### GREAT BRITAIN WAS SUPREME IN THE AIR WHEN WAR WAS ENDED

London, Jan. 23.—Great Britain was predominant in the air at the close of the war, when the British air force was the largest in the world, according to a report made public today. It fought on more fronts than the air service of any other nation, and its successes were proportionately greater,

In August, 1914, the British naval and military air services together mustered only 283 officers and 1,853 men of other ranks. In November, 1918, there were 30,000 officers and 264,000 men. At the outbreak of the war Britain had 166 airplanes, 45 seaplanes and 7 airships, while at the close of hostilities she had 21,000 airplanes, 1,300 seaplanes and 103 airships. Besides this, there were 25,000 airplanes and seaplanes being built and 55,000 airplane engines under



Dr. Knowles was the chief witness for the defence. He had completed his direct evidence, and put in the manuscripts of several sermons as evidence, and his cross-examination was under way. When he reached the point where he was beginning to convict himself, his memory failed. He could not or would not intelligently tell the court what he taught or what the Methodist Church taught in regard to certain simple, fundamental doctrines. At this point the court adjourned for the day, and the cross-examination of Dr. Knowles was to be continued next morning. But he did not return. His counsel told the court that his client was in a nervous collapse and could not appear. He also expressed his intention of withdrawing from the case as counsel, and his willingness to withdraw all the evidence which he had already submitted. The court urged him to continue, but he intimated that the case might go against them, and he wished to go while the going was good. But the court refused to allow him to withdraw. The counsel for the prosecution suggested an adjournment, but Dr. Knowles sent in through his counsel a signed statement in which he stated his refusal to again appear. His physician said that an adjournment of weeks or months would be of no service, as the same mental condition would reappear after months if the cross-examination were resumed.

### BOLSHEVISM FIRST SUCCESSFUL REVOLT AGAINST CAPITAL

Initial Win For Labor, Says H. B. Ashplant.

URGES MINIMUM WAGE

Prof. Wood Says That Is Remedy-Unskilled Labor To Be Paid.

The problems involved in the relationship between capital and labor generally, and the Russian Bolshevist move ment in particular, were discussed at considerable length at the "citizenship" meeting in the city hall last evening. Rev. R. W. McIntosh occupied the chair. Professor Louis A. Wood, pro fessor of political economy at the West-tern University, delivered a half-hour address on the question of capital's re-lation to labor, and H. B. Ashplant talked 40 minutes on "Bolshevism." A short discussion was participated in by members of the audience at the close of the addresses.

When Professor Wood had exhausted his 30 minutes the chairman intimated that the time had come for him to give way to the next speaker, and he did so. Not Understood.

The meeting was decidedly in sympathy with the views enunciated by Mr. Ashplant, who declared that the Bolshevist movement had not been pro-

Mr. Ashplant, who declared that the Bolshevist movement had not been properly understood in Canada because the "hired, subsidized press" and the "secret treaty diplomats" were is league to keep the real facts from becoming known. He quoted from the Manchester Guardian, which he described as one of the greatest news papers, not only in England, but if the world, part of an editorial in which the Bolshevists of Russia were give credit for establishing order out of chaos, and in which the British Government was blamed for sending troop to Russia, which the paper quoted from declared to be an unwarrantable inter declared to be an unwarrantable inter-ference with the affairs of a country against which Britain had not even de-clared war.

Mr. Ashplant declared that the out-

Mr. Ashplant declared that the outrages which were given such prominence in the press of Canada and Britain, were not the true indications of the character of Bolshevism. These things, he said, were the fruits of the seed sown by the autocrats of the Russian regime which was overthrown, and which had subjected the Russian working classes to the greatest indignities. He suggested also that some of the recent happenings in Russia pointed the lesson of the danger of hooze. A drink-crazed mob would do things which sober, its constituent individuals would not dream of doing.

Bearing on Labor.

