Halifax, April 16.—A cable has been received announcing the death in Korea of Mrs. Luther Young, wife of a Presbyterian Missionary in that country. Mrs. Young's illness was of comparatively short duration. With her husband she went to Korea and five years ago she was home in Canada on furlough. Mrs. Young was Miss Catherine Mair, of Campbellton, N. B. She leaves besides her husband four children.

## COURT MARTIAL OPENED THURSDAY

Canadian Rioters at Kimmel Camp on Trial.

Liverpool, April 17.—The general court martial by the commander-in-chief of the western command for the trial of a number of Canadian soldiers who are alleged to have been concerned in the rioting in Kimmel Park last month opened here to-day. Between seventy and eighty men were originally placed under arrest, but a considerable proportion of these have already been dealt with, about a dozen cases remaining to be tried. Major Gen. Bursall is presiding.

Six prisoners—Privates A. Dickson, R. Archer, V. Costoglia and J. Wallace, and Sergeants English and McKenzie, were charged to-day with having joined in the mutiny in His Majesty's forces.

Alternative charges are that they were present when soldiers combined to resist authority and failed to use their utmost endeavor to suppress the attempt.

## LIQUOR SECRETED IN CAR'S CEILING

The mysterious "Lunenburg" yielded 440 quarts of overproof spirits—Seizure in Moncton and Buctouche

The C. N. R. police continue to aid the prohibitory law officials in enforcing the act, both in this province and Nova Scotia. C. N. R. Officer Coates recently seized several gallons of liquor on a Moncton and Buctouche railroad train. C. N. R. Inspectors Power and Tracy on Sunday seized several thousand dollars' worth of liquor on an Atlantic express train at Halifax. The liquor was carefully concealed in the ceiling of a sleeping car.

This particular sleeping car, the Lunenburg, has been somewhat of a mystery for weeks, inasmuch as it was known to be a source of supply for thirty individuals. The car came from Moncton and Halifax. When the inspectors searched the car on several occasions they found nothing, but at last they noticed the absence of the usual number of screws in a section of the panelling of the ceiling.

When the panel was removed the officers found 440 quarts of Montreal grade high proof, valued at more than \$3,000 retail. The inspectors believe that the employees on the car knew nothing of the liquor, but that it was carried in the car and through an arrangement between yard employees in Moncton and Halifax.

## THE RULE OF THE ROAD.

To the Editor of The Graphic:—

Sir:—I notice in section 15 of the highway act of 1918, that, subject to the approval of the lieutenant-governor-in-council, we are to have or make a change in public traffic. At the present all teams draw to the left. This for convenience and common sense is the proper way. Here I shall give the following reasons:—Now, sir, as regards horse-drawn teams, the bulk of men, and women too, are right-handed, and when driving a horse sit on the right side of the wagon, or whatever it may be. In a wagon the driver or the responsible party and is to a certain extent responsible for the safety of all in the carriage. If the driver haul or turn to the left and the night is somewhat dark, each driver can easily see if they are giving sufficient room to pass. "Reverse that and you are putting the driver where he has no chance whatever to see what he is doing. Some will say change sides. Well, sir, as I have already said most people are right-handed or should be. All drivers use a whip or should; no driver should go on any public road without a whip. If I should sit on the opposite side to what is the custom now, sir, I attempted to whip my horse I would be very likely to get foul of my wife's nose. In that case, there would be civil war, and justice, now, sir, I lived twenty years on the Quebec side and over fifty years in New Brunswick, and know whereof I speak. In due respect to the lieutenant-governor, I know more about the matter than he does, for the reason that our calling has been entirely different. There are some cases, when an order-in-council would be permissible, but not so in this case. The people of New Brunswick should be consulted. If they by their vote say there should be a change of left to

## C.N.R. ENGINEER BADLY INJURED

Stanley Mann Thrown from Cab of Locomotive and Probably Fatally Injured.

Engineer Stanley Mann, one of the most efficient of C. N. R. engineers, running out of Campbellton was severely injured Tuesday morning near Routherville, Quebec, when he was either knocked or fell from the engine cab. He is now at the Hotel Dieu Hospital where he is in a very serious condition with little hope for his recovery.

