

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

THE FRENCH MINE HORROR.

All Rope of Further Rescue Abandoned—Bad Management the Cause of the Disaster.

Paris, Dec. 8.—The hope that some of the miners imprisoned by the falling walls of the chambers in the Puits de la Manufacture mine at St. Etienne, France, where the explosion occurred Sunday, are still alive, has been abandoned. The air in the mine is still foul and stiffing, and men who have been down in it say it would be impossible for any one to live in it for any length of time. The work of removing bodies is necessarily slow.

There are yet twelve bodies in the lower gallery. It has now been ascertained beyond all doubt that the disaster was due to the action of the manager of the mine,

beyond all doubt that the disaster was due to the action of the manager of the mine, who ordered that the ventilating apparatus be stopped. He had received no such authority from the engineer to stop the machinery. The President has sent one of his aides-de-camp to convey his condolences to the wives and relatives of those who were killed, and to distribute relief where needed.

The families of many of the dead miners are miserably poor, and this prompt action of the President in the direction of meeting their most pressing necessities will be an invaluable aid to them. This afternoon there were 41 bodies lying under the sheds awaiting identification.