Bolshevism, said the speaker, had a distinct bearing on Canadian labor conditions. It was the first successful revolution in the world's history on the part of labor as opposed to capital. Capital, declared Mr. Ashplant, represented the parasite class, while labor represented the only real producers of the world. 



the great waste of labor and material entailed by the present system of housekeeping, which necessitates "one hundred cooks in one hundred kitchens getting one hundred separate meals," which might be prepared in ten excellently outfitted kitchens, using ten per cent of the fuel and ten per cent of the labor. "Each family would still be in the privacy of the home, but the meal, in-stead of coming from an all-too-perceptible kitchen, would be delivered at the round food-container, entailing no labor beyond setting the dishes

If preferred the families could use their own dishes and wash
h a container could carry all necessary table container. door in a vacuum food-container, entailing no labor beyond setting the dishes 24 sc: them, but such a container could carry all necessary table service, so that after the meal everything could go back inside and be carried away as it came."

The writer next undertakes to solve the cleaning problem. She says: "The cleaning of an eight-room house, without a kitchen, would be a day's work for one woman. But with the swift efficiency of trained experts, using the best mechanical appliances and going from house to house in groups of two or three working together, a hundred houses could be cleaned once a week by a force of nine."

She also suggests that four women, working together in a well-equipped nodern laundry, could do washings for a hundred families, one manager attending to the cleaning force as well as the laundry.

The only thing left then, is the care of the children below school age, not nursing babies. For these, the writer suggests a baby-garden, properly fitted for their health and comfort, with two women in charge, whose love for little children is "not only maternal, but the deeper, larger, human love, which is willing to study long, to take training, to devote a whole life to the most noble of all endeavors, the improvement of the race, through true child-culture." For the larger children, she says "our schools must become second homes, with provision for rest and play as well as education, so that the family can

leave the house at once and come home together."

In this way the writer places in the hands of a working force of 25 women what is now being done by 100, a tremendous saving in labor. The reduction in the cost of living would also be very great, involving the difference between wholesale and retail prices, and the great lessening in the cost of delivery. For the systematic delivery of meals twice a day would cost much less than the present delivery of bread, milk, groceries, meat and the visits of the wagons a time this should be done. I wonder for ashes and garbage.

Besides reducing the cost of living, into each household would be coming a double wage, that of husband and wife.

The writer's immediate reason for suggesting such organization of woman power, hangs on the fact that the devastation of war has made it necessary to develop productive industry to a maximum, avoiding all waste labor. She writes: "Housework is to be counted as productive industry only in so far as it labor." Taking United States statistics as a basis for investigation, she estimates that there are 16,000,000 non-gainful women in that country, after subtracting 2,000,000 women engaged yearly in child-bearing, 4,000,000 already working, 2,000,000 of old, sick, defective or pauper women and 2,000,000 already working, 2,000,000 of old, sick, defective or pauper women and 2,000,000 living in too remote districts to be calculated. These are the advantages which the adoption of her system would bring: "To serve the country and the world in bitter need. To increase the family income, sometimes double it. To have more free time with one's family. To make the food service, laundry service, cleaning service, and child service is under honesty, efficiency and unselfishness."



Wheat flour, farina, fresh milk and cream, butter, cheese, condensed evaporated milk, bran, shorts, middlings, pollard, gluten meal, brewers' and distillers' grains, cottonseed cake, meal and oil, calf meal, patent and proprietary cattle feeds, eggs, sugars, syrups and molasses, sugar beets, clover seed, mill screenings and screenings of grain, and canned salmon. Export and import permits for wheat and oats must still be obtained from the board of grain supervisors, Whnipeg.

Foodstuffs which still require import permits from the food board are:

Macaroni, vermicelli, spaghetti, wheat flour, candy and confectionery, cocca and chocolate, prepared and manufactured, and sugars.

For foodstuffs, if destined for any of the American countries, any part of the British Empire, the European Allies, the Far East or Africa, the general license system is adopted.