Just how the accident happened will probably never be known as the unfortunate man was not seen until after the accident, when the train was immediately stopped. It is thought that he went to the side of the cab, and perhaps got down on the steps to see if everything about the wheels was all right when he was knocked off by some object, or lost his hold and fell. He was only slightly bruised about the head, but was unconscious when picked up, and has remained in this condition ever since.

The unfortunate man was rushed to the Hotel Dieu Hospital here where everything possible is being done for him.

Stanley Mann died.

Shortly before going to press we learned that Engineer Stanley Mann had died at the Hotel Dieu Hospital.

Lieutenant Armstrong Home After Fine Record Overseas—Promoted to Rank in Order to Cross Channel.

Among the New Brunswick men who arrived on the Celtic at Halifax was Lieutenant H. M. Armstrong, of big fame. He returns after a fine record overseas. An engineer by profession he enlisted with the 13th Battalion under Lieut.-Colonel Woodburn. The battalion was broken up in England he was sent to the adjutant-general's branch in London, remaining there several months. He was an officer to do so reverted to the ranks and crossed to the firing line as a private with the Canadian Engineers. He won his commission on the field a few months later.

#### THE NEW COUNCIL.

An entire new council has been chosen, and apart from His Worship Mayor Murray, not a man has had any previous experience at the Council board.

Citizens have mapped out an extensive program for our Council, but for them we beseech patience as time is necessary even for small results.

Now surely, especially as the necessary by-laws have been passed, the systematizing of the town office work will be accomplished.

The new Council will have a fresh hand to reform its pledges. Let them get to it.

#### CENTRAL STREET SUBWAY.

The matter of the building of a subway from Central street to Union St. is again receiving the attention of our citizens, and now that the war is over, the various organizations of our town should take up the matter in earnest.

That this subway is necessary is admitted by all, and the Graphic understands that the railway officials here have made the request for the placing in the estimates of a sum sufficient to complete this work.

#### THE HOUSING SCHEME.

At the last meeting of the Town Council a resolution was unanimously passed directing the Clerk to apply to the provincial government for \$100,000 of the amount granted New Brunswick under the Dominion scheme for the erection of homes for the returned soldier and working man.

#### Fertilizer Prices.

became an active subject for discussion at the ending of the war. An immediate reduction was expected by many.

If prices had advanced immediately at the beginning of the war a like reduction might be expected at its close, but there was no actual advance in fertilizer prices until the spring of 1918, notwithstanding at that time the war had been on for over three years. This of course did not apply to Potash fertilizers, the supply of Potash being cut off at once.

Late in the fall of 1917 on account of the high prices of fertilizer materials, the scarcity of shipping and the shortage of all fertilizer there was a general feeling that there would not be an adequate supply. This was called to the attention of the Government officials and the manager of the Colonial Fertilizer Company was asked to appear before the Committee on Increased Production of the Nova Scotia Legislature, and gave all possible assistance to relieve the fertilizer shortage.

In the summer of 1918 with the experience of that spring the Agricultural Department of New Brunswick called together the fertilizer manufacturers and recommended they put in a heavy stock of fertilizer materials. The Secretary of Agriculture for Nova Scotia also urged the Colonial Fertilizer Company to put in an extra supply of raw materials IRRESPECTIVE OF THEIR COST. He realized as did the manufacturers the importance of fertilizer to the food supply, and to get large crops fertilizer must be used.

At the close of the war all fertilizer manufacturers in Canada being urged by the government officials, had on hand a very large stock of fertilizer bought at the extreme outside prices quoted in the summer and fall of 1918.

The expected lower prices have not been realized but on the contrary there was a heavy demand for export and prices on some materials have actually advanced.

The sensational report appeared late in March as to heavy reduction in price of fertilizers in Aroostook County. This is traced back to one brokerage firm in New York which is attempting to dispose of undesirable fertilizer materials directly to the farmers. This material is such that no fertilizer manufacturer will buy it, although it has been on the market for sometime and the holders of it are willing to sacrifice it at a cut price. An Aroostook County farmer writes: "Have been investigating the chemicals that the New York firm is offering and have found out that it is taking chances to use it. You may refer to me or any of our Aroostook County boys in reference to this stuff as we have made a close study of these goods and feel quite safe in denouncing its use for the Aroostook County apud." The amount of this material is but a drop in the bucket of the requirements of fertilizer and it is offered cheap because it is a cheap material.

