Observations.-1. The nearer the time of the moon's change, first quarter, full, and last quarter are to midnight, the fairer will the wather be during the seven days following.
2. The space of this calculation occupies from ten at night till two next morning.
3. The nearer to mid-day or noon, the phases of the moon happen, the more foul or wet weather may be expected during the next seven days.
4. The space of this calculation occupies from ten in the forenoon to two in the afternoon. These observations refer principally to the summer, though they affect spring and autumn nearly in the same ratio.
5. The moon's change, first quarter, full, and last quarter happening during six of the afternoon hours, i. e. from four to ten, may be fotlowed by fair weather; but this is mostly topendent on the wind as is noted in the table.

## THE WEATHER.

In compliance with the usual custom, the publisher hes inserted through the calendar pages of this Almanac, a running aecount of the weather. It is however, known that very little seliance is to be placed in such matters.

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## The Sygns.-Explanatione

The Moon's piace in the Zodiac is also given. It has beef an ancient custom to apply this to the human frame, as operatitig on particular pertions of it. Those who place reliance in this notion (which lins long since been exploded by the learned) will find out what they desire, by substituting tho parts of the body, for the astronomical name given in the last column of the calendar pages, as annexed:

## To Protect Fruit from late Spring Frost.

$\mathrm{S}_{1 \mathrm{k}}$-Many expedients have been resuted to for the proo bection of fruit from the blighting influence of la'e frosts. Throwing a shect over the tree, hangimg iron upon it, kindling a fire under it. \&cc. have each been found to have a benefictal influence, but noue have been more efficient than the experimert which I am about to describe.
My friend $\mathrm{M}_{\text {ij }}$ ir R iff, who is a virtuoso, lately informed me that matily years as; he saw it stated in a French Paper, that by throwing a hemp roap over the top of a fruit tree, twhen in bloom or near the time of blomming, and by tetting its lower end touch the grount, themtree wald be protected from the inflience of frost. 'This I thought quite rational and phi-losophic-I accoraingly made the experiment. To prove more fully the modus operandi, I took two dishes half filled with water, and set them a few feet distant, under tho tree, on the night before an expecte. frost, the tree being nearly in full bloom. Throwing the rope over the top of the trees, I let the other end hang in the water of one of the dishes-the event proved the correctness of the theory. There was a hard frost on the moning of the 27th inst, and the dish into which the rope was deposited, cotnaned ice of the thickness of a dollar, while that in the other dish was scarcely of the thickness of paper.

The philusophy of the above experiment is this: the rope which was previously wetted, was a conductor of heat; the air, and of course the limbs of the tree, becante colder in the night than the earth-the ropeconducted the heat from the earth to the tree, thus keeping up an equilibrium, and preserving the tree from frost.

As far as my observation extends, the critical time for fruit is long before it is in blossnm ; but it is nevertheless true, that severe and protractel cold at that time, or even later, will destroy the fruit. This was the case last year. The fruit was killed by severefrost afier it had been formed.

There is not in my mind a doubr, that by attaching a rope to each tree of choice fruit, and thus letting it permanately remain through the winter and spring, that the fiuit would be secured from the effects of frost.

To the incredulous and the supercillinus who balance their grist all their lives with a big stone-who sufficiently wise, despise knowledge and instruction, the above may appear unworthy therr attention. Let such be informed that it is not less philosophic than lightning rods attached to buildings to protect them from the influence of electricity-Let thein be informed that
"There are more things in Heaven and Earth Than their philosophy has ever dreamed of."


Germination of seeds.- There is a complaint fiequently made by thase who purchase their garden and other seeds. that they do not grow ; and hence it is inferied that untipe and inferior seeds are put up to increase the sales; and consequently the profis of the gavdner and the seedsman. This inference may in some cases pnssibi') be true, but that it is sn in all cases where seeds do not grow, is certuinly wrong ; for no fact is more clearly ascertained, than that good seeds do not always germinate. Two things are incispensable to

the germination of seeds-hexat and moisture, if either of thesr is absert, the proeess must be suspended. It follows as a necessary consequence, that seeds planted so deep that the rays of the sun carnot influence them must remain in a state unfavourable to thei, growith; and implanted in a soil where there is warmth but no moisture, the same result will ensue. Some seeds have a coating so hard that they rarely grow under ordinary circumstances. The man who sho'd condemn his locust seed because they did nnt grow, when planted without preparation, wo'd only manifest his ignorance: by pouring boiling water upon them, allowing them to stand 48

Netw way of rateing eeets - A writer in the Farmet's Jabunet, says that the best crop of beets he ever raised, wa: n alternate rows with corn. The corn was a full ciop ; and ie ob a ned three hundred bushels of beets to t e acre, wesides The shade of the corn seems to be useful, in dry weather, as he beets with the corn did better than others in an open patcl long side. This was, pacticed in Pennsylvania, where i nay be more successful than in colder climates; but we would suggest to farmers who have a warm, diy soil, an experimer. in a small scale.

