Paris, March 6 .- News of a hurricane at Tamatave, on the east coast of Madagascar, Tamatave, on the east coast of minagacutar, on Feb. 22, has been received to-day. The wind came from the sea and struck the vessels near the mouth of the bay. The Alsimo, a French ship, was stripped almost instantly of masts and rigging and a few minutes later went to the bottom with all on board. Five coasting vessels anchored within the harbor foundered almost simultaneously. All but ten men of their crews were saved. Four other coasters sank before the storm had passed. In Tamatave the streets were swept clean of people and vehicles in a minute. Twenty-two of the best buildings in the place and a large number of huts were wrecked. The roof of the custom house was carried away and the walls were crushed in. The British consulate was demolished and four sugar factories were leveled to the ground. Provisions of the Treaty Between the Two.

OTTAWA, March 7.—Just before the adjournment of the House last night Hon. Mr. Foster laid on the table the text of the new trade treaty with France. The agreement between the two countries is as follows:

lows:

ARTICLE I.

Wines, sparkling and non-sparkling, common scaps, savons de Marseille (castile scaps), and nuts, almonds, prunes and plums of Fiench origin entering Canada shall enjoy the following advantages:

1. Non-sparkling wines gauging 15° by the centessimal alcohol meter or leas, or according to the Canadian system of testing containing 28 per cent., or less, of alcohol, and all sparkling wines shall be exempted from the surtax or ad valorem duty of 30 per cent.

2. The present duty charged on common scaps, savous de Marseille (castile scaps), shall be reduced by one-half.

3. The present duty charged on nuts, almonds, prunes and plums shall be reduced by one-third.

A PETROLEA HORROR!

PETROLEA, Feb. 7.—A terrible accident occurred at Marthaville to-day about 10:30 a.m., in which two men lost their lives and another was seriously injured. MISS WILLARD HONORED.

Lady Somerset Writes About an American Woman.

Temperance Reform-The Famous Englishwoman Gives an Elequent Tribute.

Remarkable as has been the power of our trans-Atlantic friends to attract im-mense audiences and awaken British enthusiasm, none has evoked more universa interest than has Miss Frances E. Willar interest than has Miss Frances E. Willard during her three months' stay in England. In this age of great convenings it is not often that a single meeting marks an epoch, even though it be in the interest of a reform that has now forged its way to the front in the politics of England's regnant party, and, mirabile dictu, finds a place in the Queen's speech to Parliament. This is a statement noteworthy indeed, but it is strue of the national welcome, for it was nothing less, accorded to America's White Ribbon leader at the recent great meeting in Exeter Hall.

On the hugh platform were seated men and women whose names are household words throughout the English speaking race, side by side with the leaders of the labor movement and the Salvation Army—a delegation appointed from the Methodist Church, the Baptist, the Congregational, the Society of Friends, elbowed canons of the Established Church, the temperance leaders of the Catholic hierarchy, while the chief Jewish rabbi sent a congratulatory letter and signed the address of welcome, which was also attested by 300 local unions of the British Women's Temperance Association.

Nothing could exceed the enthusiasm with which the speaker of the evening was greeted. The vast audience rose with a cheer on their lips, and for several minutes the expression of their admiration seemed as though it would never subside.

After such a greeting it was not an easy task to organize a demonstration worthy to be compared with that of Exeter Hall; but the United Kingdom Alliance, the strongest temperance society in Great Britain, proved equal to the undertaking. Five thousand persons assembled on consecutive evenings in the great Free Trade Halliu Manchester, the headquarters of the alliance. Canon Wilherforce and Sir Wilfrid Lawson were the chairmen. Testimonials were presented by the alliance and other temperance societies, and the entire audience rose to receive Miss Willard, a greeting which was perhaps excelled only by the enthusiasm which brought them to their feet again and caused a hearty British cheer to echo through the historic hall as she closed her speech.

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THE CREAT ROCK. A London Pastor's Interesting Ded and One scription of Gibraltar.

> Rev. Joseph Philp Writes to His Congregation-Pen Picture of the World's Greatest

Rev. Joseph Pnilp, the enterprising pastor of the Centennial Methodist Church, who is touring abroad will write letters to his congregation while away. One of them written on the Mediterranean Sea, Feb. 14, was read from the Pulpit Sunday. Appended are a few extracts from it:

"As I shall be very busy when I reach Italy, I write you again before leaving the steamer. The days that have passed since I wrote last are just as calm as the preceding days of our voyage. In a few hours we expect to reach Genoa, when we leave our ship. We are now in the Gulf of Lyons. Monday was an interesting day. I arose at an early hour, 4 o'clock by meridian and 12 midnight, by my watch, which still has London time. We were sailing into Gibraltar Bay, and I was anxious to see the fort as we approached. We cass anchor at 5 o'clock and waited for day. When the sun rose and flung his light over the gray marble fort and the purple mountains of Spain and Morocco, and over the blue waters of the bay, it was a scene of gorgeous splendor. I wished for the eye and mind of a painter that I might preserve on canvas the beauty of the scene. The town before us seemed small, because of the height of the rock, and we wondered where they could house the 216,000 inhabitants. When we had gone through the town, we understood. Shortly after 6 am. we were taken into port on a small tug. Carriages and a guide were provided for us, and we made the best of an hour and a half on shore. It is an oriental town, where blend people of many nations; the whitefaced, red-coated English soldiers, the lank, sallow-faced Spaulard, the swarthy, turbaned Moor, the long-bearded Jew, the sable African, etc. The streets were nearly fitteen feet wide, filled with people, horses, mules and goats. The nules and smaller donkeys were laden in true eastern style—a large basket on their sides, and often a woman and child perched on top. Men drove goats through the streets and milked them at the doors, selling froth with the milk, but no water thrown in. We saw oranges ripe on th

"Now, I ask my honorable friends in this House who believe in the principle of protection, but who may have some grievance now and then, and here and there, with the tariff; I ask them to weigh these assertions; for whatever the proposition that these gentlemen are putting before the House tonight for us to vote upon, it is with the spirit and the purpose of destroying the principle of protection in this country. A man may have a grudge, may have an objection, to some particular excresence upon the tariff; but he may be at the same time a firm believer in the principle of protection, and may wish to see it survive in this country."

The gauge of battle is thus set, and the atmosphere is cleared. We have a firm belief that when the combat opens the great majority of the people will be found working for the triumph of the interests of the many as opposed to that of the combines and rings, every one of which—and we say it without fear of successful contradiction—are now, and have been in every recent campaign, on the side of those who, like Mr. Foster, stick to the class "protectionist" system of collecting taxation.

Mungo Fraser, pastor of Knox Church, Hamilton, deliver an interesting lecture entitled "From Egypt to Jerusalem." Rev. Charles Smith opened the meeting with prayer, after which Miss Louise Daly and Mr. Forsythe rendered solos very creditably, Mr. J. W. Fetherston presiding at the organ. Dr. Eccles acted as chairman, and betore introducing the speaker thanked the ladies of the church for again conferring the honor of chairman upon him. Dr. Fraser in opening said his lecture was a continuation of the one previously delivered. He described various points of interest along the route, until coming to Tel-el-Kebir, at which place was a cemetery where were buried scores of Britain's best soldiers, slain by Arabs in the Egyptian war.
