

TELEGRAPH NEWS.

London, Aug. 11.

Narrative of a battle yet. The weather at the scene of military operations is very unpropitious. Wednesday night there was a great storm.

It is reported that the French army is retreating from Metz and moving under Gen. McMahon. It is also positively asserted that the Imperial headquarters have been removed from Metz.

Active naval operations on the Baltic are hourly expected.

King William has issued a proclamation to the inhabitants of France, where his armies are, saying that he is waging war on soldiers, not on private citizens, and promises protection to non-combatants.

Earl Derby yesterday delivered an address before the Association of Agriculturalists, at Blackpool, in which he alluded to the war, and strongly urged that England should maintain her policy of non-interference.

The Belgian King and Government, and the City Council of Brussels, have voted an address of thanks to Queen Victoria for assistance Belgium's neutrality.

An English banker, named Elliott, was yesterday arrested at Paris, while visiting his mother, charged with furnishing money to the French Army movements in the country.

He was taken to the Camp at Châlons, and was shot and shot as a spy during the evening.

New York, Aug. 12.

Gold 117½ to 118½.

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The Times this morning says in a tonight the Emperor has more perfectly understood his throne than his enemies have in a score of years.

Reassured by this prediction he has thrown away the votes of the people and the dynasty.

The Spectator thinks that the next battle must decide the fate of the Empire, as the popular faith in the Emperor is waning.

The Post contradicts the evening papers of yesterday, and asserts that the Prince Imperial is with the Emperor.

It is said that a telegraphic dispatch, named Marshal McMahon's dispatch, has been received, which was taken to move on to London. He found Karlsruhe in the telegram, as received.

Advisers through Prussian channels from St. Paul to Friday state that the Prussians have taken 71,000 prisoners.

The Berlin Correspondent of the "Times" writes that England has declined to join with Austria in the League proposed by Von Bismarck for guaranteeing the Belgians against loss of territory.

England's reason for declining is that the League could not save the North German Confederation in case Prussia should be defeated.

The success of the Emperor's late Parisian "Télé" asserts, without qualification, that the Emperor Eugene and the Prince Imperial are in Lodges at St. John's Wood.

The "Weekly Register" has the same report, which, however, it gives with caution, so as not to place too much confidence in its correctness.

O. D. Russell, returning from Rome, tells Charles Rice, an assistant under Secretary of Foreign Affairs.

The Prussian administration is passing quietly at London, where trouble was feared.

A desperate fight occurred at Derry today between the Orangemen and Catholics, in which three persons were killed and several wounded.

The military were obliged to interfere to restore order.

Paris, Aug. 12.

Communication with Strasbourg is interrupted.

The Prussians are massed around the city.

London, Aug. 14.

A special despatch from Haguenau, dated today, says that Marshal McMahon's army, consisting of 100,000 men, is on the march across the Moselle to the frontier of Prussia.

The French destroyed a fine bridge of seven arches, which spanned the river.

The forces of the Crown Prince now occupy Nancy and Frouard, at a junction on the Paris and Strasbourg Railroad.

for the term of four years from the 1st October next.

The route pursued in the conveyance of the Mail to be as follows, viz: From St. Andrews, calling at Fairhaven on Deer Island, Indian Island, Campello, and thence to North Head on the Island of Grandmanan.