District Court. - These are held in every District at the time ant place of holding the Quarter Sessions.

The Term Courl, in which Law points and other matters of prac ice are settied, rlways prectes the time of holding the Quarter Sessions, and the Distric! Court as follows:-that is, the terms of the District Curt, severally commence on the Monday in the week next but one preceding the week, and at the plare, in which the sessions are holden, and end on the 'Eaturdav in the same week.

The Distric: Court has jurisdiction in all matters of contract from forty shillings to $£ 15$; and when tise ansount is liquidated or ascertimed, either by the act of the parties or the nature of the transaction, to forty pounds. For instance, a promissnry note under finty pounds can be sred in this Court, and an open, but unsetiled account of fifteen pounds, or under, but not over that amount. Also it has juristiction in all matters of tort respecting persoral chatiles, when the damages to be recovered do not exceed $£ 15$, and the title to land is not brought into question. By a statute of the United Parliament, the Judge of the District Coutt, presides in the Court of Requests. The ordinary costs of a suis range froa f5 to $£ 10$-in the Queen's Bench from $£ 10$ to $£ 30$.

There are also Courts of Request, for the recovery of small debts ur.der $£ 10$. By a resent statute. The District Judiges preside in these and hold Couts in six divisions in etch Disrict once in two months.

## TOW NSHIP OFFICERS.

Town hip Meetings to be held annualiy on the first Monday in Januiry, by notice of the Towhship Cleik, after receiving a warrant fioin any two Justices of the Peace acting for the division in which the townships are situated, at such place as they may appoint. All Erecholders and Heuseholders over 21 years af age are entitied to vore. The Officers to be chosen are: one Cownship Cle k, one Assessor, one Collector, a sufficient number of persons to seeve as Pound Képpers and Overseers of Highways, three Town Wardens, and by stat, 4 Wm. IV.ch. 12, from thee to eighteen Fence Viewers. No Magistrate is lable to serve; nor other person offner than ence in three years, without his consent. Persons elected are Fiable to a penalty, if they do not within 20 daysafier their appointment subseribe to a declaration, to be prepared by the Township Cleik. Town Meetings regulate matters relating to cattle running at large, fines for breach of rules, height and description of fences, dangeroos pits, obnoxious weeds, \&c. Magistrates to hold a special sessions on or before the 31 Saturday in April in each yoar, nt which road divisions \&ec. are to be ar ranged. For the duties of Township Officers generally, seo chap. 291 Victoria. 1837-8; also the By-laws of the District Council.

By the late District Council Act, two Councillors are to be elecsed in each township having over 300 qualified voters, and one Councillor for each Townshyp having a less number. Seven School Commissioners are also to be elected for each of the former class of Townships, and five for the latter.

## Statute Labour, or Highway Rates.

Every male inhabitant, from 21 years of age to 50, not rated on the Assessment Roll, are liable to work on the highways two days. And by 59 Geo. III. chap. 8, section 2d, every person inserted on the Assessment Rolt, is, in proportion to the estimate of his real and personal property, stated on the said Roll, held liable to work on the highways and roads, in each year as follows:-If his property be not rated at more than $£ 25$, two days; from that to $£ 50$, three days ; from that so $£ 75$, four days; from that to $£ 100$, five days and

Every person possessed of a waggon, cart or Team of horses oxen or beasts of burthen or draft, used to draw the sume, is liable to work three days.

Inidgent persons, oppressed by sickness, age, or having a Jarge family can be exempted at the discretion of the Town Wardens.

Any person liable can commute at 2 s . 6d. per day, if they think proper.

The District Council is empowered to frame laws for commuting the Statute Labour.

All lands are rateable held in fee simple, or promise of a fee simple by land board certificate, order of council, or certificato of any Governor of Canada, or by lease. The sum lovied in no case to exceed one penny on the pound, for any one year, except the wages of members of the Assembly which are to be levied in addition.

The Queen, should she be possessed of, or in the actual occupation of any property in the province, is excepted from the payinent of taxes.
