His fresh, unhackneyed and original way of puting things sometimes startles persons accus-tomed only the ordinary staid and somehat conventional pulpit manner. Dr. Stafford has something of the poet, too, in his composition. We do not mean in mechanical expression, for we are not aware that he has ever written verse, except a small volume published some years ago. We mean an elevation of thought, an epigrammatic force of expression and the frequent use of imagery and figures of speech of a highly picturesque character. Some of his illustrations are quite Dickenslike in their blending of humor and pathos. Others partake more of the quality of an apologue or allegory. Were it not for these gleams of poetry and an occasional vein of subacid sarcasm, which we believe is unconscious and unintentional, he would be considered a coldly intellectual preacher. Dr. Stafford derives no particular advantage from his pulpit manner. In appearance he is tall and commanding, but he is exceedingly spare, indeed has much of the "lean and hungry look" ascribed by Shakes speare to Casius. His voice is not very musical and has some strange modulations, and his gestures are few, but when they occur are natural and emphatic.

The distinguished preacher writes as he speaks with freshness and vigor, but is more apt to drop into a philesophical veen with his pen than in the pulpit. One of his ablest papers is one on the indebtedness of religion to free thought, read at a meeting of the American Philosophical Association and published in the transactions of the society. Another thoughtful production is a volume of judicious counsels on divine guidance. As president of the Toronto Conference and member of successive general conferences, Dr. Stafford has taken an active part in the administration and legislation of the Methodist Church. Ottawa, Sept. 13.—According to the blue book issued from the Department of Marine, the number of sea-going vessels striving in Montreal during the year was 695, against 767, the highest number, in 1887. ### THE METHODISTS.

Splendid Success of the Mani-

ed Change in Discipline Claus

Montreal, Sept. 13.—The Methodist General Conference got through a good deal of work yesterday, receiving a vast number of notices of motion and another batch of memorials. Rev. Dr. Stafford proposed an important change in the dancing and cardplaying clause in the discipline. Rev. Principal Austin presented the annual report of Alma College, St. Thomas, which was referred to the Educational Committee. Rev. James Woodsworth, superintendent was referred to the Educational Committee. Rev. James Woodsworth, superintendent of missions in the Northwest, read his full and encouraging report of four years' work in the region under his charge. It showed that the number of circuits and missions stations had increased from 74 in 1886 to 46 in 1890, an advance of 318 per cent. On the average the missions in this region had only had a dependence on the Missionary Society of some four years and three months. The average salary paid on those independent circuits to married men was \$913, and to single men \$444. In 1886 there were 310 preaching stations, now these had increased to 459. To accommodate these they had only 95 churches, an increase, however, of 35 over 1886. The value of church property had gone up from \$161,240 to \$264,521. The money raised for all purposes has grown from \$50,961 in 1886 to \$111,485, or an average of \$125 per white member. The Indian roll had lengthened from \$42 to 1,109, and the white roll from 4,191 to \$8,786. Not more than 25 per cent. of this increase was due to recent immigration. The Sunday school department had grown from \$4 schools, 555 teachers and 4,073 scholars in 1890. While the church has sent \$33,455 missionary money into the Territories they have already paid back into this fund in the way of subscriptions \$22,112. He spoke in glowing terms of the hopes for the future of that country, and predicted that Manitoba would yet be the premier Province of the Dominion.

Death of Mr. John A. Craig.

Mr. Craig was one of the best known and most highly esteemed commercial travelers in Western Ontario, beloved alike for his genial disposition and manly qualities. He was born in London, on Feb. 10, 1853, and learned the drygoods trade with Mr. A. Sharp. For the last nine years he had been traveling for the wholesale firm of Dickison, Nicholson & Co. In 1881 he was married to Miss Mary E. Young, of Oakville, who died four years ago, leaving two daughters aged 5 and 8 years respectively. Deceased was a consistent Christian and a life-long member of the First Presbyterian Church, holding the position of secretary of the Sunday school for years. He was a member of St. John's Lodge, 209a, A. F. and A. M., and also belonged to the Royal Arcanum and the Oddfellows' societies. The surviving members of the family are Mr. S. H. Craig, Mr. Wm. J. Craig and Mrs. John Stewart, of this city, the remaining sister, Mrs. T. H. Purdom, having died three years ago to-morrow. 

THE NORTH POLAR STAR.

To know "just where you are" on a starry night when away from home may at some time be a matter of importance to the thousands of young readers of the ADVERTISER who are interested in this department. To discover your whereabouts the north polar star must be located, which may very easily be done. This wonderful and reliable northern beacon is always to be found in the same position, hence the name "fixed star." Look for the "big dipper," known as Ursa Major, which is always visible in the northern sky on any bright night. It consists of seven stars and resembles a dipper, which swings around the north polar star every twenty-four hours. Sometimes it is above the north star, sometimes below it; at other times it is to the light, again to the left, according to the hour and season. Although constantly revolving around the north polar star, and consequently at time being upside down, the seven stars composing this remarkable constellation are never separated. No matter what its position the two outside stars of the dipper—not those of the handle—always point in a straight line to the north polar star, which is the first bright star beyond the two referred to. The following diagram will be fully understood:

When upside down of course the position of the "dipper" would be as as follows, while that of the north polar star remains

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
