

TEARING DOWN DECORATIONS

Crewe's Message Congratulates Canada Upon Success-Indomitable Is Travelling Fast.

Quebec, Que., July 30. - The tercentenary festivities are now in their dying hours. Already the removal of the decorations has begun, and within 24 hours the arches, ensigns and immortal mottoes which have adorned the city for two weeks past will have been removed, and Quebec will then settle to the commercial grind of everyday life once more. This morning there was to have been a parade, but this has been cancelled owing to

There are still five or ten thousand strangers in the city, but they are making preparations for their departure. The French frigates are still in the harbor, and the hour of departure is still but a matter of conjecture. The Aube had the misfortune to break her anchor chain some days ago, and all efforts to lift the anchor from the bed of the river have so far proved futile. It is hoped, however, that by tomorrow or Saturday this will be accomplished, and if so the two warships will sail immediately.

### AN AERIAL FLEET FOR GERMANY

Will Ultimately Have Thirty Airships Suitable for War Purposes.

Berlin, July 30-While Count Zeppe lin is preparing for his great trial with his aluminum airship, other experiments with semi-rigid and entirely flexible dirigible balloons are proeeding in various parts of the country under the supervision of Government officials. It is understood that by the end of the year the military authorities will possess eight dirigible balloons suitable for war purposes Two of these will be of the Geppelin model, with a gas capacity of about half a million cubic feet. The taking over of these depends upon the result of the endurance flight and their ability to descend on dry land.



The meetings of the congress have been exceedingly well attended and the greatest interest has been displayed in the discussions, the most important of which was that of today, on the subject of the arrest of armament.

"Make it clear," Mr. Trueblood continued, "that we are not urging immediate disarmament, but a scheme by which the increasing expenditure for armaments can be stopped.

It cost the Government to plant young trees in heavy soil, \$15 an acre, while in more favorable soil the cost was from \$5 to \$10 an acre. Some of the waste soil in Ontario now being planted by the Government consisted of about 300 to 400 square niles, which was once cultivated, but was subsequently given up. In Lambton County from 30,000 to 40,000 acres of land was fast approaching a condition of waste, by being covered with sand. When No. 1 was told later of this vain effort to reach him on a matter of importance to himself, he exclaimed, "We have a telephone. Why can't we be called?" It took a representative of the telephone company some time to convince him that the trouble was due to an overload of business on his one line. He was finally convinced, however, and now two lines give him adequate service.
