THE CROW'S NEST PASS.

Western Ontario. Work on the Road Progressing Favorably.

> Winnipeg, Man., Aug. 16.-Mr. R. B. Van Horne, son of Sir Wm. Van Horne, reached the city last evening from the west and proceeds to Montreal today. Mr. Van Horne has been a member of a surveying party locating the line of the Crow's Nest Pass Railway. He states that the work on the line is progressing rapidly. There are over 50 outfits, employing 3,000 men, at work on the first hundred miles. Bridging has been commenced and about four miles of track laid. A temporary yard has been laid out at Lethbridge. Work has been commenced on the erection of the station and office buildings at McLeod. As soon as the necessary lumber is received building will be commenced on the storehouses and powder magazines at Wardner, B.C., and Sand Creek. An outfit is at work building a construction road through the mountains to enable implements and supplies to go into the mountain camps. As soon as frost sets in rock work will be commenced in earnest, and bridging will be pursued vigorously from both sides of the mountains. Eight parties are locating and revising the line west of the summit. Grading will be finished well up to the summit by Dec. 1, and by that time the line will be in running order to Crow's Nest Lake. When completed the line will be probably the lightest on record through the mountains. The maximum grade is 1 per cent, and the maximum curvature six degrees. It is expected that for rapidity and amount of construction, the work will be a record-breaker.

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

Then some one said that if people would only learn to eat orange vithout sugar, even when quite tart they would find them comparatively harmless. And sure enough, a couple of oranges eaten in the morning, with out extra sweetening, are an entirely different kind of food from the same

fruit eaten with sugar.

The same thing is true, to a degree with strawberries. True, they are of-ten too tart, not to say really sour, to be enjoyed without being abund antly powdered with fine sugar, but they are far more wholesome eaten they grow. The luxury of cream strawberries can be indulged in b young people whose activity and fresh healthy condition challenge what would be a great risk for older people and those of a dyspeptic tendency.

There probably are no healthier—or more healthful—fruits grown than apples and peaches. These are eaten without any extra sweetness being needed unless when cooked in som way. It is remembered that peaches and cream are delicious, and sugar i often added when peaches are thus served as a supper dish, but the great proportion are eaten in a natura state, and when ripe how very se dom they hurt anyone. I have heard an experienced physician say he has allowed a perfectly ripe peach to be




