



COUNTRY'S REVENUE CLOSE TO \$170,000,000

Increase For Last Fiscal Year Will Approximate Thirty-Three Millions.

the Dominion for the fiscal year which closes on Monday next-will be close to \$170,000,000, according to the figures to date of the Finance Department. This represents an increase of approximately thirty-three millions over the revenue of the preceding fiscal year. The total expenditure for the year is estimated at between \$153,000,000 and \$154,000,000, leaving a surplus of some sixteen millions over all expenditures on both consolicated fund and capital accounts. Last year the total expenditure was \$131,046,764, or some twenty-three millions less than the Government has

On consolidated fund account this year the total expenditure will be about \$111,000,000, and on capital and special accounts about \$43,000,-The increased cost of the administration of ordinary business o the Government this year under Premier Borden has been approximately tnirteen million dollars.

The steadily growing revenue under the Fielding tariff will, however, enable Finance Minister White to present next month a budget statement showing [another record surplus of revenue over all ordinary

TORONTO, HAMILTON HARD HIT BY GALE

Ninety Miles an Hour Wind Did Great Damage at Ambitious City.

SWEPT ACROSS TORONTO

Wind Plays Haves in Streets, Carrying Away Several Buildings Under Construction

Hamilton, March 21. - Hamilton nows after its experiences today omething of the terrors of an equinoctial gale. From one o'clock till a late hour this evening a hurricane blew through this city, carrying havoc and suffering in its wake. It is difficult to estimate the damage done. No one suffered to any alarming extent, but the number of those affected

will be in the hundreds. A conservative estimate is \$100,000. This morning it rained, and just before noon a very warm breeze sprang up. In an hour this was followed by perfect hurricane. The velocity of the wind could not have been less

than 90 miles an hour.

The ice was blown out of the bay in record time, and at the beach the sight of the waves running mountains high was one long to be rememberer. At first citizens were not inclined to take the matter seriously, but as the hours passed, and the violence of the wind showed no signs of abating, everybody spent a few anxious hours. Hundreds of chimneys throughout the city were blown down. In the vicinity of Lottridge street alone thirty chimneys were destroyed. This will give a faint idea of the way the wind performed. In the centre of the city pedestrians found it hard Heavy Losses.

Women were unable at times to make their way along, and flying shingles, slates, debris made the task exceedingly dangerous. Dozens of plate glass windows in the business streets were destroyed. The workmen were just putting the finishing touches on the three magnificent plate glass windows for Heintzman & Co.'s new store when a terrific gust crashed into them, and hurled the glass in fragments into the middle of the street. Others to suffer heavy loss in this respect were T. H. Pratt & Co., P. Arland, the Union Bank, the Central Club and others. Swinging signs were blown helter skelter. A large sign over the Hilda Cigar Company, built of steel, was crumpled up like paper. A big steel sign over a clothing store in front of the city hall was blown over like a paper fan, and the lesson of the day was not to pin any faith on a swinging or overhead sign when the wind was blowing 90 miles an hour. At the corner of Main and James streets, where the Federal Life building stands, it was impossible to stand up under the force of the wind. There is a heavy projecting copper cornice on this building, and it was ripped and torn in such a manner that the police were afraid it would the street was roped off for the safety







On Easter morning it is said that the sun dances-always with joy, sometimes with the cold, and often behind the curtain of cloud in this, part of the world. Coming at the equinox, when spring is just picking the shell of winter to get out, Easter shows not one green leaf.

Still, half the fun of this festival is in its movable character. It is as fickle as the moon, no more, no less. Its whims are as interesting as the weather, or as woman, whom Virgil has described as "varying and mutable ever." If some people had their way and made a cast-iron, permanent calendar, fixing holidays on the same day of the month and of the week, each year, life would lose a season-

Easter is one of the standard beginnings of spring. Then birds and flowers appear with one leap, upon the ladies' hats. Creation makes its annual repetition, in Paris fashions. No doubt, with these things, to some extent, love is born.

But it is astonishing at how many points we may hold that spring begins. Born in March or May, it was conceived at the winter solstice, when the sun turned back, and 'Halcyon Days' were welcomed by the Greeks, in Solonian Athens or at Jinana in 1913. Every fine, mild day in January or February is said to have a breath of spring in it. Poets, drawing their traditions from sun-burnt Provence, call St. Valentine's Day the opening feast of spring and love. Then birds find their summer mates and get ready for migration. To the farmer, true son of earth, first plowing or sap running, is the date to reckon by. The equinox introduces the longer days at least. Easter is the church's season of victory over winter, darkness and death. April Fools' Day stands for the mad intoxication of the year's new life, when the lunatic takes his flannels off. May Day brings the crane in new houses, or the leaders of European riots. Midbears the musk-rose, the nightin gale and the maple leaves; finally the good old 24th is hailed by cynics as the only genuine spring-day, after many false dawns, in a land where seven months are winter and the rest are mostly fall." Dainty Dishes

For Easter

Make potato salad in the ordinary way, but instead of placing it in a large salad bowl make a little mound on a bed of lettuce leaves in individual dishes. In the centre place rings of hard-boiled eggs, a spoonful of boiled salad dressing, and olives cut in small

Lemon Whip.