The farmers must decide now, whether or not they are going to plant this season with a falling off of 50 per cent. in the acreage of potatoes and garden trucks in the Southern States and the immense demand for food in Europe, it appears the farmers of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick are in a position to put in a big acreage and get the advantage of the market conditions which must prevail in the fall.

#### TWO EX-PREMIERS IN CABINET

Situation in British Politics That Has Never Before Occurred is Among the Possibilities.

Herbert H. Asquith, former premier, is often mentioned as a possible addition to the present cabinet. The Manchester Guardian points out that if this happens Lloyd George will have two former prime ministers among his subordinates. There is no former instance of this state of things in modern history, and it is a long time now since an English government contained in a secondary place even one former premier.

The classical case occurred about the middle of last century, and is furnished by the case of secession which was followed by Lord John Russell and Lord Palmerston. In the government of 1846-52 Lord John Russell was prime minister and Lord Palmerston foreign secretary, and in the government of 1852-65 their two positions were exactly reversed.

It was Lord John Russell's exceptional fate to be prime minister from the age of fifty-four till that of sixty-two, and in and out of subordinate office, under Lord Aberdeen and then under Palmerston, from sixty to seventy-three, and at that age to be prime minister again.

If Lloyd George gets Mr. Asquith as well as Mr. Balfour he will have all the living former premiers except one, the exception being Lord Rosebery, whose period of office—15 months—was as short as to compare with the meteoric premiership of the age of Caning.

#### FLASH LIGHTS IN UNISON

Fireflies Seem to Have an Understanding as to When to Begin an Illumination.

Various observers testify to the fact that myriads of glow worms very occasionally indulge in synchronous flashing with very beautiful effect. It is thought by some that this phenomenon is accidental, although in this light some cases would seem incredible.

John V. Purcell of Washington, D. C. records that in the town of Colats, island of Madagascar, P. I. a few years ago there were two trees about the size of apple trees and perhaps a hundred yards apart, and every evening these were lit with fireflies which flashed in unison, first one tree lighting up and then the other. There must have been several thousand insects in each tree, yet the synchronism was so perfect that rarely or never did a single firefly flash at the wrong time.

"To the best of my recollection the illumination period lasted about two or three seconds and the period perhaps twice that long. I can positively vouch for the accuracy of the foregoing, for it seemed to me that I produced so beautiful an effect that I thought it one of the most remarkable things in the Philippines, and it made a deep impression on me."

War Brings Peace to New York. All in peace in New York district since the war. A year or so ago any person who wandered through the "Gus House" district, on First avenue from Seventeenth to Twenty-second street, at night usually came away with a bruise on his head and a battered countenance. Many were the actual and alleged breaches of the peace laid to the young manhood of this section of the city. It ran the gamut of everything from riot to murder.

Today all this is changed. Since the "Gus House" district, near the hotel there is an air of refinement and culture in the district. Men neighbors meet on friendly terms and clothes-line fights and feuds between the women are only memories. Gone is the old order of things material. Rights have given way to celebrations in honor of the lads from the district now fighting in France. There are 171 of them from this section and the other night a service flag was unfurled. It showed five gold stars. Two thousand men, women and children, many of them mothers and fathers, lifted their voices in a pean of consecration.

Twice Cited for Bravery. To have been cited by the French for bravery twice since his arrival in France in January is the record of Professor Stephen H. Bush of the University of Iowa. In the wake of the first official announcement came a lengthy cablegram with the details of his second citation. "Courage and tenacity in bringing in wounded over exposed places" were conspicuous on the part of Professor Bush, who is working for the Y. M. C. A. with the Moroccan divisions.

The cablegram further declares that the "French are devoted to Professor Bush and the other Y. M. C. A. workers in his division and are gaining a high opinion of Americans through contact with them." Professor Bush is head of the department of romance languages at the university—Lows University News Letter.

Marked Oats. The appearance of the letter B on oats coming up this season, which is astonishing people in the rural regions of Wisconsin, is less mysterious than what is said to have happened at Zanzibar, where, so report arose, a fish was caught with two inscriptions in Arabic characters on its left. These, as deciphered by scholars, were respectively "The work of God" and "Honor to Allah." The Zanzibar narrative is a fish story—Milwaukee Evening Wisconsin.



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
