The Alaska Commission.

No announcement has yet been made as to the persons who will act as the British members of the Alaska commission. It has been suggested that two of them will be Canadians; one undoubtedly will be; and no harm would be done, but some good, if all three should be from the Dominion.

The treaty calls for a commission of "eminent jurists." The United States Government promptly violates the terms of the treaty by appointing three partisans, with very little claim to be called "jurists," whether eminent or otherwise.

It is frankly stated in the United States papers that the treaty would never have passed the Senate unless the Senators had received some intimation that it would not be carried out strictly.

"First, to assure the hesitating senators that this was not an arbitration in the ordinary sense of the word, but merely an offer to Great Britain to relinquish her boundary claims as the result of demonstration and conviction under peaceful auspices; and, second, that the commissioners on our side would make that assumption their point of departure and listen to no suggestion which pointed in any other direction.

The United States papers, in their references to the commission, are practically unanimous in their recognition of this fact; and some really go so far as to admit that Canada has some grounds for protest. A few declare that, despite their strong views on the subject, the United States commissioners will be quite ready to listen to any good arguments advanced by the Canadian counsel, and give them due weight.

"Canada," says the Washington Star, "must surrender all, or consent to allow this subject to remain open indefinitely as a source of friction between England and the United States."

The liberal party have always protested against the unfair retrograde of constituents, and they can be trusted to live up to their declarations. Adherence to pledge and principle is better than getting a slight party advantage at the cost of both.

The able diplomacy of the United States as a small pledge of our determination to be friends at all hazards. Even if a majority of the commissioners found in our favor, which is more than possible from the legal point of view, but not from the political, we do not for an instant believe, from their record, that our present Government would have the courage to demand and enforce recognition of such a decision from the American Government.

Unfortunately the results of all diplomatic negotiations in the past between Great Britain and the United States, where Canada was concerned, lead us to expect the worst in this case, as in former cases. On our side, territory has been given up, rights have been surrendered, just claims have been abandoned.

It seems a pity that British politicians cannot see the situation aright, even from an imperial point of view. The London Morning Post admits that "England cannot always pay for the good opinion of Washington at the cost of Canadian territory."

Winston Churchill, M. P., is giving the Government a heap of trouble. He grows more like his dad every day. "Where would the farmers be without cities to sell to?" asks Mr. Tarte.

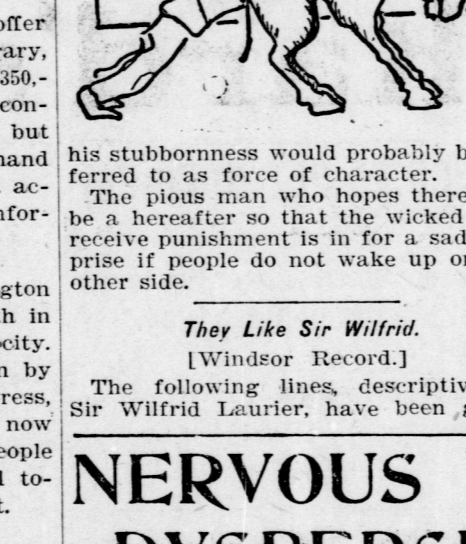
