GREY ADDRESSES THE COMMONS ON THE MOROCCAN INCIDENT

The British Foreign Secretary Says Germany Departed From Diplomatic Procedure in Disclosing Contents of Conversations -Explains Action Which Almost Led to War.

[Canadian Press.]

London, Nov. 27.—Sir Edward Grey, secretary for foreign affairs, seared the political atmosphere and poured oil on the turbulent waters of Anglo-German relations in a speech lasting an hour and a half in the House of Commons this afternoon.

The foreign secretary reviewed the whole Moroccan episode from the sudden appearance of the German gunboat Panther in the port of Agadir in Southern Morocco up to the signing of the France-German treaty. He unflinchingly upheld the attitude taken by the British Government, but at or to any settlement she was able to arrange with France, and which did not threaten the rights of Great Britain.

Sir Edward Grey made no secret of the fact that the situation had at one time been very tense, but thought his statements today would prove a vedaive to a world which had been indulging in a fit of political alcoholism. and that the time had arrived for it to get and to keep cool and sober.

The situation in North Bay proves two things. First, it is not necessary that French children be taught in French even in the primary classes, in order to give them an English education. Second, the bilingual school can give French children a good working knowledge of English if the proper methods and qualified teachers are employed. Two reasons are given for the different results in North Bay and Sturgeon Falls. In the latter place, French continues to be taught through the senior third, and through both years of the fourth class, right up to the entrance examinations. 

A NEW VISION
OF CHRISTIANITY

Rev. R. J. Campbell, of England, Addresses Large Audience at Toronto.

DEMOCRACY AWAKENED

He Believes New Forces Will Relegate War and Purify Social Depravity.

Toronto, Nov. 25.—Rev. R. J. Campbell, of the famous City Temple, London, England, enunciated his new theology, "Liberal Christianity," at the Bond Street Congregational Church last night. As he stood in the pulpit, a trim, graceful figure in black, with spare, ascetic face, dominated by flashing dark eyes and crowned by silver-white hair, speaking his sage in a voice, cultured and unaffected and with a kindly wistful note, the level of the individual conscience was far higher than what found expression in the courts and chanceries. A new spirit was animating democracy and statesmanship in Great Britain at all events, which would ultimately make war impossible. (Applause.) "Liberal Christianity stands for four things," the speaker said, in opening: "the humanity of God and the Divinity of Man; the thorough and fearless application of the scientific method to religion regardlesss of dogmatic pre-suppositions; the recognition of the solidarity of all human life and the consistent application of the solidarity of all human life and above all things, the proclamation of the solidarity of all human life and above all things, the proclamation of God."

Then the speaker referred to the frequent use which Christ made of the words, "Kingdom of God," showing that Christianity and membership in the Kingdom of God was not an outward state, but rather a new spirit in men, Christ, he said, had put no faith in any institution which had not behind it the formed spiritual consciousness of the people who were to benefit by it.

"If the Christin conscience of the country is low," he continued, "the laws are low. Divorce is not a legislative evil, but a moral evil. Thank God, divorce is uncommon in this Candad of ours; may it be ever so. The Christian consicence of this country is wide-awake spiritually and mentally, and as long as we do not degenerate we need have no fear of divorce being common in this country. I admire our Catholic friends for standing out against divorce."
