# RMAN SUBMARINE CREWS AT OSTEND

# ACT WHICH BROUGHT HONOR OF THE ENEMY

Pte. Harry Brown, Mounted Rifles, Lived Here Six Months Refuse To Board U-Boat and with Sister Before Signing On With C. E. F. Unit-One Day in Trenches Brought Death and Glorv.

Pie. Harry Brown, winner of the first Victoria Cross awarded to any spldier who enlisted in this city, gained the most covetted honor in the British army at the cost of his own life.

Press dispatches appearing in The Morning Advertiser announced that his name, wit' one other Canadian soldier from Toronto, Sergt. Frederick Hobson, appeared in the lafest list of Canadians who had won the V. C.

Although his home was near Ganano-que, where he was born, Pie. Brown enlisted in this city, where for more than six months previously he was employee of the National Brass Company, and worked as a munitions worker. He came to London to be with his sister, Mrs. Charles Egelton, 253 Briscoe street with whom he lived prior to enlisting in August, 1916, with the Canadian Mounted Riffes.

Not 19 Years Old.

The gallant young soldier was not 19 years of age when he was killed, and had been but one day in the trenches. He went to the front line or August 17, 1917, and the following day was so badly wounded that he died. During that one day his performance was such that the highest honor in the gift of the British army was awarded him even though that honor wes a postnumous one.

Heavy Naval Engagement Reported By Petrograd, One Muscovite Warship Being Sent. To Bottom-Nearly All of Crew Rescued, Germans Claim Russian Fleet Is Trapped 10,000 Prisoners and 50 Guns Taken On Oesel Island.

Berlin, Oct. 18.—Via London.—The Germans have taken 10,000 prisoners and 50 guns on Oesel Island, the war office reports.

The Russian naval forces in the Gulf of Riga have been trapped by the Germans, according to the announcement. It says German naval units are lying in the eastern portion of Kassar Bay, north of Oesel Island, and are barring the passage westward.

Petrograd, Oct. 18.—A naval battle has occurred in Gulf of Riga between Russian and German battleships, the war office announces. The Russian battleship Slava was sunk.

The Slava sank as the result of being hit several times beneath the water line. Nearly all the members of the crew were saved by Russian torpedoboats.

The Slava, built in 1903, was an old type battleship of 13,516 tons, 397 feet in length, 76 feet beam and 26 feet draft. Her armament consisted of four 12-inch and twelve 6-inch guns, with twenty-four secondary battery guns and four torpedo tubes. Her speed was 18 knots. She had a complement of 825 men.

The Slava was stationed in the Gulf of Riga as long ago as April, 1916, in which month the German admiralty reported having dropped bombs upon her in that gulf, several hits and a fire being reported. Her men were involved in the disaffection in the Baltic fleet which fol lowed the revolution, but later were restored to favor.

#### **DEPUTY REGISTRAR** NAMED TO PASS ON PASSPORT REQUEST

Given Power To Grant Passes To Eligibles.

MILITIA CONTROL ENDS

Officers No Longer Responsible for Class One Men Leaving Country.

Residents of Canada who are in Class 1, under the military service act and who wish to leave the country must first obtain permission from the registrar or deputy registrar, who is in charge of the military service registrations in their district, according to an official telegram received at militia headquarters today.

Previous regulations stated that all men of that class being in reality soldiers on leave, were required to secure a pass from the military authorities before they could leave the country. The information received today places the power in the hands of the registrar, and leaves it to him to decide whether permission should be granted or not. The military authorities have nothing further to do with it, according to local headquarters.

No word had been received at the office of the registrar or deputy registrar today with regard to the new regulation, but as the military authorities have been notified it is considered as correct. It is not known whethere a bond of \$1,000 is to be demanded of every man who leaves the country, as no information has reached that this is being done in other places.



The chief also maintains that policemen cannot be replaced as easily as some in other occupations.

All gardeners who worked vacant land this year have been asked to send in their reports," said Ald. Manness. "We have already had some and we want them all."

The heavy growth of trees at the back end of the garden keeps the sunshine from there and the returns there are poor. We had excellent success with our onions and vegetable marrow squash.

## Should You Be Exempt?

Every facility is afforded those who have reasonable ground for applying for exemption under the Military Service Act. Each man's case will be considered by a local, civil board, sitting in the locality where he lives, and will be decided as is desirable in the national interest. The idea behind the Military Service Act is to call up first only those whose absence from civilian occupations will cause least disturbance to the country's economic and social life. One hundred thousand reinforcements—no more—are to be raised under the Act.

#### Cases of Exemption

Over 1,250 civic tribunals have been organized throughout Canada, known as Exemption Tribunals. These boards are comprised of 2 members, one appointed by the county judge and one by a joint committee of Parliament. It will be seen that these tribunals are non-military and independent. The members are men closely acquainted with conditions in the places where they sit and will be able to give each case sympathetic attention.

#### National Interest Will Govern Exemptions

Consideration will be given to applications for exemption received from men engaged in the production or manufacture of commodities necessary to the conduct of the war and the support of those at home and cases in which real hardship would be caused by the withdrawal. Not all men who register these claims will be exempted, but such claims will receive careful consideration. National interest must govern.

#### **Promptness is Essential**

Prompt application for exemption is strongly urged upon all who, being included in the first class, believe they deserve exemption. But first visit a Medical Board and find out if any further action is required. Unless the Medical examination places you in Category A., you will have no immediate obligation for service.

### ALL EMPLOYERS ARE **BOUND TO SEE THAT EMPLOYEES REPORT**

BRITISH MADE

If Any Workman Fails His Boss Must Tell.

FINES ARE PRESCRIBED

Local Tribunals Must Be Unanimous of State Case for Appeal.

OTTAWA, Oct. 17.—The duties of employers under the military service act are laid down in regulations which will be issued here shortly. After the time limit for reporting for service or claiming exemption has expired (in the present case November 10), every employer must ascertain if any of his men have failed to report or to claim exemption. The employer is required to answer any questions put to him by his employer for this purpose. The employer must then report, which, if any, of his men have failed to comply with the call. An employer who refuses or neglects to comply with the regulations is liable to a fine of not more than \$100 and not less than \$50, or to imprisonment.

The employer who knowingly retains

prisonment.

The employer who knowingly retains in his service a desetter or a man absent without leave is liable to imprisonment for a term not more than six months or a fine of less than \$100 and not more than \$500.

A local tribunal is not to allow an application for exemption on conscientious grounds unless the applicant signifies in writing his willingness to perform, when required, non-combatant work, including work in the Medical Corps, the Army Service Corps and the Mechanical Transport.

A person aggrieved by a decision of the local tribunal or the military representative may take the case to an appeal tribunal. Notice of this must be given not later than three clear days after the date on notice of the decision of the tribunal received by the applicant or the military representative.


