. They went to Campbellton on the morning freight which left Bathurst about half past seven. Arriving at Campbellton about eleven o'clock he went to his brother, Percy's house, where he was arrested by Officer Mann. He said that the boots found in Kent's store were not his.

Richard LeBlanc, of the I. C. R., testified to the finding of a number of price tags in the waiting car at the station, and these were identified by the clerks of Kent's store as belonging to the company. A case guarantee was one of the tags picked up by Mr. LeBlanc, and this bore the same number as the watch case found on Gagnier. The price tag, which the clerks said belonged to the watch, was found by Harvell White on the bridge near town. Gagnier said under cross examination by Mr. Gilbert, Clerk of the Peace, that he opened the bag containing the watch at the station, and that White had not opened his red suitcase.

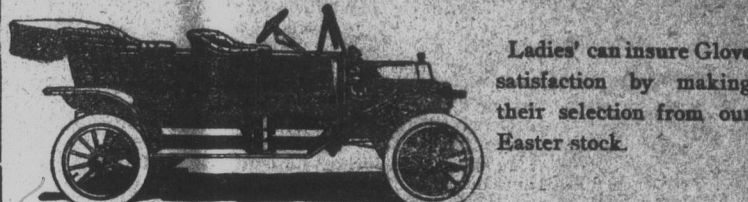

DEATH OF BATHURST MAN IN THE FAR NORTH

Mr. Waldron Brewer Smith is Dead at Stewart River, Yukon on March 19th.

Waldron Brewer Smyth, brother-in-law of Mrs. Milton Doherty of Campbellton, is called away after lingering illness of muscular Atrophy.
Mr. Wm. S. Bateman of Gould Grant Farm, received a wire on Tuesday last, announcing the death of his son-in-law, Mr. Waldron Brewer Smyth at Stewart River, Yukon, on March 19th. The late Mr. Smyth was a comparatively young man, only about thirty-five years old, and a native of South Togoche, near Bathurst. He went to the Klondike about twelve years ago, with Mr. Bateman, when the latter made his second trip to that country of gold and hazard and hardships. Three years afterwards, Mr. Smyth returned to Bathurst and married Mr. Bateman's daughter, Emma, who accompanied him back to the Yukon where he for a time longer continued to successfully engage in placer mining on Thistle, Henderson and other creeks. He later gave up mining and engaged in a mercantile and packing business in the town of Stewart River, also holding the position of post master there, and keeping a branch of the registry office. Three years ago his health broke down and he came "outside" to consult specialists in several large cities, but to no purpose, and returned north, a complete invalid to end his days there, cared for by his wife who has been his devoted nurse, as well as his helpmate in all things. Last year, Mrs. Smyth's sister, Mrs. Morris of Greenwood, Maine, went in to be of what assistance she could, and was with her during the trying time. Besides his wife, Mr. Smyth leaves his mother, several brothers and sisters to mourn their loss. The sympathy of a host of friends goes out to them in their hour of sorrow, especially to Mrs. Smyth, who has spent about eight or nine years in the wilds of the Yukon, and who has been left alone, except for the presence of One who has promised "I will never leave thee, nor forsake thee."

INSPECTOR'S REPORT OF DISTRICT SCHOOLS

School Inspector Mersereau Finds Schools in This District Being Well Conducted

Inspector Mersereau's latest report regarding schools in his district, contains the following about the Dalhousie town and parish schools. "Dalhousie—No. 1, in this parish is the town of Dalhousie, with its superior school, presided over by Principal E. D. Jones, one of the most capable and enthusiastic teachers of the Province. Point La Nim—No. 2, has a very small school, but it is well conducted. Dalhousie Junction—No. 3, had the school room enlarged and some modern desks supplied. The Cove—No. 9, opened its school under a local teacher, but found it unsatisfactory. Dundee—No. 5, provided new desks, but had not furnished them down. Shannonville—No. 6, operated a good school as usual. El River Crossing—No. 9, made some progress during the year in both departments. Summerside—No. 7, is increasing its attendance, and maintaining its efficiency during the year, with Miss Eliza Miller as teacher."
