SEARCHING FOR THE VICTIMS.

At the hour of writing, when darkness has fallen, searchers have found the upper portion of the trunk of one man, with portions of the arms—from the size presumably McDermotts—the foot of another, supposed to a Bradley, and the ear and side of the face of Chambers, known by his whiskers.

How many were in the building at the time is at present unknown. The ground on which the building was situated is strewn with small pieces of bone, and flesh, and the remains of the three kills afready dentified could be put in bushel basket.

FORCE OF THE EXPLOSION.

The building, which was a frame structure about 20x24, is totally wrecked nothing being left but a couple of tanks. A cavity beneath the ruins is about twenty feet in diameter and probably eight feet in

feet in diameter and probably eight feet in depth. As it had partially filled with waten when the first of the frantic crowd arrived it cannot be definitely stated what the cavity contains. Portions of the ruins and the remains were found 100 feet away from the place and for words around from the remains were found 100 feet away from the place, and for yards around, principally to the southward, the direction in which the force of the explosion seemed to have gone, fragments of timbers and attered garments are lying.

Bradley was about 25 and unmarried. Chambers was about 55, with a wife and grown in family. Molternett was a manual process.

Chambers was about 55, with a wife and grown up tainily. McDermott was a man of about 35, with a wife and family of four young children. Never before has anything so disastrous to human life occurred in Petrolea, and the inhabitants are utterly paralyzed. It is rumored that Chambers carried a policy of \$1,000 on his life. Upwards of 2,500 people visited the scene of the disaster, and at \$:30 more were still arriving.

How the explosion occurred will probably never be known. Dr. Lougheed, the coroner, will hold an inquest on the remains to-morrow morning.

AN EASTER SUNDAY TRAGEDY.

Suicide of Two Despendent Young Women—Both Shot with the Same Revolver.

Santa Fe, N. M., April 7.—Details of an Easter Sunday tragedy at White Oaks, N. M., reached here yesterday, the affair being a double suicide, in which two young women, formerly of Liberty, Mo., were the principals. The women were Mrs. Howard Doyle and Miss Jessie Ridgely. Mrs. Doyle had been separated from her husband and had made a confidante of Miss Ridgely. It is thought Mrs. Doyle was despondent and prevailed upon Miss Ridgely to commit suicide at the same time. The bodies of the women were found in a lonely part of the town. Over the heart of each was found a bullet hole. They were clasped in each other's arms, and between them was a revolver, which usually had a place on the mantel in Miss Ridgely's room. Their hats hung on a post near by and their cloaks had been neatly folded and placed as head rests. To each cloak were pinced notes for various friends. One letter expressed the desire that they should be buried in the same grave. None of the letters gave the reason for the act, only, "Death is sweet and we prefer it to life." only, "Death is sweet and we prefer it to life."

Seven Years in Kingston Peni

The prisoner was brought into the court roow about 10:15 and placed in the dock. His wife had seen him previously in the cells, but did not wait to hear the final proceedings. Justice Falconbridge twice asked Marray if he had anything to say why the sentence of the court should not be pronounced on him, but he did not reply. The judge then briefly reviewed the circumstances of the case. The jury, he said, could have arrived at no other verdict than that of manslaughter. As there had been ill-will between the prisoner and Rowe, and the latter had been beaten by him in June or July, there was reason to think that he had born malice towards deceased. rolling up his pants for generations for the
same purpose ought to receive some tecognition. (Laughter). Look at the doctrine
of apontaneous generation. Take's rifle,
some powder and a bullet, lay them to
gether, and they would stay till eternity
before anything happened. But, let some
intelligent agent put in the powder, put
the bullet on top, pull the triger, and
when the spark is ignited the bullet is

Now that the regulations are much more severe, an increase of this class of immigrants may be expected to take place. The new law prohibits steamship and transportation companies from encouraging immi gration to the United States, in direct opposition to the new policy of the Dominion Government, which is to devote a consider able sum to subsidise the steamship com able sum to subsidise the steamship com-panies to bring settlers to Canada. The following classes are prohibited from landing at any United States port: Paupers, felons, lunatics, polyga-mists, contract laborers, and danger-ous patients. The law provides that all immigrants who come in violation of law shall be immediately sent back on the ship that brought them over; but, should that be impracticable, sney may be returned at any time within a year after their arrival. Any alien who may become a public charge during his first year shall be sent back to the country from which he that be impracticable, they may be returned

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
