#### Here's a Mystery

New York, April 26 .- When the guard relief marched to Post 8 in the Fort Hamilton reservation yesterday to relieve Private Alfred Cargswell of the coast artillery, doing sentry duty, it found the soldier dead, a bullet wound in his head. and his arms on the ground beside him. On the morning of April 12, when the relief marched to the same post at the same time to relieve Private Julius Von Glahn, it found Von Glahn dead, a bullet wound through his head.

The post runs along the bluff overlooking Gravesend Bay, and the tour of duty during which both tragedies took place begins at midnight and ends at 8 in the morning. It is distant from the barracks and is one of the loneliest posts patroled at night. Nothing was known of the death of either sentry until the relief discovered the bodies. No shots were head. A chamber of his revolver was empty. In the case of Von Glahn there was found an exploded cartridge in his Krag-Jorgensen. It is suggested that both had been picked off by some distant enemy, and had fired their weapons in defense.

### **NEW BILL DOUBLES** THE RAILWAY TAX

Revenue To Be Split Between Govt. and Municipalities.

TO BE USED FOR POOR INSANB

All Bank Agencies to Pay a Tax Vereafter-The Conditions of the Measure.

[Special to The Advertiser.]

Toronto, April 26 .- The introduction of the Government's measure for railway taxation, the important feature of yesterday's sitting of the Legislature, was followed by an animated discussion, in which the Pettypiece bill and ts indorsation by the Conservatives, when in Opposition, played a prominent part.

Briefly summed up, the main fear ures of the measure are as follows: The present tax on railways over 150 miles long is doubled, the new tax being \$60 per mile, and \$20 for each additional track, and in unorganized territories, \$40 and \$10. Rural electric railways running on public highways will be taxed. After deducting charges for collection and the expenses of the railway commission, the amount received from railway taxation will be exactly divided, one-half being retained by the Province, and the other to the municipalities, which, noneys for the maintenance of poor insane patients. The receipts from the present bill total between \$180,000 and \$190,000, and as this will be exactly doubled, the same sum will be left for distribution among the municipalities, after the deduction of the charges

Its main recommendation was that railways be taxed 3 per cent on their gross earnings. The Government, after careful consideration, was of the opinion that such a tax could be successfully challenged by the railways. It also meant an indirect tax on the people, which could not be imposed by the Province under its present powers. Among the authorities supporting this view was the late Hon. Mr. Hardy. The Government had therefore decided, and the bill provided, that the present system of taxation should be retained, but that the rate should be doubled. ### DOWIE'S DOWNFALL A LA SOLOMON

Thousands of strangers flocked to Zion in the afternoon expecting to see Dowie and witness a clash between his followers and those of Voliva. They were disappointed, for Dowie remained at his apartments in the Auditorium Annex, forty miles away, while his rival delivered him-