Cover 1/4 box of gelatine with 4 table-speens of cold water; let stand 1/4 hour and add 1 cup boiling water, 1/2 cup sugar, juice of 1 lemon; stir until the sugar is dissolved and set in cold place to stiffen. When congealed, but not really hard, add the unbeaten whites of two eggs and beat all to a stiff white froth. Turn into a pudding mold and set aside several hours to harden. Serve with vanilla sauce made from the yolks of eggs and 2 cups of milk, with a vanilla flavoring.

Eggs and Cheese. Two cups tomato pulp, 1 teaspoonful of grated onion, 1 tablespoon of minced red pepper or dash of cayenne pepper salt and celery salt to taste, 1 pound

of cheese, 2 eggs, 1½ cup of milk, 1 tablespoon of butter, toast or crackers. Melt the butter in a hot saucepan, and add the onion, pepper and salt. Add the tomato pulp, mix well and when bubbling stir in the cheese which has been broken into small pieces. Stir until soft; then beat the eggs in the milk and add to the cheese mixture. Serve at once on small rounds of toast or crackers.

Orange Whips.

Six tablespoonfuls of cornstarch, cupfuls of milk, 4 tablespoonfuls sugar, 2 oranges, 1 tablespoonful outter and 2 eggs. Mix the milk gradually with the cornstarch, put into saucepan and bring to a boil. Add the butter, the sugar and the yolks of eggs, and boil for eight minutes, stirring all the time. Stir in the juice and grated rind of the oranges and allow the mixture to cool a little. Beat up the whites of eggs to a stiff froth, and stir lightly through the rest. Set in a mold and turn out when firm. Serve with

EGGS FOR EASTER WERE SCARCE ON THE MARKET

Commission Dealers Bought of it as a plaything it was left near-Large Numbers Early in the Week to Ship Away.

The feature of the local market today was the scarcity of fresh eggs. The
supply offered for sale did not commence
to satisfy the demand by any means.
The quantity of eggs offered today was
the smallest of any Easter market in the
last five or six years. The scarcity was
caused by the wholesalers buying large
quantities earlier in the week and shipping the eggs to outside markets. As a
presult the prices today were considerably higher than earlier in the week.
Strictly fresh eggs were quoted at 25c
to 25c per doz. on the market, and the
demand was brisk even at these prices.
The sales, per crate, were made at 22c
to 23c per doz. In the dairy hall the
wornen would not sell for less than 28c
per doz., and in a few cases 30c was obper doz., and in a few cases 30c was obtained.

Large Butter Supply.

The supply of butter was larger than that of any preceding day this week, and the prices were slightly easier. Roll butter was quoted at 29c and 30c per lb., and crock butter at 28c. In the dairy hall the prevailing price was 32c.

The quantity of maple syrup sold today was larger than that of any other day this season, and the prices ranged from \$1.35 to \$1.50 per gal. The average price was \$1.40. A large number of the buyers purchased syrup, and the sales were brisk. Large Butter Supply.

price was \$1 40. A large number of the buyers purchased syrup, and the sales were brisk.

The attendance today was much smaller than had been expected, and in consequence the demand in all lines, with the exception of apples, was brisk. The attendance of buyers was also a disappointment, but as the day progressed the number of buyers increased. Very little hay, straw or grain was offered, and the prices remained firm. Although only a few loads of hay were seld the prices showed a downward teney, and \$12 50 was the average price per ton. Oats were scarce and the prices ranged from \$1 05 to \$1 10 per cwt. The average prices were \$1 08 and \$1 09 per cwt. Wheat was firm at \$5c per bu.

The expectable section of the market was of a fair size, but as the demand was not greater than the supply there was but one change in the prices, were sfghtly firmer than for some days past. The wholesale prices were 90c and \$5c per bag, and the retail prices per bag were \$1 and \$1 05. A smaller supply of cabbages than usual was offered but the prices did not change.



Another man attempted to walk across the Pere Marquette bridge, leading into Chelsea Green, and after getting out about four feet was neary blown into the river. He had to get on his hands and knees and crawl back to safety.

A taxicab belonging to a local garage was stalled at the foot of the Dundas street hill while endeavoring to return to the city Friday afternoon after o'clock, the wind being stronger than its power.

FRENCH CREW SAVED BY GALLANT ENGLISH

Thrilling Rescue From Waves by Trawler in the North

[Canadian Press.]

Grims'v Eng., March 22. - The French bark Marie, from San Francisco for Hull, at the end of her long voyage today met with disaster and destruction, which gave occasion for the heroic rescue of her captain and crew of 24 men by the trawler Amer. The Marie went ashore last night on Halsborough Sands in the North Sea during a blizzard, and was being pounded to pieces by terrific seas. The crew was in a desperate plight, and

had almost lost hope when the Amer hove in sight, launched her lifeboat and took off the crew. The capta - and mate of the Marie retused to leave their ship until every of the crew had been saved and taken on board the Amer. The Amer's lifeboat was too much battered by the waves to return to the Marie, so the trawler stood by all through the night.

At daylight the steward of the French bark, who had been brought with his comrades on board the Amer, dived into the sea with a lifeline and swam to the wreck from which he and the captain and mate were ultimately dragged through the sea to the

rescuing vessel. They were landed here some hours having suffered considerably fr. m their perilous experiences.

BURNED TO DEATH IN HIS OWN HOTEL

Caught in Upper Apartment by Flames He Was Unable to Escape.
