The dissatisfaction is growing rapidly, and, unless some proposal for mediation is closed with during the next few days, must involve the company in conflict with all organized labor in this district. Even at the outset the hands of the company are so tied that the discharge of the Empress of India's valuable Oriental cargo, imperatively demanding quick dispatch, is at a standstill, as is also the loading of the Australian liner Aorangi, scheduled to sail on Friday, while an official notification to shippers to issue this afternoon over the signature of General Freight Agent B. W. Greer, reads thus: "Owing to our freight handlers at Vancouver having gone out on strike, we cannot accept any freight for shipment by rail or water until further advised.

The sheds and warehouses are locked and deserted. The freight trains move irregularly and short laden. Consignments, even from or for Victoria, take the roundabout alternative journey via Nanaimo, and the Island Railway. To make the general public inconvenience yet more noticeable, the commercial telegraph service is sadly disarranged through the delivery messagers having gone out in sympathy with the clerks. The strikers have now assurance sympathy and practical support from rirtually all the labor organizations in the city, and those directly in touch with railway interests have supported their resolutions with action. The longshoremen and the teamsters, for example, refuse to touch outgoing or incoming consignments via the C. P. R. Even the coal handlers decline to serve the waiting Empress liner, since her crew assisted in discharging.

President Estes today addressed a statement to the press, in which he maintains that the right to corporate existence is what the strikers ask for. accidentally asphyxiated. GUARDING AGAINST FIRE

Complete Fire-Fighting System At Mrs. Lottie G. Dimon, widow of Henry Higher Cost of Raw Materials Given Their New Foundry At Heavy Cost.

The McClary Manufacturing Company are adopting extraordinary measures to guard against loss by fire at either their new foundry near the Port Stanley tridge, or the tin shop on King street, now being rebuilt after the disastrous blaze a couple of months

Both of the buildings are to be equipped with what are known as automatic sprinklers, similar to those provided in the old London Furniture factory on King street. The sprinklers, which are ten feet apart, are attached to the ceiling on each floor, and they are so large than when opened the floor would soon be flooded and a fire quickly extinguished. Woman Gets a Check for \$66,667 for Loss of Husband.

Mount Vernon, N. Y., March 5 .- District Attorney Young, representing G. Dimon, of New Rochelle, who was killed in the Park avenue tunnel wreck on Jan. 8, 1902, yesterday received a check from the New York Central Railway Company for \$66,667 in behalf of Mrs. Dimon. This check covered a verdict of \$60,000, together with interest and costs.
