TYPHOID AT LANGTON

Forty Cases Have Developed and Cause Remains a Mystery.

Langton, Ont., Nov. 20. - The continued prevalence of typhoid fever in Langton is causing much excitement among residents of this town. There are unwards of 40 cases of the disease now under treatment, or have been, with five deaths so far reported since the disease broke out. It is believed that impure water is the cause, but samples taken from the wells in the usual way have been sent to Toronto for analysis, and have tested out fairly well, so that the authorities are now looking elsewhere for the cause of infection. The provincial authorities should look into the matter at once.




