Cows Milked To Music Yield More Fluid

New York, Oct. 29 .- Cows will yield much more of the creamy lacteal fluid when encouraged and soothed by strains of soft music. In a recent test here with both Guernsey and Holstein cows, all were milked until apparently dry. Then an electrically operated phonograph was started playing and the cows gave from 10 to 12 per cent additional milk. Other tests were made with music being played continuously during the milking period, and all of the cows averaged 10 to 12 per cent more milk than next.

AS WORLD HAS CHANGED, SO MUST CHURCH'S CUSTOMS

Rev. Dr. Dickie Tells Audience Church Must Be Readjusted.

We have come through the war to "We have come through the war to a new day and the church must be readjusted," declared Rev. Dr. H. Dickie, D.D., of Chatham, in the First Presbyterian Church last evening in the course of an address, upon the Forward Movement. "Ancient history, as it may be called, ended on August 4, 1914, and as the world has changed in the past few years, so must the church change its customs to be abreast of the times. While it is true that the old church accomplished a great amount of good in the past, it cannot live on that record, no matter how splendid it may be."

Dr. Dickie explained his belief that there is an absence of Christian funda-mentals in the world at the present time, and he defined them under three main subjects. The first was the abmain subjects. The first was the absence of prayer, especially in the homes. The heads of many households, after professing Christianity, live and conduct their homes as if there is no God, he said, and it is a mere camouflage. The second point was the absence of Christian fellowship; the close social and spiritual fellowship which was embraced by the old church is an unknown factor now. Then the speaker outlined the third point as the absence of Christian efficiency. Although the world contains many skilled artisans and professional men, there is an exceedingly small number of efficient church workers, and during the present unsettled condition of the world, the church workers, and during the present unsettled condition of the world, the problem of christianizing the people is the largest and most difficult task. The speaker did not suggest the reestablishment of the old church forms, but stated that they should be replaced by new, adequate forms. "This must be a time of reconstruction," he said, "and there is an uvgent need for the Forward Movement."

CANADA SPEAKS.

The elections of Monday dispel any doubt that may yet have lingered as to the nationwide extension of dissatisfaction with Tory Gov ernment. Ontario was the last of the provinces to buck off the fossil riders, but she did it with a vengeance. Now after long hesitation the Borden Government has trusted itself to a pronouncement in federal constituencies, and we have seen the answer.

The local Unionist organ affects to see both of the old parties rebuffed on Monday. Those that are fat and sleep o'nights are easily satisfied or consoled. The United Farmers, espe cially perhaps in the west, are simply ultra Liberals and will more than support Liberal policies. And it is not men or a party machine but policies that Liberalism always considers

The majestic old Montreal Gazette (ultra Conservative) looks over the situation through its capitalistic spectacles and decides with much head-shaking that the only thing now to save the Unionist Government is to "throw out some more of the weak timber in the cabinet" and present such a program of conservative measures as are needed to carry the country through the coming years of trial." This is really too delightful a misreading of after-the-war conditions. It hardly seems serious, but then it is the Gazette that speaks. The idea is that more simon-pure old-line Conservatism is what wil pacify the angry feelings of the Canadian electorate! Prohibition manoeuvres, the pretence o ownership, the sham income and war profits taxes and the clumsy bluffs at curbing profiteers, all this quasi-Liberalism should be pruned out and then the country will settle down in peace. The Gazette lives in an oldworld dream

It is plain as daylight that Canada is not disposed to slumber or reaction. The meaning of the II F. movement everywhere is the return to rock-bottom Liberalism, the interest of the masses before that of the classes, economical administration as against public provision for favorites and hangers-on, nepotism and Family Compact, a revenue tariff supplemented by adequate taxation of wealth and measures to secure equalization of opportunity to all.

Against a tempest of public disapproval and exclamation can it be imagined that the hardly be regarded as anything less than a usurpation. The American public recognizes the justice in the demands of the miners for better wages and better conditions, but seems to be determined that disputes over these grievances shall not be allowed to sink the entire nation in industrial anarchy, bankruptcy, physical suffering, and, possibly, civil war. If the bituminous mines of the United States are tied up, in a very short time the railways will cease running, 95 per cent of the country's industries will come to a standstill, and the vast majority of the working population will be idle. Follows, as sure as darkness follows daylight, cold and starvation and bloody clashes. Hence the American public's demand that the Government operate the railways, the mines, and such industries as are Tens of thousands of trades unionists forgotten." are opposed to such a strike as this, for labor would be the immediate and greatest sufferer. Hon. Arthur Meighen replied that in that instance there was merely a forecast of the legislation, while in this case the whole matter was before the House and all the details explained. There was no reason for the Opposition to make the same request as at that time.

The Opposition further criticized the Government because the terms of the agreement with the Grand Trunk Company were not to be submitted to Parliament for approval. Mr. King having pointed out that the meeting of Parliament to ratify the peace treaty was a parallel case, Mr. Meighen replied that there had been no prior authority on the part of Parliament to enter into the peace treaty.

Finally the minister introduced an amendment to clause three of the bill which was under discussion, providing that only such changes could be made in the agreement with the company as "are not inconsistent with the provisions of this act."

Not Yet Drafted.

In answer to Mr. King, Mr. Meighen stated that the agreement between the Grand Trunk Railway Company and the Government had not been drafted. He did not knew when it would be ready, but if it was ready before the House rose, he had no objection to its coming before Parliament. He objected to any change in the clause which would preclude the governor-in-council from embodying provisions in the agreement w

Mr. Meighen replied that there need be no date fixed. The agreement between the company and the Government would not go into force until the voting power of the stocks had been agreedered. C. A. Gauvreau, Liberal, protested against the constant repetition in questions asked the Government. 

Stands As One Man For Protection of Public.

PLAN NOT DISCLOSED

Miners' Organization Grimly Prepares For Momentous Conference.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 28.—How to deal with the soft coal strike In the event that the miners, ignoring President Wilson's command to stay on the Job, walk out Friday night, was definitely agreed upon today at a two-hour meeting of the cabinet.

The plan of action was not disclosed, but it is known that the cabinet stood as one man for protection of the rights of the public, which would suffer with the closing of the mines in which ordinarily more than half a million members of the United Mine Workers of America are employed. INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Oct. 28.—With "no change in the situation" reported at the United Mine Workers of America headquarters, leaders of the big organization of coalminers were preparing grimly tonight for a momentous conference tomorrow of its executive board, district presidents and scale committee. John L. Lewis, acting president of the organization, arrived late today from his home in Springfield, Ill., but had little to add to sentiments he has already expressed concerning the general strike planned to take effect in bituminous mines November 1.

Echoing the point made by William Green, secretary-treasurer of the organization, Mr. Lewis said that the national executive's idea that the neational executive's idea that the need for war-time prohibition had passed because the emergency had ended expressed exactly the union's attitude toward its war-time wage contract.

"There is no further use for war-time prohibition, according to the president," said Mr. Lewis. "Neither is there further use for the war-time Washington wage agreement. We therefore resent the imputation that the strike is illegal."

The suggestion that work be continued pending appointment and report of an investigating tribunal was denounced by Mr. Lewis as a measure of delay.




